ALL FOR THE GREATER GLORY OF GOD. St. Ignatius of Loyola

Clergy Corner

As we celebrate the Feast of St. Therese of Lisieux on October 1, my memory goes back to my childhood in Kerala, India. I was spiritually born and brought up in a parish named after St. Therese that celebrates the Platinum Jubilee of its consecration to God. Since St. Therese is the patroness of my parish, we learned several stories of her holiness



and purity. While alive, St. Therese made two promises that have been ringing true since her death. The first, "I will spend my heaven doing good on earth," and the second, "I will let fall from heaven a shower of roses." As a little boy, I was touched by her life and used to stand in front of her picture, praying for the showering of blessings upon me. I remember this little prayer we used to recite "St. Therese, the Little Flower, please pick me a rose from the heavenly garden and send it to me with a message of love; ask God to grant me the favor I thee implore and tell Him I will love Him each day more and more." Amen.

She had an amazing love for the Eucharist. As the Catholic Church in the US inaugurated a three-year Eucharistic Revival on June 19, 2022, the feast day of the Most Holy Body and Blood of Christ, it is timely for us to reflect on St. Therese's immense love for the Eucharist.

The secret of St. Therese's sanctity was her great love for the Lord Jesus. Even as a child, she knew Jesus was truly present in the Eucharist with body, blood, soul, and divinity. For Therese, Jesus was her close friend. She found great peace in the presence of the Blessed Sacrament. She writes about her first Holy Communion: "What indescribable memories even the smallest details of this day left in my soul!... It was a kiss of love, I felt how much I was loved, and within myself, I said: "I love you, and I give myself to You forever." Therese writes in her autobiography about the day she entered the convent, "O Jesus! on this day, you have fulfilled all my desires. From now on, near the Eucharist, I shall be able to sacrifice myself in silence, to wait for heaven in peace. Keeping myself open to the rays of the Divine Host in this furnace of love, I shall be consumed, and like seraphim, Lord, I shall love You."

Her love for Jesus in the Eucharist consumed her, and she longed to receive Holy Communion frequently. "It is not to remain in a golden ciborium that he comes down each day from heaven, but to find another heaven, the heaven of our soul in which he takes delight," she writes. She not only received Holy Communion as often as her confessor allowed but also encouraged others to do so.

St. Therese became a saint loving the Lord Jesus present in the Eucharist. For her, Jesus was her love, and she found joy in receiving the Lord Jesus in Holy Communion and adoring him constantly in the Eucharist. St. Therese offered her last Holy Communion for the conversion of a priest who had abandoned his faith. Miraculously, he repented and returned to the faith! Let her example inspire and encourage us to love Jesus in the Eucharist, receive him through Holy Communion frequently, and adore him passionately in the Eucharist. Let us visit Jesus as we adore Him in the Blessed Sacrament at St. Ignatius Chapel. We may not become a Saint like St. Therese, but we can still adore and love Jesus as she loved Him in the Holy Eucharist.

I am glad to admit the presence of AnsyMary in my life as a gift from God and thank her for being my faithful best friend all through my priesthood, from the beginning till now. As The Director of Digital Evangelism and Communications, she has not only prepared our parish prayer book but also edited it recently. I thank her for all the additional efforts she put in. I thank Peggy Gill for proofreading again and Susan Kelly for sponsoring the printing. The edited version will be released on October 7, the feast of Our Lady of Rosary.

GROW AS A DISCIPLE | PRAY, STUDY, ENGAGE, SERVE

The prophet Habakkuk lived seven centuries before Christ, yet his words could well be ours today: "I cry out to you, 'Violence!' but you do not intervene." Do we sometimes feel as though strife in our communities, and even within our own families, is more than we can handle? Like the prophet, we may ask, "How long, O Lord? I cry for help but you do not listen." Indeed, we may feel our prayers are not being answered. Perhaps it is simply that they are not "answered" in the manner and timeframe in which we wish they would be. Although "God's time" and his plan for our lives may seem mysterious or discouraging, it is by continuing to bring our concerns to God in prayer that we can actually help our faith grow and mature. We see countless examples of people who remain faithful in spite of hardship, misfortune and loss. Let us take time today, as the disciples did, to pray and ask Jesus to "increase our faith." In simply turning to the Lord, we exhibit faith that, like a tiny mustard seed, has great power and can be a source of strength to ourselves and those around us. It is in faith in Christ that we find hope.

