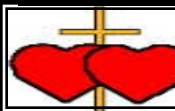

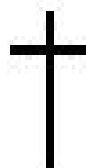

William is currently in his Third Year of Theology at Catholic Theological Union in Washington D.C. The following is William's description of the event.

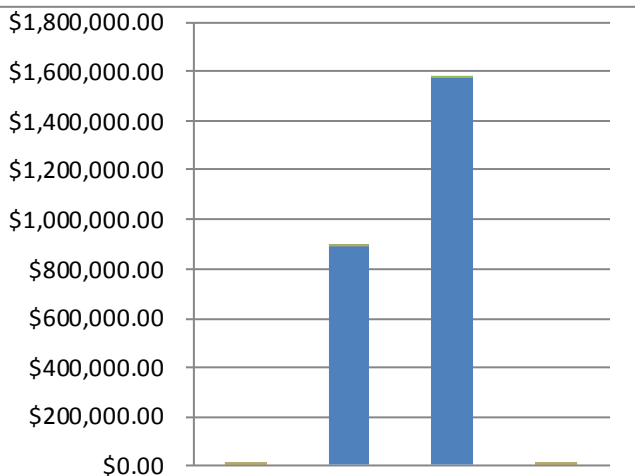
"On Wednesday, October 18, 2017, before a packed chapel of brother seminarians, formators, and friends, I participated in the Rite of Admission to Candidacy for Holy Orders with six of my brother seminarians here at Theological College. Admission to Candidacy is a major milestone in the life of a seminarian. To use parallel imagery from marriage preparation, Candidacy is similar to a seminarian being engaged to the Church. It is a public pronouncement that we, as seminarians, are serious about our commitment to completing the required study and maturation needed for Holy Orders, and that the Church deems us worthy to petition for ordination to the Diaconate and to the Priesthood.

I could not have made it to this milestone without all of you. Your prayers are a constant pillar of support for me (and for all seminarians), and it is often what keeps our heads above water when the going gets tough. St. Ignatius Parish has been supporting me for the past six years I have been in the seminary (and has been doing so long before that, too). And without your support, I might not be where I am in my formation today. So, from the bottom of my heart, thank you to everyone at St. Ignatius"

