

EASTER SUNDAY John 20:1-9 or Luke 24:1-12;13-35

EASTER IS ALL ABOUT REDEMPTION

Recently the sports world witnessed two major redemptions. The University of Virginia Basketball team won the NCAA National Championship and last Sunday, Tiger Woods won the famous golf tournament known as The Masters, in Augusta, Ga. Both had little hope to win anything. Last year after Virginia lost to a 16th seed team, the question was would they ever come back? We saw however, that Virginia through hard work, team effort and a little faith, helped them to win the highest honor in all of college basketball.

Tiger Woods, was a person who lost a marriage, had drinking problems and physical problems where as the Wall Street Journal describes "he was driven to be a bedridden recluse." The question was whatever happened to Tiger?" Now we see how again hard work, dedication, hope and cooperation brought him an enormous win in the world of golf. The word we use about both Virginia and Tiger is redemption.

Today, Easter Sunday, is a day of redemption for us! We are redeemed not by our own merits but by God, who became human like you and me and took on our sins and defeated them on the cross and by his Resurrection from the dead. The word we use for this event is redemption. The word redemption comes from the Latin *redimere*, meaning to buy back, or reacquire at a cost. Humankind has been bought back from the grip of sin and death by the love of a God who gave us his only Son, Jesus. When Jesus died on the cross that fateful day, Good Friday, our sins were forgiven and we were reunited with God and one another. When He rose from the dead on Easter, his act of sacrifice on the cross became complete. Jesus is victorious over death by the power of God the Father. We now are given a share in His victory and we are given the liberation to become sons and daughters of God.

Often we are tempted to become discouraged or give up when we face crisis after crisis in our lives. We may feel alone or think we know better than God and we end up in the dark closet obstructing God to restore us with new life. We may fall into despair that is far darker than death. Fr. James Martin in an article "Take Up Your Cross: The Risen Christ and Daily Life" writes that "this is the time to turn to the Resurrection."

The disciples "failed to realize that they are dealing with the living God, the same one whose Message to Mary Magdalene "Nothing will be impossible with God." It is because of the Resurrection "we are called not to live behind closed doors of darkness, doubt, fear and death, but to come out of our hiding and accompany Mary Magdalene, Peter and the Beloved disciple (John), weeping sometimes, searching always and ultimately be moved to joy by the dawn of the Resurrection."

The risen Christ teaches us that we are called to believe what the disciples have seen with their eyes, but we now see with faith. May we never give up because with God everything is POSSIBLE! If God can move a simple stone away, how much more can God do with our hearts and our lives if we trust and have faith in him.

The University of Virginia and Tiger Wood's story is that in the end they did not win alone. Both had a community where they worked and believed together. Tiger Woods, was no longer the solo sullen fellow. He relied on help from others. This is what we do as an Easter Family in the Catholic Church. We win together because God saves us all together and his desire is that we are one, drawn into the presence of his Son, Jesus Christ. The Resurrection teaches us that as a family, for every Good Friday we experience in life, Easter Sunday always awaits. On behalf of our priests Frs. Andrés, Benjamin, Frank, and our Sisters of St. Dominic, Srs. Mary, Kathy, Karen; and the entire parish staff, I wish you and your family a very Happy and blessed Easter. May the risen Christ dwell in your hearts forever!





EASTER 2019

Dear Friends:

As we celebrate Holy Week, the Easter Vigil, Easter Sunday, Divine Mercy Sunday and, indeed, the entire Easter Season on Long Island, we remember the power of the Risen Christ so eloquently captured in the Resurrection narratives of the four Gospels.

These Resurrection accounts put us in the presence of the Risen Lord and open us up to his power. These narratives reveal the Risen Christ's glorified wounds.

The light that streams from the glorified wounds of the Risen Jesus touch the wounds of the Church, the wounds of survivors of clergy sexual abuse, the wounds of our families and the wounds of the human family.

The power of the Risen Christ rolls back the stones of spiritual inertia and lukewarmness from our hearts, so that we can embrace a new and compelling spiritual vitality and commitment to advance *dramatic missionary growth* on Long Island and beyond.

It is my role as your Bishop, as your successor to the Apostles on Long Island, and as your servant, to be a teacher of prayer. Every Pastoral Letter, every Catholic Faith Network *Encounter* program, every YouTube video, and every Twitter message I share with you, is designed to open us all to a deeper spirit of prayer, holiness and evangelization.

In my 2019 Lenten Letter, <u>www.bishopbarreslentletter2019.org</u>, *Encounter* program link: https://youtu.be/AY wYWE3b90 I asked us all to recommit ourselves to being deeply biblical Catholics who embrace daily *lectio divina*, the prayerful, daily reading and praying of Sacred Scripture.

In this 2019 Easter Letter, I am asking all of us to recommit to a period of daily silent mental prayer, a simple, heart to heart conversation with God. St. John Vianney, the holy Curé of Ars and patron saint of all Catholic priests, wrote: "Prayer is nothing but union with God. When one has a heart that is pure and united with God, he is given a kind of serenity and sweetness that makes him ecstatic, a light that surrounds him with marvelous brightness."

