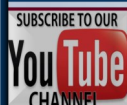

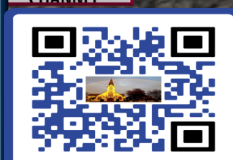

GROW AS A DISCIPLE | PRAY, STUDY, ENGAGE, SERVE

Don't get me wrong. I love vacations and weekends away. But the night and day before? It's always a whirlwind of laundry, packing, and shopping for groceries and essential car snacks. I knew we were going away. I could have gotten my act together earlier. Next trip, I tell myself. Then the cycle repeats itself. Advent can be that way. This year's going to be the year! No rushing around, no crazy last-minute shopping, no stress: I'm going to study the daily readings, read that Advent devotional, settle into the season of waiting. Today's readings speak not only to procrastinators like me but also to the planners: Wherever we are on that continuum, Advent gives us an opportunity to ready our souls for Jesus' coming. It's less about what we do when than about preparing our hearts. Through prayer, study and the liturgies of this season, we can ask God to help us clean house within and prepare for Jesus' coming.

GO EVANGELIZE

PRAYER, INVITATION, WITNESS, ACCOMPANIMENT

Today is not only the first Sunday of Advent, but the first day of the liturgical year. Today's readings encourage us to prepare for Christ's coming. I love St. Paul's imagery: "Let us then throw off the works of darkness and put on the armor of light. Let us ... put on the Lord Jesus Christ." Just as we make resolutions for the new calendar year, Advent affords us an opportunity to start anew. However, the gift of our faith reminds us that we are not alone in this! We can seek the help of the Holy Spirit through prayer and turn to the accountability partners who sit in the pews next to us at Sunday Mass. We, in turn, can be a light to others through our words, attitudes, and actions. As we light our houses and light our Christmas trees this year, we can remember to put on the armor of light ourselves as we begin this holy season.

ACTION Even with the best of intentions, the holiday season can become busy. As you go about errands or prepare your home, make an effort to listen to Advent hymns or reflections.

Life and the Sunken Submarine

We all like to read mystery novels. Sometimes we are tempted to flip to the last chapter to see how the story ends. The longer the book, the greater the temptation! If you do peek in and read the last chapter, of course, you will spoil the story and all the suspense is gone.

Our lives and the life of this world are profound mysteries. We are not sure how they will turn out to be, but we would certainly like to know. Well, we do know how they are supposed to turn out and we even know how our world will end from the Bible. Interestingly though, knowing this in no way spoils the story of life. The truth is that knowing it helps to guide and direct us through this life on earth.

Today, we begin the season of Advent. It may seem strange to begin Advent by talking about the end of the world (Mt. 24: 37- 44). After all, Advent leads up to Christmas, the feast of the beginning of our salvation. The truth is that the Church is giving us a glimpse of the final chapter of the great mystery of salvation. Today, we are getting at least some idea of how the story will turn out; and knowing it is very important to us.

We have to live on this earth with the realization that we are meant for a greater life with God in heaven. The Vatican Council reminds us: "The Church [people of God] will attain her full perfection only in the glory of heaven."

Someone has compared our lives to being in a sunken submarine. Somehow, in the submarine everything is working except the apparatus that raises the submarine to the surface. While in the sunken submarine, you must do two things. The first is that you must survive. You must eat and drink, sleep, recreate and so on.

The second thing you must do is to work hard to get the submarine back to the surface. You will no doubt make every effort to get some kind of contact with the surface. If you fail to do any of these, you are doomed. If during the long time that it takes to make repairs and you fail to take care of yourself, you will die before the work can be accomplished. On the other hand, if you become so satisfied with life in the sunken ship that you give up working to get it back to the surface, you are indeed very foolish; and you will die on the bottom of the sea.

In this world, we must carry on our everyday activities, but we must do so with the idea that we are working to reach heaven. God wants us to live as true human beings: to eat, drink, work and enjoy ourselves. But it would certainly be a great temptation to become so satisfied with our present existence as to forget all about heaven.

The Vatican Council speaks of the Church as a Pilgrim Church. This is to say that we are people on a pilgrimage, a journey to heaven. During this journey, we have a special food to sustain us, the Body and Blood of Christ in Holy Communion. The Holy Mass is also our chief "contact with the surface." For in the Mass and other sacraments, we speak to God through our prayers and He speaks to us in the words of Scripture and the homily.


During this Advent season, let us look forward to the feast of Christmas, the beginning of our salvation; we should do so with the realization of how God wants the story to end. God wills that, at the end of time, we join His Son, Jesus Christ, in glory and live forever.

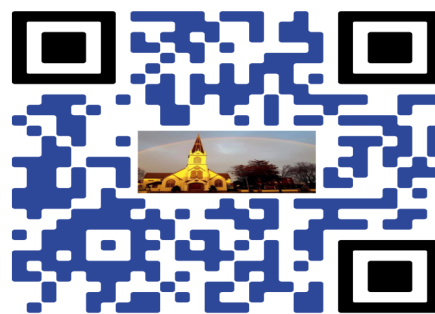


Stewardship

First Sunday of Advent

Bulletin Reflection: In today's Gospel, Jesus tells us to always stay on guard and to keep away from sin. We do not know the day or the hour when He comes back.

