

## The uninvited guest

Hospital chaplains offer comfort to patients of all faiths and cultural beliefs.

"Oh, you're looking for Father Ben? We love Father Ben, everyone loves Father Ben," said Channele Johnson, an admitting rep at Plainview Hospital.

The Rev. Benjamin Uzuegbunam, a Catholic priest who serves as a chaplain at Plainview Hospital, has been making daily visits to the hospital five days a week for the past four years.


Father Uzuegbunam is originally from Nnewi in Anambra, a state in Nigeria, but Long Island is now his home, and his extended family includes the patients who come to Plainview Hospital. Plainview, New York is a world away from West Africa, and Father Uzuegbunam has seen a lot since he came to the United States in 2004.

While studying at Loyola University in New Orleans, Louisiana, he saw how a natural disaster could destroy a region—and the human spirit. After witnessing Hurricane Katrina in 2005, he dedicated himself to hospital ministry.

"I went through a lot of hard experiences," he said. "Then God brought me to New York in 2005."

### Prepared to help

In New York, Father Uzuegbunam went on to receive his master's degree in pastoral counseling and spiritual care from Fordham University, and his doctorate degree in pastoral ministry from Hebrew Union College.

"I've been a priest for 25 years," he said. "It is my experience as a person that made me decide to speak with the hospital and work here."

His patients have taken notice. "It was a nice surprise to have Father Benjamin walk in that first day," recalled Donna Zyrski, who was recovering from hip surgery at Plainview Hospital when she met the priest recently. "It gives me peace; it makes me feel that someone is watching over me, and I do believe that people watch over us.

He has been visiting me every morning since I have been in the hospital, and he is very calming."

"We've had so many great conversations, and my faith is strong," she added. "I truly appreciate him being here."

Not all patients are welcoming and open to Father Uzuegbunam. He says some are filled with fear and others simply no longer find solace in their faith. "Sometimes people throw you away as a chaplain in the hospital because you are an uninvited guest," he said.

"There are people who are running away from the church who don't want to hear anything about God. There are people who are sad, who are mad at God, and maybe they haven't been to church for more than 20 years. And here you have a priest walking into the room uninvited. Sometimes they will put their hands up to say, 'Don't come near me.'"

### A good listener

Father Uzuegbunam says that his clinical pastoral education training has helped him to understand people's emotional needs in a way that goes beyond his theological studies.

"It's given me the ability to really

"It's given me the ability to really listen and hear much more," he said.

Regardless of how he is received by patients, Father Uzuegbunam makes his morning rounds each day undeterred, because that is his calling—one that he performs with grace.

"I see myself as a wounded healer, which means, yes, I have my own problems, but when I walk into the room, I have in my mind that I am coming to meet with Jesus, who identifies with the sick. It doesn't matter how that person reacts, because in the back of my head I am coming in to meet Jesus. And sometimes they say, 'Go, I don't need you,' and they ask me to leave or motion me to leave. But sometimes, I will come back the next day. For me, it is a very rewarding vocation."





## Adopt a three-point plan for holiness in the New Year

All Christians are called to holiness. "Be perfect, as your heavenly Father is perfect" (Matthew 5:48). There are three tools on which every Catholic can rely to attain greater holiness.

Daily prayer. God meets us in a very real and present way when we come to him in prayer. Start in the morning and pray throughout the day.

Weekly Mass. The Mass is a sacrifice and a meal. We receive Jesus' body and blood as real food for our souls. He said, "For my flesh is food indeed, and my blood is

drink indeed. He who eats my flesh and drinks my blood abides in me, and I in him" (John 6:55-56). That's why we call it,

"Communion."

Monthly Confession. Jesus created the Sacrament of Penance and Reconciliation (Confession) because he knew we would stray. He also knew we would want to come back. Frequent participation in this Sacrament sharpens our sense of sin, holds us accountable

for our errors, and gives us the grace to keep trying for

holiness.

## Mark 1:21-28, God's authority is not a formality

In this Gospel passage, Jesus and his apostles entered the synagogue at Capernaum where Jesus taught those gathered for the Sabbath. It was customary for learned teachers to say, "Thus says the Lord..."

"Thus says the Lord..."
Instead Jesus said, "I say to you ..." He taught as one who spoke with the authority of God.

His calm authority astounded Jesus' listeners.
Just as they began to wonder what it meant, he gave them a sign. He further demonstrated his authority by performing an exorcism. Spirits that bedeviled an unfortunate man at the

synagogue recognized who Jesus was.

They were forced to obey him when he commanded them to depart, despite their reluctance. In fact, God's power and authority isn't just a formality. What God says, happens.

Our kind and gentle Savior is also our powerful

and awesome Lord. As the Second Person of the Trinity, Jesus has supreme majesty and we will one day appear before him to be judged. Yes, he is our divine savior and mediator. But if we say, "Jesus is Lord," then we give him our loyalty and obedience.

