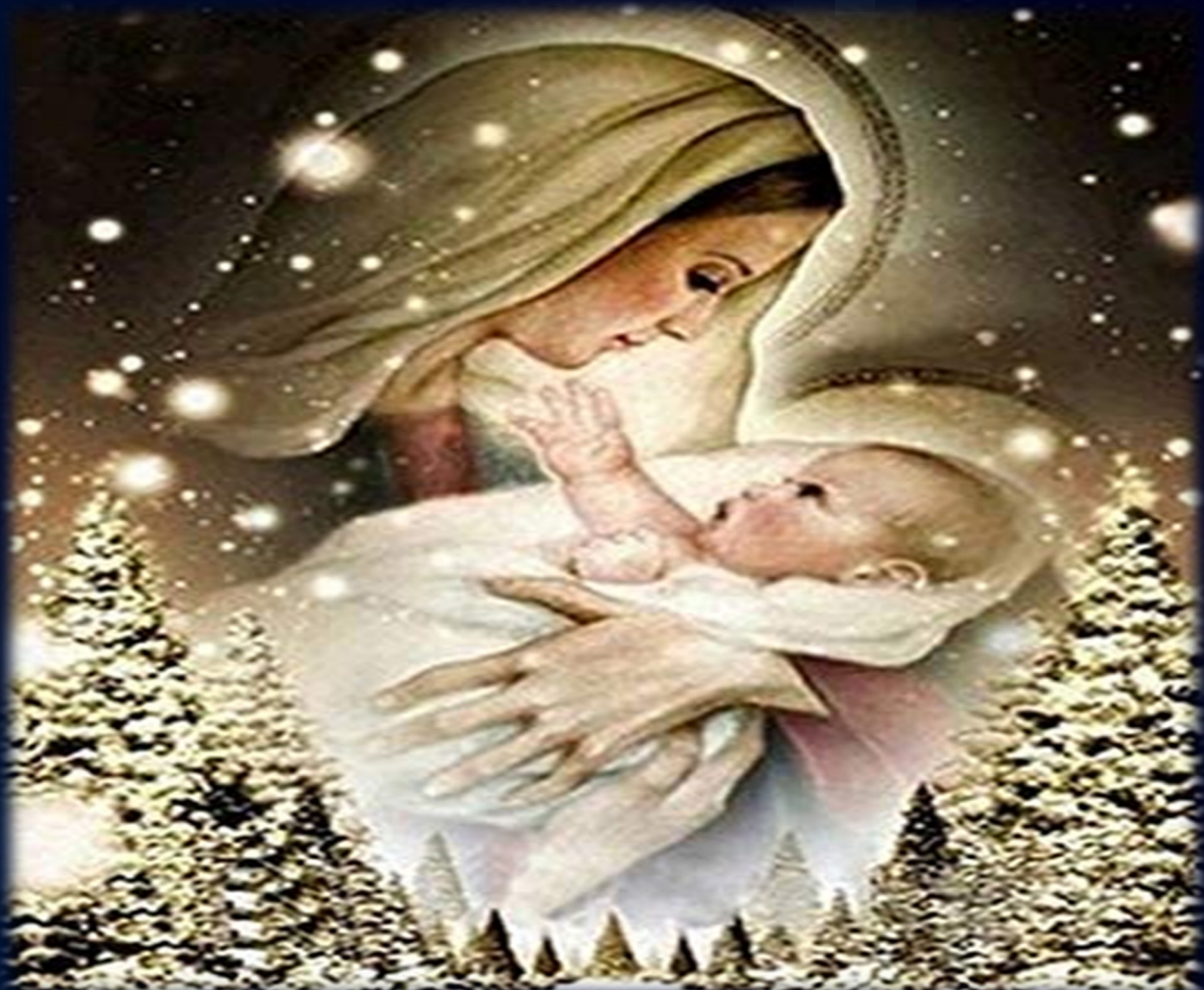

**GROW AS A DISCIPLE** | PRAY, STUDY,  
ENGAGE, SERVE

Today's readings remind us of the central role Mary plays in the story of Jesus and the story of our salvation. We may be tempted to place her on a pedestal - as well we should - she is the Mother of God! At the same time, today's Gospel reminds us she is not divine herself, but human - and she bore the incarnate flesh of the Son of God in his divine and human nature. She went through the sleepless nights and the uncertainties of parenting in all its stages. She learned early on what it takes many of us a lifetime to learn - often in fits and starts - absolute trust in God. As we celebrate this solemnity, we can bring our uncertainties, fears, and struggles to Mary our mother, asking for the grace to follow her faithful example.

**GO EVANGELIZE**  
PRAYER, INVITATION, WITNESS, ACCOMPANIMENT

Of course there's nothing wrong with New Year's resolutions, and I always admire people who have thought about them in advance. Me? I'm often tongue-tied on January 1 when someone asks me what my resolutions are (hmm ... maybe I should think about kicking that procrastination habit in 2023?) This is why Mary's reaction to the visit of the shepherds strikes me so profoundly. The shepherds pay homage to Jesus and spread the word that God's Son has been born. Mary, Luke writes, "kept all these things, reflecting on them in her heart." As we move into a new year, so rich with possibility, we might follow Mary's example and reflect before jumping headlong into this or that goal or New Year's resolution. Instead, perhaps we can take the day - or a week or a month - to prayerfully reflect on how we can best put our faith in Jesus into action. How can we witness to our faith in our daily lives? What changes might help us do that? We can ask God to help us draw up a list of ways that we can be more faithful to him.

**PRAY** Pray the Hail Mary, reflecting on each line with gratitude. If you have more time, give yourself a "mini-retreat" by reading or reflecting on a book or devotional about Mary.

## Holy Mary, Mother of God

Mary's "fiat" raised her to the amazing status of the Mother of God. Thus, she became the mother of Jesus and mother of us all. As we celebrate the birth of Jesus, during this Christmas season, we are also celebrating the birth of a new year. Let us reflect on these two points in this column.

