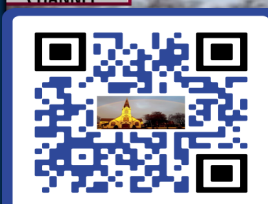

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**WORLD MISSION SUNDAY**

*On this World Mission Sunday, let us show our belief in Christ, for all the world to see*

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Reflections on the readings for the Thirtieth Sunday in Ordinary Time (October 24, 2021): JER 31:7-9; PS 126:1-2, 2-3, 4-5, 6; HEB 5:1-6; MK 10:46-52

Today we celebrate World Mission Sunday. It is our yearly opportunity to honor our life as Catholics through the special call we received at Baptism to be missionaries. It also reminds us of the service offered by the Church's missionaries in bearing Christ's message of salvation to all people in all lands. The Gospel for this Thirtieth Sunday in Ordinary Time is wonderfully appropriate in revealing the life-changing joy that can come to us as followers of our Lord and Redeemer. We meet Jesus as He is traveling with His disciples and a crowd of people who want to stay in His company as long as possible. They pass a blind man sitting by the side of the road begging. His name is Bartimaeus. Obviously, he has already heard of Jesus' message and miracles; so he shouts out, acknowledging Jesus as the Son of David and asking for His pity. The people try to quiet him; after all, he is loud and annoying and trying to get Jesus' attention. But He hears Bartimaeus and tells the others to send him forward. "He threw aside his cloak, sprang up, and came to Jesus. Jesus said to him... 'What do you want Me to do for you?' The blind man replied to Him, 'Master, I want to see.' Jesus told him, 'Go on your way; your faith has saved you.' Immediately he received his sight and followed Him on the way" (Mark 10:50-52).



This man, a blind beggar, would have been of little account to his neighbors. Yet he was able to see more clearly than many who followed Jesus. He already believed that He was the Messiah and trusted Him to heal his blindness. The way he jumped up to run to our Lord and then instantly followed Him when he received his sight reveal just how much Bartimaeus rejoiced, not only in having his eyes opened, but also in his faith. Unlike many who believe, he did not hesitate to express his gratitude with exuberance. Let us willingly show our belief in the Christ who heals spiritual blindness as joyfully as Bartimaeus – for all the world to see.

*On this World Mission Sunday, let us also "speak" of our faith, through our prayers and financial help to the Society for the Propagation of the Faith. Our generosity on this Sunday, combined with what is offered in churches and chapels around the globe, join us to the efforts of missionaries who proclaim the Gospel and serve the poor.*

## Quotes from the message of Pope Francis for the celebration of World Mission Sunday 2021.

### WE CANNOT KEEP THE LORD TO OURSELVES

Once we experience the power of God's love, and recognize His fatherly presence in our personal and community life, we cannot help but proclaim and share what we have seen and heard.... "Go therefore to the highways and byways, and invite everyone you find" (Mt 22:9). No one is excluded, no one need feel distant or removed from this compassionate love.... As Christians, we cannot keep the Lord to ourselves: the Church's evangelizing mission finds outward fulfillment in the transformation of our world and in the care of creation.... The theme of this year's World Mission (Sun)day – "We cannot but speak about what we have seen and heard" (Acts 4:20), is a summons to each of us to "own" and to bring to others what we hear in our hearts.

### THE EXPERIENCE OF THE APOSTLES

The first Christians began the life of faith amid hostility and hardship...those experiences impelled them to turn problems, conflicts and difficulties into opportunities for mission... Nothing and no one was to be excluded from the message of liberation. Like the Apostles and the first Christians, we too can say with complete conviction: "We cannot but speak about what we have seen and heard" (Acts 4:20). Everything we have received from the Lord is meant to be put to good use and freely shared with others....The first Christians, far from yielding to the temptation to become an elite group, were inspired by the Lord and His offer of new life to go out among the nations and to bear witness to what they had seen and heard: the good news that the Kingdom of God is at hand....

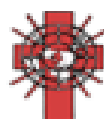
### THE PANDEMIC NECESSITATES MISSION OF COMPASSION

The pandemic has brought to the fore and amplified the pain, the solitude, the poverty, and the injustices experienced by so many people. In these days of pandemic.... there is urgent need for the mission of compassion, which can make that necessary (social) distancing an opportunity for encounter, care and promotion. "What we have seen and heard" (Acts 4:20), the mercy we have experienced, can thus become a point of reference and a source of credibility enabling us to recover a shared passion for building "a community of belonging and solidarity worthy of our time, our energy and our resources" (Fratelli Tutti, 36).