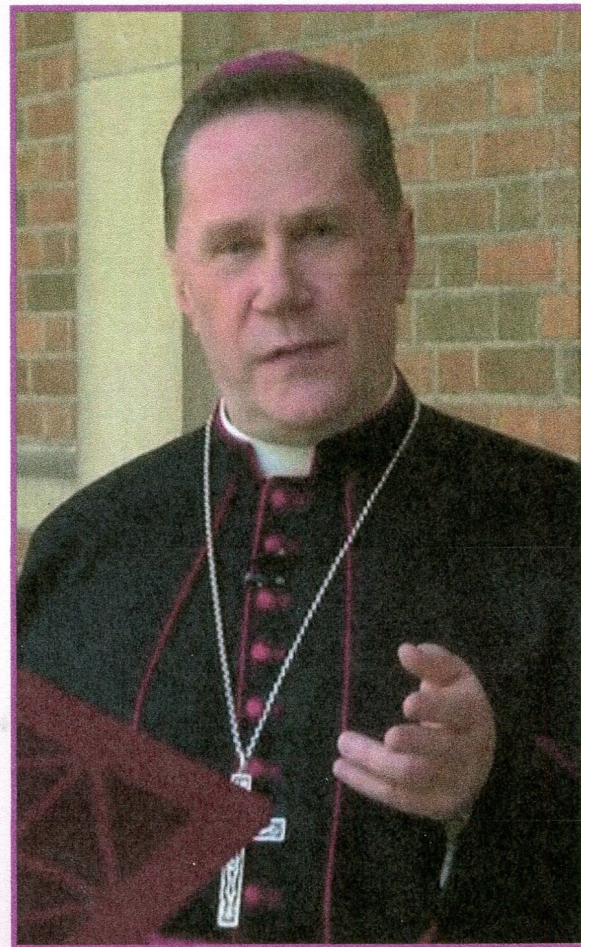

La vida y el submarino hundido

A todos nos gusta leer novelas de misterio. A veces tenemos la tentación de pasar al último capítulo para ver cómo termina la historia. ¡Cuanto más largo es el libro, mayor es la tentación! Si echa un vistazo y lee el último capítulo, por supuesto, arruinará la historia y todo el suspenso desaparecerá.

Nuestras vidas y la vida de este mundo son profundos misterios. No estamos seguros de cómo resultará, pero ciertamente nos gustaría saberlo. Bueno, sabemos cómo se supone que van a resultar e incluso sabemos cómo terminará nuestro mundo por la Biblia. Sin embargo, curiosamente, saber esto de ninguna manera estropea la historia de la vida. La verdad es que saberlo ayuda a guiarnos y encaminarnos a través de esta vida en la tierra.

Hoy comenzamos el tiempo de Adviento. Puede parecer extraño comenzar el Adviento hablando del fin del mundo (Mt. 24, 37-44). Después de todo, el Adviento conduce a la Navidad, la fiesta del comienzo de nuestra salvación. La verdad es que la Iglesia nos está dejando entrever el último capítulo del gran misterio de la salvación. Hoy, tenemos al menos una idea de cómo resultará la historia; y saberlo es muy importante para nosotros.

Tenemos que vivir en esta tierra con la comprensión de que estamos destinados a una vida mejor con Dios en el cielo. El Concilio Vaticano nos recuerda: "La Iglesia [pueblo de Dios] sólo alcanzará su plena perfección en la gloria del cielo".

Alguien ha comparado nuestra vida con estar en un submarino hundido. De alguna manera, en el submarino todo funciona excepto el aparato que sube el submarino a la superficie. Mientras estás en el submarino hundido, debes hacer dos cosas. La primera es que debes sobrevivir. Debes comer y beber, dormir, recrearte, etc.

Lo segundo que debes hacer es trabajar duro para que el submarino vuelva a la superficie. Sin duda, hará todo lo posible para obtener algún tipo de contacto con la superficie. Si fallas en hacer alguno de estos, estás condenado. Si durante el largo tiempo que lleva hacer las reparaciones no se cuida a sí mismo, morirá antes de que se pueda realizar el trabajo. Por otro lado, si te sientes tan satisfecho con la vida en el barco hundido que dejas de trabajar para que vuelva a la superficie, en verdad eres muy tonto; y morirás en el fondo del mar.

En este mundo, debemos realizar nuestras actividades cotidianas, pero debemos hacerlo con la idea de que estamos trabajando para llegar al cielo. Dios quiere que vivamos como verdaderos seres humanos: que comamos, bebamos, trabajemos y disfrutemos. Pero ciertamente sería una gran tentación estar tan satisfechos con nuestra existencia presente como para olvidarnos del cielo.

El Concilio Vaticano habla de la Iglesia como Iglesia peregrina. Esto quiere decir que somos personas en peregrinación, un viaje al cielo. Durante este camino, tenemos un alimento especial para sustentarnos, el Cuerpo y la Sangre de Cristo en la Sagrada Comunión. La Santa Misa es también nuestro principal "contacto con la superficie". Porque en la Misa y otros sacramentos, hablamos con Dios a través de nuestras oraciones y Él nos habla con las palabras de la Escritura y la homilía.

Durante este tiempo de Adviento, miremos hacia la fiesta de Navidad, el comienzo de nuestra salvación; debemos hacerlo con la comprensión de cómo Dios quiere que termine la historia. Dios quiere que, al final de los tiempos, nos unamos a Su Hijo, Jesucristo, en la gloria y vivamos para siempre.

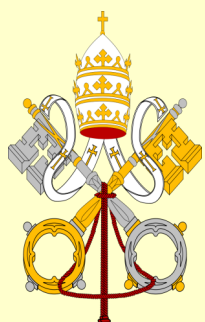
