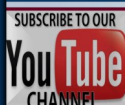

Clergy Corner



A wealthy man was once seen driving his Lamborghini car through the streets of a busy city. As he stopped in a particular place for parking, a curious passer-by, remarked at the driver: "Hey, it's surprising! You're driving such an expensive car... but didn't you notice that your rear window glasses are broken!" "There's a reason for pursuing with the broken glasses...", the man in the car replied, "the broken windows remind me of my broken relationship with my brethren!" "Huh?", enquired the passer-by with greater curiosity, "How do 'broken windows' remind you of your broken relationship with your brethren?" "Well then, listen to my story," said the man as he continued, " I was once passing through the streets, zipping across in my luxurious car when suddenly, a crashing sound was heard from the back! I saw that a stone had been thrown at my car! In great anger, I noticed that it was a rag-picker boy, who had thrown the stone! My blood boiled, in rage, as I stopped my vehicle and moved closer to him. But then I saw him, joining his hands, as he pleaded to me in tears: "Sir, look at my younger brother... I noticed that a young boy whose legs were paralyzed was lying down, with heavy scars and bruises on his legs. The boy continued: 'I was crossing the road, helping my lame brother, when a fast-moving bike ran over him, to leave him with a bleeding leg. I called out to many people for help... but none cared! Finally, out of my helplessness, I decided to throw a stone at the vehicle which would come next, in order to seek help! The boy continued: 'Sir, I am extremely sorry that your expensive car is damaged. But, trust me, this was the only way I could seek help for my injured brother!" Tears filled my eyes, as I told the boy: "My car windows are surely broken! But they are also a reminder that sometimes, we have to allow God to break certain things, to remind us that we need to stop and help! That we need to depend on God in all aspects of life! Surely, these broken windows are a sign of God's reminder for me about my broken relationship with God and with my brethren!"

We find in the gospel reading of this Sunday that Jesus is starting his ministry with a call for repentance. Repentance means repairing our broken relationship with God and with our fellow brothers in this world. The Hebrew word translated as “repent” means to turn back. Repentance means to turn back to God. Our English word “repent” is defined: “to change the way you think.” It’s a mind shift, a turning back to God, away from our selfishness, greed, pride, and unforgiveness. A turning away from our own control, our idols of power and money, or maybe children or jobs. Good things can become idols in our lives. Repentance heals us with God and others. Remember repentance prepares our heart to be right with God. But repentance also applies in other relationships too. As we approach Lent, let us spend the coming days by repenting, fasting, praying, and asking the Lord if there are any relationships that need repairing. We cannot be right with God until we are right with our fellow man.

In the book of Joel (2:12-13) the Lord calls to Israel, “return to me with all your heart, with fasting, with weeping, and with mourning; and rend your hearts and not your garments.” In the Old Testament, people commonly expressed great grief and anguish by tearing their cloaks. More than caring about the proper “signs” of being upset about their sin, God cared that they actually grieved over them in their hearts — grieved to the point of weeping and mourning. In his famous psalm of repentance, David reminds us that God does not delight so much in the outward signs of repentance (which included making a sacrifice), but “the sacrifices of God are a broken spirit; a broken and contrite heart, O God, you will not despise”(Psalm 51:17). We’re not talking about the shame and condemnation the enemy wants to heap on us, but a godly grief.

True Christian repentance involves a heartfelt conviction of sin, a contrition over the offense to God, a turning away from the sinful way of life, and a turning towards a God-honoring way of life. The importance of repentance is hard to overstate. After all, Jesus’ first public exhortation was “Repent!” (Mark 1:15) - and if it was that high on Jesus’ list, we probably should pay attention too. Let us repair our broken relationship with God, our fellow brethren.

GROW AS A DISCIPLE | PRAY, STUDY, ENGAGE, SERVE

Since the Fall, the world has been riddled with strife and divisiveness. From the disobedience in the Garden, to Cain and Abel, to conflicts and wars throughout the centuries, it's clear that we humans are prone to picking sides and fighting over them. We hear about this even within the early Church from St. Paul in today's second reading. There were rivalries, and Christians were saying things such as, "I belong to Paul" or "I belong to Cephas." But Paul wisely asks: "Is Christ divided? Was Paul crucified for you? Or were you baptized in the name of Paul?" Clearly not. There is only one source of Truth - Jesus Christ - and Paul never hesitated to refuse credit for himself, and to instead glorify the Lord in his word and deed. This is the model set for us - to refuse to set ourselves or God-made-in-our-own-image over and against the Triune God who created us. Christ came to unite us with himself and to one another, in reconciliation with the Father. His words are now our words: Repent and believe in the Gospel. Pray for the grace to come together as the body of Christ so that we can be his hands and feet in the world and carry out the work he began.