This Sunday's Gospel reading is the same Gospel we read for the Holy Mass of the Christmas dawn, with the additional verses that announce the naming and circumcision of Jesus (Lk. 2:16-21). However, on this feast day the focus is on Mary. Luke declares, "Mary kept all these things, reflecting on them in her heart." Thus, we can see Mary as the first Christian contemplative in the history of the Church.

God has shown special favor to her starting from her immaculate conception, through the birth of Jesus and all through her life, including her Assumption into heaven. In addition to her contemplation, we can look up to her for her great example of complete obedience to God's will. Mary also humbly followed God's will by observing the Jewish tradition of naming and the circumcision of her son. Thus, Mary is an extraordinary example of contemplation and obedience to God's will.

Today we celebrate the time when Mary was preoccupied with her child. First, were the nine months of waiting, and then the days watching and listening for her child as she went about her normal duties as Joseph's wife, caring for their home. However, always the delightful thought of Jesus was on her mind. Let us ask our Mother Mary to help us to follow her example.

As we begin our new year, we need to be aware of Christ, or better, preoccupied with him in a special way. As we go about the normal activities of our lives, we too must have Jesus on our mind, just as parents have their children on their mind; Christ should take a position in our minds and hearts.

We could then learn to accept others, as they are--not as miniature versions of ourselves-- without making harsh demands on them. We should begin our year by praying for our family, our friends, and the world. Let us pray for world peace and abiding grace only God can bestow upon us. We need these gifts desperately at this time of war and violence.

Interestingly, in today's first reading (Num. 6:22-27), we listened to Aaron's blessing. It is very short but rich with meaning. This blessing invokes the name of the Lord three times; and it reflects God's abiding love and care for his people. Each sentence is filled with great meaning.

