Why Do Catholics Do That?

Why do Catholics venerate relics?

Relics are the remains or personal possessions of a saint – ordinary people, like us, transformed by God's grace. When we venerate their relics, we honor the saints as models of holiness and can ask them to pray for us. Occasionally,

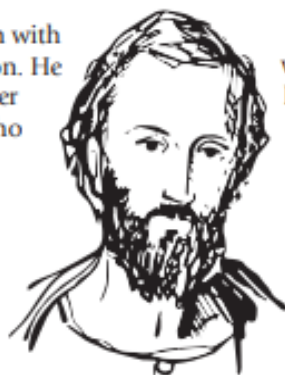


miracles happen as a result, but it is by God's power. The relics of themselves have no special properties. If one's faith in God is renewed or someone experiences a conversion of heart, then those are miracles in themselves.

The ultimate earthly father

Scripture doesn't report that St. Joseph was born with special graces, yet he was chosen to raise God's Son. He may not have had the gift of prophecy, yet he never doubted God's word. He was an ordinary man who lived an extraordinary life.

Ever faithful. As a faithful Jew with knowledge of Scripture, Joseph knew that God sometimes sent instructions through angels. That's why he was open to being guided by an angel in a dream. So Joseph's devotion to God's Word helped him follow God's will.



Steady provider. Joseph left everything to flee with his family to Egypt (Matthew 2:13-15). He kept them safe until the angel said to move back (Matthew 2:20-23). Joseph's hard work and skill helped provide for his family in a foreign land.

Good man. Scripture said that St. Joseph lived a virtuous life (Matthew 1:19). We also know he was compassionate in his treatment of Mary. Who better to raise the Son of God and care for His Mother than the ultimate earthly father?

Scripture LESSON

Luke 9:51-62, What does it take to be a disciple?

In this Gospel reading, the first man enthusiastically offered to follow Jesus but he wasn't prepared for the cost. Jesus was unflinching in pointing out that He has no home, no shelter, no family – none of the things people normally consider important for a happy life.

It may not always be comfortable to follow Jesus. Burying one's parent was considered a binding religious duty among the Jews, so the second man wanted to fulfill that duty before setting out with Jesus. Jesus' answer pointed out the importance of action when He says it is time to move. In

the third story, Jesus points out that looking back while plowing can ruin the row. He wanted the third man to

understand that we need to have a singleness of purpose to be His disciple.

What can a parent do? Remind your children that it isn't always easy to be a follower of Jesus. There are things we have to give up and comforts we may have to sacrifice. But He promises us that the rewards will be unimaginable and worth more than the costs.



Feasts & Celebrations

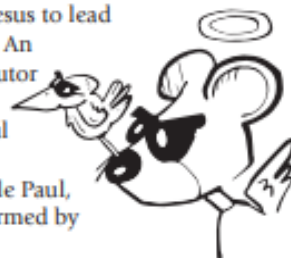
June 5 – The Feast of Pentecost. Today, we celebrate the birthday of the Church, when the Holy Spirit was given to the Apostles, following the Resurrection and Ascension of Jesus.

June 8 – St. William of York (1154). St. William was born into a noble English family. Even when political opponents slandered him, St. William was never bitter or resentful. He died less than two months after his consecration, probably poisoned.

June 15 – St. Germain Cousin (1601). Born in France, St. Germain lost her

mother at infancy and was mistreated by her stepmother. She became a shepherdess, known for her simple, yet profound faith. She attended Mass daily, leaving her flock in God's care.

June 29 – Sts. Peter and Paul (1st century). Peter, an ordinary fisherman made extraordinary by God's grace, was chosen by Jesus to lead the Church. An early persecutor of the Church, Saul became the Great Apostle Paul, also transformed by grace.



Parent TALK

When Kara took a test without studying for it, I had her illustrate a comic book about St. Catherine of Alexandria who is said to have converted 50 pagan philosophers using her wisdom and knowledge.

Partnering with saints to raise my children makes more sense than giving time-outs.

GROW AS A DISCIPLE | PRAY, STUDY, ENGAGE, SERVE

Today begins the National Eucharistic Revival, a grassroots effort launched by the U.S. bishops to reignite “devotion and belief in the Real Presence of Jesus in the Eucharist.” What better day to begin than on the Solemnity of the Most Holy Body and Blood of Christ, when we as Catholics reflect on the source and summit of our faith. “For in the blessed Eucharist is contained the whole spiritual good of the Church, namely Christ himself ...” (*catechism*, 1324) Our readings today remind us that the Eucharist is more than a powerful symbol; as Catholics, we believe we receive Christ himself - body, blood, soul, and divinity - in the form of the consecrated bread and wine. As Pope Francis said in a homily on this solemnity in 2019: “If we receive it into our hearts, this bread will release in us the power of love. We will feel blessed and loved, and we will want to bless and love in turn.” That is what the early disciples did, whether feeding the 5,000 or nurturing the early Church. The Eucharistic Revival gives each of us an opportunity to give thanks for the gift of the Eucharist and share it with others.

