Theme: God is always present in our life.

Breaking Open the Word

Suggested text for faith sharing: Gospel Reading Jesus said to his disciples:

No one can serve two masters. He will either hate one and love the other, or be devoted to one and despise the other. You cannot serve God and mammon. Therefore I tell you, do not worry about your life, what you will eat or drink, or about your body, what you will wear. Is not life more than food and the body more than clothing? Look at the birds in the sky; they do not sow or reap, they gather nothing into barns, yet your heavenly Father feeds them. Are not you more important than they? Can any of you by worrying add a single moment to your life-span? Why are you anxious about clothes? Learn from the way the wild flowers grow. They do not work or spin. But I tell you that not even Solomon in all his splendor was clothed like one of them. If God so clothes the grass of the field, which grows today and is thrown into the oven tomorrow, will he not much more provide for you, O you of little faith? So do not worry and say, 'What are we to eat?' or 'What are we to drink?' or 'What are we to wear?' All these things the pagans seek. Your heavenly Father knows that you need them all. But seek first the kingdom of God and his righteousness, and all these things will be given you besides. Do not worry about tomorrow; tomorrow will take care of itself. Sufficient for a day is its own evil."

Step One: Listen to the Word

Food, drink, clothing are mentioned in this passage. What anxieties do you feel when you release control of these things and put your trust in God?

Step Two: Look into your Life

Question for Children: What do you worry about? What can you do to stop worrying and rely on God?

Question for Youth: Do you serve two masters? If so, what can you do to stop and serve only God?

Question for Adults: Who really is the master of your life?

CATHOLIC TEACHING ON CREMATION

Recently, I had a conversation with some of our Catholics who were unaware of the Church's teaching on cremation. The following is a question and answer guide taken from the New York State Catholic Conference of Bishops and the Church's latest instruction entitled "Instruction Ad resurgendum cum Christo Regarding the Burial of the Deceased and the Conservation of the Ashes in the Case of Cremation". My hope is that this will help us when deciding on the funeral of our loved ones and or ourselves in the future.

What is Cremation?

Cremation is the process of which the body of the deceased is reduced to its basic elements. Cremation is permitted for Catholics as long as it is not chosen in denial of Christian teaching on the Resurrection and the sacredness of the human body.

Does the Church have a Preference for Either Cremation or Burial of a Body for the Deceased?

Catholic teaching continues to stress the preference of the burial of or entombment of the body of the deceased. This is done in the imitation of the burial of Jesus' body. The burying of the body shows a greater esteem towards the deceased. However, the Church also permits the practice of cremation since the cremation of the deceased's body does not affect his or her soul, nor does it prevent God, in his omnipotence, from raising up the deceased body to new life. Cremation in and of itself objectively neither negates neither the Christian doctrine of the soul's immortality nor that of the resurrection of the body.

It is allowed unless it was chosen for reasons contrary to Christian Doctrine.

What are the Steps to be Taken?

When cremation is chosen for a good reason, the full course of the Funeral should be celebrated including the Wake, the Funeral Mass and the Rite of Committal (Cemetery). Through its funeral rites, the Church commends the dead to the merciful love of God and pleads for the forgiveness of their sins.

Should the Cremation Occur Before or After the Funeral?

The Church prefers and urges that the body be present during the Wake and Funeral Mass and that cremation be done after the Funeral Mass. However, the Church also permits cremated remains to be present for the Funeral Liturgy as an option, recognizing the changing trends in funeral practices around the world.

What Should Become of the Cremated Remains Following the Funeral?

Church teaching insists that cremated remains must be given the same respect as the body, including the manner in which they are carried and given attention to their appropriate transport and placement.

The cremated remains of the faithful must be laid to rest in a sacred place that is in a cemetery or in certain cases in a church or special area that has been set aside for this purpose by competent ecclesial authority.

The following are not considered reverent actions by the church: the scattering of ashes, in the air, on land, or at sea (Except Military);, dividing the cremated remains amongst family members or friends, keeping cremated remains in mementos, pieces of jewelry or other objects, and keeping the cremated remains in the home. "Keeping ashes at home on the mantel, is a sign not only of love and grief, but also of not understanding how the loved one belonged to the entire community of faith and not just to his or her closest relatives". (Cardinal Muller)

From the beginning of the early church times, Christians desired that the faithful departed become objects of the Christian community's prayers and remembrance. Their tombs have become places of prayer, remembrance and reflection. The faithful departed remain part of the Church who believe "in the communion of all the faithful of Christ, those who are pilgrims on earth, the dead who are being purified and the blessed in heaven, all together forming one church. (15).

The reservation of the ashes of the departed in a sacred place ensures that they are not excluded from the prayers and remembrance of their family or the Christian community. It prevents the faithful departed from being forgotten, or their remains from being shown a lack of respect. It also prevents any unfitting or superstitious practices. When the deceased notoriously has requested cremation and the scattering of their ashes for reasons contrary to the Christian faith, a Christian funeral must be denied to that person according to the norms of the law.[16]


WHAT'S HAPPENING AROUND OUR FACILITIES? CAPITAL CAMPAIGN UPDATE!