First, it talks about the Lord God blessing them and keeping them as His precious possessions. Second, as His possessions, they will experience the graciousness of God's face shining upon them. Here the reference is to Moses seeing the face of God on Mount Sinai. As a result, he was transfigured and he radiated God's grace. Third, it refers to receiving God's amazing grace and peace (shalom) which includes a grace-filled, peaceful, and prosperous life. Therefore, let me conclude this reflection with the classic blessing of Patriarch Aaron, which is apropos, at this occasion:

May the Lord God bless you and keep you!

May the Lord let His face shine upon you, and be gracious unto you!

May the Lord look upon you kindly and give you His peace!

## One Minute Meditations

### A kinder, gentler you

Kindness is contagious. A recent study found that witnessing an act of kindness produces good feelings and inspires imitation. In the new year, make efforts to be kinder – more friendly, generous, and considerate – and inspire others to do the same.

### Choose not to be offended

In the news or on social media, it can appear that there is more polarization around issues now than in the past. Each side wants to persuade the other. Being right is no compensation for broken friendships, however. If there is someone in your life who deliberately pursues you to argue, don't take the bait. Rather than let arguments create a rift, look the other way when feeling slighted. Being kind is more rewarding than being right.

*"I have told you this that you might have peace in me. In the world you will have trouble, but take courage, I have conquered the world"* (John 16:33).



## Fall deeper in love with Christ in the New Year

At the center of all we do as Catholics must be a close and personal relationship with Jesus. He offers to each of us a deep, intimate, "I love you forever" kind of relationship. Make time to fall deeper in love with Christ:

**T-Talk:** Prayer is an amazing privilege. Through it, we have an open invitation: "Call to me, and I will answer you" (Jeremiah 33:3). We have a promise that He hears us: "When you call me, and come and pray to me, I will listen to you" (Jeremiah 29:12). The God of the universe wants to hear from you.

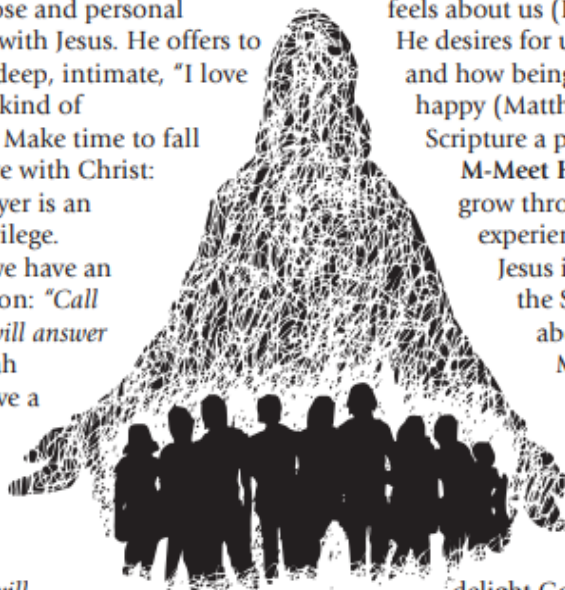
**I-Intimacy:** To love Christ, we must know Him. In Scripture, God tells us

who He is (Exodus 34:6), how He feels about us (Isaiah 43:4), what He desires for us (Luke 12:32), and how being His will make us happy (Matthew 5-7). Make Scripture a part of every day.

**M-Meet Him:** Relationships grow through shared experiences. We meet Jesus in prayer, Scripture, the Sacraments, and above all, during the Mass.

**E-Everything for love:** St. Thérèse of Lisieux discovered that she could

delight God by simply picking up a pin out of love. He wants to hear us, His beloveds, say, "I love you, too," in words and actions. Essential to falling in love with God is making time for Him.



## Why Do Catholics Do That?

## Why do Catholics believe things that aren't in the Bible?

Catholics recognize the Bible as the inspired, inerrant Word of God, and we reject beliefs that contradict Scripture. Long before the Gospels were written down, the Apostles passed on to their disciples all that Jesus taught and did. This



is what we call, "Tradition," or what was "handed on." Not everything that was handed on could be written down. It was impossible to include everything Jesus did (John 21:25). Catholic beliefs don't depart from Scripture, but delve deeper into it.