GO EVANGELIZE

PRAYER, INVITATION, WITNESS, ACCOMPANIMENT

On today’s solemnity, also known as the feast of Corpus Christi, some parishes have a eucharistic procession. This is when a consecrated host - that is, the real and substantial presence of Jesus Christ, body, blood, soul and divinity - is placed within a monstrance, which is then lifted and carried by a priest who leads the faithful in procession beginning at one holy place and ending at another. Some parishes or religious communities may extend hours for eucharistic adoration. Both of these are excellent opportunities to spend time with Jesus and reflect on Christ’s gift of himself in the Eucharist. What should be our response to this gift? As Pope Francis has said, it is a call “to go out and bring Jesus to others.” Just as Jesus challenged the disciples when they didn’t think they had enough bread and fish to serve the 5,000, we may feel we “don’t have enough” to give. Nourished by the Eucharist, however, and by our devotion to the real presence of God in that Eucharist, we have all we need to go out and witness to the love of Jesus. Go forth and announce the Gospel of the Lord.

ACTION Spend time in eucharistic adoration this week, even for a few minutes. Share what the experience was like with others or invite a friend to join you.

The family was important to him, and we are grateful for their presence during the funeral and for supporting him in good times and bad. We are grateful for our wonderful altar servers Del viernes fue, Destiny, Jocelyn, Gabriel, Juliana, El sábado fue, Natalie, Joseph and William and Delfina Hernandez who coordinated them, Ivan for live streaming, Tony and Jeff for arranging the Church for the funeral, and Sr. Maryanne, Chancellor of our Diocese, for coordinating the funeral arrangements. Frs. Francis Samuel and Jacob Varughese tirelessly worked to bid Monsignor a fitting spiritual farewell.

Finally, to Msgr. Bennett, you have shown us love for God, faithfulness to Him, and the holiness of life. There is no finishing line for you because "once a priest, always a priest," and you have prayed for us while on earth and will pray for us in heaven. May the songs of angels greet you as you enter the glory of God. The words of the Scripture have been fulfilled now "Well done, my good and faithful servant. Since you were faithful in small matters, I will give you great responsibilities. Come, share your master's joy.

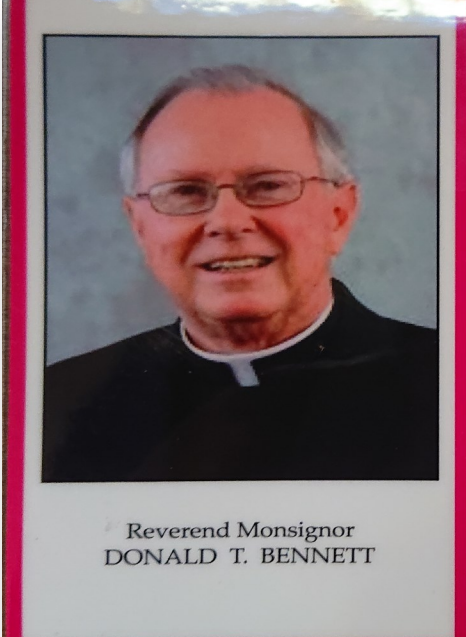

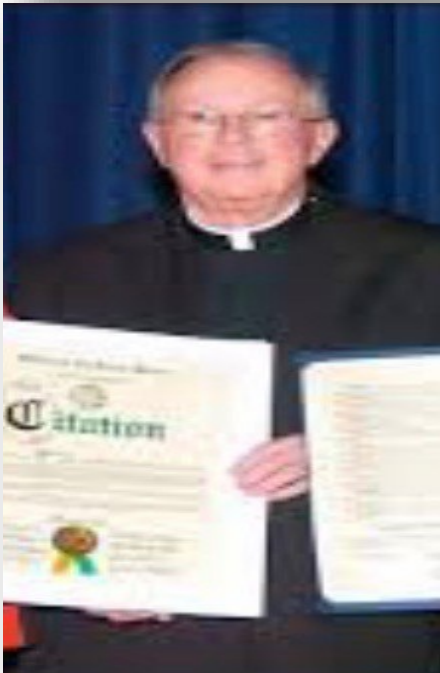
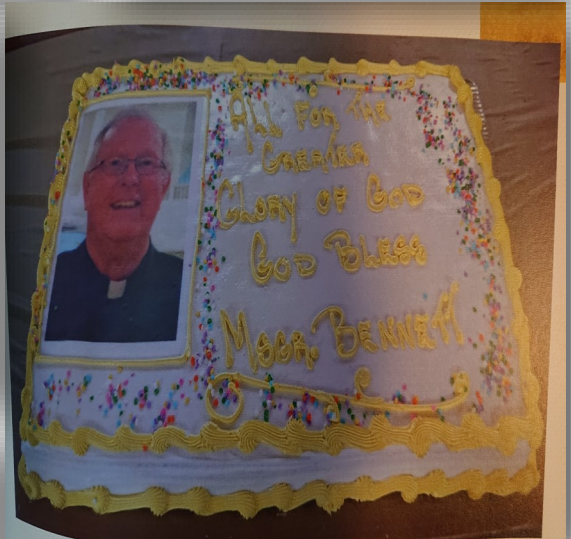

