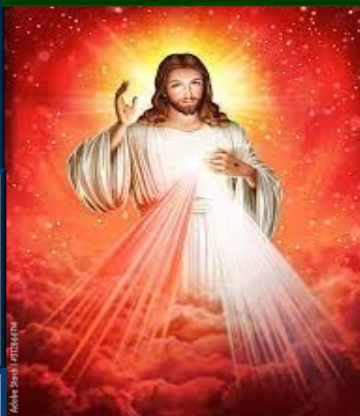

Dear Brothers and Sisters in Christ:

In our Gospel for the First Sunday of Lent, Saint Matthew tells us that before Jesus began His public ministry, He was "led by the Spirit into the desert" (*Mt. 4:1*), where He prayed, fasted, and gave Himself over to a life of Gospel poverty. *Lent is the sacred time in which, following the example of Jesus, we are led by the same Holy Spirit into the solitude of the desert to deepen our relationship with the Father and purify our hearts to become like the Son. The Spirit that draws each of us into this period of preparation does so through the practices of prayer, fasting, and almsgiving. These three pillars of Lenten observance call us away from the selfishness of sin and lead us to a deeply personal encounter with Jesus Christ.*

Recognizing that many have never experienced this personal relationship with Jesus, the Holy Spirit has led our local Church to embark on a period of Eucharistic Revival—a movement aimed at leading many to encounter Jesus by restoring understanding and devotion to the great mystery of the Eucharist. Following the Spirit's desire to rekindle Eucharistic amazement in our hearts, let us reflect on prayer, fasting, and almsgiving as practices deeply rooted in devotion to the Body and Blood of Jesus.

The Mass is the greatest prayer of the Church, the "source and summit of the Christian life" (CCC 1324). Lenten prayer focused on the Eucharist calls us to rediscover the Catholic practice of praying the Mass by offering our intentions, work, hardships, and family life as "spiritual sacrifices" united to the priest's offering of the Lord's Body (*Lumen Gentium, 34*). *In this way the great prayer of the Church becomes the great prayer of our lives: the summit to which all our daily sacrifices are directed and the source from which graces flow into everyday life.*


Prayerfully receiving the Eucharist not only requires bodily fasting from food but also spiritual fasting from worldly attachments that keep us from communion with God. At prayer in the desert, Christ rejects the temptations of Satan by reciting a scripture verse from Deuteronomy 8:3, "One does not live by bread alone, but by every word that comes from the mouth of God." The Lord recognizes that bodily fasting becomes a prayer only when it moves us to cling to God's Word. This Lent may we take time to prepare for the Sunday Eucharist not only by fasting, but also by meditating on the weekly scriptures.

In the second century, Saint Justin Martyr wrote one of the earliest accounts of the celebration of the Sunday Eucharist. He recounts that after the breaking of the bread, the early Christians would be moved to give alms and "take care of all who are in need" (*First Apology, 67*). *The Church has always recognized an inseparable bond between the sacrifice of the Mass and the sacrifice of almsgiving. Saint John Chrysostom even understood almsgiving as a Eucharistic action. He described the poor person as an "altar" where one could encounter the Body of Christ and offer everywhere a daily sacrifice (Homily 20 on Second Corinthians). As we remember the sacrifice of Christ at each Sunday Eucharist, may we always remember the poor.*

Christ entered the desert for 40 days to prepare for the mission ahead of Him. Following the Lord's example, we enter the Lenten desert of prayer, fasting, and almsgiving with the goal of becoming Eucharistic missionaries. The Holy Spirit is leading each of us to a personal encounter with the Lord and calling us to pray and fast for the conversion of many hearts during this grace-filled moment of Eucharistic Revival.

Let us follow the Spirit's guidance with open hearts ready to receive the Lord; and may the heart of Jesus, in the Most Blessed Sacrament, be praised, adored, and loved with grateful affection, at every moment, in all the tabernacles of the world, even to the end of time.