### AN INVITATION TO EACH OF US

On World Mission (Sun)day, which we celebrate on the penultimate Sunday of October, we recall with gratitude all those men and women who by their testimony of life help us to renew our baptismal commitment to be generous and joyful apostles of the Gospel. Let us remember especially all those who resolutely set out, leaving home and family behind, to bring the Gospel to all those places and people athirst for its saving message. To be on mission is to be willing to think as Christ does, to believe with Him that those around us are also my brothers and sisters. May His compassionate love touch our hearts and make us all true missionary disciples.

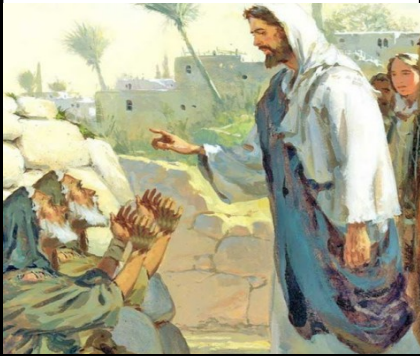

**Jesus healed a demoniac who was blind and mute. ( Matthew 12:22-23 )**



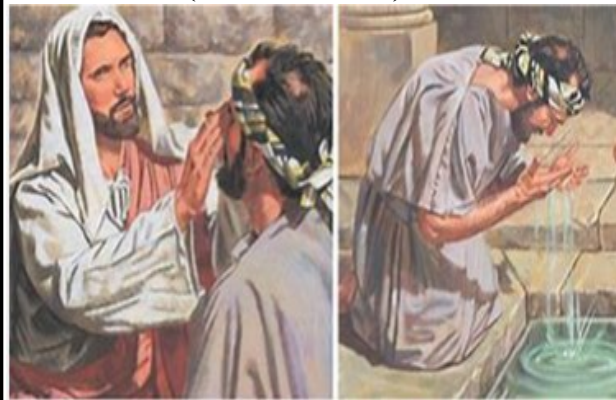
**Today's Gospel : Jesus healed a blind man named Bartimaeus while coming into Jericho.**

**Healing the blind was one of the signs that was prophesized of the Messiah in Isaiah 35:5-6 and Isaiah 61:1-2 which was quoted by Jesus Himself in Luke 4:17-21 and Luke 7:18-23 . Jesus is the light of the world, and so only He can turn darkness into light.**

**GROW AS A DISCIPLE | PRAY, STUDY, ENGAGE, SERVE**

How often do we pray with abandon? Perhaps when turbulence makes us wonder if our plane's going down, when a friend or loved one faces a difficult diagnosis or life-threatening injury, when we face a setback, a major decision, or a heartbreak. On some days, though, have we been guilty of just going through the motions when we pray? Not so for Bartimaeus. "Jesus, son of David, have pity on me," he repeatedly implores, ignoring the shushing of the crowd. When Jesus asks him what he wants, the blind man doesn't beat around the bush. "I want to see." Recognizing his faith, Jesus heals him. Bartimaeus could not see, yet he had recognized Jesus as the Messiah and persisted in prayer. His example reminds us to be persistent in prayer, holding nothing back from Jesus who desires to make us whole.

**GO EVANGELIZE**

**PRAYER, INVITATION, WITNESS, ACCOMPANIMENT**

While Bartimaeus faced physical blindness, this did not prevent him from recognizing Jesus as the Son of David, the Messiah. In our modern-day world so filled with distractions, we can become blind to the face of Jesus, or simply take his abundant love for us for granted. As the psalmist reminds us, "The Lord has done great things for us. We are filled with joy." Looking back on our lives, we can probably see a few miracles - the birth of a child, the stunning beauty of a sunrise over the mountains or the arborvitae in our backyards, the friends who walk alongside us through each chapter of life. Today's readings encourage us to open our eyes to the face of Jesus in our lives, and in turn to reflect his steadfast love to those we encounter.

**PRAY** Read today's psalm response: "The Lord has done great things for us; we are filled with joy." Reflect on experiences and people who have brought you closer to God - friends, family, or your parish priest. Write them a note or say a prayer of thanksgiving.

**ST. IGNATIAN YEAR CORNER**

**Friendship with St. Francis Xavier**

It began in 1527 at the University of Paris, where nineteen-year-old Francis shared room with fifteen years older Ignatius. Francis was a promising scholar and athlete. At first, Francis who was proud and ambitious, at that time ridiculed Ignatius for his piety. But Ignatius, on the other hand was loving and he saw the hidden potential of Francis and worked hard to win him over as a friend. Ignatius helped Francis out of his serious financial difficulties. Ignatius then guided Francis through an intensive, month-long personal retreat designed to encourage full surrender to God. He used some of the notes from his book of "spiritual exercises," the experiences of his own spiritual life, to guide Francis. This powerful experience of repentance and conversion made Francis to give his life to Jesus. In fact later in life, Francis regarded Ignatius with the deepest affection and gratitude, and called him as "the father of my soul." Francis went on to become the greatest missionary since St. Paul in the sixteenth-century, and spread the gospel in India, Indonesia, and Japan.

