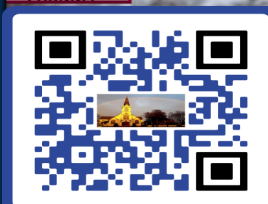

My dear St. Ignatius Parish family,

One of our favorite national pastimes is "passing the buck." We have all played this game of letting someone else do what we should be doing, of handling a job, a responsibility, or an assignment. We particularly like to pass the buck when listening to sermons. We think that some of the best homilies, retreats, conferences, and lectures we hear are "meant for someone else." We listen and say: "That's good advice for my kids," "My neighbors should have heard this homily," or "That's aimed at my office staff," and so on. And that is precisely what Jesus' hometown people did. They did not acknowledge that they were poor, blind, or prisoners who needed a savior and liberator. Hence, they not only rejected Jesus and His "liberation theology," but also tried to eliminate him from the world as their ancestors had killed the prophets sent to them by God.

Wednesday is the **Feast of the Presentation of the Lord**. February 2, forty days after Christmas, has been given the name Candlemas since one tradition associated with this feast is the blessing of candles used in prayer. Since 1997, the Presentation of the Lord has been recognized as the World Day for Consecrated Life for women and men in consecrated life who are called to reflect the light of Jesus Christ to all people. The celebration of World Day for Consecrated Life is transferred to the following Sunday to highlight the gift of consecrated persons for the whole Church. Please pray for our Nuns at St. Ignatius Convent, and in next week's bulletin, we will acknowledge their outstanding service to God and society. Fr. Francis and I belong to a religious order, "Order of the Imitation of Christ" (OIC), commonly known as "Bethany Ashram." Please keep our Order in your prayers.

February 3 is the optional memorial of **Saint Blaise**. Using unlit candles that were blessed the previous day, this memorial of the fourth-century bishop and martyr traditionally includes the blessing of throats. A general version of the blessing will follow the Holy Mass at the 7:00 am and 9:00 am Mass on Thursday.

This weekend is the beginning of **National Catholic Schools Week**. The theme for this annual observance is "Catholic Schools – Faith. Excellence. Service." Quality academic standards are practiced and maintained in catholic schools. Because of high standards and rigorous instruction, the students learn the standard educational subjects and art, music, language, study skills, and the skills needed to be lifelong learners.

Catholic school offers many opportunities for students and families to put their faith into action through service, projects, and other similar giving endeavors. The catholic schools teach students to become future servant leaders, faith-filled disciples, and enriched citizens in our community. These shared qualities make Catholic schools succeed. Faith development, academic excellence, and dedication to service set Catholic schools apart from other educational options. Please consider opting for catholic schools for your children/grandchildren if your resources allow. As our good neighbor, Holy Family School in Hicksville and other schools will offer scholarships and financial aid to accommodate deserving students into the catholic educational system.

Let us continue to pray for our beautiful parish and one another.

GROW AS A DISCIPLE | PRAY, STUDY, ENGAGE, SERVE

Wait, what? One moment the people of Nazareth embrace Jesus, but as soon as he challenges them the crowd turns on a dime, and moves toward throwing him off a cliff. The Son of God, also the son of a carpenter, goes from hometown hero to *persona non grata* just like that, prefiguring his death on the cross and giving credence to his admonition that “no prophet is accepted in his own native place.” From the earliest moments of his public ministry as recorded in Luke, Jesus’ love for us is prominent. He never faltered. He never wavered. He moved forward to continue his mission of fulfilling God’s will for him, and be a sacrifice once and for all for our sins. Perhaps we have had a similar experience of being the “hero” for someone, only to somehow end up the goat. It is not easy to remain steadfast in our daily mission to love as Jesus loved. Today’s readings assure us that God will give us the grace to do so.

GO EVANGELIZE

PRAYER, INVITATION, WITNESS, ACCOMPANIMENT

It can be challenging to square Paul’s eulogy of love with the reality of day-to-day living with a spouse, family members, and friends. Love is patient ... *except when I’m late getting out to the car for church again.* Love is kind ... *except between crabby siblings who want to watch different shows on Netflix.* It is not quick-tempered ... *unless you thoughtlessly back into my car in the driveway.* It occurs to me that perhaps Paul’s words aren’t entirely about us, but about the perfect love of God. It’s pretty amazing to think that God loves us in all the ways Paul describes. As we open our hearts to God’s love and deepen our relationship with Jesus through prayer, we may find that love spilling over into our daily interactions. For when we are kind, we love; when we are patient, we love; when we are not quick-tempered, we love.