## Make one change for God this year

When making New Year's resolutions this year, consider one change that will bring you closer to God. Here are some ideas other Catholics have used to strengthen prayer, serve the poor, and evangelize our faith ...

**Laura** felt her prayer life growing stale, so when her parish asked for adorers for the perpetual adoration chapel, she jumped at the chance. Now, Mondays at midnight, Laura can be found in the presence of the Eucharist. She



said, "I really look forward to my peaceful hour each week. It's just me and Him."

**Peter's** law practice is incredibly busy, but he takes an afternoon off every month to work at the local soup kitchen serving hot meals to the homeless and working poor. When asked why, he said, "Jesus said, 'When I was hungry, you gave me to eat.'"

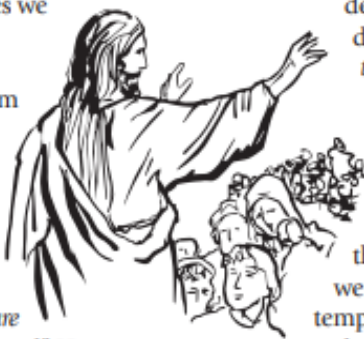
**JoAnn's** children are grown, yet she teaches a religious education class at her parish. "What better way to spread our faith than to children? That's where I can do the most good," she said.

### from Scripture

### Matthew 5:1-12a, Jesus' blueprint for holiness

This passage contains the Sermon on the Mount during which Jesus detailed the Beatitudes – the attitudes we need to be truly holy, and therefore happy. In fact, "beatitude" is translated from the Greek word for happiness. Jesus was saying, "Happy are you!" or "Congratulations!" if you live by these attitudes.

When Jesus said, "blessed are the poor in spirit ... blessed are they who mourn ... the persecuted" He promised that when we turn to God in times of trial, we will be comforted and cared for. When He said, "Blessed are the pure in heart ... those who hunger and thirst



for righteousness," He was showing us that a holy heart will receive what it desires. When He described "the meek ... the merciful ... the peacemakers," He gave us a blueprint for how to act.

We can measure our behavior against these standards. When we are faithful to God in tempting moments, and translate holy inner attitudes into outward actions, we'll know we're on the right path to holiness. When we live by the Beatitudes, we'll be truly happy.

### Q & A What qualities can I pursue to make me a better follower of Jesus?

Actually, when you were baptized, made your First Communion, or got Confirmed, the Holy Spirit conferred gifts to help you grow in strength and holiness. Recognizing these gifts and nurturing them will certainly make you a better Christian.



**Wisdom:** This gift helps us stay focused on God's will and His plan for us.

**Understanding:** Lets us grasp truths. It means seeing with the heart and the mind.

**Counsel:** Also called "right judgment," counsel enables us to weigh alternatives to make the right choice.

**Fortitude:** The ability to remain firm against pressure. (Also called courage.)

**Knowledge:** A person with knowledge sees more than one dimension of an issue to determine the right path.

**Piety:** Helps us think of ourselves as children of God and be eager to serve Him.

**Fear of the Lord:** The wonder and awe God inspires encourages us to respect Him and all his creations.

The more you use these gifts, the more you will grow in faith and holiness. Then you will certainly become a better Christian.

### Feasts & Celebrations

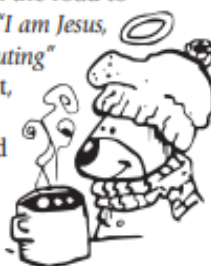
**January 2 – St. Gregory Nazianzen (389).** Known as "The Theologian" for his faithfulness and eloquence, St. Gregory was unwillingly made Bishop of Sasima. He worked to clarify the Church's teachings about the Holy Trinity.

