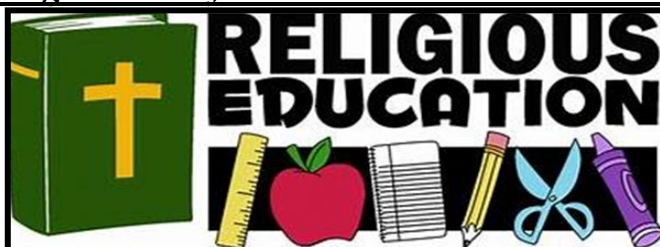

St. Ignatius Loyola’s feast day is Tuesday, July 31st. Please join us for the 9AM Mass on Tuesday. (Please see further details inside this bulletin.)

The Rectory will open on Tuesday at 10am and close at 5pm. There will be no evening hours.



The Religious Education Office will be closed for the months of July and August. Registration forms will be available at the Rectory or on the parish website. Registration forms must be returned by June 30. After June 30 there will be a \$25 late fee charged.

All children who are attending the 1st grade through the 8th grade in the local public schools must be registered in the Religious Education Program.

In order to receive the Sacraments of Penance and First Holy Communion children must have 2 years of studies. Religion classes continue for the 3, 4, 5, 6, 7th grades. Students will be eligible to receive the Sacrament of Confirmation after 7 years of Religious Education studies.

Feast Day—July 31, 2018



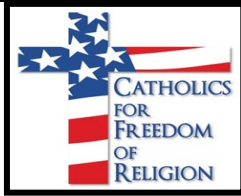
“Go, set the whole world on fire” was the parting words of St. Ignatius of Loyola to St. Francis Xavier whom he was sending to the East to conquer kingdoms and nations for Christ. Ignatius, “a man ablaze with God,” kindled the fire of divine love in the first six companions who together with him founded the Society of Jesus (The Jesuits) “to help souls” in their spiritual life to come closer to God. Ignatius who communicated his spirit to his sons was instrumental by divine grace to transform 56 of them into Saints and 147 of them into Blesseds. Ignatius and his band of men were the major spearheads of Catholic Reformation at the height of Protestantism. The role he and the Jesuits played to stem the tide of Protestantism has left its mark all over Europe. His is the Order that has the lion’s share in carrying the standard of the Cross to distant lands from the 16th Century and in establishing premier Catholic educational institutions throughout the world. The Order with its adaptability, availability and mobility launched into every sphere of activity in the Church “for the greater glory of God.” The Jesuit Order numbering 16000 is the most prominent and influential presence among the Religious Orders in the Church today. All this because Ignatius’ momentous decision to serve Christ the King than an earthly king in whose service he was engaged in.

Ignatius “a man given to the vanities of the world” and “whose chief delight consisted in martial exercises with a great and vain desire to win renown”, lived not so commendable a life until thirty when wounded in battle he was confined to bed, providentially reading unwelcome books on the life of Christ and lives of saints. He was challenged by the lives of saints, especially of St. Francis of Assisi and St. Dominic and asked himself “If they can, why can’t I?” Being a knight, he chivalrously accepted the challenge. For a year he took to serious prayer, penance and reflection in the cave at Manresa, Spain leading to deeper conviction and conversion. God taught him “like a school master” and transformed him through his prayer and penance. His prayer experiences and convictions he has summarized in his famous Spiritual Classic “The Spiritual Exercises,” a series of meditations and contemplations intended to transform the exercitant “to know Christ intimately, to love him tenderly and to follow him closely.” These are the prayer exercises that have challenged and changed many men and women to surrender themselves totally to Christ and to his cause and to become committed, holy and saintly people.

In the Preamble of The Spiritual Exercises, Ignatius lays down the Principle and Foundation of Christian life, the formulation of which was prompted by the truth, “all things come from God and all things return to God” (Cf. Romans 11.36), the graced enlightenment he had at the bank of the river Cardoner. Man is created to return to God: “God created us so that we might know, love, and serve him in this life and be happy with him forever. God’s purpose in creating us is to draw forth from us a response of loving service here on earth. All the things in the world are gifts of God, created for us, to be the means by which we can come to know him better, love him more sincerely, and serve him more faithfully. As a result, we ought to appreciate and use these things insofar as they help us toward our goal of loving service and union with God. But in so far as any created things hinder our progress toward our goal, we ought to let them go.” This leads to true spiritual freedom to “find God in all things” and “to seek the glory of God”.

