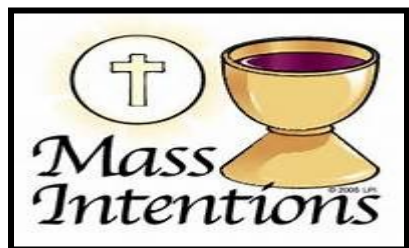

Breaking Open the Word

Suggested text for faith sharing: 2nd Reading from Peter

Beloved: If you invoke as Father him who judges impartially according to each one's works, conduct yourselves with reverence during the time of your sojourning, realizing that you were ransomed from your futile conduct, handed on by your ancestors, not with perishable things like silver or gold but with the precious blood of Christ as of a spotless unblemished lamb.

He was known before the foundation of the world but revealed in the final time for you, who through him believe in God who raised him from the dead and gave him glory, so that your faith and hope are in God.

Step One: Listen to the Word

As you hear the words of Peter in this reading, what line or phrase strikes you most powerfully?

Step Two: Look into Your Life

Question for Children:

How is Jesus your example when others don't like you?

Question for Youth:

Sheep know their shepherd and follow his voice. How hard is it for you to recognize the voice of God in your own life? Who has helped you hear God's voice?

Question for Adults:

In what specific ways is Christ an example which you follow when dealing with others, especially with the ones against whom you hold a grudge or those who dislike you?

Happy Easter, parishioners!!

As we progress through the Easter season, Father Jim has graciously permitted me to present some thoughts about St. Ignatius Human Services' commitment to fulfilling Christ's message on earth. In this Easter season, we are reminded of how Jesus was faced with numerous challenges: He fed the hungry and healed the sick, and even brought Lazarus back to life. He himself was resurrected on the third day, Easter Sunday!

As a faith community, we are also presented with numerous challenges: welcoming the stranger, feeding the hungry, sheltering the homeless, comforting the bereaved, supporting the poor, among others. As Catholics, with the support of the Holy Spirit, we are called to overcome these challenges. St. Ignatius Human Services is the conduit through which these challenges are routinely met and overcome. For many people in our community, St. Ignatius Human Services is the face of St Ignatius Loyola R. C. Church. For the past forty-one years, we have welcomed all those who are in need: whether the need is groceries to feed a family or English lessons to be able to function in the larger community. The St. Ignatius Human Service Center and Center of Mercy operate in an atmosphere of Christ's caring, concern and compassion.

St. Ignatius Human Services has maintained numerous programs and events for our community's disenfranchised populations throughout the year. Beginning with our fiscal year each September, we distribute new school supplies, provided by the St. Ignatius community, to children in need with our Back-to-School program. Every year, prior to Thanksgiving, I fret and worry that we won't have a sufficient number of turkeys to provide to those in need; and every year at Thanksgiving, through the generosity of parishioners and others in Hicksville, we distribute more than 140 turkeys and Thanksgiving dinner gift baskets. We provide hot Thanksgiving meals to the homeless and to shut-in individuals. Is this not a present-day reenactment of Jesus' feeding of the masses with fishes and loaves? We live out our faith in other ways: at Christmas, more than one hundred households who live in poverty are given department store gift cards donated by parishioners.

As our Lord cared for the sick, so do we, referring those in need to the Bishop McHugh Health Center here in Hicksville and to the Fideliscare Health Insurance program.

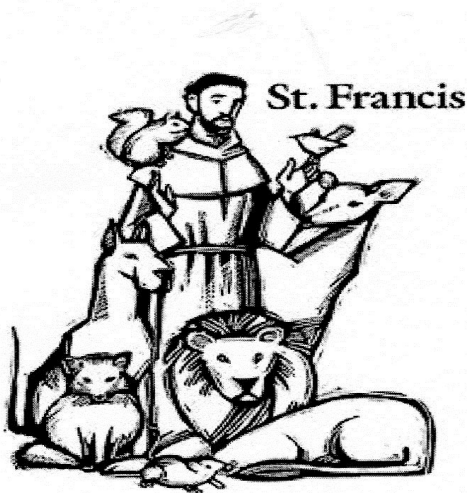
We are committed to follow Christ by providing the food, clothes and other services on which the large and growing population of impoverished people in our community depends. Over the years, we have opened more than one thousand seven hundred cases. Presently, more than two hundred seventy cases are open. St. Ignatius Human Services tries to make sure that these people are sheltered, clothed and have enough to eat. It is this endeavor that brings us closer to living out our lives as Christians and being one in the body of Christ.