GROW AS A DISCIPLE | PRAY, STUDY, ENGAGE, SERVE

Today is the last Sunday in Ordinary Time before Lent begins. I realize in saying it that way, however, it sounds like a warning (“the bookstore will be closing in five minutes, please bring your purchases to the register!”) rather than an acknowledgement of the celebration that it is. So let me put it another way: Today is the 7th - of 33 - Sundays in Ordinary Time this year, which means, we’ve only just begun. We are in some of the earliest days of the Church’s “ordered” (ordinary/numbered) approach to helping us mature and grow in faith. We do this by living with and in the life of Christ over the course of a year. At each step we celebrate the life, passion, death, and resurrection of Christ, but we also set aside different seasons to focus on those specific elements. And so it makes sense that as we approach Lent, we hear more about what exactly God asks of us. Lent will be a season of preparation for Christ’s passion; have we prepared our hearts accordingly to receive him? Today’s readings remind us of what sets us back: hatred for others; desire for revenge; grudges; worldly wisdom; all things which are destructive of God’s temple - our souls, as Saint Paul says. Having a heart full of these things means there is no room for love, which means there is no room for Christ. Let us pray for God’s help in ridding ourselves of all that is destructive, and for the strength to grow a heart only for him.

REFLECT Spend some time taking stock of your spiritual life. Are you holding contempt for someone, or seeking revenge for something? Where might you be falling short in striving to imitate Christ? Bring these thoughts to God in prayer.

GO EVANGELIZE

PRAYER, INVITATION, WITNESS, ACCOMPANIMENT

I’d argue that in some ways, Lent actually starts before Ash Wednesday since it requires forethought and planning. We have to prepare for a season of preparation! We have to figure out what to fast from or add to our spiritual lives, and how we might specifically direct our almsgiving. But how ready are we to respond in a meaningful way to the fact that Christ died for love of us? His death transformed our death into the promise of eternal life. Today’s Gospel offers practical actions, things which all Christians should strive for daily, but especially observe during Lent if a spiritual reset is needed. Jesus tells us to turn the other cheek. Hand over your cloak. Go the extra mile: “Give to the one who asks of you, and do not turn your back on one who wants to borrow.” Love your enemies and pray for your persecutors. Lent is a call to act out of love, especially in tough situations. Take these next couple of days to prepare for Ash Wednesday and the weeks that follow.

