Breaking Open the Word: Suggested text for faith sharing: Gospel, the short version Mt. 25:14-15, 19-21 Jesus told his disciples this parable: 'A man going on a journey called in his servants and entrusted his possessions to them. To one he gave five talents; to another, two; to a third, one--to each according to his ability. Then he went away. After a long time the master of those servants came back and settled accounts with them. The one who had received five talents came forward bringing the additional five. 32ND SUNDAY IN ORDINARY TIME Matthew 25:1-13

ARE YOU READY? ARE YOU PREPARED?

As we head toward the end of our Church liturgical year, the scripture readings challenge us with the question, Am I ready to meet God? Recently, we have been hit by many events that tell us how fragile life can be and that death can come at any second. We have witnessed this in Las Vegas, the recent terror attack in lower Manhattan and now with profound sadness, with yet another mass shooting, in Texas. In this Sunday's Gospel Jesus tells us through the parable of the wise and foolish virgins, that we do not know the time or the hour of our own death. The midnight call to action finds the wise prepared and welcomed and the foolish unprepared and left out.

Are you prepared? Are you ready? Am I ready? St. Paul tells in his letter to the Thessalonians not to be afraid of death as people who have no hope. He writes that the power of the resurrection of Jesus is so strong that the people who have already died before Jesus' Second coming will also share in his resurrection. Then all who are alive, will be caught up together with them in the clouds to meet the Lord in the air.

How can we prepare? The Book of Wisdom tells us that we prepare for our death by seeking wisdom. The gift of wisdom is to see God at work in our life and in our world and living according to God's ways. This means that we are to be forgiving, generous, not always expecting a reward for doing good, and loving our neighbor as we love God and ourselves. Let us pray that each day we will grow in the wisdom of God which will help us grow in gratitude for God's kindness and in the certainty that one day we will be fully with our God and all of those who have been faithful and have gone before us.

CAPITAL CAMPAIGN UPDATE: CONTINUING OUR MISSION





Ban on Farmers Over their Marriage Views is Overturned

A federal judge ruled in mid-September that the Catholic Michigan farmers who were banned from selling their produce at a farmers market because of their religious beliefs about marriage, may resume selling their goods. East Lansing officials had banned the farmers from participating in the 2017 Farmers Market (even though this farm had sold their organic fruits there for 7 years) when they learned the farm would resume hosting weddings for unions between "one man and one woman."

"All Steve Tennes wants to do is sell his food to anyone who wants to buy it, but the city isn't letting him," said Alliance Defending Freedom in June. "If the government can shut down a family farmer just because of the religious views he expresses on Facebook - ... then no American is free."

St. Catherine Labouré

Born the ninth of eleven children to a French farming family, St.



Catherine eventually joined the Daughters of Charity. Shortly after, the Blessed Mother appeared to Catherine and asked to have a medal engraved with her image and the words, "O Mary conceived without sin, pray for us who have recourse to thee" engraved on it. The devotion spread quickly, but no one knew St. Catherine's involvement until soon before her death. She was canonized in 1947.

Counting Blessings

Do what Jesus did

It is hard to imagine how wonderful Heaven is or the joy that awaits us there. Jesus' mission of salvation while on Earth made Heaven possible for us, if we live a life of holiness and grace as he did. Jesus hoped we would do what he did ...

Service. While on Earth, Jesus' purpose was to serve God and others. He even performed servant tasks such as serving food and washing feet. He asked that we model his servant's heart.

Love. When he walked among us, Jesus reached out to those who felt unloved, comforted those who were suffering, and helped people draw closer to his Father. Try to show love in

Why do Catholics honor saints in our churches?

Saints are spiritual role models whose examples we can follow to Heaven. Viewing statues and images of them in our churches helps us to recall their heroic virtue and faithful love for God.

themselves, are not meant to be objects of worship.
Instead, we recognize the good these holy people did and honor their examples.
Just as in praising a painting we honor the painter, in praising the saints, we honor God who made them.

God loves us as we are

Most of us care about how we come across to other people. Choices about how we live, work, or dress can be influenced by a desire for others' approval. While it is only human to want to be liked, it's important to remember that God's opinion matters most. The best part? God always loves us.

His love never changes. Human standards change over time. Someone considered "in" today, can be "out" in no time. God's love is unchanging and unending.

Friends come and go. Sooner or later,

friendships change or friends may move on. But Jesus said, "... behold, I am with you always, until the end of the age" (Matthew 28:20). God never leaves.

> He loves us for who we really are. There's nothing God doesn't know about us, and he adores us anyway. Go figure.

If God likes you, others may, too. To please God, we have to fill ourselves with love for him and other people, and that makes us even nicer to be around.



Matthew 25:31-46, Judged on love

In this Gospel reading, Jesus describes the coming of the Son of Man, that is, his glorious return on the last day. Jesus


will appear at the end of time as the King of the Nations and the Judge of History. Everyone who has ever lived, from the first to the last, from the greatest to the least, will stand before Christ. All of us will be judged on how we loved, especially how we loved those who suffered among us.

