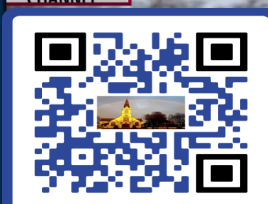

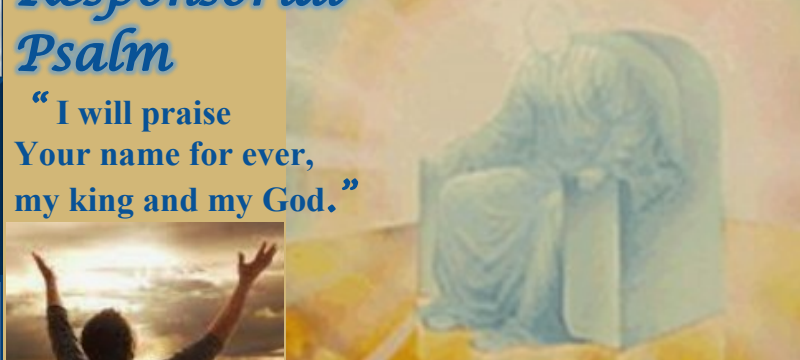

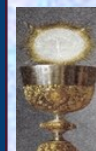

Clergy Corner



Some years ago, our daughter was teaching at St. Killian's School, and I received a call from her. She asked me to come down to her classroom and settle a dispute between her and one of her students. So, off I went to St. Killian's. When I arrived, she explained that they were discussing the 10 Commandments and that one of her students had raised the question there were just two commandments (to explain: when Jesus is challenged by one of the scholars about inheriting eternal life, Jesus responds by asking what is written in the law. The scholar responds – you shall love the Lord your God with all your heart, with all your being, with all your strength and with all your mind, and your neighbor as yourself. [Luke 10:25-27]). So, in a sense, her student was actually correct. But then I sent the room into an uproar; I declared that they were both wrong. I said that Jesus left us with just ONE COMMANDMENT! To LOVE – to love God and to LOVE everyone else.

St. Peter, in his first letter, advises the Christian community, “Above all, let your love for one another be intense, because love covers a multitude of sins. Be hospitable to one another without complaining. As each one received a gift, use it to serve one another as good stewards of God's varied grace.”

Paul, in his letters advises his followers “to be kind to one another, compassionate, forgiving one another as God has forgiven you in Christ.” And, elsewhere, in Paul's letter to the Corinthians, he details what is LOVE – “It bears all things, believes all things, hopes all things, endures all things. Love never fails”

In today's Gospel, Jesus says: “I give you a new commandment: LOVE ONE ANOTHER. As I have loved you, so you also should love one another. This is how all will know that you are my disciples, if you have love for one another.”

All of our readings today speak to this point – LOVE ONE ANOTHER. Paul and Barnabas travel through the eastern provinces encouraging the followers of the WAY (we were not called Christians yet) to persevere in the faith. In each of the places they visited, they were greeted and welcomed – they shared the love of the disciples of the WAY. As we look further in the Acts of the Apostles and in Paul's letters, we see that as he traveled the people would give him gifts to be presented to the other communities and money to be given to the congregation in Jerusalem where it would be distributed to the needy.

In Revelations, John explains how the vision he had of the new Jerusalem was the dwelling for the human race and that God will dwell with them and they will be His people. We see the reflection of God's love when “He will wipe every tear from their eyes, and there shall be no more death or mourning, wailing or pain, for the old order has passed away.” In John's first letter he declares: “God is love, and whoever remains in love remains in God and God in him. (1 John 4:16).

You and I are present day disciples of Jesus – followers of the WAY (Christians – Catholic Christians) and as disciples, we are called to follow Jesus' commandment – to love one another. How do we show this love? What are we called to do? Like the early Christians, we are called to share what we have with the needy and put Peter's and Paul's advice into practice – forgive one another. And most importantly, to LOVE ONE ANOTHER.