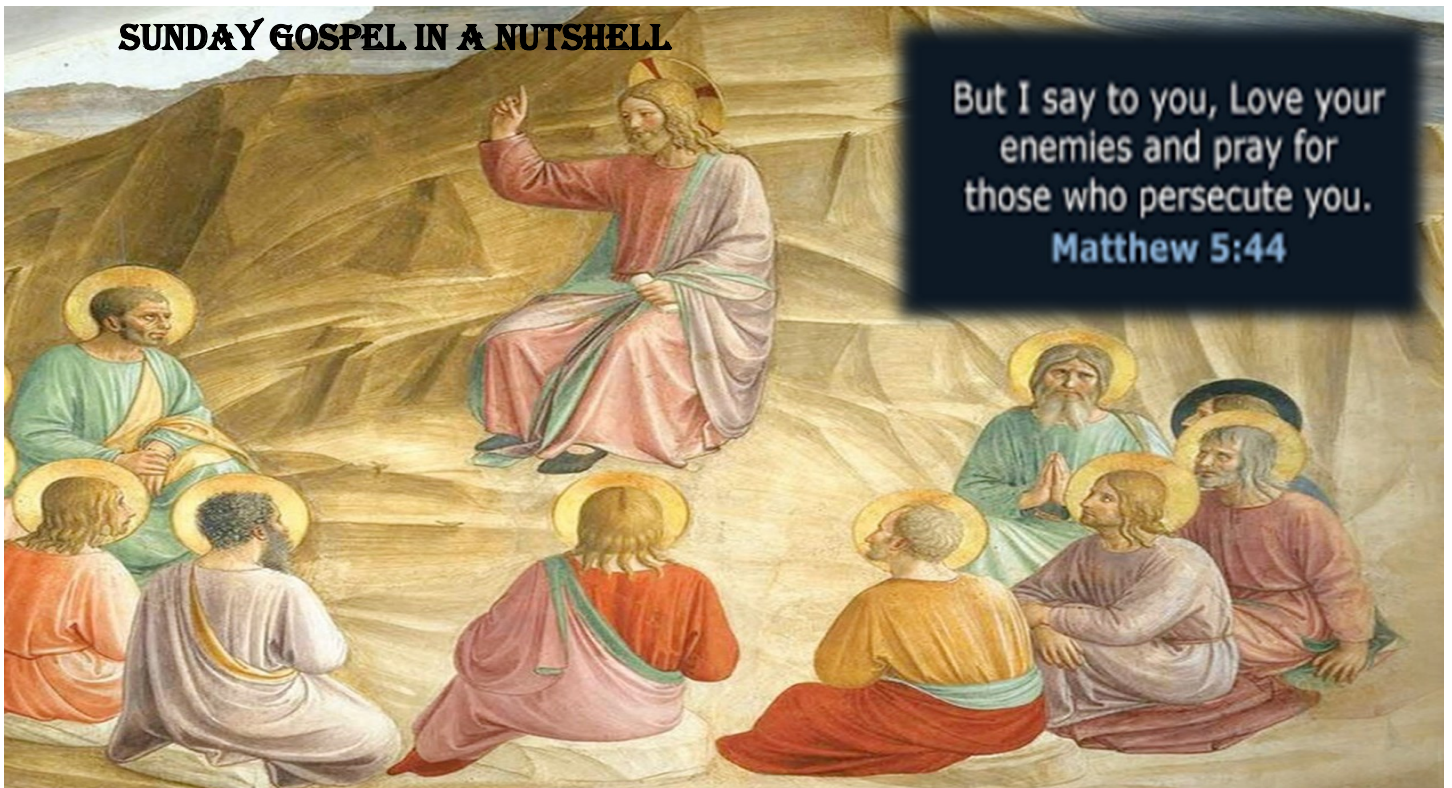

Ash Wednesday is the first day of Lent. Its official name is "Day of Ashes," so called because of the practice of rubbing ashes on one's forehead in the sign of a cross. Ash Wednesday and Lent are observed by most Catholics and some Protestant denominations.

include Ash Wednesday and Good Friday (one full meatless meal is permitted), and meatless Fridays during Lent (fish and shellfish are permitted).

The Three Pillars

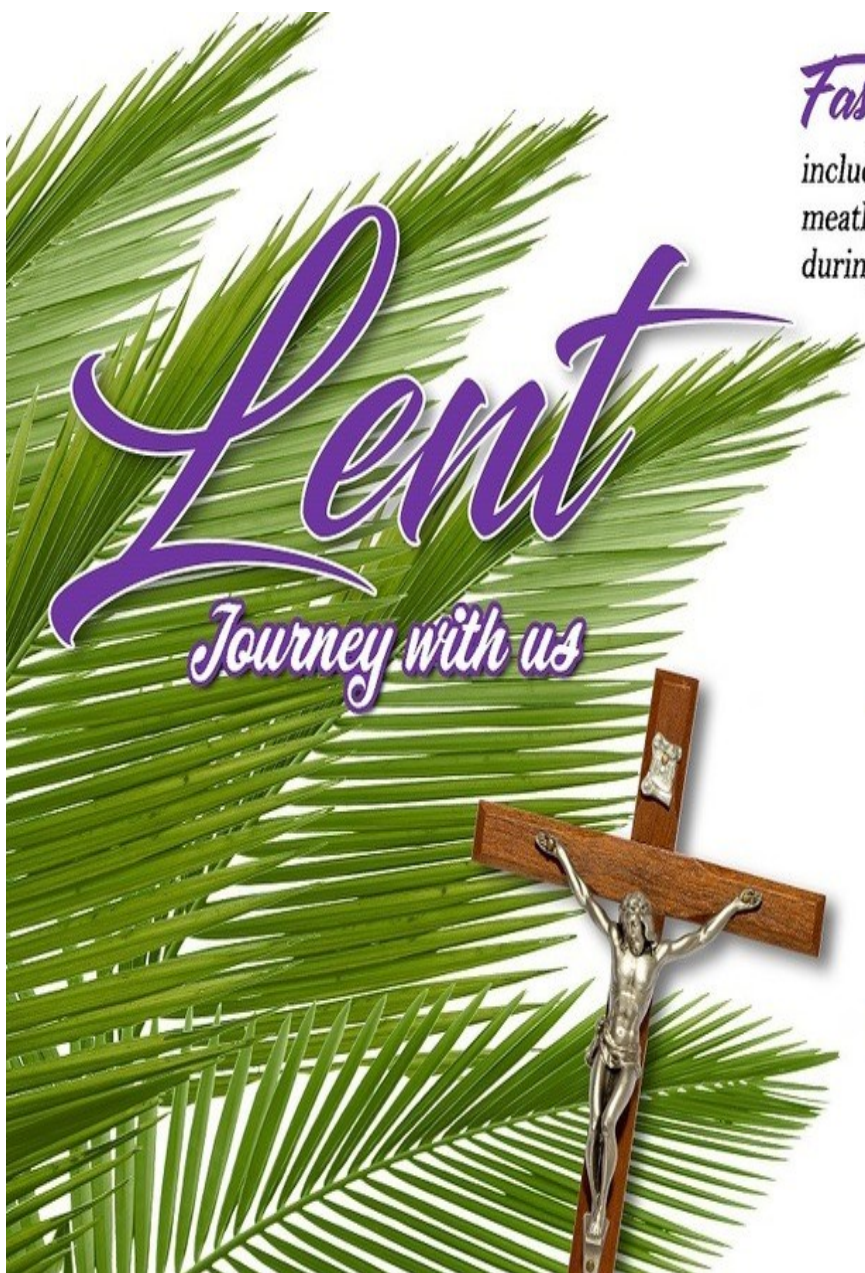
of Lent are prayer, fasting and almsgiving. In addition to fasting, many also choose to abstain from other comforts during Lent.

