GROW AS A DISCIPLE | PRAY, STUDY, ENGAGE, SERVE

Palm Sunday can seem like a study in contrasts. We hear the jubilant account of Jesus riding triumphantly into Jerusalem. Then we listen to the Passion narrative, reminded that Jesus' kingship bears little resemblance to royalty as we perceive it. He will suffer and he will die. As Paul describes it, "He humbled himself, becoming obedient to the point of death, even death on a cross. Because of this, God greatly exalted him." Jesus tries to explain this to the disciples, who don't fully grasp the events about to take place, instead quarreling over who would be the greatest. Yet even in this chaos of misunderstanding, Jesus continues to teach them, promising that those who stand by him in his trials will join him in the kingdom of heaven. There are certainly times when we fail to fully perceive and understand all that the Lord is teaching us, or why we are undergoing certain trials and difficulties. As we enter into Holy Week, we can ask Jesus to help us understand the meaning of the cross in our own lives, using this time to reflect on the meaning of his sacrifice for each of us.

GO EVANGELIZE

PRAYER, INVITATION, WITNESS, ACCOMPANIMENT

As we listen to the Passion narrative, we hear Peter betray Jesus, the soldiers jeer at him, and a passer-by being told to carry Christ's cross. Only Luke's account describes the two criminals, one of whom demanded that Jesus "save yourself and us." The second criminal rebukes him, asking Jesus to "remember me when you come into your kingdom." After Jesus dies, the centurion glorifies God, a good man takes him down from the cross, the women prepare his body for burial. As we enter Holy Week, we will have time to reflect on Jesus' last days, but also on the individuals in the crowd the day he died. How did they react? How would we have reacted? What can we learn from the women who stayed beside Jesus, the criminal who looked beyond his own pain and sin to see Jesus as Messiah, and even Peter in his initial betrayal? During the week ahead, we can also make an effort to attend each liturgy of the Triduum, using this time to deepen our faith as we prepare for Easter.

PRAYER Take time to read the Passion narrative at home. Invite Jesus into your heart. If you've fallen a little behind on your Lenten commitments, Holy Week is a great time to hit refresh.

Clergy Corner



My dear St. Ignatius Parish family,

This sixth Sunday of Lent is given the title Palm Sunday of the Passion of the Lord. With the blessing of and procession with palms, we begin our Holy Week recalling the Messianic entrance into Jerusalem that leads to Christ's Passion. We welcome Jesus into our lives, asking him to allow us to share in his suffering, death, and Resurrection. This is also when we remember and relive the events that brought about our redemption and salvation. That is why the Holy Week liturgy presents us with the actual events of the dying and rising of Jesus. The liturgy also enables us to experience vicariously, here and now, what Jesus went through then. In other words, we commemorate and relive during this week our dying to sin and selfishness and rising in Jesus, healed, reconciled to God and each other, and redeemed by His death and rising for us.

Today we join the Palm Sunday crowd in spirit to declare our loyalty to Christ and fidelity to His teachings by actively participating in the Palm Sunday liturgy. As we carry the palm leaves to our homes, we declare our choice to accept Jesus as the King and ruler of our lives and our families. Let us express our gratitude to Jesus for redeeming us by His suffering and death through our active participation in the Holy Week liturgy and our reconciliation with God and His Church, repenting of our sins and receiving God's pardon and forgiveness from Jesus through His Church.

Our parish Joins Catholic parishes in our diocese to offer reconciliation **on Monday, April 11, from 2-4 pm and 6-9 pm** for individual confession and absolution in the Church. All are encouraged to make the Sacrament of Penance a part of their Lenten preparations. Now the confessions are back in Church, and so request you to enter only through the Penitent's door to do the face-to-face or behind the screen confessions. (Our confessionals have two doors, one entry is marked as priest, and the other door is marked as Penitent). Those who like to have a face-to-face confession, please ask the priest while you are inside the confessional, and then the screen will be moved to see each other. Please note the change of Saturday Confessional time. Now it is from 4:00-4:45 pm. In addition to this, from now onwards we are providing opportunity for confessions on every first Sunday and all Sundays of Lent, except Palm Sunday, after the 9:30am Mass.

On Tuesday, April 12, our bishop, John Barres, will celebrate the Chrism Mass and bless the oils used throughout our diocese during the coming year. The three oils are Oil of the Catechumens – used to anoint those preparing for Baptism, Oil of the Sick – used to anoint those suffering from illness, and Sacred Chrism – used to anoint during Baptism, Confirmation, Ordination, and to consecrate a new altar.

Lent ends, and the Paschal Triduum (three days) begins with the evening Mass on Holy Thursday. Because of the importance of these three days, only the Triduum services are permitted. There will be no morning Masses, funerals, or other rites celebrated. Please refer to the schedule to join us for various services arranged during the Holy Week.

As we prepare to celebrate Jesus' victory over death, we gratefully remember Fr. Andres Fernandez, who has gone to his eternal reward in heaven. He had served our parish for three years, especially the Hispanic Community. He is remembered for his commitment to our parishioners and his ability to connect Bible in everyday life situations. He made parishioners understand that we could always go further when serving the Lord, and there is much more to do than what we regularly do. May God reward him for his faithful life, and may he rest in peace.