May our heavenly patron, St. Ignatius, help us to live the Principle and Foundation of our life to become committed to Christ and to his mission to reform and transform the world.

Religious Liberty & Adoption Services:

Faith-based adoption agencies, including Catholic Charities, **have shut down** in Massachusetts, Washington D.C., Illinois, and California, because of anti-discrimination laws or funding in these states. The agencies' policies of placing children only with married husband and wife couples have conflicted with expanding legal requirements to place children with same-sex couples. When legislatures in these states failed to carve out a religious exemption for these agencies, they were faced with a difficult choice: **violate its conscience, or close its doors.**

Support for Religious Liberty has recently been passed by legislatures in Oklahoma and Kansas. These states now join AL, SD, TX, VA, and MI who already have laws in place that grant protections to faith-based adoption agencies that cite their religious beliefs for not placing children in same-sex homes. Supporters of these laws argue that the core issue is protecting a groups right to live out its religious faith.

Department Blazes Through 125 Years

St. Ignatius congratulates and asks God's blessings on our Hicksville Fire Department.



In what sounds like an urban legend, the Hicksville Fire Department— beloved by residents and famous for popcorn ball throwing the Sunday after Thanksgiving—rose from the ashes of a passing thunderstorm.

It was the summer of 1866. The hot, humid days of a typical Long Island summer brought with it a storm whose lightning sparked a fire that ravaged a set of buildings on Old Country Road. In the days following, the aftermath set off a discussion for the need of a fire department. In 1868, the first fire company was finally established, and was officially organized as Protection Hook and Ladder Company One.

As the Hicksville community grew, the need for more and better equipment grew as well, and in 1876 a second company was established as Chemical Engine Company One, later to be named Independent Engine and Hose Company Two in 1892..

The same year that Company Two was founded, a small piece of land was arranged for the building of a firehouse complete with a hip roof, small tower, flag pole and bell. Lettered on the front was “Chemical Engine Co. 1.” An old hand-drawn wagon was given to the company to serve as a truck for carrying a hose.

In 1890, citizens concerned for fire safety raised \$700 that was contributed to obtaining a ladder truck. Accordingly, Co. 1 had a truck house, complete with a bell, built to house the new vehicle.

By 1893, Citizens Engine Company Three was formed and in February, a joint meeting of the three companies called for the organization of a proper fire department, thus formally establishing the Hicksville Fire Department. A fire district, to “furnish all firefighting appliances necessary to the good and welfare of the companies” was founded in 1902.

Growing just as fast then as it continues to grow now, Hicksville was a booming community and found the need for Engine and Hose Company Four in 1904 and Emergency Company Five in 1928.

On Nov. 4, 1904, the Fire District let the community vote on \$6,000 to be used for the building of a proper fire house in a central area of town. Out of 103 votes, 60 votes for the building set things in motion, and the firehouse officially opened in 1906 where Peppercorn’s stands today. Now, Station One is just across the street from Peppercorn’s at 20 E. Marie St. The newer, bigger building was built in 1932 for \$88,000 after the Board of Fire Commissioners recognized the need for more room to house all of the necessary equipment.

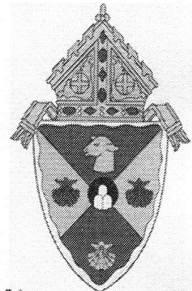
As it stands today, the Hicksville Fire Department has grown to include Hook and Ladder Company Six (1956), Engine Company Seven (1957), Floodlight/Heavy Rescue Company Eight (1966), a Haz-Mat team, a Fire Police squad, an EMS team, the Ladies Auxiliary group and the Hicksville Junior Firefighters program.

