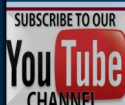

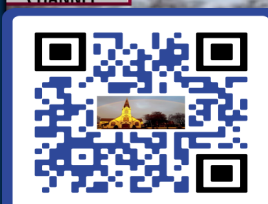

My dear St. Ignatius Parish family,

Consumers Report put out a little book entitled, *How to Clean Practically Anything*. The book tells you what solvent to use for nearly every kind of stain. Here are a few: Glycerin will remove the stain from a ballpoint pen. Boiling water will remove berry stains. Vinegar will remove crayon stains. To remove a rust stain from your cotton work clothes, moisten the spot with some full-strength vinegar and then rub in a bit of salt. Ammonia will remove blood stains. Alcohol will remove grass stains. Hydrogen peroxide is good for magic marker stains. Mix a teaspoon of 3% hydrogen peroxide with a little cream of tartar or a dab of non-gel toothpaste, rub the paste on the stain with a soft cloth, rinse, and the stain, whatever it was, should be gone. Try a little meat tenderizer to remove protein-based stains like milk, chocolate, and blood from clothes. Use bleach on mildew stains. Lemon juice works well on rust stains.

After reading this long list of techniques to deal with stains, you will be surprised that this book is silent about what affects our lives the most. The book lists absolutely nothing for the stain of sin. And the reason it doesn't is that there is only One Person who can do that. Only Jesus Christ, the Incarnation of Divine Mercy, as described in today's Gospel, can forgive us our sins when we repent, confess our sins, and ask for God's pardon and forgiveness.

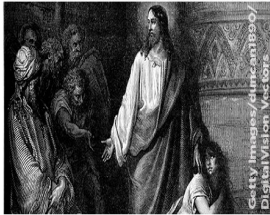
The Gospel text today speaks not just about forgiveness of God, but of non-condemnation. When someone you love, trust, and respect hurts you, you get shattered many times. This opens two paths for us, either harbor resentment and retaliate or forgive from your heart and move on. If we opt to pay back the damage done by the other, that would change our priorities in our life, affect our relationships, and bring bitterness to people around us.

As Christians, perhaps our only option is to forgive others as Jesus forgave his offenders. Specifically in this weekend, Gospel Jesus does not condemn either the woman or the condemners of the woman. If you want to run a successful race you must keep your eyes forward, toward the goal to be reached, and not backward on the road already crossed. Our ultimate destiny is heaven and not the appreciation and acceptance of others. When the voices of the crowd and the stones of their condemnation are bearing down on us, we need to fly to Jesus. He alone can dispel all those negative messages and replace them with the Good News of God's love and forgiveness.

How is Lent going? During this Holy Season, the Church invites us to seek, pare down, refocus, and plant "new ways" to come closer to God. The most beautiful accomplishment of this Lent and Ignatian Year was that we could publish a Parish Prayer Book. Thank you AnsyMary for your dedication and selflessness to assemble various Catholic devotions, prepare the prayers and reflections, and compile this prayer book for the spiritual nourishment of the parish community. I am sure that The Annexure, she has included, will be of great help and use for us. As a parish family, God blessed us to organize a retreat on Ignatian Spirituality on March 19. I am grateful to Fr. George Witt, SJ for offering us such a wonderful retreat day and to the Activities Committee who with the support of Catholic Daughters and Columbiettes, for arranging Breakfast, Lunch, and Refreshments for over 80 participants. Our parishioners and friends supported us to organize this day, especially the following people helped with either the set-up, serving, clean-up, or by donating food. GROW AS A DISCIPLE | PRAY, STUDY, ENGAGE, SERVE

During Lent, we hear familiar stories: the event of Jesus’ transfiguration, the prodigal son, and today the woman caught in adultery. Each reveals an aspect of God’s perfect love for us and a glimpse of how we can reflect that love toward others. In today’s Gospel, the Pharisees once again are testing Jesus, saying the law demands that the woman caught in adultery be stoned. Jesus responds, “Let the one among you who is without sin be the first to throw a stone at her.” What a perfect response to the Pharisees, and to each one of us when we focus on the faults of another. Jesus’ words teach and challenge us to look more closely at the ways we judge others – by appearance, a social media post, political party, for example – and ask ourselves whether we are truly doing so out of love. Closer to home, we may be quick to point out our spouse or children’s perceived faults, without acknowledging our own. Jesus invites us to look at others – and ourselves – with the eyes of mercy.