One Minute Meditations

St. Zita of Lucca

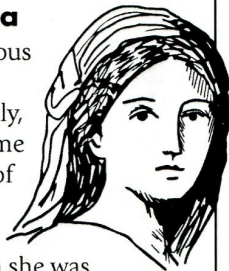

family when she was

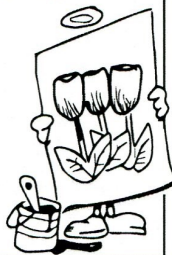
twelve. For her hard work, piety, and generosity, she was despised by her fellow servants and overburdened by her employers. Eventually, her love and humility won over her enemies, and she was given charge of all household affairs. Famous for helping the sick, the poor, and the imprisoned, she is the patroness of domestic workers.



Heart to heart

There is nothing wrong with "pestering" God (Matthew 7:7), but think: if this were all we did with our loved ones, what quality of relationship would that be? Instead, God seeks a personal relationship with each of us — to converse with us heart-to-heart. Of course, tell him what's on your heart, but don't forget to listen to him, too.

"Draw near to God, and he will draw near to you" (James 4:8).



Healthy habits for happy hearts

Human beings are creatures of habits — we love our comfortable routines. Healthy diet and exercise practices make our bodies strong. The same is true of spiritual habits. They can strengthen our souls. The key to living a happy life is to develop healthy habits of the heart.

Humility. Humility is closely tied to gratitude and is the appropriate response to contemplating the greatness of God. Regularly meditating on God's immense acts — creating the universe out of nothing, sacrificing himself to save us — is a sure way to appreciate his love and generosity.

Prayer. Happy Catholics use prayer to connect to God and gain distance from

worldly preoccupations that can weigh heavily. Develop a prayer routine that helps you "pray constantly." For example, start with a morning offering, recite the Angelus at noon, pray a daily Rosary, perform a brief examination of conscience at night, and sit in silent prayer for at least 15 minutes.

Trust. No one asks for discomfort but we get into trouble when we go out of our way to avoid it. In so doing, we can put ourselves before God and others. Healthy

Catholics know that there is no avoiding suffering and it can even be meaningful. Trusting that God loves us dearly and will use our suffering for good makes the suffering easier to bear.



Why Do Catholics Do That?

Why do Catholics believe in the "Real Presence"?

We believe that Jesus is really, truly, and substantially present in the Eucharist because we have it on divine authority. Referring to the Eucharist, Jesus told his disciples, "whoever eats my flesh and drinks my blood has eternal life" (John 6:54). Jesus makes this



promise to us every time we receive the Eucharist at Mass. When the priest, acting in the person of Christ, consecrates the bread and wine, Jesus becomes really and truly present, Body, Blood, Soul, and Divinity.

Take an antidote for a deadly sin

Some sins are considered especially deadly because they lead to other sins. Fortunately, the "Capital" or "Deadly" sins such as envy, pride and lust have antidotes. For example:

Envy is wanting what someone else has. Heavy doses of gratitude will help. Our peace is restored when we remember that all good gifts come from God and are glad for others' good fortune and grateful for our own.

Pride is seeking attention and honor that belong to God. Pride makes us focused on ourselves,



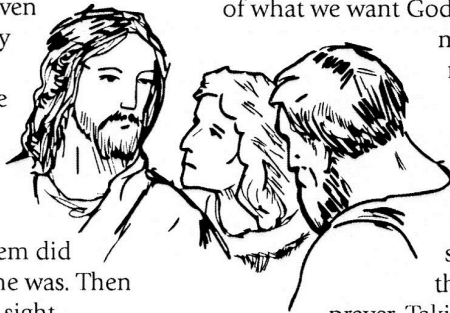
concerned about how we appear to others. Humility is a counter. Purposely draw attention to others, rather than yourself. Praise and thank God daily for your gifts.

Lust is focusing on sexual self-gratification rather than glorifying God. Sexuality is a gift from God and not inherently impure. Lust, however, is misuse of that gift, straying from God's intentions for us. Love, willing the good of the other, is at the heart of what it means to be human. Love for God and each other is the antidote.

from Scripture

Luke 24:13-35, Jesus hides in plain sight

Jesus was so close to Cleopas and his companion on the road to Emmaus, he could have tripped them. Yet neither man recognized him. Jesus even gave clues to his identity that he quoted from Scripture. The men were too caught up in the pain and disappointment of the crucifixion. Only when he broke bread with them did they see Jesus for who he was. Then he was gone from their sight.



