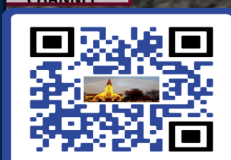

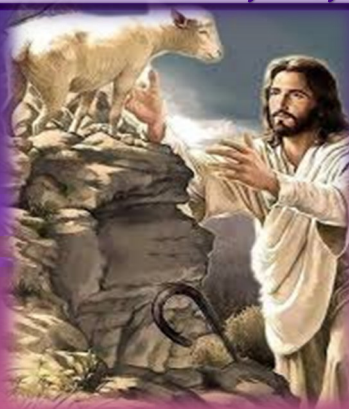

GROW AS A DISCIPLE | PRAY, STUDY, ENGAGE, SERVE

Five days, five minutes of sunshine: That's how the city where I live greeted 2023. As the month wore on, the gloom seemed unrelenting with only momentary breaks in the clouds. When the sun did return, people posted photos on social media with a combination of joy and relief. That experience hints at the effect Jesus had on St. Paul and the early Christians. As he writes, "You were once darkness, but now you are light in the Lord." Today, just as then, Jesus brings light and healing to the darkness within us and within our world. Unlike the elusive sun, we can see the light of Jesus every day - in the people we love, the kindness of strangers, moments of prayer, unexpected joys. In turn, St. Paul encourages us to "live as children of light" by being the face of Jesus to others.

GO EVANGELIZE

PRAYER, INVITATION, WITNESS, ACCOMPANIMENT

Even in the midst of Lent as a penitential season, the Sunday readings offer us much hope. Consider today's familiar story of Jesus healing the blind man. He doesn't just tell the man to open his eyes. Instead, Jesus smears clay on the man's eyes and has him wash in the Pool of Siloam; only then does the blind man see. He was transformed through Christ. Through our baptism we, too, have been transformed and "enlightened," becoming sons and daughters of light (CCC 1216). As we continue to observe Lent, perhaps we're working on areas in our life where we have been spiritually blind - or at least not seeing 20/20. Through our baptism and the sacraments, we can be healed and transformed by Jesus, the "light of the world." In turn we can share that light with others, as we continue to grow in the virtues of "goodness and righteousness and truth" of which St. Paul speaks.

PRAY Psalm 23 is a favorite of many and for good reason. Read or listen to it this week as encouragement on your Lenten journey:

The Lord is my shepherd; I shall not want. In verdant pastures he gives me repose; beside restful waters he leads me; he refreshes my soul.

Thought of the week

The book “God’s Annoying Love for Imperfect People” by Michael Yaconeli tells the story of a man recently converted to Jesus and how an unbelieving friend sought to “see” why. “So, you have been converted to Christ?” “Yes.” “Then you must know a great deal about Him. Tell me, what country was he born in?” “I don’t know.” “What was his age when he died?” “I don’t know.” “How many sermons did he preach?” “I don’t know.” “You certainly know very little for a man who claims to be converted to Christ.” “You are right. I am ashamed of how little I know about Him. But this much I know: I was a drunkard three years ago. I was in debt. My family was falling to pieces; they dreaded the sight of me. But now I have given up alcohol. We are out of debt. Ours is a happy home. My children eagerly await my return home each evening. All this Christ has done for me. This much I know of Christ.” Does it not sound like the answers given by the blind man healed by Jesus?

A story goes that a man bumped heavily into another man on the street, and so he asked angrily, “Why don’t you look where you are going?” The other man retorted, “Then why don’t you go where you are looking?” So, is it to look where you are going or to go where you are looking? Is it the same? Or is there a difference? If we were to look where we are going and go where we are looking, then there would undoubtedly be fewer accidents.

The blind man in today’s gospel had his eyes opened, and he could see. More than just being able to see, he could also look deeper into his experience of being healed of his blindness. Lent is a time to look deeper, see how Jesus sees us, and restore our friendship with Him. Last Sunday, we heard the Israelites complain, “Is the Lord in our midst or not? (Ex 17:7). How often do we ask the same question, “Does God see our suffering and daily toils, or Is God a figment of our Imagination?”

St. Ignatius believed that we could find God in all things, at every moment, even in the most ordinary and desperate moments. To do this, we must take time to reflect on our experience, look at the data of a day and discern their meaning. Ignatius recommended a five-step method of prayer called the Examen to help us find God in all things. The Examen encourages us to look back over a period and pay attention to what is happening in and around us. In last year’s parish retreat, we practiced the following steps, and once again, let us review our progress and recap it.

These are the five steps of the Examen (Examination of Conscience):

1. Prepare your heart and mind. Center yourself by lighting a candle or taking a few deep breaths. Allow yourself to feel the presence of the Holy Spirit.
2. Review the day with gratitude. Think back through the events of your day, noting the joys and delights. Think about the people you interacted with and what you shared with each other. Don’t forget the little pleasures! Then, thank God for these experiences.
3. Pay attention to your emotions. Notice the points in your day where you felt strongly. Feelings of frustration may indicate that you need to change course on a certain project. Feelings of worry about a friend’s situation might later prompt you to send a comforting note. What is God telling you through your feelings?
4. Select a part of your day to pray over. What one part of your day stands out most to you? It can be positive or negative. Lift up a prayer of gratitude, intercession, repentance, whatever the case may be.
5. Pray for tomorrow. Ask God to guide you through tomorrow’s challenges. Turn your anxieties over to God and pray for hope.