In our current noise-addicted and social-media addicted culture, it can seem almost impossible to commit to a serious period of silence and mental prayer each day.

In the past, we may have tried to be faithful and consistent to mental prayer but found we could not sustain it. We may have given up or become so discouraged that we no longer believe that we could ever be serious about mental prayer.

Father Walter Ciszek, S.J. (1904-1984), was a Polish-American Jesuit priest who was imprisoned for more than twenty years for doing missionary work in the Soviet Union. His cause for canonization is currently underway in Rome.

Father Ciszek wrote a memoir of his spiritual journey in which he explains how prayer saved him through his years in prison, in solitary confinement, and even in the Gulag. In the book He Leadeth Me, he makes the connection between deep faith and deep prayer: "We cannot pray as if we were talking to the empty air; so in the very act of praying we unconsciously remind ourselves of the reality and the presence of God, thereby strengthening our belief in him ... Without faith, our lives are just so many empty and boring routines, hollow at the core, as day succeeds day with little sense of meaning or feeling of accomplishment. With faith, however, even the most boring and routine action of every day has merit and significance for us – and for the kingdom of God."

And so, each Easter, we all together humble ourselves and begin again. The power of the Risen Christ allows us a new beginning and opens us up to new vistas of conversion and spiritual growth.

St. Peter of Alcantara (1499-1562) was a Spanish Franciscan friar who lived in the 1500's and was a master of spirituality. Consider what this great saint said about how mental prayer transforms our lives: "In mental prayer the soul is purified from its sins, nourished with charity, confirmed in faith, and strengthened in hope; the mind expands, the affections dilate, the heart is purified, truth becomes evident; temptation is conquered, sadness dispelled; the senses are renovated; drooping powers revive; tepidity ceases; the rust of vices disappears. Out of mental prayer issues forth, like living sparks, those desires of heaven which the soul conceives when inflamed with the fire of divine love. Sublime is the excellence of mental prayer, great are its privileges; to mental prayer heaven is opened; to mental prayer heavenly secrets are manifested and the ear of God ever attentive."

This Easter, may the power of the Risen Christ and the Gospel Resurrection narratives open us to the Holy Spirit expanding the height, depth and breadth of our daily mental prayer and our capacity for contemplative concentration.

May each one of us embrace our call as baptized Catholic Christians to not only pray at a deep level ourselves, but also to teach others to pray as well.

May the Holy Spirit continue to raise up contemplative missionary saints on Long Island!

El Padre Walter Ciszek, S.J. (1904-1984), fue un sacerdote Jesuita Polaco-Estadounidense que estuvo encarcelado durante más de veinte años por hacer un trabajo misionero en la Unión Soviética. Su causa de canonización está actualmente en marcha en Roma.

El padre Ciszek escribió una memoria de su viaje espiritual en la que explica cómo la oración lo salvó a través de sus años en prisión, en confinamiento solitario e incluso en el Gulag. En el libro El Me Guió, establece la conexión entre la fe profunda y la oración profunda: "No podemos orar como si estuviéramos hablando al aire vacío; en el acto mismo de orar nos recordamos inconscientemente de la realidad y la presencia de Dios, fortaleciendo así nuestra creencia en El... Sin fe, nuestras vidas son rutinas vacías y aburridas, huecas en su esencia, a medida que al día sucede otro día, con poco sentido o sentimiento de logro. Sin embargo, con la fe, incluso la acción más aburrida y rutinaria de cada día tiene mérito y significado para nosotros, y para el reino de Dios".

Y así, cada Pascua, todos juntos nos humillamos y comenzamos de nuevo. El poder de Cristo resucitado nos permite un nuevo comienzo y nos abre a nuevas perspectivas de conversión y crecimiento espiritual.

San Pedro de Alcántara (1499-1562) fue un fraile franciscano español que vivió en los años 1500 y fue un maestro de la espiritualidad. Considere lo que este gran santo dijo acerca de cómo la oración mental transforma nuestras vidas: "En la oración mental, el alma se purifica de sus pecados, se nutre de la caridad, se confirma en la fe y se fortalece en la esperanza; la mente se expande, los afectos se dilatan, el corazón se purifica, la verdad se hace evidente. Se conquista la tentación, se disipa la tristeza; los sentidos se renuevan; los poderes caídos reviven; cesa la tibieza; el óxido de los vicios desaparece. De la oración mental surgen, como chispas vivientes, aquellos deseos del cielo que el alma concibe cuando se inflama con el fuego del amor divino. Sublime es la excelencia de la oración mental, grandes son sus privilegios; a la oración mental se abre el cielo; a la oración mental secretos celestiales se manifiestan y el oído de Dios siempre está atento".

En esta Pascua, que el poder de Cristo Resucitado y las narraciones de la Resurrección de los Evangelios nos abran al Espíritu Santo expandiendo la altura, la profundidad y la amplitud de nuestra oración mental diaria y nuestra capacidad de concentración contemplativa.

