Theme: If we believe, we will be saved.

Breaking Open the Word: Suggested text for faith sharing: 1st Reading from Kings

At the mountain of God, Horeb, Elijah came to a cave where he took shelter. Then the LORD said to him, Go outside and stand on the mountain before the LORD; the LORD will be passing by. "A strong and heavy wind was rending the mountains and crushing rocks before the LORD—but the LORD was not in the wind. After the wind there was an earthquake—but the LORD was not in the earthquake. After the earthquake there was fire—but the LORD was not in the fire. After the fire there was a tiny whispering sound. When he heard this, Elijah hid his face in his cloak and went and stood at the entrance of the cave.

Step One: Listen to the Word

Listen carefully to this reading. What word or image catches your imagination in it? What sense do you take away from this reading about faith?

Step Two: Look into Your Life

Question for Children: What does God’s voice sound like when you pray and listen to Jesus?

Question for Youth: In today’s Gospel, Peter began to walk on the water when he was focused on Jesus. He began to sink when he got distracted by the storm. What is your life like when you are focused on Jesus and your relationship with God? How is it different when you get caught up in other things?

Question for Adults: Tell about your experiences of hearing God speak in “tiny voices” rather than in the winds and earthquakes of life.

I wish to begin by saying that I am delighted to be here at St. Ignatius Loyola parish for summer help. I thank Fr. Jim for the honor and privilege of writing this column. This Sunday we celebrate the feast of the Transfiguration of the Lord.

The Transfiguration is arguably one of the most momentous and meaningful moments of Jesus' life on earth. Why did the Transfiguration take place on a mountain? In the Old Testament understanding, a mountain is the nearest point to heaven, the privileged place of divine-human encounter and experience. Moses ascended Mount Sinai to receive from God's own hand the tablets of the Law. The prophet Elijah climbed Mount Horeb and experienced the Lord's gentle, quiet and reassuring presence. It was on Mount Moriah that God tested Abraham's faith. We do not know the exact location where the Transfiguration took place.

I remember going up this 1800-foot high mountain when I visited the Holy Land on a pilgrimage from Rome, where I was doing my doctoral studies. There is a little chapel on the spot where the Transfiguration is supposed to have taken place. The background of the sanctuary is adorned with a beautiful mosaic of two peacocks. This symbol speaks volumes about the esoteric mystery of the mystical moment of the illumination of Jesus and the ecstatic experience of the apostles Peter, James and John when they saw their Master transfigured before their eyes. They saw a spark of divinity shining through Him. And speaking with Jesus, were two other mountain climbers of the Bible: Moses and Elijah.

Why was Jesus transfigured in the presence of his three apostles? The apostles Peter, James and John were close to Jesus. They belonged to the inner circle of the followers and friends of Jesus. They were very distressed and disappointed when Jesus told them of his impending 'disastrous' death. The purpose of Jesus' Transfiguration was to reassure them, to strengthen them in their faith, to boost their spirit and to prepare them for the journey to another mountain: Mount Calvary. The extraordinary mountain-top experience had an endearing and enduring impact on the apostles. Many years later, the apostle Peter would declare that he was an eyewitness to what happened on the holy mountain that day (2 Pet 1:16-18). And John the evangelist would testify that he had seen the glory of Jesus, the glory as of the Father's only Son, full of grace and truth (Jn1:14). For the apostles the transfiguration was a transforming experience, which sustained them later in their life and ministry.

Why was the Transfiguration such a private and brief event? And what is its significance for us today? The Transfiguration was the beginning of a journey both for the Lord and the apostles, a preview of the glory that was awaited. The awestruck apostles, after the foreboding and frightening experience, had to climb down the mountain and continue their journey on the level of faith. Being with Jesus means not staying up on the mountain, but getting on with life, being with the people in the valley of tears, being the salt of the earth, light of the world, leaven in the dough. We are to leave the security and protection of the known, and trust God with the unknown. We are to journey to an unmapped and uncharted future led by God, to become persons a people of the promise.

Every time we celebrate the Eucharist, we experience before our eyes the mystery of the Transfiguration of the Lord. The bread and wine are transubstantiated into his Body and Blood. When we receive Holy Communion, let us promise the Lord that we will listen to him, obey his teaching and follow Him, even unto death. Let us hear and heed Him, who holds the key to a full and fulfilling life.