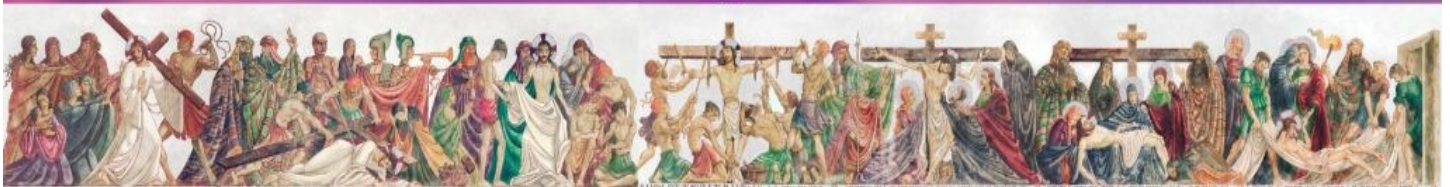

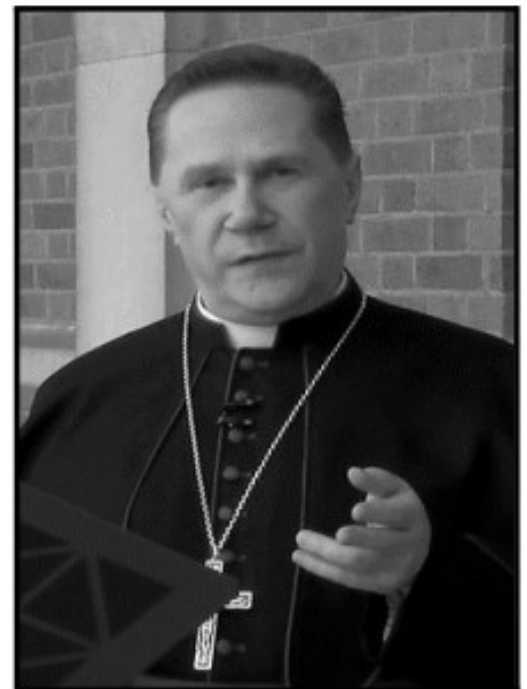

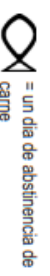

Queridos Hermanos y Hermanas en Cristo:

En nuestro Evangelio del primer domingo de Cuaresma, San Mateo nos cuenta que, antes de comenzar su ministerio público, Jesús fue "conducido por el Espíritu al desierto" (Mateo 4:1), donde Él oró, ayunó y se entregó a una vida de pobreza evangélica. La Cuaresma es el tiempo sagrado en el que, siguiendo el ejemplo de Jesús, somos conducidos por el mismo Espíritu Santo a la soledad del desierto para profundizar en nuestra relación con el Padre y purificar nuestros corazones para asemejarnos al Hijo. El Espíritu que nos atrae a cada uno de nosotros a esta etapa de preparación lo hace a través de las prácticas de la oración, el ayuno y la limosna. Estos tres pilares de la Cuaresma nos alejan del egoísmo del pecado y nos conducen a un encuentro profundamente personal con Jesucristo.