GO EVANGELIZE

PRAYER, INVITATION, WITNESS, ACCOMPANIMENT

I find today's Gospel reading so reassuring. Even just a tiny speck of faith can move mountains. Or, in this case, uproot a mulberry tree and plant it in the sea! Working for a Catholic magazine, I'm privileged to write about people with a deep and abiding faith, one they freely share with others through their example and by sharing their stories. I bet we can all point to a friend or family member who exhibits the kind of faith so strong that it rubs off on others they encounter. Jesus reminds us that even a little faith can have a huge impact – not only on our lives but on others. We can share it by offering to pray for those facing a challenge, talking to God when we feel overwhelmed, and opening our hearts to the presence of Jesus in the Eucharist and in the faces of the people we encounter each day.

PRAY Even the prophet Habakkuk and the disciples experienced "off" days where faith eluded them. But the psalmist reminds us to keep showing up in prayer: "If today you hear his voice, harden not your hearts." Especially in moments of despair, bring your concerns to God in prayer.

included people others often excluded. Consider Zacchaeus, the tax collector. We know he was unpopular, small in stature, dishonestly wealthy, and he really wanted to see Jesus.

As the chief tax collector in Jericho, Zacchaeus was rich but unpopular. Tax collectors often overcharged and kept the extra money. Something about Jesus must have intrigued Zacchaeus, who climbed a tree to see Him. Imagine his shock when Jesus called him down and invited

Himself over for dinner. Deeply moved, Zacchaeus was shocked into repenting, promising to generously reimburse the people he robbed -

and to donating half his wealth to the poor.

Jesus saw Zacchaeus as a child of God. In return, Zacchaeus' eagerness for Jesus' friendship changed his life forever, beginning with

generous restitution. As followers of Jesus, we are called to be open, forgiving, and accepting of others. We never know their full story. Look past the gossip and adopt Jesus' habit of forgiving quickly and being welcoming in your relationships.



October 2 - Feast of the Guardian Angels. All of us have a guardian angel, in charge of protecting us and watching over us day and night. On this feast day, remember to thank the Guardian Angels for the work they have done in helping us.

October 6 - St. Bruno (1101). St. Bruno was born in Germany, studied in France and became a theology professor. He founded the Carthusian Order in 1084, whose life was based on prayerful solitude, manual labor, and poverty. He was never formally canonized.

October 16 – St. Margaret Mary Alacoque (1690). St. Margaret joined the Sisters of the Visitation at Paray-le-Monial. In 1673, she began having visions of Jesus Christ, in which He asked for a feast to his Sacred Heart. The Church officially recognized the devotion to the Sacred Heart in 1765.

October 18 – St. Luke, Evangelist (1st century). St. Luke was a Christian physician from Antioch. His Gospel and Acts of the Apostles were probably written between 70 and 85 A.D.

Souls: The Rosary prepares us for deeper prayer. Switching from "active working mode" to "contemplative prayer mode" may not happen right away. The repetition of the Our Father and Hail Mary prayers creates a space in our minds and hearts, so we can enter into deep, intimate prayer with God.






FOOD PANTRY NEEDS

Act Now! Tell the Federal Government to Do No Harm to Catholic Health Care Ministries


The Church's ministries of healing, education, and social services bear witness to Jesus Christ and build up the common good. Church institutions are not mere providers of social services. They are expressions of Christian ministry dedicated to human flourishing. We serve all people, without regard to race, sex, religion, or any other status, because God has imbued every person with inherent human dignity. Most Americans understand that mission-driven organizations should be free to operate in accordance with their missions. But a recent rule proposed by the U.S. Department of Health and Human Services (HHS) would prevent Catholic hospitals, clinics, assisted living facilities, and health care workers from carrying out their work. New Unjust Mandates from HHS

The HHS rule implements the nondiscrimination provision of the Affordable Care Act, Section 1557. It protects people from discrimination on the basis of their sex in health care. But HHS interprets Section 1557 to impose new mandates about gender identity. According to the new rule, it would be considered discrimination for a health care worker or Catholic hospital to object outright to performing gender transition procedures, regardless of whether that objection is a matter of religious belief or clinical judgment. The proposed rule also suggests that the government may refuse to honor the right of health care workers and providers not to perform or participate in abortions. The proposed HHS Section 1557 rule could function as both an abortion mandate and a gender transition procedure mandate.

Objection to gender transition is not discrimination.

All people should be treated in accordance with their God-given dignity, and no individual should be denied health care because of his or her sex. Most people understand that when medical professionals determine gender transition procedures—such as the administration of puberty blocking drugs or surgery to remove healthy body parts-to be harmful, they are making clinical judgments, not discriminating against persons. A study commissioned by the USCCB found that 70% of registered voters recognized that objection to the procedure is not discrimination.