One Minute Meditations

Healthy worship

Recent medical studies revealed that people who attend church at least weekly have longer life expectancies and fewer complications from illnesses or surgeries than non-churchgoers. Going to church may not protect us from health crises, but it does help us cope with them.



Empty and fill

There are times in our lives when we have to empty our minds of negativity so God can replace it with peace and joy. Each day, take time to rid yourself of anger, fear, self-pity, jealousy, and bitterness. Then look for God's gifts of peace, wisdom, friendship, forgiveness, and love.

Speak the truth

Do you have the courage to speak out against injustice or sin? Yes, when you do, you may be called "intolerant" for sharing Gospel truths, but tolerance doesn't render truth untrue. In fact, saying nothing can be worse. Christ is clear: "When your brother sins, rebuke him and when he repents, forgive him" (Luke 17:3).



Give Sundays to God

God intended Sundays as days for worship, rest, and charity for His people. In today's world, however, it can be challenging to "keep holy the Lord's Day." Try these suggestions to recapture your Sundays for God:

Worship: Mass is a direct encounter with God. Make it the center and highlight of your day. Prepare yourself to receive Jesus in the Eucharist by going to Confession regularly and staying aware of your conscience so as to avoid sin. One of the best ways to honor Him is respond to His love with your own.

Rest: Make Sunday different from the rest of the week. Avoid unnecessary work. Finish errands and

chores by sundown on Saturday. Serve leftovers or casseroles on paper plates to minimize washing up. Limit screen time, social media, and online shopping.

Joy: God rested on the Seventh Day and delighted in His creation (Genesis 1:31-2:2). Find time today to do something that brings you

joy. Spend time with loved ones, take a nature walk, indulge in a hobby, read a good book.

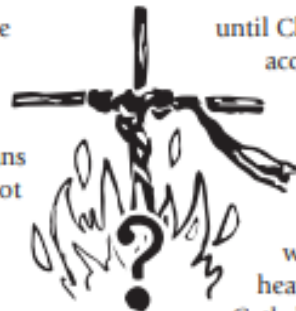
Charity: Traditionally, charitable works are performed on the Lord's Day. Consider putting money in the poor box at church, donating food or clothes to a shelter, or visiting a lonely neighbor. Don't forget, praying for others and treating them with kindness is a much-needed act of charity.



Why Do Catholics Do That?

Why do Catholics believe Jesus "descended into hell"?

In the Apostles Creed, we profess that Jesus "descended into hell" - Hades in Greek or Sheol in Hebrew. Used here, it means "the realm of the dead," not necessarily the place of punishment. Human sin closed the gates of heaven even to righteous souls,

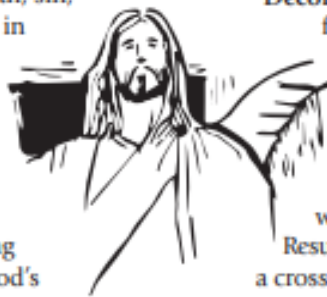


until Christ's coming. After accomplishing our redemption on the Cross, Jesus descended to the underworld, bringing news of their salvation to the righteous souls who were waiting to enter heaven (Catechism of the Catholic Church, #633).

Keeping Easter joy alive throughout the year

Easter Sunday celebrates Jesus' victory over death, sin, and Satan. In fact, it is the most important event in human history. This joy Easter inspires can't be contained to just one day; the Church gives us a whole season to celebrate. Try these ideas to prolong the joy of Easter:

Keep a Lenten practice that helped you grow closer to God – a small sacrifice to honor His sacrifice. For example, attend an extra Mass during the week, or perform an act of charity to share God's love.



Decorate the house. Celebrate the victory Christ won for you. Display an image of the Risen Christ in your home. Decorate crosses and statues with white sashes. Put out bouquets of flowers (real or silk) for the garden in which Jesus rose (John 19:41).

Proclaim the Good News. Mary Magdalene was the first to share the news of the Resurrection (John 20:17). Share it, too, by wearing a cross or crucifix, saying grace in public, talking about His grace, imitating His forgiveness.

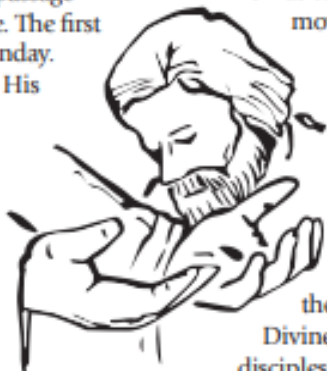

Luke 15:1-3, 11-32, The Father's heart

The two Resurrection appearances of Jesus to His disciples in this passage highlight God's merciful love. The first appearance was on Easter Sunday.

Jesus could have abandoned His Apostles, just as they had abandoned Him in the Garden of Gethsemane, but He didn't. Instead, Jesus appeared to them and gave them His peace, His Spirit, and the power to forgive sins in His name.

