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
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#### THE SOLEMNITY OF THE MOST HOLY BODY AND BLOOD OF CHRIST CORPUS CHRISTI

#### WELCOME HOME CHRIST, THE BREAD OF LIFE & MEDICINE OF IMMORTALITY-WELOMES US BACK

We the priests and staff here at St. Ignatius Loyola, want to welcome back those of you who are able to, your beautiful church building. It has been a long time. We missed you! It was strange celebrating Mass looking at an empty space and just four walls. Although, many of you sent pictures that were placed on pews in our convent chapel. So while celebrating Mass, I was able to have you there. In a spiritual way, you were all present at Mass because we all make up the Body of Christ. St. Paul in his letter today to the Corinthians, writes that the Church makes up you and me. We are the Body of Christ. For as beautiful as it sounds, it is nothing compared to having your physical presence back into our church.

As you return, you will notice we are in a "new normal". There are quite a few differences to consider as we are still in the Covid-19 Pandemic:

#### 1) Entrances and Exits

Entrance and Exit Ways will be clearly marked. Everyone is to enter the church either thru the front door or the handicap door and then exit through the handicap, north entrance or south entrance doors closest to the parking lot. Please follow the arrows.

#### 2) MASKS

Everyone is REQUIRED to wear a mask unless you have breathing issues and/or you have a very young child.

#### 3) SOCIAL DISTANCE

We still have to maintain 6 feet social distance from one another.

#### 4) WASH HANDS

Sanitize or Wash your hands. Sanitizers are provided.

#### 5) NUMBER OF PEOPLE ALLOWED IN CHURCH

We are currently in Phase 2 in moving forward from our lockdown. That means that we may allow up to 25% of the capacity in our church to attend and worship at Mass. Here at St. Ignatius, we can allow up to approximately 120 people at each Mass. Certain pews and chairs have been designated where each family and person can sit. Other pews and chairs are cordoned off. When we go beyond 120, parishioners will need to go to another Mass.

#### 6) A NEW MASS SCHEDULE

Since we need time to clean and sanitize the church after each Mass, a new schedule will go into effect until further notice.

Weekday Mass Schedule starting Monday, June 15th will be one Mass at 9am until further notice. Masses: Saturday 5:00pm, Sunday 7:30am, 9:30am, 12 Noon, 5:00pm Mass in Spanish (Español). Overflows will be in Msgr. Tarrant Hall when necessary. Although, we cannot guarantee an additional overflow at 9:30am. Our apologies. Thank you for your understanding.

There is no obligation to attend Sunday Mass until further notice.

#### 7) HOLY COMMUNION

I am sorry to write that Holy Communion will not be distributed at this time. After the Priests & Deacons receive, all are invited to make an Act of Spiritual Communion Prayer. Even though you are not receiving Holy Communion physically, Jesus is still coming into you in a strong spiritual way in the Eucharist. I really feel for each of you who have not been able to receive since March. However, I pray that your yearning for Jesus in Holy Communion will bring you closer to Him, so that when you do receive, it will be like receiving Jesus for the very first time.

In today's Gospel from John 6, Jesus uses very strong language to explain the food and drink he offers is his own flesh and blood. He is really giving of Himself in His risen presence to us in the Eucharist. When we see and receive the Eucharist, it is no longer bread and wine but the Body, Blood, Soul and Divinity of Christ. We call this transubstantiation. Most importantly, we need to pray for the faith to believe that this is really and truly the Lord Jesus that we see, experience and will one day again consume in Holy Communion.

The most important reason why we consume the Eucharist is that we are to become what we eat. Become Jesus. St. Augustine writes: "If we receive the Eucharist worthily, we become what we receive." And in receiving Christ, we become one body in him, and through him, one with the Father and the Holy Spirit. Through receiving the Eucharist, we enter into a unique and personal relationship with the Trinity and with one another, the Body of Christ. This is why we go to Mass, to become Jesus. Even though, we face so many challenges during the week, Jesus in the Eucharist, makes all the difference. He will not only give us the strength for the week, He brings us salvation and eternal life. Thank you for reflecting on all this information. May we continue to pray with and for one another during these unprecedented times.

## DECK OF CARDS

A young solider was in his bunkhouse all alone one Sunday morning over in Afghanistan. It was quiet that day, the guns and the mortars, and land mines for some reason hadn't made a noise. The young soldier knew it was Sunday, the holiest day of the week. As he was sitting there, he got out an old deck of cards and laid them out across the bunk.

Just then an army sergeant came in and said, Why aren't you with the rest of the platoon? The soldier replied, "I thought I would stay behind and spend some time with the Lord. The sergeant said "Looks like you're playing cards. The soldier said, "No sir, you see since we are not allowed to have Bibles or other spiritual books in this country, I 've decided to talk to the Lord by studying this deck of cards. The sergeant asked in disbelief, "How will you do that?"