Both Cleopas and his friend had formed such clear ideas of what they wanted Jesus to be that they failed to see him for who he was. They expected a

warrior king and almost missed the universal savior. Aren't we like that, too? Don't we have such expectations of what we want God to be that we

miss who he really is? Christ's presence in our lives isn't revealed so much by the song of angels as the whisper of a

prayer. Taking the time to be alone with God, to read Scripture, and seek him in the people around us will help us uncover Christ's presence everywhere.

Q & A

Why are there religious orders?

Historically, religious orders were founded in response to a need within the Church. Each order receives a special



grace from the Holy Spirit, called a charism, which helps to build up the Church. For example, the charism of the Sisters of Life is to

protect human life in all its stages.

There are two "kinds" of religious orders: contemplative and active. Members of contemplative orders live apart from the world in closed-off communities. They devote themselves entirely to prayer. Members of the active orders do their work in the world, though there is often a contemplative element to their life as well.

Religious life is "a permanent state of life recognized by the Church, entered freely in response to the call of Christ to perfection...characterized by the profession of...[vows]" (*Catechism of the Catholic Church*). All religious orders have the mission to spread the Gospel by how they live. They vow to live in poverty, chastity, and obedience so they can dedicate their lives, hearts, and minds completely to God's service.

Feasts & Celebrations

April 1 – St. Hugh of Grenoble (1132). St. Hugh was the bishop of Grenoble, France, and as bishop, he worked hard to reform his diocese of corruption. St. Hugh was also the friend and patron of St. Bruno, giving him the land where the Grand Chartreuse was built. With his help, St. Bruno founded the Carthusian order.

April 9 – Palm Sunday. The Sunday before Easter is called Palm Sunday and recalls Jesus' triumphant entry into Jerusalem, when he was greeted by crowds waving palms and cheering,

"Hosanna to the Son of David; blessed is he who comes in the name of the Lord; hosanna in the highest" (Matthew 21:9). It marks the beginning of Holy Week.

April 24 – St. Fidelis of Sigmaringen (1622). In his native Prussia, St. Fidelis became a lawyer and championed the poor and oppressed. He joined the Franciscans. During the Protestant Reformation, St. Fidelis worked hard to bring people back to the Catholic faith. He was martyred by an angry mob.

Se puso en medio y les dijo: 'Paz a ustedes'

Boletín: 140

Para encontrar el remedio adecuado es necesario un buen diagnóstico. ¿De dónde viene la falta de armonía y paz interior que experimenta el ser humano? ¿Por qué yo mismo me experimento tantas veces roto y dividido interiormente? La revelación sale a nuestro encuentro: la falta de armonía y paz interior tiene su origen en el pecado, en la rebeldía del hombre frente a Dios y sus amorosos designios. Al romper con Dios el ser humano se quiebra interiormente y cae en un proceso de desintegración incluso psíquica, rompe la comunión con sus hermanos humanos y con toda la creación. El pecado, lejos de llevar al ser humano a su plenitud y a la gloria divina —como sinuosamente había sugerido la antigua serpiente (ver *Gén 3,5*)— se volvió contra él mismo, hundiéndolo en el abismo de la muerte. En efecto, al romper con la Fuente de su misma vida y amor la criatura humana se quebró interiormente ella misma, ingresando de este modo en un proceso de desintegración incluso psíquica, rompiendo asimismo la comunión con sus hermanos humanos y con toda la creación. Frutos amargos de esta *cuádruple ruptura* son la pérdida de la paz y armonía interior, que se expresan en la experiencia de vacío, soledad, tristeza, infelicidad, amargura, ansiedades, etc. De esa falta de paz y armonía en el corazón humano surgen todas las contiendas, rencillas, divisiones e incluso guerras entre los pueblos.

¿Cuál es el remedio? ¿Dónde encontramos la verdadera y profunda paz que anhelan nuestros inquietos corazones? En Cristo, recuerda San Pablo, «estaba Dios reconciliando al mundo consigo» (2Cor 5,19). Porque Dios nos ama, nos ha enviado a su propio Hijo para que en Él encontremos la paz que tanto necesitamos: «¡Él es nuestra paz!» (Ef 2,14). Él, cargando sobre sí nuestros pecados, reconciliándonos con el Padre en la Cruz, nos abre el camino a una profunda reconciliación y armonía con nosotros mismos, con todos los hermanos humanos y con toda la creación.

«¡La paz contigo!», nos dice el Señor también a nosotros, invitándonos a acoger el don de la paz y reconciliación que Él nos ha obtenido por su Pasión, Muerte y Resurrección, invitándonos a acogerlo a Él mismo en nuestras vidas y convertirnos también nosotros en agentes de reconciliación en nuestra familia, en nuestros círculos de amigos y ambientes en los que trabajamos o estudiamos.
