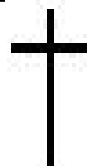

POPE FRANCIS-5 YEARS OF SERVICE AS OUR HOLY FATHER

It was exactly FIVE years ago on March 13th that we watched our televisions to see who our new Pope would be for our Catholic Church. I recall watching it with Msgr. Bennett, wondering who is this Cardinal Jorge Mario Bergolio from Buenos Aires, Argentina, another non-Italian (1/2 Italian) Pope.

We knew he was someone special just by the name he chose, Francis, after St. Francis of Assisi. His name meant that he would carry out the Petrine Ministry as a tribute to fulfill that mission of St. Francis who was told by our Lord to “go and rebuild my Church”. The Lord meant for St. Francis to go and rebuild his people, and not the building. I believe that Pope Francis was told to do the same. Pope Francis is the first Jesuit Pope, first from the Southern Hemisphere and the first non-European Pope since Syrian Gregory III, who reigned in the 8th century.

From an article I read by Mario J. Padredes, American Bible Society, I learned that he is a Pope of humility. One gesture that impressed upon me was his request to ask the world and the people at St. Peter’s square the night he was chosen, to bless him. Never, in my lifetime have I witnessed such an act of humility. His papacy exhumes humility through his acts of simplicity, frankness and coherency. He is a friend to all.

He is also a Pope of mercy. A book was written from an interview entitled “The Name of God is Mercy”. Mercy is so much a part of Francis’ papacy and his life that he called forth An Extraordinary Holy Year and Jubilee of Mercy for the whole Church beginning on March 13, 2015.

During his pontificate, so far he wrote two Encyclicals Lumen Fidei (The Light of Faith) and Laudato Si (On Care for Our Common Home). He also wrote two Apostolic Exhortations, which carry less authority, yet still significant; Evangelii Gaudium (The Joy of the Gospel) and Amoris Laetitia (Love of the Family).

May we take this time to celebrate and express with gratitude to almighty God the gifts of this Pope. Although he has had his controversies, I do believe he is the right Pope for the right time. Just like St. John XXIII who was chosen to open the doors of the Church to the world and St. John Paul II was chosen to break the chains of communism and bring the church back to its roots, Pope Francis was chosen to help deal with the atheistic, secular and apathetic forces of our time that threaten to shrink the church as a modern day force of good. Ad multos Annos, Holy Father Francis.

One Minute Meditations

St. Margaret Clitherow

St. Margaret Clitherow was born in York, England in 1555. She was raised Protestant but became a Catholic soon after she married.

When Queen Elizabeth I outlawed Catholicism, St. Margaret continued to practice her faith, even hiding Catholic priests in her house so they could say Mass in secret. In 1586, Margaret was arrested. Instead of being afraid, she was serenely joyful during her time in prison. She refused to renounce her faith and died a martyr.



St. Joseph

March 19th, the Solemnity of St. Joseph, honors the Spouse of the Blessed Virgin Mary. He is the patron of the Universal Church and protector of families.

"You are praising God when you do your day's work. You are praising him when you eat and drink. You are praising him when you rest on your bed. You are praising him when you are asleep. So when are you not praising him?"

"Who, then, is my neighbor?" (Luke 10:29)

Jesus' parable of the Good Samaritan (Luke 10:25-37) challenges our idea of who is a stranger. As followers of Jesus, we know that it is not acceptable to care only for people who are like ourselves. Our faith calls us to look beyond borders and see all people as neighbors. "If you love those who love you, what credit is that to you?" (Luke 6:32).

Who is a neighbor? Jesus never directed us to like everyone, but he raised love of neighbor to the level of a Commandment. And he doesn't allow us to be selective.

The snarky coworker or unpleasant older person who lives next door?

Both are neighbors we are asked to love. Customers who harp on the tiny mistakes we make, or relatives who love to point out our flaws?

Neighbors. People from around the world whose values and behavior are foreign to us? Neighbors, all.

What is neighbor love? It starts by seeing those around us – truly looking past the outer appearance and learning names, personal stories, circumstances.