GROW AS A DISCIPLE | PRAY, STUDY, ENGAGE, SERVE

I'm an expressive one when it comes to sharing my opinions:
I absolutely LOVE these new shoes! I LOVE, LOVE, LOVE this lemon meringue pie! All good. My friends and family are mildly pleased that I am content with my wardrobe and my diet. But in today's Gospel, Jesus gives us the great commandment, combining the two commandments - to love God and to love neighbor - into one: "Love one another. As I have loved you, so you also should love one another." But what does it really mean to *love*? Saint Paul says it is to be patient, kind, and to rejoice with the truth; it is not being jealous, pompous, rude, or quick-tempered. (1 Cor 13: 4-6) Saint Thomas Aquinas says that "to love is to will the good of another." The love we show is the very essence of what it means to be Christian. "*This* (italics added) is how all will know that you are my disciples, if you have love for one another."

GO EVANGELIZE

PRAYER, INVITATION, WITNESS, ACCOMPANIMENT

In today's reading from Acts, Paul, and Barnabas return from their travels to various Christian communities. They have shared the Good News, making disciples in each place and building up the Church. Yet when they return, they do not gloat or boast of their accomplishments. Rather, they "reported what God had done with them and how he had opened the door of faith to the Gentiles." Sometimes in our strivings - to be better friends or parents, better Christians, better at sharing our faith - we can become discouraged when we fall short. Paul, arguably the best evangelist ever, reminds us that God works through us, not the other way around. We are to persevere, placing our trust in God. Through him we are able to love as he does, and help others come to know that same love.

ACTIONS Spring is upon us! Plant something and watch it grow. Just as the sun and water nurture a garden, God nurtures and helps us grow through the Holy Spirit and the people around us. How can we in turn share that love with others?



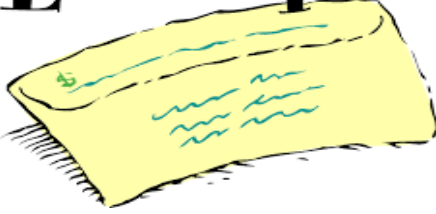

With Pandemic Coming to an End - Reflections on Religious Liberty

Americans of faith are fortunate to live in a country with robust liberty protections in our Constitution and Bill of Rights First Amendment. However, during these past two-plus years of COVID restrictions on religious activities, including full community worship, and their designation as "non-essential" while many secular activities were designated "essential", invites reflection on religious freedom in America today.

Since the U.S. Supreme Court has ruled on a number of cases based on the Free Exercise Clause of the First Amendment, we can ask, *"Why did the founding generation protect religious liberty?"* The history of humanity is intertwined with faith and fundamental religious values that led to the modern understanding of human rights. "Because their ancestors had escaped religious persecution in Europe, the founding generation saw the need to protect religion and viewed morality as necessary to the nation's success," wrote Prof. Anthony Koenc, Dallas College of Law. ⁽¹⁾ The First Amendment placed religion in a special category, uniquely shielding it from government interference.

"No doubt an emergency on the scale of COVID-19 justifies strong measures to protect the public, but we cannot lose sight of the fact that many of these measures are extraordinary assertions of government power that can dramatically constrain our basic freedoms.

The power of government must have limits."

Evangelio del Quinto Domingo de Pascua (Jn 13, 31-33a.34-35)

Cuando salió Judas del cenáculo, dijo Jesús: «Ahora es glorificado el Hijo del hombre, y Dios es glorificado en él. Si Dios es glorificado en él, también Dios lo glorificará en si mismo: pronto lo glorificará. Hijos míos, me queda poco de estar con vosotros. Os doy un mandamiento nuevo: que os améis unos a otros; como yo os he amado, amaos también entre vosotros. La señal por la que conocerán todos que sois discípulos míos será que os amáis unos a otros.»

Palabra del Señor / Gloria a ti Señor Jesús

Para saber cómo amar a los demás como Dios nos ama tenemos que responder una pregunta: ¿Cómo nos ama Dios?

El primer detalle es que Dios ama a todos sin importar si somos bonitos o feos, simpáticos o antipáticos, populares santos o pecadores. Y, para coronar su Amor, Jesús nos amó mucho más que a sí mismo, dando su vida por nosotros. Amar así parece imposible. Pero sabemos que Dios es la fuente de todo amor ... y no sólo eso, sino que Dios es el Amor mismo. Como no podemos amar por nosotros mismos debemos pedir al Señor que nos enseñe a amar con Su Amor, como El me ama a mí y como El ama a los que yo debo amar. Esta oración es importante porque ambos mandamientos -el amor a Dios y el amor al prójimo- están unidos. Uno es consecuencia del otro. Y hay que amar con el amor de Dios.