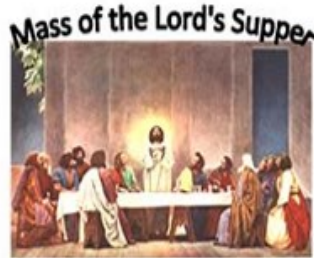

In 1931, Our Lord, Jesus Christ appeared to Polish nun Sister Faustina Kowalska. She saw Jesus clothed in a white garment with His right hand raised in blessing. His left hand was touching His chest in the area of the heart, from where two large rays came forth, one red and the other pale. Jesus said to her: "Paint an image according to the pattern you see with the signature: *Jesus, I trust in You...* I am offering people a vessel with which they are to keep coming for graces to the fountain of mercy. That vessel is this image with the signature: '*Jesus, I trust in You*'."

Saint Faustina was canonized on April 30, 2000 by Pope John Paul II, who declared the Sunday after Easter to be known as "Divine Mercy Sunday."

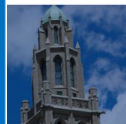

Clergy Corner



El libro “God 's Annoying Love for Imperfect People” de Michael Yaconeli cuenta la historia de un hombre recientemente convertido a Jesús y cómo un amigo incrédulo trató de “ver” por qué. “Entonces, ¿te has convertido a Cristo?” “Sí.” “Entonces debes saber mucho acerca de Él. Dime, ¿en qué país nació?” “No sé.” “¿Qué edad tenía cuando murió?” “No sé.” “¿Cuántos sermons predicó?” “No sé.” “Ciertamente sabes muy poco para un hombre que dice estar convertido a Cristo”. “Tienes razón. Me avergüenzo de lo poco que sé de él. Pero esto es lo que sé: Yo era un borracho hace tres años. Estaba endeudado. Mi familia se estaba cayendo a pedazos; ellos tenían la vista de mí. Pero ahora he dejado el alcohol. Estamos fuera de la deuda. El nuestro es un hogar feliz. Mis hijos esperan ansiosamente mi regreso a casa cada noche. Todo esto Cristo lo ha hecho por mí. Esto es lo que sé de Cristo”. ¿No suena como las respuestas del ciego curado por Jesús?

Una historia cuenta que un hombre chocó fuertemente contra otro hombre en la calle, y le preguntó enojado: “¿Por qué no mirás por dónde vas?” El otro hombre replicó: “Entonces, ¿por qué no vas a donde estás mirando?” Entonces, ¿es mirar por donde vas o ir por donde miras? ¿Es lo mismo? ¿O hay alguna diferencia? Si mirásemos por donde vamos y fuéramos por donde miramos, indudablemente habría menos accidentes.

Al ciego del evangelio de hoy se le abrieron los ojos y pudo ver. Más que sólo ser capaz de ver, también podía profundizar en su experiencia de ser sanado de su ceguera. La Cuaresma es un tiempo para mirar más profundamente, ver cómo Jesús nos ve y restaurar nuestra amistad con Él. El domingo pasado escuchamos a los israelitas quejarse: “¿Está el Señor entre nosotros o no? (Éx 17,7). ¿Con qué frecuencia nos hacemos la misma pregunta: “¿Dios ve nuestro sufrimiento y nuestras fatigas diarias, o es Dios un producto de nuestra imaginación?”

San Ignacio creía que podíamos encontrar a Dios en todas las cosas, en todo momento, incluso en los momentos más ordinarios y desesperados. Para ello, debemos tomarnos un tiempo para reflexionar sobre nuestra experiencia, mirar los datos de un día y discernir su significado. Ignacio recomendó un método de oración de cinco pasos llamado Examen para ayudarnos a encontrar a Dios en todas las cosas. El Examen nos anima a mirar hacia atrás durante un período y prestar atención a lo que sucede dentro y alrededor de nosotros. En el retiro parroquial del año pasado, practicamos los siguientes pasos y, una vez más, revisamos nuestro progreso y lo recapitulamos. Estos son los cinco pasos del Examen (Examen de Conciencia):

1. Prepara tu corazón y tu mente. Céntrese encendiendo una vela o respirando profundamente unas cuantas veces. Permítete sentir la presencia del Espíritu Santo.
2. Revisa el día con gratitud. Piensa en los eventos de tu día, observando las alegrías y delicias. Piense en las personas con las que interactuó y lo que compartió entre sí. ¡No te olvides de los pequeños placeres! Entonces, agradezca a Dios por estas experiencias.
3. Presta atención a tus emociones. Fíjate en los puntos de tu día en los que te sentiste fuerte. Los sentimientos de frustración pueden indicar que necesita cambiar de rumbo en un determinado proyecto. Los sentimientos de preocupación por la situación de un amigo pueden incitarlo más tarde a enviar una nota de consuelo. ¿Qué te está diciendo Dios a través de tus sentimientos?
4. Seleccione una parte de su día para orar. ¿Qué parte de tu día destaca más para ti? Puede ser positivo o negativo. Elevad una oración de agradecimiento, de intercesión, de arrepentimiento, cualquiera que sea el caso.
5. Oren por mañana. Pídele a Dios que te guíe a través de los desafíos del mañana. Entrega tus ansiedades a Dios y ora por esperanza.

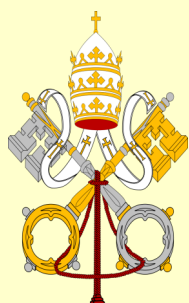