GO EVANGELIZE

PRAYER, INVITATION, WITNESS, ACCOMPANIMENT

Every time we go out to dinner, my son makes fun of me for agonizing over the menu: “You always regret what you pick!” Indeed, regret can be a powerful emotion. Fortunately, the dinner dilemma requires only that I mooch off of my son’s entrée. However, deeper regrets can bog us down and prevent us from moving forward in faith. Today’s readings challenge us not to wallow in past mistakes, preconceptions, or bad habits. As we hear in Isaiah, “The things of long ago consider not; see, I am doing something new!” We hear this idea again from St. Paul, who writes of “forgetting what lies behind” and straining forward toward “the prize of God’s upward calling, in Christ Jesus.” In the Gospel, Jesus doesn’t dwell on the past sins of the adulterous woman other than to say, “Go, and from now on do not sin any more.” Fortunately, our Church offers an antidote to regret and sin in the sacrament of reconciliation. Whether it’s been a month or a decade, what better time than Lent to return to this sacrament and experience God’s mercy and forgiveness?

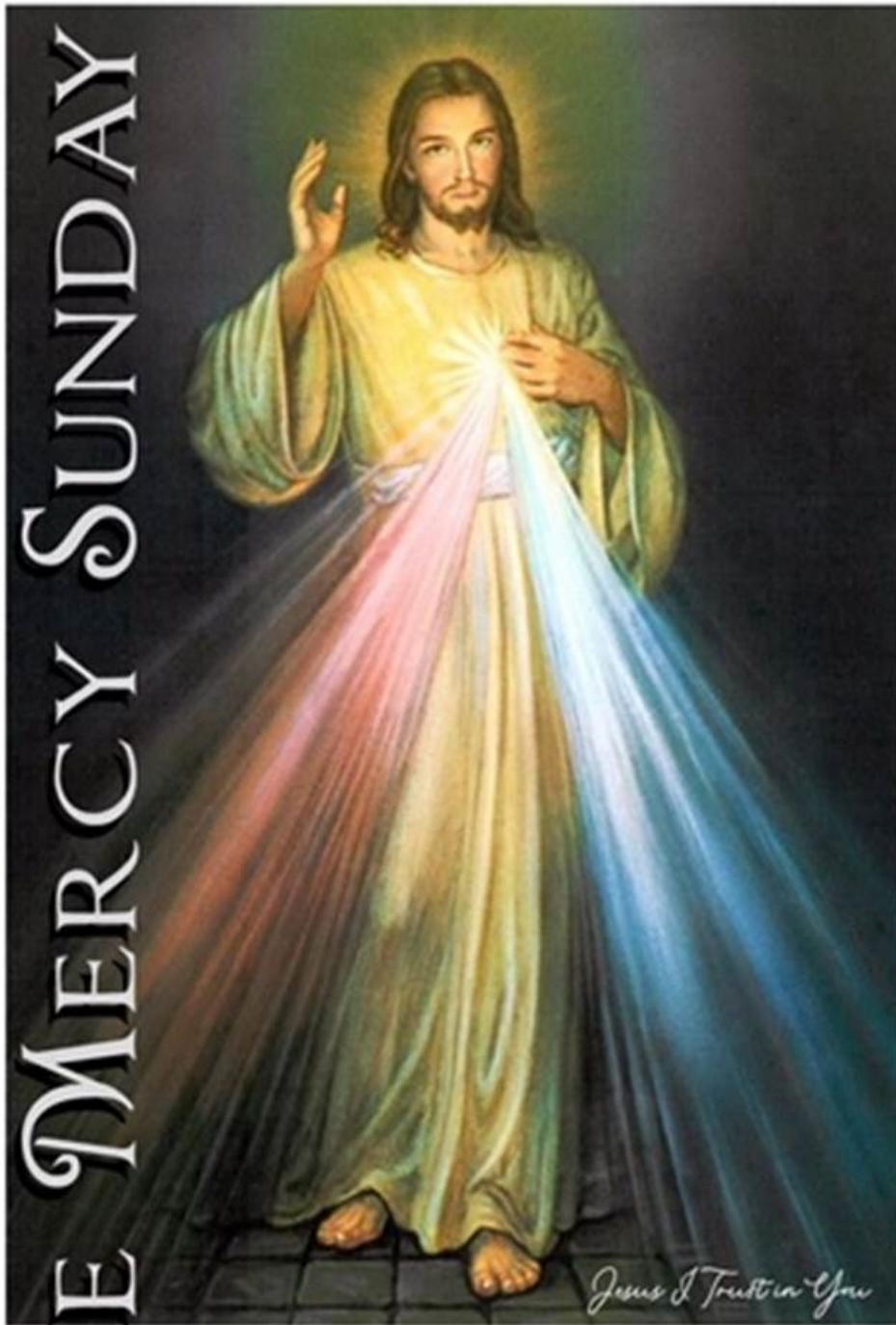

In 1931, Our Lord, Jesus Christ appeared to Sister Faustina Kowalska. She saw Jesus clothed in a white garment with His right hand raised in blessing. His left hand was touching His garment in the area of the heart, from where two large rays came forth, one red and the other pale. Jesus said to her: "Paint an image according to the pattern you see with the signature: *Jesus, I trust in You* ... Thoughtful Moments

Lay a foundation

Don't hesitate to talk to children about topics that may seem beyond youngsters' understanding right now. The Holy Trinity or the Real Presence might go over their heads at this moment, but will become clearer in time. Others will remain mysteries as they do for us. Look at it as sowing seeds for later harvest.

Prayer works

The Israelites were so sinful that God was ready to destroy the entire nation. But Moses prayed for them, and God relented. Prayer can make a difference.

A parenting win

Say, "I love you," until they're sick of hearing it ... and then say it again. Praise them in public like God did, "This is my beloved Son, in whom I am well pleased" (Matthew 3:17).