The department now has three more stations outside of its headquarters on East Marie Street—Station 2 (1956) serving the northeast section of Hicksville, Station 3 (1956) serving the northwest section and Station 4 (1990) serving the southwest section. Housed across these four stations are the department’s numerous hose engines, ladder trucks, a heavy rescue truck, and EMS, fire police and ambulance vehicles.

COMUNIDAD HISPANA



Tanto Eliseo, el profeta, y Jesús responden al hambre de las personas antes que ellos. Alistan los servicios de otros para alimentar a la gente; ambos se encuentran con un desconcierto similar. Hay mucha gente hambrienta y muy poca comida para alimentarlos. ¿Notaste que el pan en ambas historias es pan de cebada? No eran cruasanes ni rosquillas, solo el pan simple de los pobres, provistos de la misma gente. Hay alimentos más que suficientes para satisfacer su hambre y hay sobras. En el milagro de Jesús, ¡muchas sobras! El hambre de las personas volverá y lo que el Señor da es más que suficiente por ahora, y el futuro.

El relato de Eliseo nos recuerda que el hecho de que Jesús proporcionara pan no era la primera vez que Dios alimentaba a las personas hambrientas. ¿Recuerdas también el maná y la codorniz en el desierto para los israelitas? Pero Jesús no solo está proporcionando alimentos para el camino, aunque lo está haciendo. También atrae a los hambrientos, no solo para llenar sus estómagos, sino para compartir una comida con él y con los demás.

Cuando comemos nuestra comida eucarística hoy, no será solo para nuestra propia hambre espiritual. La Eucaristía es una comida comunitaria y se nos recuerda que no se trata solo de nuestra salvación personal. Somos salvados y alimentados como comunidad, y como comunidad estamos llamados a alimentar a los demás. Eliseo y Jesús usan el pan provisto por otros y entonces preguntamos: ¿Quiénes están hambrientos y qué pan tengo para ellos? Note que Jesús y sus discípulos no solo tiran el pan a las manos extendidas. En cambio, hay un ritual de acompañamiento: el pan de la gente se le da a Jesús, quien lo recibe, da gracias y comparte la comida con el hambriento. Aprendemos que no solo alimentamos las hambres físicas de las personas. También les ofrecemos nuestra presencia y compromiso, un alimento muy nutritivo y satisfactorio para las muchas hambres de la gente moderna.

Todas esas personas que Jesús y sus discípulos alimentaron ese día entraron en una nueva relación entre ellos y con él. Podemos ver por qué Juan y la iglesia primitiva salvaron la historia. La alimentación de las multitudes es más que una historia milagrosa de pan multiplicado. Es una lección para nosotros acerca de la Eucaristía: acerca de personas hambrientas que vienen al altar para llenar sus hambres y luego, como discípulos renovados, van a hacer lo mismo por otros.

No era solo una comida para los miles junto al mar de Galilea, ¿verdad? También fue un recordatorio de que Jesús nos daría, bendito y quebrantado, de la cruz. Él renovó el pacto que Dios hizo con las personas hambrientas y errantes en el desierto y, con esta comida, renueva el pacto con nosotros también.

Durante la lucha por los derechos civiles en nuestro país, la gente estaba muy agitada sobre sus compañeros de mesa. Se negaron a comer con personas de otras razas. En la multitud junto al mar de Galilea ese día, ciertamente hubo aquellos considerados pecadores y ritualmente inmundos por los devotos. Las mujeres estaban allí también; el sano y el enfermo; ciudadanos y extranjeros; razas diferentes; el cómodo y el pobre. Sin embargo, no había restricciones sobre quién podía o no comer la comida. Todos comieron o fueron bienvenidos en la mesa de Jesús. Ninguno tiene un menú exclusivo con opciones. Comieron la misma comida: Jesús se estaba ofreciendo a todos. Así como el pan se rompió y se compartió para todos, también lo estará, y lo está,

Para recibir los Sacramentos de la Penitencia y Primera Comunión, los niños tienen que tener dos años de estudios. Después de recibir estos Sacramentos, las clases de religión continuaran cada año para el 3, 4, 5, 6, y 7 grados. Los estudiantes serán elegibles para recibir el Sacramento de la Confirmación después de 7 años de estudios de Educación Religiosa.