Memoriam - Rev. Msgr. Donald T. Bennett

The parish family of St. Ignatius Loyola mourns the passing of our tenth pastor, Rev. Msgr. Donald T. Bennett. Monsignor came to us in June 1999. In his twelve years as pastor Monsignor devoted himself to the our spiritual, temporal and social needs. Monsignor seemed to have a quiet spirituality. He was very liturgical. He put much effort to make sure the liturgy was done correctly, and music was an important part of the liturgy for him. He also took much time in the preparation of his homilies. Monsignor worked to restore more reverence to the Eucharist. During his pastorate, daily Exposition of the Eucharist in the Chapel began. He was instrumental in the planning and expansion of the various shrines in our Prayer Garden so that people may sit quietly in prayer when the the church was not available for prayer and reflection. Monsignor Bennett was very pastoral and cared about his flock; in a few cases, he handpicked someone to bring communion to the sick when it seemed the person had a special need. During his pastorate our Spanish community had grown to require full-time care. Rev. Jose Quilcate came to serve the people in 2002 ,and the first Spanish Mass was celebrated on December 8, 2002. A very spiritual and touching memory here in our church was of Monsignor Bennett's celebration of a funeral Mass for Nicholas Hope, a child who was unwanted. It was held with the assistance of the AMT Children of Hope Foundation here in Nassau County. Monsignor, in his homily, said to those in attendance that they had "come to tell the world that every human life has infinite value to us." He also reached out to Nicholas' parents and told them not to be afraid to seek help. St. Ignatius Parish would be there to help them.

Children were the future of our church in Monsignor's mind and heart. He believed that they were our most prized possession. He tried to encourage young families to become more involved. "We need them," he said of the children, "to appreciate what a great thing their faith is," when he was interviewed in October 2005 by the NY Daily News. He played a very important part in St. Ignatius Loyola School's "Celebration of 100 Years of Catholic Education." A proud moment for him also was when the school earned Middle School Accreditation after five years of diligent work by the administration and staff. Monsignor worked closely with the Religious Education staff to provide instruction to our children in public school and enjoyed spending time with the children in their faith formation classes. The Faith Formation Program was a priority for him. Monsignor Bennett had a great devotion to history, in particular within the church. In the early 2000's major projects were undertaken to repair severe deterioration of the Old School, the rectory and convent. A Vision of Faith Campaign was held, and along with the Diocesan Jubilee Fund Campaign, major projects were completed. Then Monsignor worked to bring the interior church back to its original Gothic architecture. Thanks to his dedication we have the beautiful church as we see it today. Furnishings from the original 1891 church which had been stored in the church basement during the 1972 renovation were utilized throughout the church. In a homily at the first Mass after the restoration was complete, Monsignor said, "... we cannot forget our history." When our church bells went silent in 2006, again parishioners answered his appeal for the Bell Fund. By Easter 2007, our presence within the Hicksville community was heard again. A very important year for Monsignor Bennett and all our parish was the year-long celebration of the parish's 150th Anniversary. One special event held that year was participation in Hicksville's Memorial Day Parade. He had the opportunity to ride in a stately burgundy 1931 Chevy Classic. A model of the first St. Ignatius Church from 1859 also was a part of the parade. In his own quiet way, he loved celebrations and being with the people. This

was also evident when he began a tradition here at St. Ignatius - the parish picnic usually held the Saturday after Labor Day. Parishioners who attended cannot forget our priests handsomely clad in Hawaiian shirts which later became part of the raffle. Monsignor Bennett retired in June 2011. When he retired he continued to be an important presence within the parish. On a funny note, if you were on church property around 1 PM on a nice day you might spot him in his white wide-brimmed straw hat going about picking up garbage! He took such pride in the church and its grounds. Monsignor remained in residence here at St. Ignatius until the fall of 2016. Then he moved to Our Holy Redeemer Parish in Freeport where he again was with Rev. Douglas Arcoleo, a former Associate Pastor here at St. Ignatius. In October 2019 his newest residence became St. Pius X Senior Priests' Residence in Amityville which more recently moved to Lake Ronkokoma. He grew to love our parish and considered it home. He was bereft when he had to leave. He learned that what his parishioners lacked in money they more than made up for in determination, volunteerism, kindness and cooperation. Monsignor Bennett was sorely missed when he left St. Ignatius. He will be missed even more now. May God bless and reward him for his fifty-five years of service as a priest both here at St. Ignatius and throughout the Diocese.
