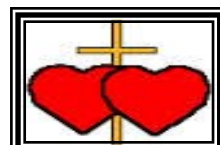

HOLY WEEK
THE WEEK THAT SAVED THE
WORLD

My brothers and sisters we have now entered the most sacred time of our Catholic Christian year, Holy Week. EWTN has a great theme when they call this week "The Week that Saved the World." Of course we need faith to understand this and to get the depth of our Lord's action from his journey into Jerusalem, to the Last Supper with his disciples, to the Cross on Calvary, to the tomb where he is buried and finally to the joy of Easter at the Resurrection.

Without faith, this week would be looked upon as a defeat. Most of the disciples and friends of Jesus certainly thought that way at first.

As we journey with our Lord this week, we may want to ask the question, what am I taking along with me as I go? What in my life do I want to give to the Lord and place on His cross? What is it that needs to be redeemed?

Of all the characters who have a role in the Passion and Death of Jesus, with whom do I identify most? Maybe it is more than one person? That is ok, because each of us may reflect the righteousness of the Pharisees, the fear of St. Peter and most of the disciples, the betrayal of Judas, the tears of the women of Jerusalem, or the faithful and/or the perseverance of Mary and the Beloved Disciples, whom most scholars say is John. May we not be afraid to bring all of this with us so that we may come to know that Jesus came to redeem it all and make us anew again.

The Salvation that Jesus brought into the world, is not economic or political. It is spiritual. Salvation is meant to liberate us from sin and death, because he came that we may have life and have it to the fullest.

Please take time to invite your family and friends to walk with Jesus along his journey because his journey is our journey. Maybe you know of one person who has not set foot into our journey for a while. Invite them. Allow them to feel the power and passion of Jesus.



Unite your suffering, anxieties, pains and gratitude with the Lord Jesus on the cross.

Beginning from Holy Thursday Evening to sundown on Easter Sunday, the church will be celebrating the most sacred time of this week, known as The Paschal Triduum which means three days.

These days are counted from sunset to sunset as one day, according to the Jewish tradition. During these days we keep one festival, our Passover, our Easter. We come together with all the people of our parish with Christians in every time and place, to fast, pray and keep watch for the Passover of the Lord.



COMUNIDAD HISPANA

DIOS MIO, DIOS MIO, PORQUE ME HAS ABANDONADO?



Desde los primeros años de la joven Iglesia cristiana, los creyentes reconocieron que con el sufrimiento, la muerte y la Resurrección de Cristo se cumplieron todas las profecías mesiánicas y se confirmó su identidad divina. El recuento de Mateo que escuchamos hoy es casi idéntico al de Marcos y comienza sugiriendo que el motivo de la traición de Judas fue avaricia y que las 30 monedas de plata cumplieron la profecía de Zacarías 11:12. Más tarde cuando Pedro

promete lealtad, Jesús predijo que lo iba a negar.

Podemos ver a estos discípulos como figuras históricas con cualidades y debilidades únicas, pero también como representantes de todos los cristianos. Al escuchar este relato podemos comparar sus reacciones y sentimientos a los nuestros en circunstancias similares. Después del juicio, algunos personajes inesperados se acercaron para ayudar a Jesús: Simón de Cirene, María de Magdala, y José de Arimatea; todos son signos de que Dios está presente y activo en los lugares más inesperados. La lectura de la Pasión del Domingo de Ramos prepara el escenario para todos los eventos de Semana Santa. Por ejemplo: el Jueves Santo, cuando la Iglesia celebra la institución de la Eucaristía, la lectura de ese día es el lavado de los pies del Evangelio de Juan y no el relato de la Última Cena. La lectura de hoy termina apropiadamente cuando cierran la tumba. Mateo es el único evangelista que incluye algunos signos que siguieron a la muerte de Jesús: el velo del Templo, el terremoto, las rocas partidas, la apertura de los sepulcros, y la resurrección de muchos. Es su manera de demostrar el efecto tan profundo que tuvo para toda la creación la muerte de Jesús.

- Jesús tomó pan, lo bendijo, lo partió y se lo dio a sus discípulos. Nosotros también estamos llamados a ser bendecidos, partidos, y entregados a otros en amor y servicio.
- Es en el contexto de nuestra experiencia comunitaria que somos transformados por la Pasión, la muerte, y la Resurrección de Jesucristo.
- En el instante que Jesús muere, “el velo del Santuario se rasgó en dos...” (27:51), posiblemente significando que ahora, por la muerte de Jesús, todos tenemos acceso a la presencia de Dios.

- ⇒ Al final de la cuaresma los católicos celebramos la Semana Santa, en la que recordamos la pasión, muerte y resurrección de Jesús.
- ⇒ La Semana Santa comienza con el DOMINGO DE RAMOS, este día recordamos cuando Jesús entro a Jerusalén y todo el pueblo lo alabo como Rey. Este día, los católicos llevamos palmas a la Iglesia, como los judíos en tiempo de Jesús, para que las bendiga.

El Viernes Santo:

- ⇒ Después de la ultima cena, Jesús fue a rezar a un monte que se llamaba de los Olivos y allí lo tomaron preso.
- ⇒ Después lo interrogaron, lo azotaron, le pusieron una corona de espinas, se burlaron de El y finalmente le clavaron en una cruz y murió.



El Jueves Santo:

- ⇒ El Jueves Santo recordamos la ULTIMA CENA con Jesús y sus apóstoles. Donde Jesús: instituye el sacerdocio, y instituye la eucaristía, ya que El quería quedarse para siempre con nosotros.

Y como hizo esto?

Dejándonos LA EUCARISTIA, o sea la COMUNION. Entonces, cada vez que comulgamos, Cristo que esta en la hostia, entra en nuestra alma.