Praying for others – whether we know them personally or not – is a powerful way to love them.

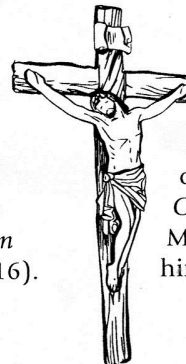
Neighbor love isn't blind to others' sin but it requires focusing on our own first. We love neighbors best by letting them witness in us the fullness of a life in Christ.



Why Do Catholics Do That?

Why do Catholics have crucifixes in church?

The crucifix – a cross with Jesus' body on it – reminds us of the price of our salvation and God's infinite love for us; "God so loved the world that he gave his only Son to death on a cross" (John 3:16).

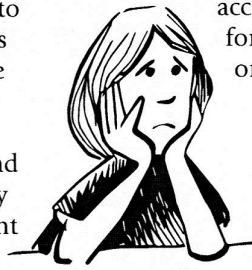


A crucifix helps us to remember that the sacrifice of Christ and the sacrifice of the Eucharist are one single sacrifice (*Catechism of the Catholic Church, 1545*). During Mass, Jesus, through the priest, offers himself to the Father for us.

Why does God let bad things happen?

"If God is good, why does he allow bad things to happen?" In our hearts, we may know that God is loving and doesn't want us to suffer, but it can be difficult to see his plan when trouble strikes. The key is to stay close and trust his love.

Draw closer to him. Sometimes God allows bad things to happen because he knows that adversity can draw us closer to him. Take the Old Testament hero, Joseph, for example (Genesis 37-50). He was sold into slavery by his own brothers, falsely



accused by his master's wife, and unjustly imprisoned for years. Eventually he was released and became one of the most powerful men in Egypt.

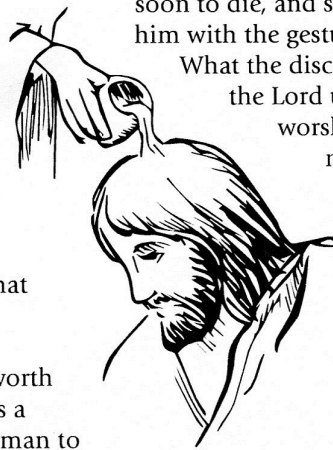
Stay connected. Throughout his suffering, Joseph kept his friendship with God strong so he could see God's hand in his life. When his brothers begged for forgiveness, Joseph was able to answer, *"Even though you meant harm to me, God meant it for good, to achieve his present end, the survival of many people."*

Mark 14:1-15, 47, Waste or worship?

In this reading, we follow the march of events toward Jesus' death. It begins in Bethany with a woman pouring a costly ointment over Jesus' head and horrifying the disciples with a frivolous use of an expensive material. However, Jesus silenced them, pointing out that "she has anointed my body beforehand for burying."

The ointment was costly – worth about one year's wages. It was a significant sacrifice for the woman to make. Yet, unlike the disciples, the woman understood that Jesus was



soon to die, and she meant to honor him with the gesture.

What the disciples saw as waste, the Lord understood as worship. Jesus saw her material offering as "a beautiful thing." She took one of her most honored possessions and gave it to Jesus in an unusual act of devotion. Rather than

consider it a loss, Jesus felt honored by it.

Q & A How do I make a good Confession?

The Sacrament of Penance and Reconciliation (Confession) can sometimes feel like an obligation instead of an encounter with God's mercy, but it doesn't have to be that way. Try these tips for a more joyful Reconciliation.

Examine your conscience. Compare your actions to the principles of the Ten Commandments (Exodus 20) and the Beatitudes (Matthew 5). Bring to the confessional the significant ways you have failed to live up to them.

Confess the small ones, too. Participating in the Sacrament frequently means that you may only have venial (minor) sins to confess. Confess them anyway. Piling up venial sins can lessen our resistance and pave the way for mortal sin. Confessing keeps our consciences sharp.

Express contrition and resolve to avoid sin. Ask for the grace to continue growing in holiness and avoiding evil.

