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

Clergy Corner

29th SUNDAY IN ORDINARY TIME

Mt 22:15-21

Dear Parishioners,

In his Inaugural Address on January 20, 1961, John F. Kennedy, the newly-elected President of the United States, gave the famous challenge: "My fellow Americans, ask not what your country can do for you; ask what you can do for your country. My fellow citizens of the world, ask not what America will do for you, but what together we can do for the freedom of man. Finally, whether you are citizens of America or citizens of the world, ask of us here the same high standards of strength and sacrifice which we ask of you. With a good conscience our only sure reward, with history the final judge of our deeds, let us go forth to lead the land we love, asking God's blessing and His help, but knowing that here on earth God's work must truly be our own." If we personalized Kennedy's statement it would read, "Don't ask, 'What can my country do for me?' Instead ask, 'What can I do for my country?" And add, "Don't ask, 'What can God do for me?' Instead ask, 'What can I do for the Kingdom of God?"

We have double citizenship, one of this world in which we live now, and the other of the kingdom of God. We have duties and obligations to both the kingdoms and hence there should be no clashes between the two. Jesus made it very clear to the Pharisees who attempted to trap him that they need to be loyal both to God and to the emperor. No one can peacefully exist in a divided society since a society without rules and regulations cannot offer an atmosphere conducive to living and practicing one's religion. By our nature, human beings are social beings. Therefore, rules and regulations that bring unity and order to the society need to be respected and a good believer needs to be a good citizen as well. This weekend's Gospel teaches us that responsible citizenship is a virtue, and therefore, participation in political life is a moral obligation. Voting with the aim of protecting human life, promoting human dignity and advancing the common good of all God's children helps to make the world a better place.

Today is World Mission Sunday. It is celebrated throughout the Universal Church in response to the Gospel invitation to live in solidarity with all the world's peoples, especially those most in need of the Good News of God's love. Let us support the Holy Catholic Church through our prayers and financial support bringing Jesus and His values to the world. **How do we celebrate Mission Sunday locally?** I want everyone to bring at least one person back to Holy Mass (not someone with compromised immunity). This Sunday, let us recommit ourselves as a missionary of Jesus to bring healing and peace to those who have strayed from the Holy Catholic Church perhaps because of our priestly brothers/ministers irresponsible and scandalous lives. I am happy to meet any person who has any questions especially about the Chapter 11 filing of the diocese.

Catholic Daughters of the Americas is one of the oldest and largest organizations of Catholic women in the Americas. **Tina Devlin, CDA Regent, summarizes their activities as follows** "Our court, Court Queen of Angels #869, was formed here at St. Ignatius Loyola parish in 1924. Si personalizamos la declaración de Kennedy, diría: "No preguntes: '¿Qué puede hacer mi país por mí?' En lugar de eso, pregunte, '¿Qué puedo hacer por mi país?' "Y agregue," No pregunte, '¿Qué puede hacer Dios por mí?' En lugar de eso, pregunte: '¿Qué puedo hacer por Dios?'"

Tenemos doble ciudadanía, una en este mundo en el que vivimos ahora y la otra en el reino de Dios. Tenemos deberes y obligaciones para ambos reinos y, por lo tanto, no debería haber enfrentamientos entre los dos. Jesús les dejó muy claro a los fariseos que intentaron atraparlo que debían ser leales tanto a Dios como al emperador. Nadie puede existir pacíficamente en una sociedad dividida, ya que una sociedad sin reglas y regulaciones no puede ofrecer una atmósfera propicia para vivir y practicar la propia religión. Por su naturaleza, los seres humanos son seres sociales. Por lo tanto, las reglas y regulaciones que traen unidad y orden a la sociedad deben ser respetadas. El buen creyente debe ser un buen ciudadano también. El Evangelio de este fin de semana nos enseña que la ciudadanía responsable es una virtud y, por tanto, la participación en la vida política es una obligación moral. Votar con el objetivo de proteger la vida humana, promover la dignidad humana y promover el bien común de todos los hijos de Dios ayuda a hacer del mundo un lugar mejor.

El Domingo Mundial de las Misiones (SMM) se celebra en toda la Iglesia Universal en respuesta a la invitación del Evangelio a vivir en solidaridad con todos los pueblos del mundo, especialmente con los más necesitados de la Buena Nueva del amor de Dios. 

