Reverence for the Eucharist

God our Father assembles His people to sing His praise. Gathered around the table of the word and of the Eucharist, we are nourished with His grace and sent forth to make His kingdom come. Each generation of believers has continued to recognize the Lord Jesus in the breaking of bread. Listed below are reminders of how we can receive Him more reverently and lovingly.

When you enter the church, please face the tabernacle and genuflect before entering your pew.

How Do I Receive Communion?

EITHER IN THE HAND OR ON THE TONGUE

PREPARE

yourself to receive the Body of Christ by opening your heart to Him and building a reverence for the Sacrament.

Bow your head before reaching priest.


I. If you receive on the hand-

APPROACH the altar and put out your hands to receive the Flost. Hold your hands as Cyril of Jerusalem described in the 4th century:

"... do not go stretching out your open hands or having fingers spread out, but make ... a throne ... which shall receive the King"."



PRESENTATION Your priest or minister will present the Host to you. He will say, "The Body of Christ," you answer "Amen." **Receive the Host reverently** with cupped hands



(one hand under the other)

Either hand may hold the other; the left hand is usually above the right by custom.

COMMUNICATE

Yourself by taking one step to the side and then placing the host in your mouth. Use your underneath hand to do this.

RETURN

to your place in the congregation.



- * TAKE CARE not to drop any piece of the Host.
- * LET ALL your gestures express reverence.
- DO NOT REACH for the Host; the priest will place it in your

Slightly cupped hands place one hand under the other.

II. If you receive on the Tongue -If you wish to receive the Host on your Tongue After "The Body of Christ," say "Amen"

and accept the Host with mouth open and

without extending your hands.



Judge not

It is tempting to view others' behavior and feel the need to correct it. Remember that criticizing others is a serious business. "Stop judging and you will not be judged. Stop condemning and you will not be condemned. Forgive and you will be forgiven" (Luke 6:37). Better to worry about our own behavior and let others do the same.

"Listen to counsel and receive instruction, that you may eventually become wise"

What is in your spiritual toolbox?

Can you imagine trying to build a house with just a hammer? It won't be as effective as using the right set of tools. So, too, we can face life on our own, or we can let God give us the tools we need

to thrive. A useful spiritual tool box will include this equipment:

Sacraments:

Grace – a share in God's divine life and friendship – comes to

us most effectively through the Sacraments. When we frequently receive the Eucharist and regularly participate in the Sacrament of Penance and Reconciliation, the resulting grace is a key tool that strengthens us to live out our lives in God's friendship.

Scripture: When facing challenges, we often "hear" the voice of a beloved parent, favorite teacher, or wise

friend in our heads providing guidance from conversations past. Scripture helps us to "hear" God's voice. Through the Bible, God has equipped us with all that we need to succeed in this world and live with him eternally in the next.

It is meant to be lived.

Companions: "Do not be led astray: "Bad company corrupts good morals" (1 Corinthians 15:33). Despite their best intentions, the wrong friends can lead us away from God. Choosing companions who support our faith, hold us accountable, and share our love for God are important elements in our spiritual toolboxes.

Luke 13:22-30, The narrow gate

In this Gospel passage, we read Jesus' answer to the million-dollar question:

"Will only a few people be saved?" The gate to Heaven is "narrow", open to whoever can "fit through." When an ancient city was threatened the gate was locked. Hidden in part of the wall was a narrow opening so no one could enter with armor or weapons. Even an enemy would have to enter unarmed.

Or, to use modern example, the gate of Heaven is like the gate at the airport, in that we may need to get rid of extra or unsafe baggage before going through it. Here, this may be unconfessed

serious sin, unforgiveness, undue attachments to earthly goods, etc.

> We may be surprised. People who felt entitled to Heaven in this life will be turned away, while others deemed "unworthy" will be welcomed in. It comes down to

whether we can part with the extra or unsafe baggage in our hearts. Jesus said, "I am the gate. Whoever enters through me will be saved" (John 10:9). The moral: pack wisely and find the



What did Jesus & mean by "turn the other cheek"?