The second visit was for "Doubting" Thomas, who wasn't present for the first appearance. Thomas couldn't believe that Jesus was really risen, despite the accounts of eyewitnesses. He demanded physical proof. Jesus appeared



in the Upper Room and invited Thomas to investigate. St. Thomas, moved to faith, cried out, "My Lord and my God!" (John 20:28).

This passage reminds us we can always bring our doubts, fears, and need for forgiveness to God, especially on the Sunday after Easter — Divine Mercy Sunday. To the disciples who abandoned Him, Jesus extended His peace and forgiveness. For St. Thomas who had been struggling with doubt, Jesus came in person to strengthen his faith. "Jesus, I trust in You!"

Q & A

Why do Catholics display crucifixes?

Catholics display the Crucifix because it reminds us of Jesus' sacrifice, His victory, and His love for us.

His sacrifice. Jesus willingly sacrificed Himself for us on the Cross. At every



Mass, the moment of Jesus' sacrifice is made mysteriously present again in the sacrifice of the Eucharist in an unbloody manner. The Crucifix indicates that the sacrifice of the Cross and the Mass are one sacrifice

(CCC #1545).

His victory. The Crucifix looks like defeat, but in fact, it's a sign of victory. Jesus' sacrifice reconciled us with God, reopened Heaven to us, and broke the grip of death. Jesus took on death, sin, and evil, and rose again triumph.

His love. "Greater love has no man than this, that a man lay down his life for his friends" (John 15:13). The Crucifix reveals how precious we are to God. Jesus taught us that true love seeks the good of the other. Jesus put our good first. He endured the crucifixion so we can be with Him forever in Heaven.

Feasts & Celebrations

April 5 – St. Vincent Ferrer (1419). Against his parents' wishes, St. Vincent Ferrer joined the Dominican Order. He preached through much of Europe. He was called the Angel of Judgment because his sermons aimed to prepare his listeners for judgment.

April 8 – St. Julie Billiart (1816). Born in France, St. Mary Rose Julie Billiart was devoted to the care and education of the poor. After receiving a vision of her future religious order, she later founded the Sisters of Notre Dame.

April 24 – Divine Mercy Sunday. In 1931, Jesus appeared to St. Faustina and asked that the Sunday after Easter become the "Feast of Mercy." Jesus promised special graces to those who honor him as the King of Mercy and pray The Chaplet of Divine Mercy.

April 25 - St. Mark (1st century). St. Mark wrote the second Gospel largely based on St. Peter's perspective. He accompanied Saints Paul and Barnabas on their journey through Cyprus and is credited with founding the Church of Alexandria.

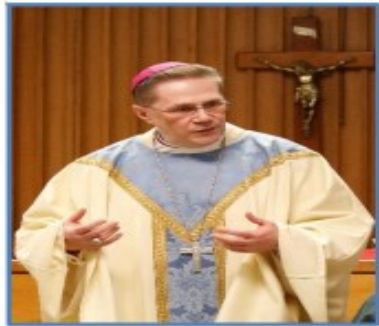

Significado de Semana Santa

Qué es Semana Santa:

La Semana Santa, conocida como Semana Mayor, es un período de ocho días que comienza con el Domingo de Ramos y culmina con el Domingo de Resurrección.

Con la Semana Santa, el cristiano conmemora el Triduo Pascual, es decir, los momentos de la Pasión, la Muerte y la Resurrección de Jesucristo.

La Semana Santa está precedida por la Cuaresma, en que se recuerda el tiempo de preparación de 40 días que pasó Jesucristo en el desierto.

Las celebraciones centrales de la Semana Santa son Jueves Santo, Viernes Santo, Sábado Santo y Domingo de Resurrección.

La Semana Santa es un tiempo para dedicarse a la oración y reflexionar sobre Jesucristo y los momentos del Triduo Pascual, pues Jesús, con su infinita misericordia, decide tomar el lugar de los hombres y recibir el castigo para liberar a la humanidad del pecado.

Además, la Semana Santa es el tiempo ideal para que el ser humano medite sobre sus acciones y los cambios que debe realizar para acercarse más a Dios y cumplir con sus mandamientos.

Durante la Semana Santa, el católico cumple con diversos actos, como procesiones, la escenificación del drama de la muerte y pasión de Cristo, entre otros.

Los penitentes se someten a duras cargas como símbolo de su autosacrificio y, en el día Viernes Santo, los fieles deben de guardar ayuno y abstenerse de comer carne.

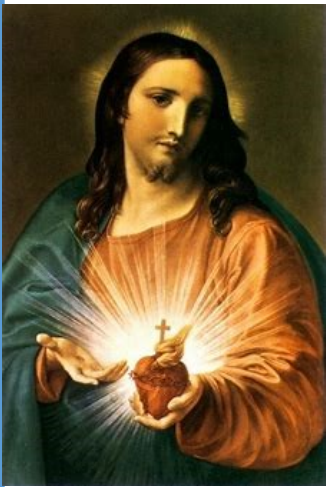

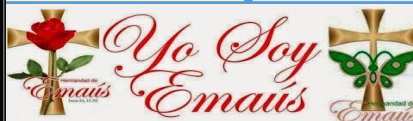