No podemos amar al prójimo sin amar a Dios. Y no podemos decir que amamos a Dios si no amamos al prójimo, pues el amor a Dios necesariamente se traduce en amor al prójimo.

Hace algunos años, nuestra hija estaba enseñando en la escuela St. Killian's School y recibí una llamada de ella. Me pidió que fuera a su salón de clases y resolviera una disputa entre ella y uno de sus alumnos. Entonces, me fui a St. Killian's. Cuando llegué, me explicó que estaban discutiendo los 10 Mandamientos y que uno de sus alumnos había planteado la pregunta de que solo había dos mandamientos (para explicar: cuando uno de los eruditos desafía a Jesús acerca de heredar la vida eterna, Jesús responde preguntando lo que está escrito en la ley. El erudite responde: Amarás al Señor tu Dios con todo tu corazón, con todo tu ser, con todas tus fuerzas y con toda tu mente, y a tu prójimo como a ti mismo. [Lucas 10:25- 27]). Entonces, en cierto sentido, su estudiante estaba realmente en lo correcto. Pero luego envió la habitación en un alboroto; Declaré que ambos estaban equivocados. ¡Dije que Jesús nos dejó sólo un MANDAMIENTO! AMAR – amar a Dios y AMAR a todos los demás.

San Pedro, en su primera carta, aconseja a la comunidad cristiana: “Sobre todo, que nuestro amor mutuo sea intenso, porque el amor cubre multitud de pecados. Sean hospitalarios unos con otros sin quejarse. A medida que cada uno recibió un don, utilízalo para servirse unos a otros como buenos administradores de la multiforme gracia de Dios”.

Pablo, en sus cartas, aconseja a sus seguidores “ser amables unos con otros, compasivos, perdonándose unos a otros como Dios nos perdonó a nosotros en Cristo”. Y, en otra parte, en la carta de Pablo a los corintios, detalla qué es el AMOR: “Todo lo soporta, todo lo cree, todo lo espera, todo lo soporta. El amor nunca falla”

En el Evangelio de hoy, Jesús dice: “Les doy un mandamiento nuevo: ÁMENSE los unos a los otros, como yo los he amado, así también ustedes deben amarse los unos a los otros. En esto conocerán todos que son mis discípulos, en el amor que se tengan unos a otros.”

Todas nuestras lecturas de hoy hablan de este punto: AMARSE LOS UNO A LOS OTROS. Pablo y Bernabé viajan por las provincias orientales animando a los seguidores del CAMINO (aún no nos llamamos cristianos) a perseverar en la fe. En cada uno de los lugares que visitaron fueron recibidos y bienvenidos, compartieron el amor de los discípulos del CAMINO. A medida que miramos más allá en los Hechos de los Apóstoles y en las cartas de Pablo, vemos que mientras viajaba, la gente le daba regalos para presentarlos a las otras comunidades y dinero para entregar a la congregación en Jerusalén, donde se distribuiría a los necesitados.

En Apocalipsis, Juan explica cómo la visión que tuvo de la nueva Jerusalén era la morada de la raza humana y que Dios moraría con ellos y ellos serían su pueblo. Vemos el reflejo del amor de Dios cuando “Él enjugará toda lágrima de sus ojos, y no habrá más muerte ni luto, ni llanto ni dolor, porque el antiguo orden ha pasado”. En la primera carta de Juan declara: “Dios es amor, y quien permanece en el amor permanece en Dios y Dios en él. (1 Juan 4:16).

Usted y yo somos discípulos de Jesús en la actualidad, seguidores del CAMINO (cristianos, católicos) y, como discípulos, estamos llamados a seguir el mandamiento de Jesús: amarnos unos a otros. ¿Cómo mostramos este amor? ¿Qué estamos llamados a hacer? Al igual que los primeros cristianos, estamos llamados a compartir lo que tenemos con los necesitados ya poner en práctica el consejo de Pedro y Pablo: perdonarnos unos a otros. Y, lo más importante, AMARNOS UNO A OTRO.