To understand Jesus' instruction of "turning the other cheek" (Matthew 5:39), it's necessary to understand some cultural context. Someone striking you



on the right cheek would've used his left hand, which was considered unclean in Jesus' day. Striking with the left was for slaves, children, and

anyone else you considered your social inferior. Turning the other cheek told the aggressor, "I am your equal. You will not treat me that way again."

To "turn the other cheek" is often misinterpreted as an order to do nothing to stop evil. What it really means is, do no evil to stop evil. Instead, we can graciously respond to cruel remarks (if they deserves a response at all), get outside help, work for changes in policies, show kindness to our oppressors. Most of all, pray for the aggressor's change of heart. You don't always know the fruits of your prayers until later on. Resisting the temptation to "get even" is possible with the grace of God, who forgave his persecutors from the Cross.

Feasts & Celebrations

Aug. 6 – The Transfiguration of the Lord. Tradition says that Mt. Tabor was the site of the Transfiguration during which Christ appeared radiant in the company of Moses and Elijah, and a voice was heard to say, "This is my beloved Son, with whom I am well pleased; listen to him" (Matthew 17:5).

Aug. 8 - St. Dominic (1221). Born to a noble family in Spain, St. Dominic studied to become a Franciscan canon regular, but left to preach against the widely popular but dangerous Albigensian heresy. He founded the Order of Preachers, or "Dominicans,"

who successfully defeated this heresy. He is also credited with receiving the Rosary from Our Lady and teaching the prayer to others.

Aug. 22 - Queenship of the Blessed Virgin. In 1954, Pope Pius XII established this feast day to celebrate the Coronation of Mary as Queen of Heaven and Earth. Mary's queenship is rooted in Scripture and Tradition. As the mother of the King,

Mary can intercede for us in Heaven.

Para la reflexión

¿Hemos hecho de nuestra fe cristiana una religión a la carta? ¿Qué cosas hemos dejado de lado, que no nos gustan porque son demasiado exigentes? ¿Nos callamos ante nuestros amigos o familiares en cosas de la Iglesia que sabemos que deberíamos defender?

En el Evangelio nos encontramos con Jesús y él nos habla con claridad. Si queremos salvarnos, si queremos alcanzar la verdadera felicidad, nos invita a seguirle, nos invita a vivir de una determinada manera. No nos promete que siempre va a ser fácil estar con él. Si al maestro lo clavaron en la cruz, no podemos pensar que a sus seguidores les va a ir mucho mejor. Es lo que nos dice Jesús en el Evangelio de hoy: "He venido a prender fuego en el mundo". No dice que haya venido a poner paños calientes para que nos sintamos bien. No. Jesús pretende cambiar este mundo, revolucionarlo, ponerlo patas arriba. Eso no es fácil. A veces es causa de dolor y división. La paz llegará después. El Reino es algo que llega pero primero hay que conquistarlo, hay que esforzarse. Para conseguir la justicia es preciso luchar contra la injusticia.

Por eso, lo más importante de la vida del cristiano no es participar en la misa del domingo. Ese es el lugar de encuentro con la comunidad. Pero donde un cristiano se juega su ser cristiano, es en su vida diaria, en la relación con su familia, sus compañeros de trabajo, sus amistades. Ahí es donde hay que vivir en cristiano. Aunque eso signifique ir en contra de la opinión de los demás o perder su amistad. Porque ser cristiano no es responder siempre con una sonrisa a todo lo que nos dicen, sino saber poner por delante, con cariño pero también con fuerza, la verdad del Evangelio. Pero no nos asustemos. Recordemos los muchos que han dado y dan su sangre en defensa de la fe. Su testimonio nos debe animar a vivir con más radicalidad nuestra vida cristiana