PRAY The Lord has commissioned us to take the Gospel to the ends of the earth. Where we cannot go physically or in person, we can go in prayer. Bring before the Lord all who yet need to hear his voice and repent and believe. Pray for those who are persecuted for their belief in Jesus Christ.

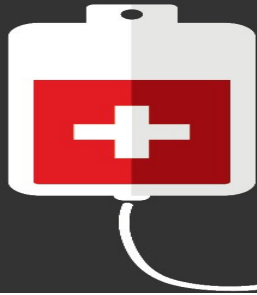

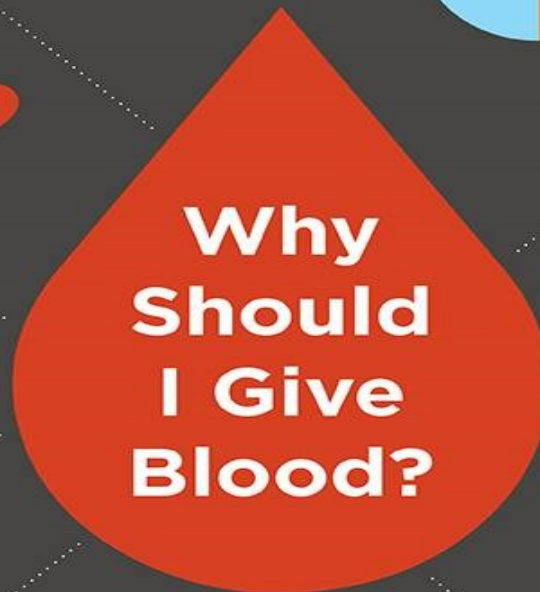

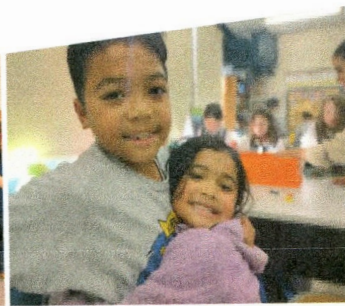

Rincón de Clero



Una vez se vio a un hombre rico conduciendo su automóvil Lamborghini por las calles de una ciudad concurrida. Mientras se detenía en un lugar particular para estacionar, un transeúnte curioso le comentó al conductor: "¡Oye, es sorprendente! Estás conduciendo un automóvil tan caro ... ¡pero no notaste que los vidrios de tu ventana trasera están rotos!" "Hay una razón para perseguir con los vidrios rotos...", respondió el hombre en el auto, "¡los vidrios rotos me recuerdan mi relación rota con mis hermanos!" "¿Eh?", inquirió el transeúnte con mayor curiosidad, "¿Cómo te recuerdan las 'ventanas rotas' de tu relación rota con tus hermanos?" "Bueno, entonces, escucha mi historia", dijo el hombre mientras continuaba, "Una vez estaba pasando por las calles, cruzando a toda velocidad en mi lujoso automóvil cuando de repente, ¡se escuchó un ruido de choque en la parte trasera! Vi que una piedra había caído. ¡Había sido arrojado contra mi auto! Con gran ira, me di cuenta de que era un chico traperero, quien había tirado la piedra! Mi sangre hirvió, de rabia, cuando detuve mi vehículo y me acerqué a él. Pero entonces lo vi, uniendo sus manos, mientras me suplicaba entre lágrimas: "Señor, mire a mi hermano menor... Me di cuenta de que un niño con las piernas paralizadas estaba acostado, con grandes cicatrices y moretones en las piernas. El niño continuó: 'Estaba cruzando la calle, ayudando a mi hermano cojo, cuando una bicicleta en movimiento rápido lo atropelló, dejándolo con una pierna sangrando. Llamé a muchas personas en busca de ayuda... ¡pero a nadie le importó! Finalmente, en mi impotencia, decidí tirar una piedra al vehículo que vendría a continuación, ¡para pedir ayuda! El niño continuó: 'Señor, lamento mucho que su costoso automóvil esté dañado. Pero, créeme, ¡esta era la única forma en que podía buscar ayuda para mi hermano herido!' Se me llenaron los ojos de lágrimas cuando le dije al niño: "¡Seguramente las ventanas de mi auto están rotas! ¡Pero también son un recordatorio de que a veces, tenemos que permitir que Dios rompa ciertas cosas, para recordarnos que debemos detenernos y ayudar! ¡Que necesitamos depender de Dios en todos los aspectos de la vida! ¡Seguramente, estas ventanas rotas son una señal del recordatorio de Dios para mí sobre mi relación rota con Dios y con mis hermanos!"