Ninguna parroquia puede llevar a cabo la obra de la Iglesia sin el apoyo de sus feligreses. Por ejemplo, los feligreses pueden llevar la Comunión a los enfermos, limpiar la iglesia, atender los servicios parroquiales, enseñar formación en la fe y dar dinero para que la iglesia pueda seguir operando. Esta vital participación lleva el corazón de Jesús a su gente. Pregúntele a su párroco qué necesita de usted su parroquia.



Recuerden el domingo

La Iglesia exige que los católicos participen en la misa del domingo y otros días de precepto. Es la mejor forma de encontrarnos regularmente con Cristo. No trabajamos el domingo para que nada dificulte la atención y la alabanza debidas a Dios. Dios quiere que descansemos el domingo a fin de recabar fuerzas para la siguiente semana.

Las virtudes son el antídoto del pecado

Las virtudes son buenas costumbres morales que moldean nuestros corazones para que se parezcan al de Dios. Contribuyen a que nos habituemos a obrar el bien. Como los pilares que son para una vida cristiana en la moralidad, las virtudes nos ayudan a combatir el pecado. Por ejemplo:

La humildad: Esta virtud es el antídoto del orgullo. La humildad nos ayuda a reconocer que Dios se merece nuestra adoración y nuestra obediencia. En lugar de centrarnos en nosotros mismos, la humildad nos ayuda a centrarnos en vivir de acuerdo con los designios de Dios. Algunas ideas para practicar esta virtud incluyen tomar el lugar menos importante, llamar la atención hacia los demás en lugar de hacia nosotros mismos,

aprender a amar las cosas sencillas.

El perdón: El pecado de la ira se define como un sentimiento descontrolado de odio y de furia. El antídoto es el perdón.

Cuando alguien le ofenda, perdone con rapidez y esfuércese por sanar la relación. Absténgase de murmurar y evite criticar a menos que pueda ofrecer soluciones razonables y útiles.

La gratitud y la generosidad van de la mano. Nos recuerdan que Dios

es la fuente de todo bien y que todo lo bueno que tenemos es un don que debemos disfrutar y compartir. Interrumpa el ciclo de "comparación y desesperación" entre envidia y avaricia. Limite su tiempo en las redes sociales y las compras compulsivas. Mencione diariamente algo que aprecie, o halle la forma de mostrar amabilidad cada día.



¿Por qué hacen eso los católicos?

¿Por qué llaman los católicos "Real Presencia" a la Eucaristía?

En la Última Cena, Jesús dijo "Esto es mi cuerpo... esto es mi sangre" (Mateo 26:26-28) sobre el pan y el vino, y así se hizo. Ordenó a sus apóstoles, y a los sacerdotes que los suceden, que hagan lo mismo en cada misa (*Catecismo de la Iglesia Católica*, #1375).



Cuando recibimos la Comunión, literalmente hablamos con Jesús con el corazón en la mano. Los detalles son un misterio, pero eso no impide que Jesús llegue hasta nosotros, en Cuerpo y Sangre, Alma y Divinidad, en la Eucaristía.

“Aquí tienes a tu madre” (Juan 19:27)

Jesús nos entregó todo en la Cruz, incluso a su madre para que fuera nuestra madre (Juan 19:27). No adoramos a María porque no es Dios, pero la honramos de manera especial imitando el amor de Jesús por ella (Lucas 2:51). Podemos:

Llamarla “Mamá”. Cuando somos bautizados en la Iglesia María se convierte en nuestra madre por la gracia (CIC, #967) y podemos dirigirnos a ella con confianza y cariño como sus hijos. María quiere lo mejor para nosotros. Nos conduce siempre hasta su hijo por el camino más rápido y seguro.



Aprender de ella. ¿Quiere saber cómo seguir a Cristo con fe y a diario? María fue la primera—y perfecta—cristiana. Confió en Dios sin cesar y obedeció su voluntad y nos dice: “*Hagan todo lo que él les diga*” (Juan 2:5).