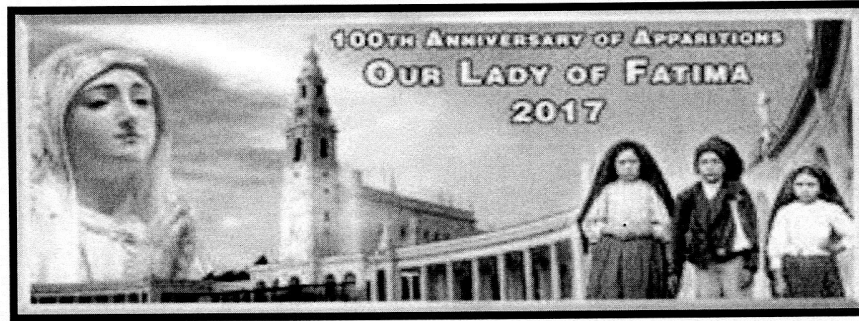

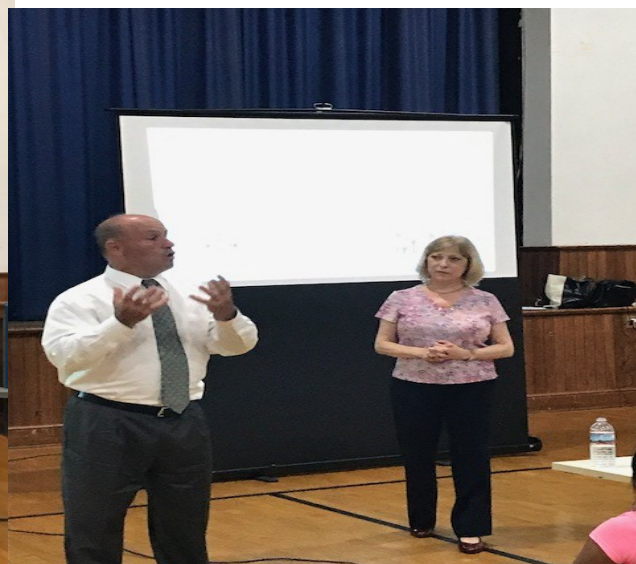

From May to October in 1917, Our Lady of the Rosary appeared to three little children of Fatima, Portugal. People of every medical condition of life went to Fatima to honor Mary, the Mother of God and thank her for the graces received and to beg her for favors received of body and soul. On May 13, 1967, the 50th Anniversary of Our Lady's appearance at Fatima, Pope Paul VI blessed 25 Pilgrim Virgin Statues when he visited Fatima. It was his desire that these statues be taken around the world on pilgrimages of peace. One of these statues was presented to our country and has continued moving in solemn procession throughout the U.S.

We are in need of travel-size toothpaste and shaving cream. Tooth brushes and disposable razors are in short supply, as well as white athletic tube socks! 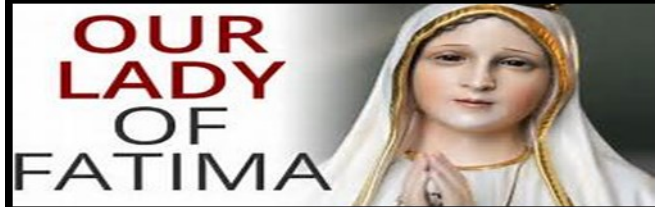

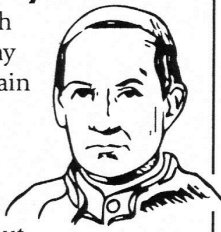

One Minute Meditations

St. Anthony Mary Claret

The son of a cloth weaver, St. Anthony was born in Spain in 1807. He wanted to become a Jesuit missionary but was prevented by his health. He was ordained a priest in Catalonia and in 1849, he founded the Claretian order. Shortly after, he became the archbishop of Cuba. He established the Religious Publishing House and produced more than 200 works. He was confessor to Queen Isabella II and participated in the First Vatican Council.



God's search for us

Oftentimes it feels like we are searching for God, but he is the one looking for us. God created us, redeemed us, and calls us to follow him. Today, ask God to show you where he's calling you and resolve to follow him.

"Thou art my God; I will exalt thee, I will praise thy name; for thou hast done wonderful things, plans formed of old, faithful and sure" (Isaiah 25:1).



Begin again

It is an unfortunate part of our human condition that we make mistakes. Fortunately, our loving Father always grants additional chances. In fact, he is delighted when we refresh our sincere attempts to live fully in his love. Here's how to begin again.

Shake off failure. There is nothing more defeating than dwelling on sins or errors of the past. Do what you can to prevent repeating past mistakes, shake it off, and move confidently forward.

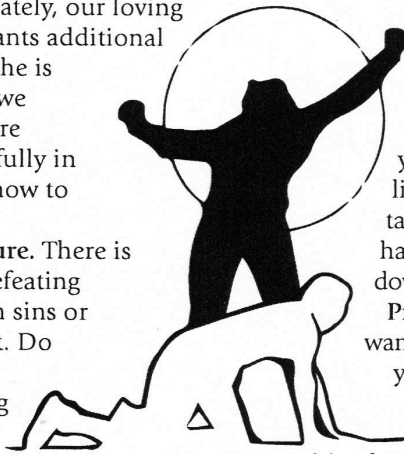
Take stock and confess. Rebuild your future on a solid foundation. Perform a detailed examination of conscience and then go to Confession. If necessary, ask your priest for a good

examination tool to use. Perform your penance immediately and make amends. Then, knowing that God has forgiven you, forgive yourself. Repeat often.

Make a plan. What would you like to change in your life? Are there steps you can take that will make you holier, happier, healthier? Write them down and commit.

Pray for strength. You may want to make minor tweaks to your life or major change may be in order. Either way, prayer and daily spiritual exercises are key to success. We need God's strength and guidance to succeed.

Begin. Each beginning starts with a new day. Take your first step knowing that God is with you and success is possible.



Why Do Catholics Do That?

Why do Catholics sit, stand, and kneel during the Mass?

We adopt different postures throughout the Mass to help us focus, and each posture means something different.

