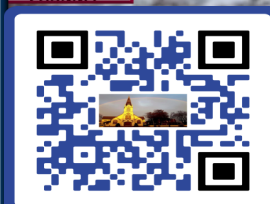

Are you a Martha or a Mary? For me, it depends on the day, but on first glance I'd say I relate more to Martha. When I plug in the vacuum and start handing out cleaning supplies, one of my sons invariably asks: "Is company coming over?" Even once they arrive, I'm often so busy with host duties that I don't really relax enough to truly connect with our guests! All of that said, I'm not sure Jesus is criticizing Martha or just talking about housework; rather, he addresses her as a friend. "Martha, Martha, you are anxious and worried about many things. There is need of only one thing." Mary, who sits at the feet of Jesus, shows us what matters most: our relationship with Jesus. It doesn't mean we won't get caught up in the busyness of entertaining or life in general. When that happens, however, Jesus' words can gently call us back to what matters: the way we live our life for Christ each day and prioritizing our relationship with him.

It's wedding season! I was recently talking to a friend whose daughter got married a few weeks ago. She and her daughter had spent months planning the wedding, of course, but the actual day went by "too fast," she said, her voice tinged with regret. Sometimes it seems life can be like that. We can get so caught up in the day-to-day that we forget to take a breath and savor each moment with friends and family. In today's readings, Mary shows us how to truly be present to Jesus by listening to his voice in prayer and reading his words in Scripture. MEMBER PROFILE: JOHN P. TONER



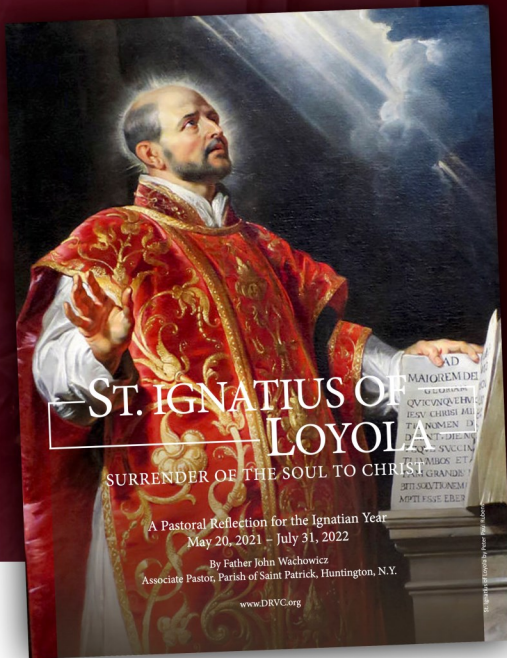
My name is John Patrick Toner, and I am the son of long-time parishioner and St. Vincent de Paul member John Toner. Although I am the newest member of the parish's St. Vincent de Paul chapter, I am certainly not new to St. Ignatius. I was born and raised in Hicksville and attended St Ignatius grammar school for 8 years. I was an altar boy and received all the sacraments from baptism to marriage under the roof of our beloved church. After taking my wedding vows to my wife of 30 years, under the watchful eye and spiritual guidance of Rev. Msgr. Edward Tarrant, I moved out to Suffolk County to raise a family.

In recent years I found myself spending more and more time in Hicksville visiting family members and my parents. I was introduced to the Society of St. Vincent de Paul by my father and realized that the mission and the message of the Vincentians is one that is very familiar to me. The nuns of St. Ignatius grammar school laid down the foundation of Catholicism and its works of charity and compassion. St Pius X Preparatory high school only helped to enrich these core Christian values. Spending 40 years commuting from Long Island to NYC, Brooklyn, and Newark by too many trains and subways one begins to easily recognize the face of hunger and despair. Joining the Society of St. Vincent de Paul seemed to be the natural next step in my life for I began to see the face of hunger and despair right here in our Hicksville community.