**Ignatian Spirituality on Missionary works**

The Jesuits practiced the concept of "Apostolic Mission" which included priority of prayer, the Trinitarian missio Dei (God's mission), the positive embrace of creation and culture, a commitment to seek God in all things, to go wherever others needed help and to enable them to help others, and choose ministries according to what most served the universal good.

**Reflexiones sobre las lecturas del Trigésimo Domingo del Tiempo Ordinario (24 de octubre de 2021) Jer. 31,7-9; Sal. 126, 1-2.2-3.4-5.6; Heb. 5,1-6; Mc. 10, 46-52**

Hoy celebramos el Domingo Mundial de las Misiones. Es nuestra oportunidad anual de honrar nuestra vida como católicos a través de la llamada especial que recibimos en el bautismo para ser misioneros. También nos recuerda el servicio que prestan los misioneros de la Iglesia al llevar el mensaje de salvación de Cristo a todos los pueblos de todas las naciones. El Evangelio de este trigésimo domingo del tiempo ordinario es maravillosamente apropiado para revelar el gozo de cambiar nuestra vida como seguidores de nuestro Señor y Redentor. "Y el ciego, arrojando su manto, se puso de pie de un salto y fue hacia él. Jesús le preguntó: «¿Qué quieres que haga por ti? Él le respondió: «Maestro, que yo pueda ver». Jesús le dijo: «Vete, tu fe te ha salvado». En seguida comenzó a ver y lo siguió por el camino." (Mc. 10:50-52).



Este hombre, un mendigo ciego, habría sido de poca importancia para sus vecinos. Sin embargo, era capaz de ver con más claridad que muchos de los que seguían a Jesús. Él ya creía que Jesús era el Mesías y confiaba en que curaría su ceguera. La forma en que se levantó para correr hacia nuestro Señor y luego lo siguió al instante, después de ser curado, revela cuánto se regocijó Bartimeo, no sólo por tener los ojos abiertos, sino también por su fe. A diferencia de muchos creyentes, no dudó en expresar abiertamente su gratitud. Mostremos de buen grado nuestra fe en el Cristo que cura la ceguera espiritual con la misma alegría que Bartimeo, para que todo el mundo lo vea.

## Citas del mensaje del Papa Francisco para la celebración de la Jornada Mundial de las Misiones 2021.

### NO PODEMOS RESERVAR AL SEÑOR PARA NOSOTROS MISMOS:

Cuando experimentamos la fuerza del amor de Dios, cuando reconocemos su presencia de Padre en nuestra vida personal y comunitaria, no podemos dejar de anunciar y compartir lo que hemos visto y oído. La relación de Jesús con sus discípulos, su humanidad que se nos revela en el misterio de la encarnación, en su Evangelio y en su Pascua nos hacen ver hasta qué punto Dios ama nuestra humanidad y hace suyos nuestros gozos y sufrimientos, nuestros deseos y nuestras angustias (cf. Conc. Ecum. Vat. II, Const. past. Gaudium et spes, 22). Todo en Cristo nos recuerda que el mundo en el que vivimos y su necesidad de redención no le es ajena y nos convoca también a sentirnos parte activa de esta misión: «Salgan al cruce de los caminos e inviten a todos los que encuentren» (Mt 22,9). Nadie es ajeno, nadie puede sentirse extraño o lejano a este amor de compasión.

### LA EXPERIENCIA DE LOS APÓSTOLES

La historia de la evangelización comienza con una búsqueda apasionada del Señor que llama y quiere entablar con cada persona, allí donde se encuentra, un diálogo de amistad (cf. Jn 15,12-17). Los apóstoles son los primeros en dar cuenta de eso, hasta recuerdan el día y la hora en que fueron encontrados: «Era alrededor de las cuatro de la tarde» (Jn 1,39). La amistad con el Señor, verlo curar a los enfermos, comer con los pecadores, alimentar a los hambrientos, acercarse a los excluidos, tocar a los impuros, identificarse con los necesitados, invitar a las bienaventuranzas, enseñar de una manera nueva y llena de autoridad, deja una huella imborrable, capaz de suscitar el asombro, y una alegría expansiva y gratuita que no se puede contener. Como decía el profeta Jeremías, esta experiencia es el fuego ardiente de su presencia activa en nuestro corazón que nos impulsa a la misión, aunque a veces comporte sacrificios e incomprendimientos (cf. 20,7-9). El amor siempre está en movimiento y nos pone en movimiento para compartir el anuncio más hermoso y esperanzador: «Hemos encontrado al Mesías» (Jn 1,41).

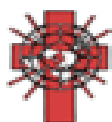
### LA PANDEMIA HACER URGIR LA MISIÓN DE LA COMPASIÓN