## Feasts & \* © Celebrations

Jan. 1 – Solemnity of the Blessed Virgin Mary, the Mother of God.
Today, we honor Mary, but also Jesus as God. In their honor, pray a Rosary.
Because this feast day is on a Monday, Mass attendance is optional (but encouraged) this year.

Jan. 25 – The Conversion of St. Paul the Apostle (1st Century). Setting out for Damascus to carry on the persecution of the Christians, he encountered Christ (Acts 9:1-19; 22:5-16; 26:12-18) while on the road to Damascus. He was struck blind from

the experience until he was baptized by Ananias three days later. He converted and began preaching the faith as he travelled around the Mediterranean.

Jan. 26 – Sts. Timothy and Titus (1st Century). Timothy was a convert of St. Paul's and later became his trusted friend, joining him in apostolic work. He was with Paul at the founding of the Church in Corinth. Titus, also a friend of Paul's, served the early Church as a peacemaker and administrator to a community on Crete.

## Q & A

## I make terrible decisions. How can I do better?

It's true that bad decisions can lead to sin. Try to take a formal approach to decision making.

Get all the facts. That helps you know your options.

**Pray.** Place yourself in God's presence and ask for his guidance.

Listen to your conscience. Your conscience is the ability within you that helps you discern right from wrong. "Moral conscience, present at the heart of the person, enjoins him ... to do good and to avoid evil. It also judges particular choices, approving those that are good and denouncing those that are evil." (CCC #1777)

Choose to do the right thing, choose to follow your conscience. This requires courage.

**Ask for help.** When in doubt, ask a trusted advisor.

Be accountable. Take responsibility for any decisions you make and for their consequences. Although blaming others in some cases is justified, it usually is not productive.

Admit mistakes. Learn from mistakes you make and apply what you have learned to future situations. Don't get thrown by errors. Continue to persevere, despite setbacks.

En el cumplimiento de su misión, que consiste principalmente en predicar la Buena Nueva a las ovejas perdidas de Israel (ver Mc 1,38; Mt 15,24), la frecuente oración o diálogo íntimo con el Padre aparece como algo prioritario para Él. En otra ocasión enseñará a sus discípulos lo que Él mismo vive, la necesidad que Él mismo experimenta: «es necesario rezar siempre y sin desfallecer» (Lc 18,1).

Por más duro que suene, su prioridad no es curar a los enfermos de sus males, o liberar a los endemoniados de los espíritus inmundos, o saciar la curiosidad de las multitudes que empiezan a buscarlo por la fama de gran profeta que va adquiriendo, sino la fidelidad a la misión que el Padre le ha encomendado. Él ha venido al mundo a anunciar la Buena Nueva de la reconciliación, y prioriza su acción de acuerdo a su misión principal. No podemos dejar de resaltar la importancia fundamental de dicho anuncio, pues ¿de qué hubiera servido su encarnación, su muerte y resurrección, así como su ascensión, sin esa predicación y anuncio? El don de la Reconciliación operada por el Señor Jesús (ver 2Cor 5,18-19) necesita del anuncio, de la proclamación de la Buena Nueva, de la predicación, para ser comprendido y acogido por el hombre (ver Rom 10,17).

El que verdaderamente es discípulo de Cristo, jamás deja de rezar porque obedece al ejemplo y a la voz de su Maestro, que ha dicho: es preciso «orar siempre sin desfallecer» (Lc 18,1). La oración es para el creyente una necesidad, necesidad que responde a una sed de Dios que busca saciar en el encuentro con Él. Consiste en un tejido armonioso que se entreteje de momentos fuertes de oración y de oración continua. Los momentos fuertes de oración como el diálogo íntimo con el Señor en el Santísimo, la meditación de su Palabra en espíritu de oración, la participación atenta en la Santa Eucaristía, la celebración de la Liturgia de las horas, nutren la oración continua, oración que es vivir en continua presencia de Dios y hacerlo todo por Él. No deja de rezar quien buscando obedecer en todo a Dios hace de toda su actividad una incesante alabanza a Él (ver 1Cor 10,31).

Si el Señor Jesús se daba el tiempo para rezar, no dejando la oración "para el final del día" como tantas veces solemos hacerlo nosotros, sino rezando antes de iniciar sus exigentes y diarias actividades, ¡cuánto más debemos nosotros buscar el tiempo necesario para tener momentos fuertes de oración a lo largo del día! Si andamos en búsqueda de la reconciliación para nosotros mismos —el perdón de nuestros pecados, la curación de nuestras heridas más profundas, la armonía y paz interior, la alegría y gozo continuo,

la fuerza para la lucha, etc.— y si queremos llevar a otros el don de la reconciliación, entendamos de una vez por todas que ello es imposible sin la oración perseverante.