We sit during the homily and the readings to help us listen. We stand during the Gospel, and when the priest enters and

leaves, to show him honor and respect when he represents Christ.

Finally, we kneel at the Consecration in adoration of the Blessed Sacrament, because Christ, himself, is present. These actions are intended to engage both our bodies and our minds in prayer.



God's will be done

Ever pray really hard for something only to be disappointed in the outcome? The let down feels like God isn't listening. Yet, our way isn't God's way. He always listens to our prayers but doesn't necessarily answer the way we expect. Of course, we know no one is more qualified to lead than our heavenly Father. Doesn't it make sense to trust him?

Don't be outcome specific. Asking God to double your income may not be reasonable. Instead put your worries in his hands. Know that



your Father has your best interest in mind and will find the solution that is just right for you.

Be open to alternatives. Sometimes taking a different job or buying a less expensive home is the better choice. You may net more personal time and less overall stress.

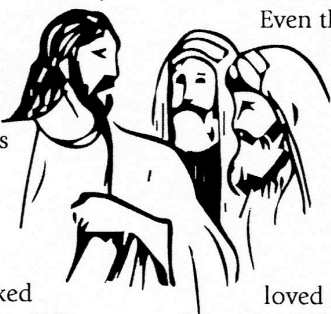
Let Scripture speak to you. *"Trust in the Lord with all your heart, on your own intelligence rely not; In all your ways be mindful of him, and he will make straight your paths"* (Proverbs 3:5-6).

from Scripture

Matthew 22:34-40.
Jesus has the right answers.

In their first meeting with Jesus, the Pharisees attempted to trap him into publicly contradicting Jewish law by sending a slick lawyer to "engage" him. Then Jesus could be arrested and silenced. The lawyer they sent knew that generations of Jews had debated fruitlessly about which law was the most important. Pretending to seek Jesus' opinion, he asked him to choose which of the 613 commandments of the Jewish law was the most important.

Jesus silenced them by saying that everything starts and ends with love –



love of God and love of others. To love God is to love one another. Love is at the heart of all the other laws.

Even the Pharisees couldn't argue with that.

While it is easy to love God, loving others is more difficult. It means including those our natural inclination says to exclude or avoid. Jesus

loved prostitutes, thieves, lepers, even his political enemies. True love of neighbor is measured by how we treat the poor, the vulnerable, and our enemies. This is how God loves and he calls us to the same.

Q & A

What is a "sacramental character?"

Certain Sacraments leave an indelible mark on our souls. Called the "character" or "seal," it marks us as belonging to Christ (*Catechism of the Catholic Church (CCC), #1272*) in a special and permanent way. The Sacramental character is first received in Baptism and is also imprinted in the Sacraments of Confirmation and Holy Orders. Like Baptism, these Sacraments are only received once.



Each "mark" patterns us after Christ in a different way. In Baptism, we become children of God and sharers in Jesus' mission. In Confirmation, we receive a second character, which strengthens us to proclaim Christ publically (*CCC, #1304*). In Holy Orders, a man is consecrated to the service of Christ and the Church.

The Father set his seal on Christ (John 6:27) and we are sealed in Christ (2 Corinthians 1:22). It is a sign that the one baptized, confirmed, and ordained bears a special and unique relationship to Christ. This indelible seal remains even in a person not in the state of grace or who has lost faith.

Feasts & Celebrations

Oct. 23 – St. John of Capistrano (1456). Born in Capistrano, Italy in 1386, St. John studied law at Perugia. He resigned his post as governor to join the Franciscans in 1416. Renowned for his preaching, he was asked to lead the crusade that successfully recaptured Constantinople from the Ottomans and saved Christendom.

Oct. 28 – Saints Simon and Jude (1st Century). St. Simon was a Zealot – a Jew who believed that the Messiah would free them from political

oppression. St. Jude was a fisherman. After being called by Jesus to be Apostles, they eventually traveled to Persia where they preached the Gospel until they were martyred.

Oct. 30 – St. Alphonsus Rodriguez (1617). Following the tragic losses of his children and wife, St. Alphonsus entered the Jesuit order as a lay brother and worked as a hall porter at a college on the island of Majorca. Known for holiness and wisdom, many students and civil authorities came to him for advice, including the young St. Peter Claver.