PRAY Although our love for one another is imperfect, we must strive to love as Jesus loved each day, and there is no better place to start than prayer. Ask a friend or family member this week if they have any concerns you can include in your prayers. Or request a Mass for someone who is going through a tough time or who has recently died.

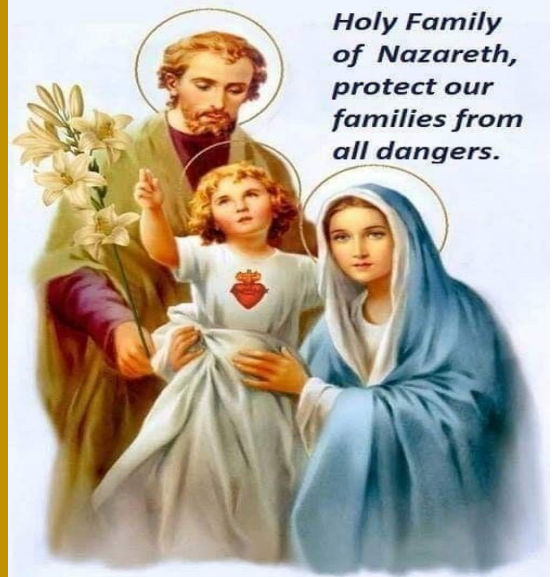

Thoughtful Moments

Through the eyes of a child

In teaching our children about the Catholic faith, we have the chance to learn again for ourselves. Let a child's wonder about the mysteries of God's love awaken your own sense of excitement. In connecting with your children, you may find you are reconnecting with the child in yourself.



Telling is not tattling

Sometimes children encounter or witness situations they can't handle. For example, they may see that a friend is overwhelmed and in danger but has no one to help. Youngsters may be afraid that seeking help for the friend is "tattling." Remind children periodically that as a parent, you are on the same team. Telling isn't the same as tattling. Everyone needs help sometimes.

"His divine power has granted to us all things that pertain to life and godliness, through the knowledge of him who called us to his own glory and excellence" (2 Peter 1:3).



The five Rs of raising Catholic children

There is no one formula for raising devout Catholic children into faithful Catholic adults, but we can utilize a strategy that has helped many parents and families. These five Rs can help you shape your parenting strategy.

Receive the sacraments frequently. Sacraments are direct encounters with Christ and we need them to keep our souls alive. Baptize babies as soon as possible after birth. Make an immovable monthly date for family Confession. Bring children to Mass every Sunday and holy day of obligation.

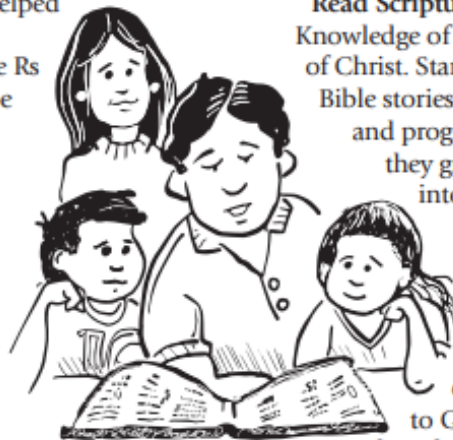
Raise children in the Faith. If they don't attend Catholic school, enroll them in your parish religious education program. Support their formation from

kindergarten all the way through high school graduation. Put sports and clubs second.

Read Scripture as a family. Knowledge of Scripture is knowledge of Christ. Start with simple toddler Bible stories when they are small, and progress to the real Bible as they grow. Incorporate these into evening story time.

Remember to pray - often - together. Model daily prayer for children and encourage them to talk to God regularly. Teach them basic Catholic prayers and devotions. Pray in the morning, the evening, at meals (even in public), when there's trouble and when there is joy.

Remain steadfast. Don't let anything or anyone lure your family from God's friendship. Rely on His grace and trust Him.



Why Do Catholics Do That ?

Why do Catholics have candles blessed on February 2?

In the liturgical calendar, February 2 is the Feast of the Presentation of Jesus in the temple, when Jesus was dedicated to God. At that time, Simeon greeted Mary, took the infant Savior in his arms and praised God, "Mine



own eyes have seen your salvation... a light to reveal you to the nations" (Luke 2:30-32). For this reason, priests traditionally bless candles - a liturgical symbol of Christ - and give them to the people. Thus, the feast is called, Candlemas Day.

Give your children lots of gifts

If you could give your child any gift in the world, what would it be? The truth is that you know that what the world can offer won't make him or her happy. Instead, pray frequently and fervently for gifts that will. Consider making petitions for these gifts part of your prayers for your children:

Wisdom. Ask that your child be inspired to avoid poor choices and have the wisdom to lead Gospel-centered lives.