The point of the Sacrament is to reconcile us with the God who loves us more than we can imagine, and who is always eager to forgive us. Confession helps us come back and begin again.

Feasts & Celebrations

March 1 – St. David of Wales (c. 600). St. David is the patron saint of Wales. He was born into Welsh nobility, but instead chose to become a priest. He was later consecrated a bishop. He is best known for founding an ascetic monastery and ridding the area of the Pelagian heresy.

March 17 – St. Patrick of Ireland (c.461). Born in Scotland, St. Patrick was kidnapped and brought to Ireland as a slave. He escaped but later returned to become the bishop of Ireland and is credited for having established the

Church there.

March 19 – St. Joseph, Husband of Mary (1st Century). Jesus' earthly father and husband to the Blessed Mother, St. Joseph is a model of fatherhood and a protector of families.

March 25 – Palm Sunday of the Lord's Passion (1st Century). On Palm Sunday of the Lord's Passion, we recall Jesus' triumphant entry into Jerusalem, when he was greeted by crowds waving palms and cheering. This Sunday marks the beginning of Holy Week.

Señor,

Podemos notar que las lecturas de la misa hoy no hablan de arrepentimiento y sacrificio como en la primera parte de Cuaresma. Estas lecturas presumen que nos hemos preparado suficientemente para acompañar a Jesús por su muerte ardua y su resurrección gloriosa. En un sentido estamos como los griegos en el evangelio que quieren ver a Jesús. Ellos

constituyen un signo que la etapa final de la obra de la salvación ya puede comenzar. Nosotros queremos vivir de nuevo el misterio de la salvación para ser sus beneficiarios.

Jesús da una parábola para indicar lo que está para tener lugar. Dice que su muerte producirá la vida en abundancia como la semilla desbaratándose en la tierra produce mucho fruto. Para entender lo que significan estas palabras recordémosnos lo que dijo el sumo sacerdote Caifás anteriormente en este Evangelio de San Juan. Cuando los judíos debatían en el Sanedrín que hacer con Jesús, Caifás declaró: "... es mejor que muera un solo hombre por el pueblo y no que perezca toda la nación" (Juan 11:50). Esto no fue la opinión de un fulano sino el anuncio de parte del representante de Dios más alto en el pueblo judío. A lo mejor Caifás no se dio cuenta cuan verdaderas fueran sus palabras. No obstante, muestran lo que Dios ha ordenado por el mundo. Dios quiere que Jesús dé su vida para que el pueblo judío y, en torno, toda la humanidad tengan la vida eterna.

¿De qué tenemos miedo nosotros? Cada uno tiene su propia historia. Pero creo que muchos tenemos miedo por nuestros seres queridos que no más siguen el camino de Jesucristo. En cambio de la esperanza para la vida eterna, ellos quieren procurarse las recompensas del mundo corriente. Dejan de recibir los sacramentos. A su extremo sólo buscan el placer mientras evitan toda responsabilidad. Particularmente hay causa de miedo si nuestros queridos se encuentran en la segunda categoría.

Y si decimos con Jesús "Ahora...tengo miedo", también diremos consigo, "Padre, dale gloria a tu nombre". Esto es tanto un compromiso de parte de nosotros por Jesús como es una petición de Jesús por nosotros. Pues Dios es glorificado cuando hagamos obras buenas por los demás. Dios es glorificado, por ejemplo, por Doña Carmen que pasa todos los martes visitando a los enfermos de un hospital en Puerto Rico.

Se dice que el Jueves Santo, el Viernes Santo, y el Sábado de la Gloria no son tres servicios distintos sino constituyen una sola celebración. Juntos el servicio de los tres días presenta de nuevo la historia de nuestra salvación del pecado y la muerte. Qué comience pronto. Qué realicemos una vez más la victoria de Jesucristo por nosotros. Qué sea escrita en nuestros corazones para que nunca busquemos solo el placer y evitemos toda responsabilidad. Qué realicemos pronto la historia de nuestra salvación.