The specific criteria for judgment is the basis for the Seven Corporal Works of Mercy, which are: feed the hungry and give drink to the thirsty, clothe the naked and welcome the stranger, care for

> the sick and imprisoned, and bury the dead.

> > In the end, we will be judged on our response to the suffering of others. Do we, like the "blessed," respond with compassion and

mercy? Or do we, like the others, turn a blind eye and do nothing? The goal is to see Christ in others and to minister to their needs as he did.





Nov. 1 – All Saints Day – a Holy Day of Obligation. In the early Church, there was a desire to celebrate saints and martyrs by assigning each a feast day. However, the Christian persecutions were so horrible that there weren't enough days in the calendar for individual commemorations. Pope Gregory IV designated Nov.1 as All Saints Day.

Nov. 14 - St. Lawrence O'Toole (1180). St. Lawrence was born in County Kildare, Ireland. When he was twelve, he was dedicated to God's service. St. Lawrence became Dublin's

second archbishop and a papal legate. He was canonized in 1225.

Nov. 16 - St. Margaret of Scotland (1093). Queen Margaret of Scotland was dedicated to caring for the poor. She washed beggars' feet and gave them alms. She fed orphans and destitute adults before eating her own meals.

Nov. 26 - Solemnity of Christ the King. God promised his people a king who would triumph over their enemies. Jesus is our King. In Baptism and Confirmation, we are brought under his kingship.



what are findulgences?

An indulgence is "the remission before God of the temporal punishment due to sin whose guilt has already been forgiven" (Catechism of the Catholic Church). In other words, after certain conditions have been met, the Church prays that the punishment for one's sins either on Earth or in Purgatory will be reduced or eliminated.

Jesus' sacrifice on the Cross and the prayers and good works of the saints during their lifetimes make indulgences possible. The Catechism compares this idea to something like an infinite bank account. The Church draws from the "treasury" of spiritual goods - prayers and sacrifices - of the saints and applies the benefits to those completing the indulgence (CCC #1476). To gain an indulgence, certain requirements must be met, including attending Confession, receiving Holy Communion and praying for the intentions of the pope.

Indulgences are only effective for sins that have already been forgiven in the Sacrament of Confession. Otherwise, we could be in danger of presuming on God's mercy or assuming God's forgiveness without true contrition.

"Hacer una buena acción diaria" es un pedazo de la sabiduría enseñado a los Scouts. ¿Quién duda que nuestra sociedad fuera un lugar más agradable si todo el mundo lo practicaría? Como dice la primera lectura de toda sabiduría, la frase brilla como una joya "radiante e incorruptible". También el dicho tiene que ver con el evangelio hoy que habla de lámparas de aceite.

En el Evangelio según San Mateo una luz brillante significa buenas acciones. Recordamos cómo en el Sermón del Monte Jesús instruye a sus discípulos: "Hagan brillar su luz delante de todos para que ellos puedan ver las buenas obras de ustedes y alaben al Padre que está en el cielo". Ciertamente los hechos hablan más fuertemente que las palabras. Ya en el evangelio hoy Jesús cuenta de las diez vírgenes. Cinco de ellas se consideran sabias supuestamente porque llevan bastante aceite para mantener sus lámparas encendidas. Pero las lámparas encendidas son símbolos que ellas han cumplido muchas obras buenas. Tal vez ellas hayan visitado a los huérfanos o alimentado a los desamparados. Entretanto a cinco chicas les falta el aceite. Éstas no han hecho nada para brillar "radiantes e incorruptibles". Si fueran vivas hoy, ellas serían las muchachas que desgastan el tiempo en los medios sociales preocupadas si les quieren los demás.

Deberíamos pensar en las bodas a las cuales se admiten las cinco vírgenes previsoras no sólo como las bodas de un tal Juan y una tal Dora. Más bien, en el evangelio las bodas tienen un matiz más grande. Significan el banquete celestial a la cual Jesús invita a sus elegidos. Como dice la segunda lectura, es el "encuentro del Señor" donde "estaremos siempre con él" como sus esposas.

Un cine da pista de la verdad de este evangelio. Una hermana y un hermano enfrentan una situación retadora. Su padre, que les trataba mal en su niñez, ya queda sin casa. Porque los abandonó, los dos hermanos andan lastimados en sus vidas personales. La mujer está involucrada en una relación adúltera y su hermano no puede comprometerse a su novia. No obstante, los dos cooperan para darle el apoyo necesario a su padre hasta que muera. Al final de la película las vidas de los dos han cambiado significativamente por su obra buena. La mujer renuncia la relación pecaminosa, y su hermano está listo para casarse con su novia. La buena obra que han hecho por su papá ha resultado en un estado dichosa para los dos.

Sí es cierto estamos o bien ocupados o bien cansados para hacer buenas obras. Tememos que intentar hacerlas vaya a agobiarnos despiadadamente. Pero la verdad es a menudo el contrario. Por esforzarnos a hacer buenas acciones la satisfacción que recibimos nos facilitan la vida. Nos salva de la tentación de quedar preocupados si nos quieren los demás. Nos hace posible encontrar al Señor. Las buenas acciones nos facilitan la vida.