When its hospital denied access to a Catholic priest who was asked to administer sacraments to a trauma patient injured in a car accident, the Office of Civil Rights at the U.S. Dept. of Health & Human Services intervened causing the University of Maryland Medical System to amend its COVID-19 visitor policy. "The Trump Administration has made it a priority to defend Americans'

right to practice their faith, at all times and especially during this pandemic," said Secretary Alex Azar. "As our work with the Univ. of MD Medical System shows, we can deliver healthcare, combat COVID-19, and protect religious freedom all at the same time." (1)

The case of a juror removed from deliberation because he sought divine guidance, will be heard by the 11th U.S. Court of Appeals. "Dismissing a deliberating juror for believing prayer is effective denial of the noble and civic duty to serve as a juror to hundreds of millions of Americans who seek divine guidance through prayer," said counsel for First Liberty. (2)

The Dept. of Education issued a final rule that expands religious liberty protections on college campuses and allows the Department of Education to suspend or cut federal funding from colleges that violate the First Amendment. It ensures the equal treatment of religious student groups at public universities. "This administration is committed to protecting 1st Amendment rights to students, teachers, and faith-based organizations. Students should not be forced to choose between their faith and their education...,"said Sec. Betsy DeVos⁽³⁾

Happening Now: Executive Order Ensures Babies Born Alive Receive Proper Care

"I will always defend the sacred right to life," said Pres. Trump at the National Catholic Prayer Breakfast. "This is our sacrosanct moral duty." ⁽⁴⁾ The Sept. 25, 2020 order directs HHS Sec. Alex Azar to implement an "Executive Order on Protecting Vulnerable Newborn & Infant Children" that recognizes "the human dignity and inherent worth of every newborn or other infant child, regardless of prematurity or disability, and to ensure for each child protection under the law." ⁽⁵⁾ It is uncontested that many children have been born alive following an abortion and left unattended to die alone, sometimes for many hours (Centers for Disease Control document, 2019)

One Minute Meditations

True happiness

Popular theologian C.S. Lewis wrote, "Aim at Heaven and you will get Earth thrown in. Aim at

Earth and you get neither." We were made for God and can't be truly happy unless we are united with him. If we focus on worldly concerns, we will never know the meaning of true happiness. If we focus on God, we will know happiness even on Earth.

The Commandment imbalance

Of the Ten Commandments, only the first three address how we are to respect the Creator of the universe.

The other seven detail how we are to treat each other. It is one way God lets us know how much he wants us to love one another.

Silence of the heart

"In the silence of the heart God speaks. If you face God in prayer and silence, God will speak to you. Souls of prayer are souls of great silence." Mother Teresa of Calcutta

"Live in harmony with one another"

In times of uncertainty or stress, tempers can shorten, perspectives narrow, and peace suffers. It is important to remember that Jesus came to bring love and unity. His followers are asked to do the same.

"The rich and the poor meet together; the Lord is the maker of them all" (Proverbs 22:2) – embrace diversity, don't just tolerate it. Different as we are, we are all made in God's image and likeness. There is great diversity in the communion of saints.

"Beloved, if God so loved us, we also ought to love one another" (1 John 4:11) – as children of God, all humans were created with inherent dignity that we are required to acknowledge.

Trying to understand others' perspectives is the best way to realize the impact of our actions on them.

"Blessed are the peacemakers, for they shall be called sons of God"

(Matthew 5:9) – a steady diet of violent entertainment and media helps us become comfortable with violence and to see people as characters rather than humans.

Instead, live with peace and pray for victims

"And let the peace of Christ rule in your hearts" (Colossians 3:15). This means we have to make the choice to trust God's promises (letting His peace rule) or to rely on ourselves and reject the peace He offers.

Why Do Catholics Do That

What is grace?

of violence.

God gives us a free gift to share in His life, a gift that we can't earn and don't deserve. Called, "grace," this gift helps us to become His adopted children. When God shares His divine life with us as sanctifying grace, we

are strengthened to act in His love. Through actual grace, God strengthens us to live in harmony with His will. Sacramental and special graces – gifts of the Holy Spirit –help us to live out our Christian vocation.

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Make holiness your goal

All people are called to be holy, "Be you therefore perfect, as also your heavenly Father is perfect" (Matthew 5:48). Achieving holiness requires a constant effort like climbing a mountain. To stop trying, even for a little while, is to lose ground. Daily effort will pay off with results.

Look for Jesus' presence. Search for Him each day. Not only will awareness of His presence help you grow in love and kindness toward everyone, you will find it easier to control your faults.

Don't avoid suffering. Jesus experienced extreme

suffering in His time on Earth and used it to pave our way to Heaven.

Pay attention to His voice. Speak to Him, ask Him for help, express sorrow for your mistakes, tell Him you love Him.

Nurture your faith. Just as food nourishes our bodies, faith feeds our souls. Scripture is a staple of our spiritual diet. Ask for the inspiration of the Holy Spirit to meditate on Scripture every day.

Practice patience. It's the first step toward holiness.

Matthew 22:34-40, Jesus has the right answers.

