"Belong More Deeply"

Third Sunday of Lent Sun., March 19, 2017

Theme: Jesus is the Living Water
Breaking Open the Word

Suggested text for faith sharing: Gospel, the short form.

Jesus came to a town of Samaria called Sychar, near the plot of land that Jacob had given to his son Joseph. Jacob's well was there. Jesus, tired from his journey, sat down there at the well. It was about noon. A woman of Samaria came to draw water. Jesus said to her, "Give me a drink." His disciples had gone into the town to buy food. The Samaritan woman said to him, "How can you, a Jew, ask me, a Samaritan woman, for a drink?" —For Jews use nothing in common with Samaritans.—Jesus answered and said to her, "If you knew the gift of God and who is saying to you, 'Give me a drink, 'you would have asked him and he would have given you living water."

Step One: Listen to the Word: In this story, what image or scene did you see in your mind's eye? What phrase or word caught your ear?

Step Two: Look into Your Life

Question for Children: How do you experience Jesus helping and loving you?

Question for Youth: Jesus revealed himself to an outcast of society. How can you be "living water" to the outcasts of your school? Society? The world?

Question for Adults: When you are tempted to try to satisfy your "thirst for meaning" through some other means, what keeps you coming back to the living water of intimacy with Christ? Through what means do you experience Christ's power in your life: Sacraments? Scripture? Prayer? Others?

Matthew 17:1-9

LENT-LISTEN TO JESUS

A Sonnet on the Transfiguration

By Malcolm Guite

*For that one moment, in and out of time',
On that one mountain where all moments meet,
The daily veil that covers the sublime
In darkling glass fell dazzled at his feet .
There were no angels full of eyes and wings
Just living glory full of truth and grace.
The love that dances at the heart of things
Shone out upon us from a human face
And to that light the light in us leaped up,
We felt it quicken somewhere deep within,
A sudden blaze of long-extinguished hope
Trembled and tingled through the tender skin.
Nor can this blackened sky, this darkened scar
Eclipse that glimpse of how thing really are.*

This poem offers a beautiful description that we hear about in today's Gospel on the Transfiguration of Jesus. This is a time where Jesus knows that the disciples are fearful and downtrodden. They know that suffering awaits them. Jesus wants to give them a boost and help them face what is to come.

So he takes three of his closest disciples, Peter, James and John up to the top of a mountain and becomes transformed before their eyes. He gives them a glimpse of his resurrection to help them face the pain and suffering to come when he is placed on the cross. It is here on the mountain that Jesus receives all that he needs before completing his mission to bring in the reign of God.

This is a day when the disciples catch a glimpse of truth, grace and love in a human face; when we see for a moment the glory of God, when we are given real hope before beginning the darker side of Lent to the cross.

Jesus' transfiguration is a foreshadowing of

how we might be transformed in our lives while living on this earth. What we need to do is to listen to him and allow him to use us as his instrument of bringing his presence to others. We can do that by using our gifts, skills and talents to our parish in helping it to grow more and more into the body of Christ.

Please pray for all of our Elect and our Candidates of the RCIA who are experiencing a transformation of their own lives as they prepare to become Christians and/or full members of our Church at the Easter Vigil. They serve as an example of how Baptism washes us and changes us once and for all, and along with Confirmation and the Eucharist, brings us into God's family, transforming our living, and giving new life.

You can eat meat this Friday. Just choose another day not to eat meat, or do an act of charity and penance.

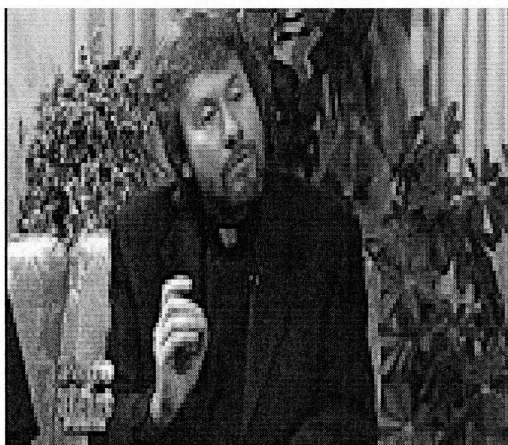

TU MISERICORDIA, SEÑOR, VENGA SOBRE NOSOTROS, COMO LO ESPERAMOS DE TI

¿Puede haber acaso un cristianismo sin cruz? ¿Puede uno ser discípulo de Cristo sin asumir las diarias exigencias de la vida cristiana, sin morir a los propios vicios y pecados para renacer diariamente a la vida en Cristo, sin abrazar con paciencia el dolor y el sufrimiento que también nosotros encontramos en nuestro caminar? ¡No! El Señor nos ha enseñado claramente: «Si alguno quiere venir en pos de mí, niéguese a sí mismo, tome su cruz y sígame».

Cristo cargó su Cruz y por nosotros murió en ella. Nuestra vida, para que se asemeje plenamente a la del Señor Jesús, debe pasar por la experiencia de la cruz. Al seguir a Cristo no se nos promete: «¡todo te va a ir bien!»

Todo lo contrario, se nos advierte de pruebas y tribulaciones, y se nos dice: «Hijo, si te llegas a servir al Señor, prepara tu alma para la prueba». La vida cristiana no es fácil, no está exenta de pruebas a veces muy duras. ¡Cuántos sucumben a las pruebas apenas el camino se torna “cuesta arriba”, apenas experimentan oposición, apenas se les exigen ciertas renunciaciones! El cristianismo no es para aquellos que buscan un refugio.

Pero, ¿quién en su debilidad y fragilidad será capaz de resistir la prueba, alcanzar la paciencia en el sufrimiento y en la adversidad, soportar el peso de la cruz y dejarse crucificar en ella, si no tiene una esperanza que lo sostenga e incluso un premio que lo estimule? Por ello, antes de cargar con su propia Cruz hasta el Calvario, antes de dejarse crucificar Él mismo para nuestra reconciliación, el Señor quiso mostrar un breve destello de su gloria a tres de sus apóstoles para hacernos entender que si bien no hay cristianismo sin cruz, la cruz es el camino a la luz, es decir, a la plena y gozosa participación de su misma gloria.

Así, pues, cada vez que las cosas se tornen difíciles en tu vida cristiana, cada vez que experimentes la prueba, la dificultad, la tribulación o cualquier sufrimiento, mira el horizonte luminoso que se halla detrás de la tiniebla pasajera y recuerda lo que decía San Pablo: «estimo que los sufrimientos del tiempo presente no son comparables con la gloria que se ha de manifestar en nosotros».