Courage. Fortify him to stand for justice and speak out against bigotry, unfairness, and cruelty.

Strength. Pray that as she grows she will withstand



negative peer pressure.

Compassion. Help him follow Jesus' commandment to love one another.

Discernment. Give children the skills to select healthy friendships.

Independence. Ask that children care less about what other people think of them and be more interested in pleasing God.

Faith. Faith in God, the teachings of Christ, Scripture, and the teachings of the Church are the foundation for a healthy life and eternal salvation. These gifts will make children happy forever.

In this Gospel passage, Jesus compared our deeds to the fruits on the trees. If the tree is good, it will produce good fruit, just as if a person is good, his words and actions are likely to be good. It would be less likely for a bad person to regularly do many virtuous deeds.

Jesus extends the "good trees, good fruit" parable to our speech. Just as you can measure the health of a tree by its fruit, you can check the condition of your heart by the quality of your words. This is because our "heart" -



our deepest center - is the origin of our actions, including our words. Whether we are at peace or angry affects what we do.

What can a parent do? Teach children that words do matter and that how they talk can affect others for good or bad.

Words are the easiest way we can imitate Jesus. If our words are uplifting, kind, truthful and try to bring peace to others, then that is a good sign we are heading in the right direction.

Feasts & Celebrations

Feb. 2 - St. Catherine of Ricci (1590). St. Catherine was born to a prominent banker. Against her father's wishes, she joined the Dominicans when she was twelve. She is known for her visions of the Lord's Passion, which she experienced every Friday.

Feb. 11 - Our Lady of Lourdes (1858). A heavenly lady appeared to St. Bernadette Soubirous, a poor, sickly girl from a French village. A miraculous spring with healing waters emerged from a nearby cave. The beautiful lady revealed herself as the "Immaculate Conception"

- the Blessed Virgin Mary.

Feb. 19 - St. Barbatus (c. 682). From Benevento, Italy, St. Barbatus tried to convert his town from paganism. In a last-ditch effort, he described what they would suffer when Emperor Constans II besieged the city. The whole city converted promptly, and he was elected bishop soon after.

Feb. 22 - St. Peter's Chair. Marking St. Peter's establishment of the Holy See, on this festival we thank God for His Church and pray for its holy preservation.



Parent TALK

As children, we never missed Mass. That's why I was shocked when my brother recently declared that he doesn't take his children to Mass. "It's enough that I bring them to religious education class every week," he said. "We're too busy for Mass, too."



Why would anyone teach children a religion but prevent them from practicing it? In class children learn about a Catholic's serious obligation to attend Mass and the wonderful graces we get from the Eucharist. At home, they learn that soccer practice or birthday parties come before Mass. Sports before Jesus? How confusing!

I gave my brother a copy of *Follow the Way of Love*, a message to families from the U.S. bishops. It's about how God's love is experienced in a family and how it is supported by the whole Church. Hopefully it will help him see being Catholic as a gift and not a burden.

Three traditional vows

There are three traditional vows of poverty, chastity, and obedience, which most religious profess today.

The traditional three vows locate this specification in the attitude and behavior of the religious in the areas of the three major dimensions of human life (possession, affectivity and power) which are simultaneously the three major areas of human interaction which structure the world (economics, social life, and politics).

FORMULA OF THE INSTITUTE

- In 1524 Francis, Ignatius, and six other men met in Paris inside a crypt beneath a church.
- They made private vows of poverty, chastity, obedience to the pope, and go to the Holy Land to convert infidels.
- Francis then studied theology and was ordained on 1537.
- Ignatius made a new order that was approved by Pope Paul III called "Formula of the Institute."

Mi querida familia de la Parroquia de San Ignacio,



Uno de nuestros pasatiempos nacionales favoritos es "pasar la pelota". Todos hemos jugado este juego de dejar que alguien más haga lo que deberíamos estar haciendo, de entregar un trabajo, una responsabilidad o una asignación. Particularmente nos gusta pasar la pelota cuando escuchamos sermones. Creemos que algunas de las mejores homilias, retiros, conferencias y disertaciones que escuchamos están "destinadas a otra persona". 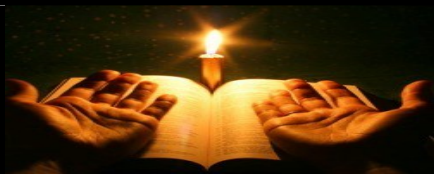