The purpose of Society of St. Vincent de Paul, in solidarity with local food pantries and many other organizations, is to serve people in need; further promote the church's message of servitude through works of charity, home visits, and a lot of much needed prayer. Unfortunately, it may not be enough. The cries of the poor and destitute grow louder and more numerous in our community as the price of food and basic services continue to rise. A very hot housing market has led to increasing rents. Some of our neighbors are being asked to find new homes as landlords seek to sell their properties. When basic services such as food, clothing and shelter are denied, desperation is sure to follow. Sometimes the smallest actions can have profound impacts. Please consider how you can better serve and help families in our community. Financial gifts and the donation of time are always welcomed and much appreciated but sometimes just recognizing a struggling neighbor and passing along information that might help them, can make all the difference in the world.

If you know of a family in need, please don't hesitate to introduce them to the Society of St. Vincent De Paul.

The Faith of Our Founders – Freedom Requires Sacrifice

Most of the nation's 56 Founders were openly religious, believing with Samuel Adams that "true Religion and good Morals are the only solid foundations of public liberty and happiness." After signing the Declaration of Independence on July 4, 1776, Samuel Adams wrote, "We have this day restored the Sovereign to whom men ought to be obedient. He reigns in Heaven, and with a propitious eye beholds his subjects assuming that freedom of thought and dignity of self-direction which He bestowed on them. From the rising to the setting of the sun, may His kingdom come!"

"And for the support of this Declaration, with firm reliance on the protection of Divine Providence, we mutually pledge to each other our Lives, our Fortunes, and our sacred Honor." - The final line of the Declaration of Independence

With this pledge, the 56 Founders were willing to sacrifice everything for God and for liberty. Many of them and their families suffered hardship that few today remember:

- Five were captured by the British and tortured before they died.
- Twelve had their homes ransacked and burned.
- Nine fought and died from wounds or hardships of war.
- A Virginia planter and trader saw his ships sunk by the British navy and he died in poverty.
- Others also lost all their worldly possessions and died bankrupt.

Descubran a Dios en las cosas cotidianas

San Josemaría Escrivá, fundador del Opus Dei ("Obra de Dios"), nos enseñó que puede encontrarse santidad extraordinaria en circunstancias ordinarias: "Todo lo que se hace por amor, adquiere hermosura y se engrandece" a los ojos de Dios. ¿Buscan el camino más seguro hacia la santidad? Hagan santo cada momento.

Santificar el trabajo: "Lleven a cabo las pequeñas obligaciones de cada momento" y pongan todo su corazón, su mente, su talento y su amor en lo que hagan. Cuando ofrecemos nuestras tareas (la "materia prima") a la gracia de Dios, él les concede un valor infinito. Por ejemplo, podemos ofrecer actividades —especialmente las desagradables— por las intenciones nuestras o de otras personas. Ésta es una forma de dedicar las actividades diarias a Dios.



Santificar los momentos: Encuentren "lo divino oculto en las situaciones más ordinarias". Dios usa momentos que son difíciles, aburridos o que sobrepasan nuestras habilidades para ajustarnos a Cristo. Jesús pasó la mayoría de su vida terrenal trabajando y viviendo una vida santa pero a menudo ordinaria. Con su gracia crecemos en paciencia, perseverancia, humildad, compasión y gratitud al hacer frente a momentos ordinarios con virtud extraordinaria.

Santificar la actitud: Cuando somos pacientes con los demás, aceptamos bien tanto la alabanza como la crítica y evitamos la envidia, la murmuración y la falsedad, demostramos que pertenecemos a Cristo. Nuestro trabajo se convierte en el trabajo de Dios. Nos convertimos, sin prisa pero sin pausa, en "un santo, semejante a todos a su alrededor, pero profundamente identificado con Jesucristo".

¿Por qué hacen eso los católicos?

¿Por qué creen los católicos que el papa puede enseñar con infalibilidad?