Reconociendo que muchos nunca han experimentado esta relación personal con Jesús, el Espíritu Santo ha llevado a nuestra Iglesia local a embarcarse en un periodo de Reavivamiento Eucarístico, un movimiento dirigido a llevar a muchos al encuentro con Jesús, restaurando el conocimiento y la devoción del gran misterio de la Eucaristía. Siguiendo el deseo del Espíritu de renovar el asombro Eucarístico en nuestros corazones, reflexionemos sobre la oración, el ayuno y la limosna como prácticas profundamente enraizadas en la devoción al Cuerpo y la Sangre de Jesús.

La Misa es la oración más grande de la Iglesia, la "fuente y cumbre de la vida cristiana" (Catecismo Iglesia Católica -CIC- 1324). La oración cuaresmal centrada en la Eucaristía nos llama a redescubrir la práctica Católica de rezar en la Misa ofreciendo nuestras intenciones, trabajo, dificultades y vida familiar como "sacrificios espirituales", unidas a la ofrenda del Cuerpo del Señor por parte del sacerdote (Lumen Gentium, 34). De esta manera la gran oración de la Iglesia se convierte en la gran oración de nuestras vidas: la culminación a la que se dirigen todos nuestros sacrificios cotidianos y la fuente de la que manan las bendiciones en la vida diaria.

Recibir la Eucaristía en oración no sólo exige un ayuno corporal de alimentos, sino también un ayuno espiritual de los apegos mundanos que nos alejan de la comunión con Dios. En la oración en el desierto, Cristo rechaza las tentaciones de Satanás recitando un versículo de la Escritura de Deuteronomio 8:3: "No sólo de pan vive el hombre, sino de toda palabra que sale de la boca de Dios." El Señor reconoce que el ayuno corporal se convierte en oración sólo cuando nos mueve a aferrarnos a la Palabra de Dios. Que esta Cuaresma dediquemos tiempo a prepararnos para la Eucaristía dominical no sólo ayunando, sino también meditando en las Escrituras semanales.

En el siglo II, San Justino Mártir escribió uno de los primeros relatos sobre la celebración de la Eucaristía dominical. Cuenta que, tras la fracción del pan, los primeros cristianos se sentían impulsados a dar limosna y a "atender a todos los necesitados" (Primera Apología, 67). La Iglesia siempre ha reconocido un vínculo inseparable entre el sacrificio de la Misa y el sacrificio de la limosna. San Juan Crisóstomo entendía incluso la limosna como una acción Eucarística. Describía al pobre como un "altar" donde encontrarse con el Cuerpo de Cristo y ofrecer en todas partes un sacrificio diario (Homilía 20 sobre Segunda de Corintios). Al recordar el sacrificio de Cristo en cada Eucaristía dominical, recordemos siempre a los pobres.

Cristo entró en el desierto durante 40 días para prepararse para la misión que le esperaba. Siguiendo el ejemplo del Señor, nosotros entramos en el desierto cuaresmal de oración, ayuno y limosna con la meta de convertirnos en misioneros Eucarísticos. El Espíritu Santo nos lleva a cada uno de nosotros a un encuentro personal con el Señor y nos llama a rezar y ayunar por la conversión de muchos corazones durante este momento lleno de gracia del Renacimiento Eucarístico.

Sigamos con el corazón abierto la guía del Espíritu listos para recibir al Señor y que el corazón de Jesús, en el Santísimo Sacramento, sea alabado, adorado y amado con cariñoso agradecimiento, en todo momento, en todos los sagrarios del mundo, hasta el fin de los tiempos.