**January 16 – St. Berard and Companions (1220).** St. Francis of Assisi sent St. Berard and his companions to evangelize in the Muslim territories. After being arrested in Morocco, they were martyred after refusing to stop preaching and renounce their Faith.

**January 23 – St. Marianne Cope**

(1918). St. Marianne began religious life as an educator in New York schools, and later became a nurse. In 1883, she helped St. Damien de Veuster serve the leper colonies of Hawaii, continuing his work after his death.

**January 25 – Conversion of St. Paul (1st Century).** Formally called "Saul", he persecuted the Christians until Jesus appeared to him on the road to Damascus, saying, "I am Jesus, whom you are persecuting" (Acts 9:5). After that, Saul became Paul and traveled around the known world, preaching the Faith.



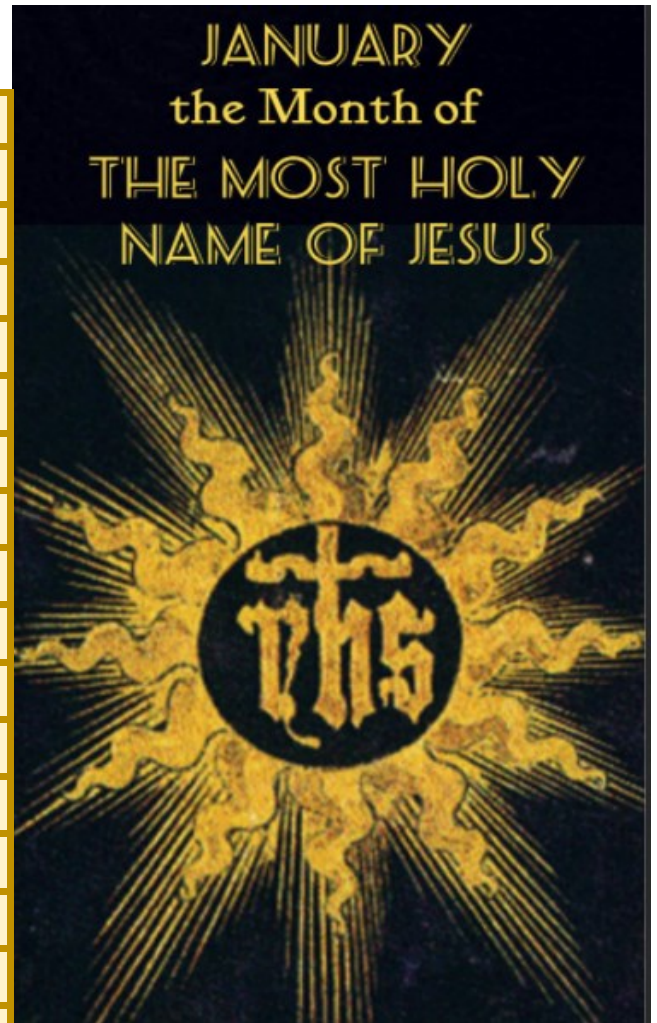

### **Santa María, Madre de Dios**



El “fiat” de María la elevó a la asombrosa condición de Madre de Dios. Así, ella se convirtió la madre de Jesús y madre de todos nosotros. Mientras celebramos el nacimiento de Jesús, durante esta temporada Navideña, también estamos celebrando el nacimiento de un nuevo año. reflexionemos sobre estos dos puntos en esta columna.

La lectura del Evangelio de este domingo es el mismo Evangelio que leemos para la Santa Misa del amanecer navideño, con los versos adicionales que anuncian el nombramiento y la circuncisión de Jesús (Lc 2,16-21). Sin embargo, en este día de fiesta el foco está en María. Lucas declara, “María guardaba todas estas cosas, meditándolas en su corazón”. Así, podemos ver a María como el primer cristiano contemplativo en la historia de la Iglesia.