Jesús nombró a san Pedro cabeza (visible) de su Iglesia y le dio las llaves del reino para atar y desatar. En la Última Cena prometió enviar al Espíritu Santo que "les enseñará todo y les recordará lo que les he

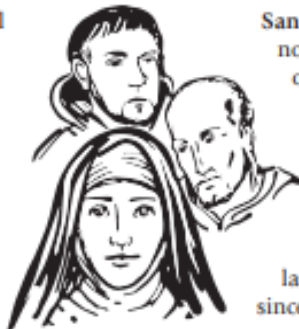


dicho" (Juan 14:26). Con la guía del Espíritu Santo el papa enseña con infalibilidad cuando, como sucesor de san Pedro, proclama la doctrina en cuestiones de fe y de moral (Catecismo de la Iglesia Católica (CIC) #891).

Consejos de los santos para la oración

La oración es idealmente una conversación personal con Dios que fortalece nuestra amistad con él. Pongan a prueba estos "consejos profesionales" de los santos:

San Juan de la Cruz: Según san Juan, expresar nuestras necesidades humanas y presentarlas ante Dios en oración es un acto de amor. Nos enseñó que no tenemos que especificar lo que necesitamos o queremos, sino ofrecerle nuestra necesidad a Dios y pedirle que haga lo que quiera "... porque el Señor sabe lo que nos conviene mejor que nosotros".



San Bernardo de Claraval: "Los que son sinceros y sabios no dudarán en 'mascar' el salmo con su mente". La buena oración se nutre con la lectura y la meditación de la Sagrada Escritura. También puede ser útil un buen comentario católico.

Santa Teresa de Ávila: "Él quiere ... conocer el amor que sientes por él, se encuentre tanto en la monotonía como en el deleite espiritual". La buena oración, como el amor verdadero, persevera incluso en las dificultades o en la monotonía. Nuestro esfuerzo sincero agrada a Dios.

Lucas 12:13-21, Más importante que las riquezas

En este pasaje evangélico, le piden a Jesús que intervenga en una disputa familiar sobre una herencia. En tiempos antiguos los rabinos se encargaban de resolver esas disputas. Jesús se negó al principio, pero al ver las disensiones de la familia sobre el desacuerdo, les contó una parábola sobre un hombre rico pero necio a fin de poner en perspectiva su situación.



El hombre de la historia no fue condenado por sus riquezas. Fue condenado por su egoísmo y su falta de previsión. No compartió su excesiva

riqueza con los necesitados ni la usó con generosidad. Aunque era rico, era pobre espiritualmente. Se presentaría ante Dios con las manos vacías.

El objetivo de esta parábola no es asustarnos para que nos libremos de nuestra riqueza, sino recordarnos que hay algo más importante en la vida que la acumulación de bienes. Nuestro valor y nuestra estima no se basan en lo que tenemos sino en lo que hacemos con los dones que nos ha dado Dios. Cómo los usamos para ocuparnos de sus amados hijos. Cuando entendamos esto, nuestros corazones serán como el suyo.

Fiestas y celebraciones

3 de julio – Santo Tomás (siglo I). A pesar de ser conocido como "Tomás el incrédulo", hizo una hermosa profesión de fe cuando recibió la prueba de la resurrección de Jesús: "Señor mío y Dios mío" (Juan 20:28). La tradición cuenta que Tomás evangelizó a los partos, los medos y los persas y que llegó hasta la India.

9 de julio – Santa Verónica Giuliani (1727). Nacida en Italia en el siglo XVII, santa Verónica ingresó en el orden de las capuchinas y pronto empezó a tener visiones de la Pasión de Cristo. Por una gracia especial recibió en su cuerpo las

marcas de las heridas de Cristo.

22 de julio – Santa María Magdalena (siglo I). Jesús arrojó de María siete demonios (Lucas 8:2) y ella apoyó económicamente su misión. Estuvo al lado de la cruz de Jesús con su madre y fue quien informó de la resurrección a los apóstoles.

26 de julio – San Joaquín y santa Ana (siglo I). Se sabe poco de los abuelos de Jesús, pero la fe inquebrantable de María, su devoción a las normas de su religión y su temple en las crisis indican los valores en los que fue educada.



P ¿Trae buena & suerte el escapulario R marrón?