You see the *ACE* sergeant, it reminds that there is only one God. The *TWO* represents the two parts of the Bible, Old and New Testaments. The *THREE* represents the Father, The Son, and the Holy Spirit.. The *FOUR* stands for the Four Apostles- Matthew, Mark, Luke and John. The *FIVE* is for the five virgins that were ten but only five of them were glorified. The *SIX* is for the six days it took God to create the Heavens and Earth. The *SEVEN* is for the day God rested after working the six days. The *EIGHT* is for the family of Noah and his wife, their three sons and their wives, in which God saved the eight people from the flood that destroyed the earth for the first time. The *NINE* is for the lepers that Jesus cleansed of leprosy. He cleansed ten but nine never thanked him. The *TEN* represents the Ten Commandments that God handed down to Moses on tablets made of stone. The *JACK* is a reminder of Satan. One of God's first angels, but he got kicked out of heaven for his sly and wicked ways and is now the joker of eternal hell. The *QUEEN* stands for the Virgin Mary. The *KING* stands for Jesus, for He is the King of all Kings.

When I count the dots on all the cards, I come up with 365 total, one for every day of the year. There are a total of 52 cards in a deck, each is a week, 52 weeks in a year. The four suits represents the four seasons; Spring, Summer, Fall and Winter. Each suit has thirteen cards, there are exactly thirteen weeks in a quarter. So when I want to talk to God and thank Him, I just pull out this old deck of cards and they remind me of all that I have to be thankful for.

The sergeant just stood there and after a minute, with tears in his eyes and pain in his heart he said, "Soldier, can I borrow that deck of cards?"

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In the meantime, you can pray this prayer to receive Holy Communion in a Spiritual Way.

An Act of Spiritual Communion

Jesus, I believe that you are present in the Most Holy Sacrament. I love You above all things, and desire to receive You into my soul. Since I cannot at this moment receive You sacramentally, come at least spiritually into my heart. I embrace You as if you were already there and unite myself wholly to you. Never permit me to be separated from You. Amen

Before the Civil War there was a block of stone on what later became the Belmont Abbey College property in North Carolina. It was called the "Slave Stone" because slaves being sold at auction were made to stand on that stone so that potential buyers could see them.

Years later, the Stone was turned and refashioned into a baptismal font that is now in the entryway of the Mary Help of Christians Basilica on the Belmont Abbey College campus. A plaque was placed on this font that is there to this day that connects the Waters of Baptism with the freedom to be children of God.

A slave rock transformed into a baptismal font is a powerful image that can help us to rediscover the relationship in our Catholic faith between repentance and conversion, and social change.

Each one of us today opens our hearts and lives to the Holy Spirit, the indwelling presence of the Holy Trinity within us and the power of the Body and Blood of Christ to transform us, heal us, inspire us so that we can be instruments of Spirit-driven social change that rejects hatred, violence, racism and blindness and embraces the love and peace of Jesus Christ.

Imprinted in this stone was the emotional memory of the coarse cruelty of the slave traders and the anguish and trauma of slave families being separated and further stripped of their human dignity. The Slave Stone carried some of the emotional imprint of the stones of Calvary itself as do historical images from our nation's history of lynchings, Jim Crow laws, film footage of fire hoses turned on African Americans engaged in peaceful civil rights protests and now, the recent horrific video we all saw depicting the tragic and senseless killing of George Floyd, a man who was in police custody on a Minneapolis street.

On behalf of the faithful of the Diocese of Rockville Centre, I express my heartfelt prayers and condolences to the Floyd family. We pray for peace on the streets of our cities. We pray that peace, charity and justice may animate non-violent protests. We pray for our public servants, our police, our first responders and their families. We pray for the witness of our Church and the ecumenical and interfaith witness we have with our brothers and sisters of different faiths.

On Friday, September 25, 2015, Pope Francis celebrated Mass in New York City at Madison Square Garden. In his homily, he reminded us of Christ's presence in every city around the world.

He said: "Knowing that Jesus still walks our streets, that he is part of the lives of his people, that he is involved with us in one vast history of salvation, fills us with hope...A hope which makes us see, even in the midst of smog, the presence of God as he continues to walk the streets of our city. Because God is in the city."

We pray for peace on the streets of our cities and for justice. We pray for a powerful awareness, as our Holy Father says, of the presence of God as Jesus walks and carries His Cross through the wounded streets of our cities. Two years ago, on April 4, 2018, we commemorated the 50th Anniversary of the Assassination of Dr. Martin Luther King, Jr. and I shared a Pastoral Letter "*The Dream and Our Deepest, Truest Selves*" which has been reposted on our <u>DRVC.org</u> website. Little did we know as we prayed and prepared for that 50 year commemoration of Dr. King's death how relevant it would be two years later.

Allow me to share a brief section of it: "With the help of God, whose love he preached so fervently, Dr. King's sacrifice tipped the scales of human history and brought us closer to the fulfilment of a dream, one that recognizes the dignity of men and women of all races, one that recognizes that the sanctity of human life is the foundation of every human right, and one that recognizes the rich contributions and legacy of African Americans in our country."

May each one of us stir the flame of Christ's love and peace at every moment and in every situation in these painful and traumatic days.