Encontramos en la lectura del evangelio de este domingo que Jesús está comenzando su ministerio con un llamado al arrepentimiento. El arrepentimiento significa reparar nuestra relación rota con Dios y con nuestros hermanos en este mundo. La palabra hebrea traducida como "arrepentirse" significa volver atrás. El arrepentimiento significa volverse a Dios. Nuestra palabra en inglés "arrepentirse" se define: "cambiar la forma en que piensas". Es un cambio de mentalidad, un volverse a Dios, lejos de nuestro egoísmo, codicia, orgullo y falta de perdón. Un alejamiento de nuestro propio control, nuestros ídolos del poder y el dinero, o tal vez hijos o trabajos. Las cosas buenas pueden convertirse en ídolos en nuestras vidas. El arrepentimiento nos sana con Dios y con los demás. Recuerde que el arrepentimiento prepara nuestro corazón para estar bien con Dios. Pero el arrepentimiento también se aplica en otras relaciones. A medida que nos acercamos a la Cuaresma, pasemos los próximos días arrepintiéndonos, ayunando, orando y preguntando al Señor si hay alguna relación que necesite reparación. No podemos estar bien con Dios hasta que estemos bien con nuestro prójimo.

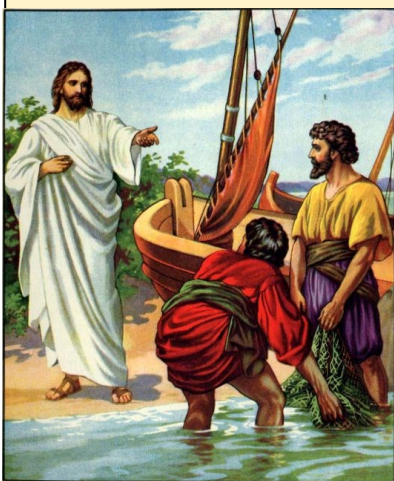
En el libro de Joel (2:12-13) el Señor llama a Israel, "vuélvase a mí de todo corazón, con ayuno, llanto y lamento; y rasgad nuestros corazones y no nuestras vestiduras." En el Antiguo Testamento, la gente comúnmente expresaba gran dolor y angustia rasgando sus mantos. Más que preocuparse por las "señales" apropiadas de estar molestos por su pecado, Dios se preocupó de que realmente se entristecieron por ellos en sus corazones, entristecidos hasta el punto de llorar y lamentarse. En su famoso salmo de arrepentimiento, David nos recuerda que Dios no se deleita tanto en las señales externas de arrepentimiento (que incluían hacer un sacrificio), sino que "los sacrificios de Dios son un espíritu quebrantado; un corazón quebrantado y contrito, oh Dios, no lo despreciarás" (Salmo 51:17). No estamos hablando de la vergüenza y la condenación que el enemigo quiere amontonar sobre nosotros, sino de un dolor piadoso.

El verdadero arrepentimiento cristiano implica una convicción sincera de pecado, una contrición por la ofensa a Dios, un alejamiento de la forma de vida pecaminosa y un cambio hacia una forma de vida que honra a Dios. Es difícil exagerar la importancia del arrepentimiento. Después de todo, la primera exhortación pública de Jesús fue "¡Arrepentíos!" (Marcos 1:15) - y si estaba tan alto en la lista de Jesús, probablemente también deberíamos prestar atención. Reparemos nuestra relación rota con Dios, nuestros hermanos.

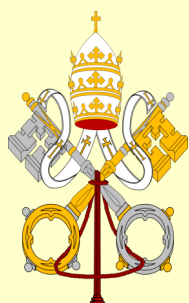