Que cada uno de nosotros acepte nuestro llamado como Cristianos Católicos bautizados no solo para orar a un nivel profundo, sino también para enseñar a otros a orar.



Queridos amigos:

En esta Carta de Pascua de 2019, les pido a todos que volvamos a comprometernos con un período de oración mental diaria en silencio, una simple conversación de corazón a corazón con Dios. San Juan Vianney, el santo Cura de Ars y patrón de todos los sacerdotes católicos, escribió: "La oración no es más que la unión con Dios. Cuando uno tiene un corazón que es puro y está unido a Dios, se le da una especie de serenidad y dulzura que lo vuelve extático, una luz que lo rodea con un brillo maravilloso".

En nuestra cultura actual, adicta al ruido y adicta a las redes sociales, puede parecer casi imposible comprometerse con un período serio de silencio y oración mental cada día.

En el pasado, es posible que hayamos tratado de ser fieles y coherentes con la oración mental, pero hemos descubierto que no podíamos sostenerla. Es posible que nos hayamos rendido o nos hayamos desanimado tanto que ya no creemos que podríamos ser serios con la oración mental.



OMUNIDAD HISPANA



Hoy día la Iglesia celebra la resurrección del Señor. Este Domingo es la "fiesta de las fiestas y la solemnidad de las solemnidades". En la noche que precedió a este día resonó en todas las Iglesias el "Exulten", que canta: "Esta es la noche en la cual Cristo, rompiendo las cadenas de la muerte, surge del sepulcro victorioso... Oh noche dichosa, tú sola mereciste conocer el tiempo y la hora en la cual Cristo resucitó de entre los muertos!"

Nadie fue testigo ocular del momento de la resurrección de Cristo. Esto ocurrió en el seno de esa "noche dichosa" en un momento que sólo ella conoce. Por eso todo el Evangelio de este Domingo de Resurrección gira en torno a la experiencia del "sepulcro vacío". El primer

día de la semana, es decir, el domingo (el sábado es el séptimo día para los judíos), van de madrugada las mujeres al sepulcro, encuentran la piedra que lo cubría removida y anuncian: "Se han llevado del sepulcro al Señor y no sabemos dónde lo han puesto". Corren al sepulcro los apóstoles Pedro y Juan y verifican el hecho: "Las vendas por el suelo y el sudario que cubría su cabeza plegado en un lugar aparte". Y entonces, respecto del discípulo amado, el Evangelio dice que él, entrando en el sepulcro vacío, "vio y creyó".

La fe es un don sobrenatural que consiste en apoyar toda la existencia en una verdad que ha sido revelada. De este tipo es la verdad que proclama y celebra hoy el mundo cristiano, a saber, la resurrección de Cristo de entre los muertos. Los apóstoles vieron a Cristo resucitado y afirman: "Dios lo resucitó al tercer día y le concedió la gracia de aparecerse... a nosotros que comimos y bebimos con él después que resucitó de entre los muertos" (Hechos 10,40-41). Por tanto, la resurrección de Cristo es un hecho histórico comprobado por testigos oculares, pero permanece un hecho trascendente que sobrepasa la historia.

La resurrección de Cristo es la verdad fundamental del cristianismo. Ella es el argumento de que todo lo que Cristo enseñó era verdad y, sobre todo, es el argumento de que su muerte en la cruz fue un sacrificio que Dios aceptó en propiciación por los pecados del hombre, que reconcilió a los hombres con Dios y nos libró del poder del pecado y de la muerte. "Cristo resucitó de entre los muertos, como primicias de los que murieron" (1Cor 15,20). Su resurrección funda nuestra fe en la resurrección final de los muertos. Sólo a la luz de su resurrección adquiere valor su promesa: "Yo soy la resurrección; todo el que cree en mí, aunque muera, vivirá" (Juan 11,25). Con razón San Pablo puede argumentar: "Si los muertos no resucitan, entonces tampoco Cristo resucitó; y si Cristo no resucitó, vana es vuestra fe y vosotros estáis aún en vuestros pecados" (1Cor 15,16-17).

El único testimonio válido que los creyentes podemos dar de la resurrección de Cristo hoy es el de conducir una vida libre del pecado. Para el hombre esto es imposible; pero es posible para Dios. Para todo hombre de buena voluntad el testimonio de una vida santa es un argumento irrebatible de que ha actuado el poder de Cristo resucitado que nos sana en lo más profundo. Todos experimentamos en lo más profundo de nuestro ser el lado oscuro del pecado que a menudo emerge y nos esclaviza y todos debemos exclamar con San Pablo: "¡Pobre de mí! ¿Quién me librará de este cuerpo de pecado?" (Rom 7,24). Esto lo puede hacer sólo Cristo, que con su paso de la muerte a la vida nos arrastra consigo y nos hace pasar de la esclavitud del pecado a la libertad de los hijos de Dios.