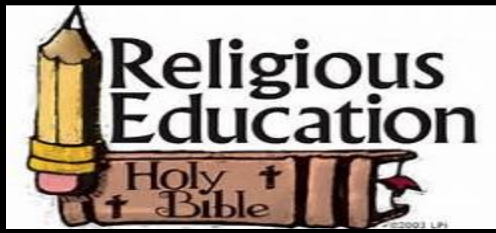

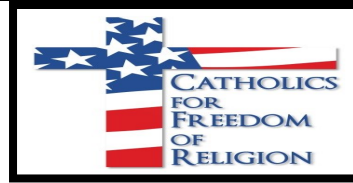

School Districts Ban Prayer at HS Graduations

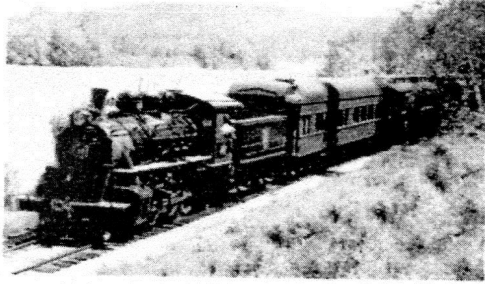

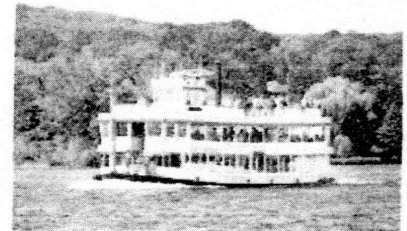

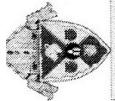

El Señor reina, altísimo sobre la tierra.



¿Cuántas veces en medio de duras pruebas o dificultades nos hemos preguntado: «¿Está Dios entre nosotros o no?» (Ex 17,7)? ¿Cuántas veces hemos querido o quisiéramos que Dios nos hable, cuando por ejemplo buscamos una luz para orientar nuestra vida, para tomar una

decisión importante, cuando nos encontramos en una situación angustiada? Y si nada escuchamos, pensamos que "Dios no nos habla".

Pero, ¿es verdad que Dios no nos habla? ¿O somos nosotros quienes "teniendo oídos no oímos", "teniendo ojos no vemos", porque nuestro corazón está embotado y endurecido? (Ver Mt 13,14-15). ¡Cuántas veces Dios arroja su semilla en nuestros corazones, encontrando sólo una tierra estéril, endurecida! ¡Cuántas veces nos pasa lo que dice aquél aforismo: "no hay peor sordo que el que no quiere escuchar"! Dios habla, y en Cristo habla fuerte, pero no pocas veces le corremos, le cerramos los oídos porque lo que nos dice no siempre se acomoda a lo que nosotros quisiéramos escuchar. Sí, la palabra de Dios incomoda mucho porque exige cambios radicales, exige opciones radicales, exige renunciaciones que no siempre estamos dispuestos a realizar, exige abrazarnos a la Cruz cuando no queremos sufrir, ¡exige tantas cosas más que no necesariamente nos gustarán!

Lo cierto es que en Cristo, su Hijo, Dios ha hablado y nos sigue hablando también HOY con mucha fuerza, para quien está dispuesto a escuchar. Sus palabras son esas semillas que Dios nos pide acoger dócilmente en nuestros corazones: «Este es mi Hijo amado, escuchadle.» (Mc 9,7)

Por ello, ante esta "sordera" que de una u otra forma a todos nos afecta, querámoslo admitir o no, conviene preguntarnos con toda humildad y honestidad: ¿Cómo acojo yo a Cristo, Palabra viva y eterna del Padre? ¿Cómo acojo yo sus palabras y enseñanzas? ¿Hago todo lo posible por hacer fructificar las enseñanzas de Cristo en mi vida mediante obras concretas, asumiendo cambios necesarios en mi comportamiento? ¿O ahogo el dinamismo de su Palabra en mi corazón (ver Heb 4,12), cerrándome con autosuficiencia a lo que me enseña, siendo inconstante cuando el camino se torna difícil, dejándome arrastrar por las atractivas seducciones del poder, del placer, del tener?

Como el Padre eterno, también Santa María, la Madre del Señor, nos señala a su Hijo y nos exhorta vivamente a escuchar sus enseñanzas para ponerlas en práctica: «Haced lo que Él os diga.» (Jn 2,5) Ten la certeza de que si pones por obra la Palabra divina enseñada por el Señor Jesús y no te contentas sólo con oírla, practicándola, serás feliz. (Ver Stgo 1,25)

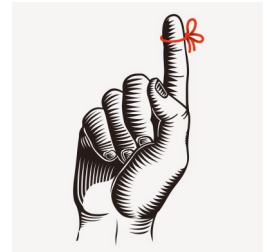