No protections for health care workers to oppose abortion and gender transition procedures.

Although the proposed regulations say that HHS will consider whether conscience and religious freedom laws apply, the regulations offer no assurance that HHS will ever agree that anyone has the right to follow their beliefs or convictions. In fact, HHS is currently fighting court rulings that hold that HHS violated religious freedom laws the last time they tried to impose this mandate.

Health care workers and religious facilities must be free to conscientiously object to these procedures.

Pope Francis has frequently defended the rights of medical professionals to conscientiously object to harmful procedures. Most people agree with the Church on this issue.



Take action!

The United States Conference of Catholic Bishops is vigorously opposing the provisions in the rule that do harm to life and religious liberty. All Catholics and people of good will can help. Mientras celebramos la Fiesta de Santa Teresa de Lisieux el 1 de octubre, mi memoria se remonta a mi infancia en Kerala, India. Nací y crecí espiritualmente en una



parroquia que lleva el nombre de Santa Teresa y que celebra el Jubileo de Platino de su consagración a Dios. Como Santa Teresa es la patrona de mi parroquia, aprendimos varias historias de su santidad y pureza. En vida, Santa Teresita hizo dos promesas que se han hecho realidad desde su muerte. El primero, "Pasaré mi cielo haciendo el bien en la tierra", y el segundo, "Haré caer del cielo una lluvia de rosas". Cuando era niño, me conmovió su vida y solía pararme frente a su foto, orando por la lluvia de bendiciones sobre mí. Recuerdo esta pequeña oración que solíamos recitar "Santa Teresita, la Pequeña Flor, por favor cógeme una rosa del jardín celestial y envíamela con un mensaje de amor; pídele a Dios que me conceda el favor que te imploro y dile a Él lo amaré cada día más y más". Amén.

Tenía un amor asombroso por la Eucaristía. Como la Iglesia Católica en los EE. UU. Inauguró un Avivamiento Eucarístico de tres años el 19 de junio de 2022, el día de la fiesta del Santísimo Cuerpo y la Sangre de Cristo, es oportuno que reflexionemos sobre el inmenso amor de Santa Teresa por la Eucaristía.

El secreto de la santidad de Santa Teresita fue su gran amor por el Señor Jesús. Incluso cuando era niña, sabía que Jesús estaba realmente presente en la Eucaristía con cuerpo, sangre, alma y divinidad. Para Teresa, Jesús era su amigo más cercano. Encontró una gran paz en la presencia del Santísimo Sacramento. Ella escribe sobre su primera Comunión: "¡Qué recuerdos indescriptibles hasta los más pequeños detalles de este día dejaron en mi alma!... Fue un beso de amor, sentí cuánto me amaban, y dentro de mí dije: " Te amo y me entrego a Ti para siempre". Teresa escribe en su autobiografía sobre el día que entró en el convento: "¡Oh Jesús! en este día, has cumplido todos mis deseos. De ahora en adelante, cerca de la Eucaristía, podré sacrificarme en silencio, para esperar el cielo en paz. Manteniéndome abierta a los rayos de la Divina Hostia en este horno de amor, seré consumida, y como serafines, Señor, te amaré."

Su amor por Jesús en la Eucaristía la consumía, y anhelaba recibir la Sagrada Comunión"No es para quedarse en un copón de oro que él baja cada día del cielo, sino para encontrar otro cielo, el cielo de nuestra alma en el que se deleita", escribe. No sólo comulgaba con tanta frecuencia como su confesor permitió pero también animó a otros a hacerlo.

Santa Teresita se hizo santa amando al Señor Jesús presente en la Eucaristía. Para ella, Jesús era su amor, y encontró alegría en recibir al Señor Jesús en la Sagrada Comunión y adorarlo constantemente en la Eucaristía.

Santa Teresita ofreció su última Comunión por la conversión de un sacerdote que había abandonado su fe. ¡Milagrosamente, se arrepintió y volvió a la fe! Que su ejemplo nos inspire y anime a amar a Jesús en la Eucaristía, recibirlo a través de la Santa Comunión frecuentemente, y adorarlo apasionadamente en la Eucaristía. Visitemos a Jesús mientras lo adoramos en el Santísimo Sacramento en la Capilla de San Ignacio. Puede que no lleguemos a ser santos como Santa Teresa, pero aún podemos adorar y amar a Jesús como ella lo amó en la Sagrada Eucaristía.

Estoy feliz de admitir la presencia de Ansy Mary en mi vida como un regalo de Dios y le agradezco por ser mi mejor amiga fiel a lo largo de mi sacerdocio, desde el principio hasta ahora.