Yo te amo, Señor, tu eres mi fortaleza



Sufre quien no es correspondido en su amor. Se queda solo quien se niega a amar o no alcanza ser amado o amada. ¿Y no es espantosa y angustiante esa soledad? ¿No es a quedarnos sin nadie a lo que más le tememos y huimos? ¿No hemos sido alguna vez o somos acaso ahora infinitamente tristes cuando

experimentamos la ausencia de alguien que nos ame verdaderamente? ¿Quién resiste la soledad, ese sentirse abandonado, sin nadie que lo valore o se preocupe por uno? En la soledad la alegría por la vida se extingue poco a poco y el sufrimiento se hace a veces insoportable.

Y es que así somos: ¡necesitamos de otros "tú" humanos, necesitamos de la comunión profunda con esos otros seres semejantes a nosotros, necesitamos amar y ser amados para ser felices! Llámese amor paternal o filial, amor fraternal, amor de enamorados o esposos, o amor de amistad. Necesitamos vivir el amor, y nuestra vida se llena de luz, se hace hermosa y plena de sentido cuando lo vivimos. De ese modo entramos en comunión con aquel "Tú" por excelencia que responde verdaderamente a nuestros intensos anhelos de amor, para que nutridos de ese amor divino, podamos al mismo tiempo amar como Él, con su mismo amor, a nosotros mismos y a nuestros semejantes.

En efecto, quien pone a Dios en el centro de sus amores, no limita su amor a sólo Dios, no ama menos a los demás, nada "pierde" o renuncia al amor humano, sino que experimenta cómo su corazón se ensancha cada vez más, su amor se purifica, crece, madura, enciende su vida y se expresa en lazos de verdadera amistad, de un auténtico amor humano que nunca pasará, porque Dios no pasa nunca, y quien lo ama a Él y en Él ama a todos, permanecerá también en eterna comunión con todos aquellos o aquellas a quienes ama.

No olvidemos que quien ama a Dios sobre todo, ama a sus semejantes como Él los ama. Nuestra vida está llamada a transformarse en una manifestación del amor de Dios para con todos los seres humanos sin excepción, un amor que se hace palpable en la misericordia, la caridad y la solidaridad con el prójimo. Ese, en realidad, es el camino más seguro para crecer en el amor a Dios: amar al prójimo.

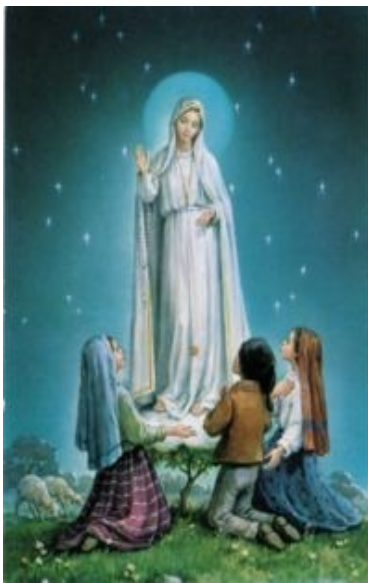

Cien años de devoción popular

El 13 de mayo de 1917, tres pastorcillos de entre 7 y 10 años afirmaron haber visto a la Virgen María sobre una encina verde en Cova da Iria, en aquel entonces, un terreno pedregoso cercano a la localidad de Fátima, Portugal. Esa "mujer más brillante que el sol" se les apareció otras cinco ocasiones en los meses siguientes. La emoción que causó el anuncio llevó a entre 50.000 y 70.000 personas a reunirse en Cova da Iria durante la última aparición, el 13 de octubre, cuando se produjo un fenómeno meteorológico raro descrito como "el milagro del sol". La devoción a Nuestra Señora de Fátima- que la Iglesia autorizó oficialmente en 1930- ha estado marcada por intensas manifestaciones de fe. Para expiar los pecados o agradecer a la Virgen la ayuda prestada a los fieles con problemas de salud, amor o dinero, numerosos peregrinos caminan hasta Fátima durante varios días y recorren de rodillas el camino que lleva hasta la Capilla de las apariciones, de unos centenares de metros.