"... When you give alms, do not let your left hand know what your right is doing ... And your Father who sees in secret will repay you" (Matthew 6:3-4).



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Take back Sunday

In the Third Commandment, God instructed us to keep holy the Lord's Day – Sunday. This is a challenge in today's busy world but God commands this for our good. We need a day of rest to grow in holiness and thrive in God's care. Try these tips to "take back" your Sundays in the midst of a busy family life:

Highlight the Mass. It's vital for our souls that we

reconnect with God and receive His grace. That's why attending Sunday Mass is at the heart of what we do as Catholics. Communion with Jesus is critical for our holiness. Instill a Mass habit in children early.

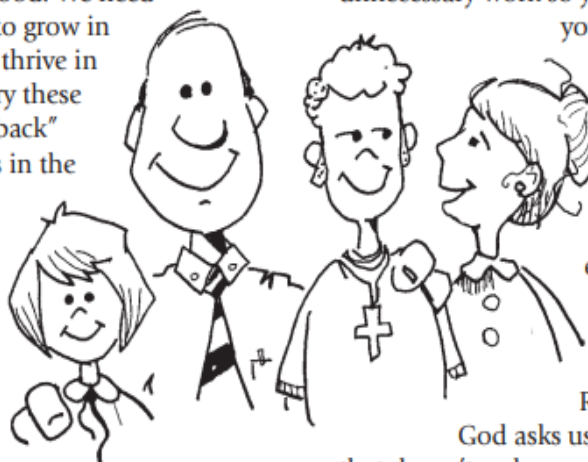
Have a slow, easy day, especially if

your weeks are busy. Slow down the pace of your Sunday and focus on your family.

Enjoy a day of rest. Avoid unnecessary work so you can center your day around God and family. Finish homework before Sunday. Cook on Saturday or eat leftovers on paperware so that cooking is unnecessary.

Remember that God asks us to avoid work that doesn't recharge us.

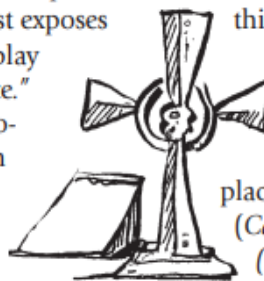
Share love. Allow Mass to remind all to be patient, use kind words, forgive annoyances, show love. Consider adopting a Sunday habit of putting money in the poor box at church, visiting a lonely neighbor, or preparing a box for a food or clothing drive.



Why Do Catholics Do That ?

Why do Catholics practice Adoration?

Adoration is a time-honored, powerful devotion in which the priest exposes a consecrated host in a display holder called a "monstrance." The adorer is literally eye-to-eye with Christ, in the form of the Blessed Sacrament, who gazes on us with love (Mark 10:21).

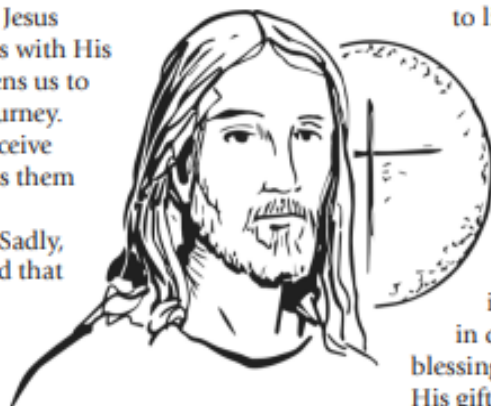


Since one is adoring God, this action fulfills the First Commandment. It's pleasing to Him and beneficial for our souls. For these reasons, Adoration has a unique place among Catholic devotions (*Catechism of the Catholic Church (CCC), #1378*).