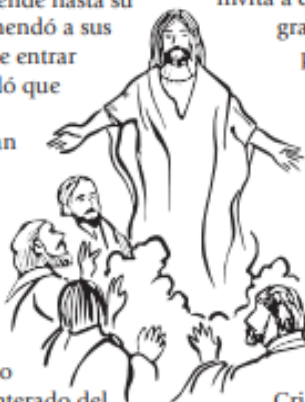
Pedirle su intercesión. Cristo es el mediador (1 Timoteo 2:5). Pero también ella recibe nuestras oraciones por los demás. Como madre de Jesús y Reina del Cielo, las oraciones de María son poderosas. Ella seguirá pidiendo por nosotros hasta que llegemos al Cielo.

de las **E**scrituras

Lucas 24:46-53, La misión encomendada por Dios

Este pasaje de Lucas es su versión de la Ascensión en la que Jesús asciende hasta su padre en el Cielo. Jesús encomendó a sus discípulos una misión antes de entrar en el Cielo. Primero les recordó que su sufrimiento, muerte y resurrección eran parte del plan de Dios. Estos acontecimientos, conocidos como el Misterio Pascual, son tan importantes que los recordamos en cada misa.

Luego Jesús envió a sus discípulos para que llamaran a las gentes al arrepentimiento y al discipulado. Al haberse enterado del sufrimiento, la muerte y la resurrección de Cristo para que ellos se salvaran, el siguiente paso lógico sería el arrepentimiento, literalmente “el cambio de



postura”. A la gente se la invitaba y se la invita a que se reconcilien con Dios gracias al perdón de sus pecados recibido mediante los sacramentos.

Jesús murió por todos, pero no todos lo sabían. La misión de sus primeros seguidores fue decirle a todo el mundo cómo Dios los había salvado y ofrecerles, en nombre de Cristo, un camino a seguir: el arrepentimiento y el perdón. Si conocemos a Cristo, su sacrificio, su amor y la vida eterna que nos ofrece, estamos obligados a comunicárselo a los demás de palabra, de obra o dando ejemplo.

Fiestas y celebraciones

12 de mayo – San Pancracio (c. 304). Huérfano desde niño, fue llevado a Roma por un tío. Se convirtieron inspirados por los cristianos. Los dos fueron decapitados por negarse a realizar sacrificios a los ídolos durante el reinado del emperador Diocleciano. San Pancracio tenía sólo catorce años.

14 de mayo – San Matías (siglo I). Cuando los apóstoles se reunieron para elegir al sucesor de Judas, Pedro dijo que el nuevo apóstol tenía que haber seguido a Jesús desde su bautismo hasta su ascensión y haber sido testigo de su resurrección. San Matías fue elegido para

ocupar el puesto de Judas.

22 de mayo – Santa Rita de Casia (1457). Casada contra su voluntad con un marido cruel a la edad de doce años, santa Rita vivió dieciocho infelices años antes de enviudar. Al enfermar y morir sus hijos, se hizo monja agustina. Se la conocía por su devoción a la oración y la caridad.

29 de mayo – La Ascensión del Señor. Esta festividad conmemora el final de la misión salvadora de Jesús y su entrada triunfal en el Cielo.



P & R ¿Qué es la fiesta de Nuestra Señora de Loreto?

En el año 2019, el papa Francisco dedicó un día especialmente a Nuestra Señora de Loreto. Loreto es la ciudad de Italia donde se cree que se encuentra la casa en la que creció María. Según la



tradición, los ángeles transportaron la casa desde Tierra Santa hasta Italia en el siglo XIII cuando Tierra Santa estaba siendo atacada.

Tanto si los ángeles transportaron en realidad la casa o si una familia devota y rica pagó su transporte, los hallazgos científicos han verificado que la casa no es una casa italiana del siglo XIII. El estilo arquitectónico, la construcción y los granos de polen encontrados en la argamasa no son característicos de la Italia del siglo XIII sino de la Palestina del siglo I.

No estamos obligados a creer en el transporte milagroso de la Casa de Loreto, pero la relevancia de esta devoción nos alcanza. Recordamos la maternidad de María, de Jesús primero y de nosotros hoy (Juan 19:27). Se nos anima a que pidamos su intercesión por las familias y a que recordemos la importancia de la familia en el plan salvador de Dios.