Dios le ha mostrado especial favor a partir de su inmaculada concepción, a través del nacimiento de Jesús y durante toda su vida, incluida su Asunción al cielo. Además a su contemplación, podemos admirarla por su gran ejemplo de completa obediencia a la voluntad de Dios. María también siguió humildemente la voluntad de Dios al observar la tradición judía de poner el nombre y la circuncisión de su hijo. Así, María es un extraordinario ejemplo de contemplación y obediencia a la voluntad de Dios.

Hoy celebramos el tiempo en que María estaba preocupada por su hijo. Primero, fueron los nueve meses de espera, y luego los días observando y escuchando a su hijo mientras ella se dedicó a sus deberes normales como esposa de José, cuidando su hogar. Sin embargo, siempre el encantador pensamiento de Jesús estaba en su mente. Pidámosle a nuestra Madre María que nos ayude a seguir su ejemplo.

Al comenzar nuestro nuevo año, debemos estar conscientes de Cristo, o mejor, preocupados por él de una manera especial. A medida que realizamos las actividades normales de nuestra vida, también debemos tener a Jesús en nuestra mente, así como los padres tienen en mente a sus hijos; Cristo debe tomar una posición en nuestras mentes y corazones.

Entonces podríamos aprender a aceptar a los demás, tal como son, no como versiones en miniatura de nosotros mismos sin hacerles duras exigencias. Debemos comenzar nuestro año orando por nuestra familia, nuestros amigos y el mundo. Oremos por la paz mundial y la gracia permanente que solamente Dios puede otorgarnos. Necesitamos estos regalos desesperadamente en este momento de guerra y violencia.

Curiosamente, en la primera lectura de hoy (Núm. 6:22-27), escuchamos la bendición de Aarón. Eso es muy corto pero rico en significado. Esta bendición invoca el nombre del Señor tres veces; y refleja el amor y el cuidado permanente de Dios por su pueblo. Cada oración está llena de gran significado.

Primero, habla de que el Señor Dios los bendice y los guarda como sus preciosos posesiones. Segundo, como sus posesiones, experimentarán la gracia del rostro de Dios brillando sobre ellos. Aquí la referencia es a Moisés viendo el rostro de Dios en el Monte Sinaí. Como resultado, se transfiguró e irradió la gracia de Dios. En tercer lugar, se refiere a recibir la asombrosa gracia y paz de Dios (shalom) que incluye una vida llena de gracia, vida pacífica y próspera. Por lo tanto, permítanme concluir esta reflexión con el clásico bendición del patriarca Aarón, que es pertinente, en esta ocasión:

¡Que el Señor Dios te bendiga y te guarde!

¡Que el Señor haga resplandecer su rostro sobre ti, y tenga de ti misericordia!

¡Que el Señor te mire con bondad y te dé su paz!

**SANTA MARIA, MADRE DE DIOS**

El dogma de la Maternidad Divina se refiere a que la Virgen María es verdadera Madre de Dios. Fue solemnemente definido por el Concilio de Efeso (año 431). Significa básicamente que María es Madre de Dios. La palabra utilizada en griego fue Theotokos, que significa: la que dio a luz a Dios, la paridora de Dios. Esta afirmación no quiere decir que Dios tiene su origen en María, sino que de María salió una persona que es Dios. Ella dio a luz a alguien que es Dios; hombre verdadero y Dios verdadero. El origen de Jesucristo es divino; engendrado del Padre antes de los siglos, desde la eternidad, pero hecho hombre por la encarnación en María. Ella es su madre, y por lo mismo es Madre de Dios, puesto que Jesucristo es Dios. Ved que la virgen concebirá y dará a luz un hijo, y le pondrán por nombre Emmanuel, = que traducido significa: «Dios con nosotros.» (Mt 1,20- 23)

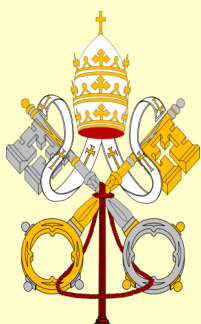