In their first meeting with Jesus, the Pharisees attempted to trap him into publicly contradicting Jewish law by

sending a slick lawyer to
"engage" him. Then Jesus
could be arrested and
silenced. The lawyer they
sent knew that generations of Jews had
debated fruitlessly
about which law
was the most

important. Pretending to seek Jesus' opinion, he asked him to choose which of the 613 commandments of the Jewish law was the most important.

Jesus silenced them by saying that everything starts and ends with love –

love of God and love of others. To love God is to love one another. Love is at

the heart of all the other laws. Even
the Pharisees couldn't argue
with that. While it is easy to
love God, loving others is
more difficult. It means
including those our
natural inclination
says to exclude or
avoid. Jesus loved
prostitutes, thieves,

lepers, even his political enemies.

True love of neighbor is measured by how we treat the poor, the vulnerable, and our enemies. This is how God loves and he calls us to the same.



In October we celebrate the Rosary with the feast of **Our Lady of the Rosary on October 7th**. The Rosary helps us meditate on the mysteries of our salvation – Jesus' birth, life, death, and resurrection.

Oct.15 - St. Teresa of Avila (1583). St. Teresa founded a strict religious order whose nuns wore rough brown habits and sandals instead of shoes. St. Teresa established more than 17 convents of Discalced Carmelites and helped reform the Carmelite friars.

Oct. 17 - St. Ignatius of Antioch

(1st century). Succeeded St. Peter as the second bishop of Antioch, St. Ignatius encouraged obedience to the world's bishops and reminded people that Jesus is present in the Church and in each other.

Oct. 28 – St. Simon and St. Jude (1st century). St. Simon was a Zealot – Jews who believed that the Messiah would free them from political oppression. St. Jude was a fisherman. After being called by Jesus to be apostles, they ended up in Persia where they evangelized until they were martyred.

Q & A

How can I develop more faith?

Faith is not a single event or a mastered skill. It's a journey that develops and grows over time. A father asking Jesus for a miraculous cure for



his son cried out, "I do believe, help my unbelief" (Mark 9:24). We have to ask God to help our faith develop and grow.

The best way to develop a strong faith is to pray.

Prayer is a conversation with God. Most of us use prayer to talk at God, but it's important to listen, too.

One good way to listen to God is to read his Word in the Bible. Start by reading a passage from Scripture, particularly the Gospels. Then ask yourself what the passage is saying to you, personally.

For example, ask yourself, "What is God saying to me through this reading?" Or "How can I put his message into practice in my life?" We need to meditate on the message and put it into action in our lives. Only then can the word be "living and effective" (Hebrews 4:12).

Domingos anteriores Jesús nos presentaba diferentes invitaciones relacionadas con la Viña de Dios. En esta ocasión las invitaciones tienen que ver con un Banquete de Bodas, en el que encontramos algunos puntos sorprendentes y relevantes:

 Lo primero es que no estamos muy habituados a que nos hablen del Reino de Dios como de un «<u>banquete de</u> <u>bodas</u>». En este tipo de eventos están muy presentes la alegría, la convivencia, el encuentro, la amistad con quien nos ha omunión que va surgiendo entre todos los

invitado, pero también la comunión que va surgiendo entre todos los asistentes,

incluso aunque muchos no se conozcan. Esta manera de presentar el Reino excluye que la entrada al Reino sea un asunto privado, o individualista: es con otros. Tampoco hay que hacer méritos, o ganarse que a uno le inviten. Basta con que el anfitrión quiera contar con nuestra presencia, depende más que nada de su amistad o cariño. Evidentemente una invitación así no se percibe como algo «obligatorio», pues más bien uno se siente halagado por haber sido invitado a un momento tan especial y trascendente para los novios.

A eso se alude precisamente en la invitación a la comunión eucarística: «Dichosos» los invitados a la mesa/cena del Señor».

A la mesa eucarística y a la mesa del Reino.

Jesús presenta a Dios como un Rey (el padre del novio) que invita, que hace una oferta: «Venid a mi fiesta»: quiero celebrar la salvación, que sois mis amigos, que me apetece que nos acompañéis en un momento tan gozoso y especial, porque la fiesta de mi hijo no sería tal fiesta si faltáis vosotros. Cabe esperar, además, que siendo el Rey quien invita, en el banquete no falte de nada, que sea un derroche: «manjares suculentos, un festín de vinos de solera...»

El amor de los novios y su boda es presentado a menudo en la Biblia como símbolo de la Alianza, un compromiso de amor entre Dios y su pueblo. Y esto nos tiene que recordar la escena de la última Cena de Jesús (también un banquete), donde Jesús habla de alianza (nueva y eterna), habla de amistad y de amor mutuo, de que ha sido él quien ha elegido a sus invitados/amigos, de su ardiente deseo de que sean uno entre ellos, y de que se sirvan (lavatorio) mutuamente...