Help children treasure the gift of Holy Communion

When we receive Holy Communion, Jesus comes into our hearts and nourishes us with His grace, heals our wounds, and strengthens us to fight temptation. He is food for our journey. Teaching children how to reverently receive Holy Communion is a gift that benefits them forever.

Remind them who Communion is. Sadly, many Catholics today don't understand that the Eucharist is Jesus Christ, Body and Blood, Soul and Divinity. Explain to children that Jesus is truly present (CCC #1374). He's there every Mass



to listen to them, help them, and love them.

Refresh Communion manners. Show children how to receive Communion reverently, whether by mouth or by hand. Teach them to walk back to the pew, hands folded, kneel in prayer as they consume the Host, and offer prayers of thanksgiving.

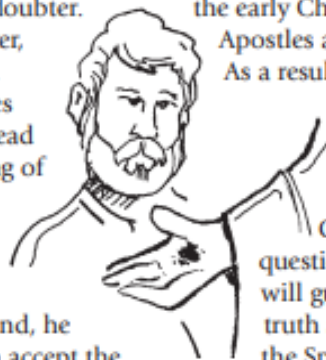
Stay after Mass. As long as the Host is in our bodies, we are a tabernacle. Stay in church until the priest gives the final blessing. Encourage children to thank Jesus for His gifts before leaving for home.

Scripture LESSON

John 20:19-31, From doubt to faith

Poor Thomas. A faithful friend and energetic evangelist and yet he will always be known as the doubter. Through Thomas, however, we learn that doubts and questions are not enemies of our faith. Often they lead to a greater understanding of God's truth.

Even though Thomas was with Jesus for three years and witnessed amazing miracles first hand, he still needed more help to accept the Resurrection. Far from scolding him or being disappointed in his lack of faith, Jesus invited Thomas to do what was



necessary to become convinced. Notice, too, that Thomas didn't leave the early Church, nor were the other Apostles angry at his lack of faith. As a result, he was able to find the answers he needed in the Church.

What can a parent do? Tell children that God isn't upset by our questions or doubts. In fact, he will guide our search for the truth and Jesus promised that the Spirit would help those who seek it (John 16:13). God knows that people who probe their doubts and fears often reach the truth.

Feasts & Celebrations

April 10 - Palm Sunday of the Lord's Passion. The Sunday before Easter is called Palm Sunday of the Lord's Passion because it recalls Jesus' triumphant entry into Jerusalem when he was greeted by crowds waving palms and cheering. It marks the beginning of Holy Week.

April 11 - St. Stanislaus of Kraków (1079). As Bishop of Krakow in 1072, St. Stanislaus attempted to reform the violent king of Poland, Boleslaus II. When his efforts failed, he excommunicated the king. In retaliation, Boleslaus murdered the

saint. **April 27 - St. Zita (1278).** Born in Monsagrati, Italy, St. Zita became the servant of the wealthy Fatinelli family. Famous for her miracles in helping the sick, the poor, and the imprisoned, she is the patroness of domestic workers.

April 30 - Pope St. Pius V (1572). Born to a poor family in Italy, Antonio Ghislieri became a Dominican, taught theology, and became Pope Pius V. He established seminaries and hospitals, and published the Roman Catechism, Roman Breviary, and the Missal.

Mi querida familia parroquial de San Ignacio,



Informe de consumidores publicó un librito titulado *Cómo limpiar prácticamente cualquier cosa*. El libro le dice qué solvente usar para casi todos los tipos de manchas. Aquí hay algunos. 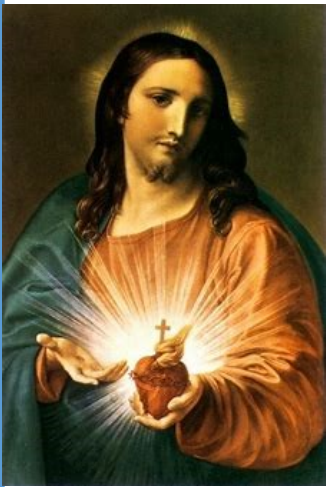