El escapulario (del latín *scapula*: "hombro"), está formado por dos pedazos pequeños de tela unidos con cintas y se lleva sobre el pecho y la espalda, sobre la piel. Según la tradición,



Nuestra Señora se le apareció a san Simón Stock, fundador de la Orden de los Carmelitas, y le dio el escapulario marrón, prometiendo que quienes lo llevaran hasta la muerte no sufrirían el fuego del infierno, se salvarían del peligro y experimentarían paz y protección.

El escapulario marrón es el tipo más común y se celebra una ceremonia en la que la persona acepta oficialmente el escapulario y el sacerdote se lo pone. El escapulario no es un amuleto de "buena suerte". Al igual que otros objetos sacramentales, su misión es prepararnos para conseguir la gracia mediante las oraciones de la Iglesia, la cual pide la bendición de Dios para beneficio de nuestro cuerpo o nuestra alma (CIC #1670). El escapulario en sí —o cualquier otro objeto sacramental— no "hace" nada; simplemente recuerda a quien lo lleva su compromiso con la santidad y la protección de María, algo que ya sucede.

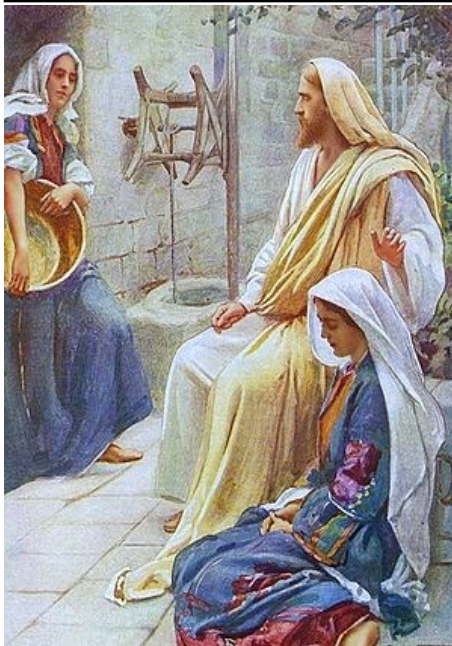

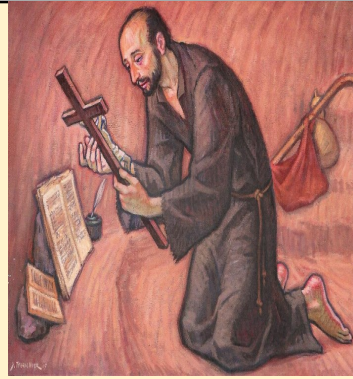

AÑO IGNACIANO - 500 AÑOS DE CONVERSION Y 400 AÑOS DE CANONIZACION DE SAN IGNACIO DE LOYOLA - FIESTA JULIO 31, 2022

Íñigo, llevaba encima una cruz de madera con una inscripción latina que decía: "Íñigo de Loyola llevaba esta cruz. 1522."

Esta reliquia se descubrió en 1710 en la iglesia de Santo Domingo. Más tarde se guardó en el convento de Santa Clara y durante las desgracias de julio de 1936 desapareció. Al principio su imagen de mendigo, de hombre que pedía limosna y un trozo de pan para él y para los del hospital, dejado, sucio, desgredado, mal calzado y con un saco por capa le valió el mote del «hombre del saco». La gente se lo quitaba de encima, le hacían burla, los niños le tiraban piedras... Pero él no se inmutaba: el antiguo militar sólo abría los labios para bendecir Dios. Con el tiempo se calmó esta tormenta y su vida de penitente no escapó a los ojos de la gente que se dio cuenta de que tenía un corazón que amaba: sus harapos de mendigo escondían un corazón misericordioso ya que dedicaba horas a visitar y atender enfermos, servía a los pobres del hospital en lo más repugnante, enseñaba catecismo a los niños... y del desprecio llegaron a la admiración. El «hombre del saco» no era un mendigo como los demás, ni un demente, sino un hombre de virtud, un santo. Quién lo tildó de hipócrita, mentiroso y farsante ahora se le arrodillaba a los pies. **San Ignacio de Loyola, ruega por nosotros!**
