

OUR LADY OF MOUNT CARMEL—FEAST DAY JULY 16.



Mount Carmel is a biblical place where the prophet Elijah prayed for Israel, which was suffering a terrible drought at the time. Soon Israel got rain and was saved. Elijah saw the cloud as a symbol of the Virgin mentioned in the prophecies of Isaiah. Following the example of Elijah, the hermits who lived on Mount Carmel prayed for the advent of the much-awaited Virgin, who would become the mother of the Messiah. The origins of the Carmelite Order can be traced back to Elijah and his disciples. In the 13th century, during a pilgrimage to the Holy Land, St. Simon Stock joined a group of hermits on Mount Carmel. He was elected the 6th superior-general of the Carmelites. The order suffered persecution and oppression from secular clergy and other orders. The monks sought the intercession of the Blessed Virgin. On Sunday July 16th, 1251, Our Lady appeared to Simon Stock who was knelt in prayer.

She was holding the Child Jesus in one arm and the Brown Scapular in

the other. She uttered the following words: "Hoc erit tibi et cunctis Carmelitis privilegium, in hoc habitu moriens salvabitur" (This shall be the privilege for you and for all the Carmelites, that anyone dying in this habit shall be saved). On January 13, 1252, the order received a letter of protection from Pope Innocent IV, defending them from harassment. As the patroness of the Carmelite Order, the title Our Lady of Mount Carmel, or Virgin of Carmel, was given to the Blessed Virgin Mary.

The Brown Scapular of Our Lady of Mt. Carmel is a miniature derivative of the actual brown scapular used by the Carmelites, which is worn as a sign of their vocation and devotion. Our Lady gave St. Simon a scapular for the Carmelites with the following promise, saying, "Receive, My beloved son, this habit of thy order: this shall be to thee and to all Carmelites a privilege, that whosoever dies clothed in this shall never suffer eternal fire...It shall be a sign of salvation, a protection in danger, and a pledge of peace." On receiving the message "I, the Mother of Grace, shall descend on the Saturday (Sabbath) after their death and whomsoever I shall find in Purgatory, I shall free, so that I may lead them to the holy mountain of life everlasting." from The Blessed Virgin in a vision related to those who wear the Brown Scapular, Pope John XXII issued the apocryphal Bull "Sacratissimo uti culmine" on March 3, 1322. As per Church tradition,

three conditions are to be fulfilled to obtain the benefits of this Sabbatine Privilege attached to the wearing of the Brown Scapular:

- 1. Wear the Brown Scapular
- 2. Observe chastity according to one's state in life
- 3. Pray the Rosary



Prayer to Our Lady of Mount Carmel

Thou who, with special mercy, look upon those clothed in thy beloved Habit, cast a glance of pity upon me. Fortify my weakness with thy strength; enlighten the darkness of my mind with thy wisdom; increase my faith, hope and charity. Assist me during life, console me by thy presence at my death, and present me to the August trinity as thy devoted child, that I may bless thee for all eternity in Paradise. Amen.

GROW AS A DISCIPLE | PRAY, STUDY, ENGAGE, SERVE

I don't know about you, but even for the quickest of errands I don't like to leave my house without my smartphone. Nor would I go on a road trip without my trusty mini-Diet Coke and a snack or two. So I'm struck by what Jesus tells the Apostles when he sends them on their mission to share the Good News: "He instructed them to take nothing for the journey but a walking stick - no food, no sack, no money in their belts." While it may be hard for us to imagine striking out with only the sandals on our feet, to me this reading is more about what the Apostles did have than what they went without: They had a companion (Jesus sent them two by two) and the spiritual blessings Saint Paul refers to, including a relationship with Jesus and absolute trust in him. Today's readings remind us to set aside distractions and spend time deepening our relationship with Jesus through prayer, reading the Scriptures, and participating in the sacramental life of the Church. In doing so, we, too, can join in the mission of the early disciples by giving our lives to Jesus and sharing his message with others.

GO EVANGELIZE

PRAYER, INVITATION, WITNESS, ACCOMPANIMENT

I find the phrase "the new evangelization" somewhat ironic. After all, evangelization is not new, it goes back to the earliest days of the Church, which wouldn't exist had it not been for the disciples. The "new" part reminds us that we today also share in this mission. The U.S. Catholic bishops describe it succinctly: "The New Evangelization calls each of us to deepen our faith, believe in the Gospel message and go forth to proclaim the Gospel." This call is both simple, and challenging, but we don't have to be perfect. After all, just as God called Amos, a humble shepherd, and Jesus called the Twelve, a motley group of fishermen, he calls us. Like them, our first "task" isn't a task at all - it is placing God and our relationship with Jesus at the center of our lives. Only then can we effectively share the Gospel with others, inviting our brothers and sisters to a life in Christ - to become part of God's adopted family.

WITNESS At the end of Sunday Mass, we often hear the words: "Go in peace, glorifying the Lord by your life." As we are sent forth, let us ask God to show us how we can share the Gospel with others during the week ahead. Then pay attention to where the Spirit leads us in answering our prayer.



ST.IGNATIAN YEAR CORNER

Rigorous ascetic life at Manresa

Ignatius lived for about a year, the decisive months of his career, from March 25, 1522, to mid-February 1523 in Manresa, a town 48 km (30 miles) from Barcelona, begging for his food. He ate and drank sparingly, scourged himself, and for a time neither combed nor trimmed his hair and did not cut his nails. He attended Holy Mass daily, and for several months spent much of his time in prayer, often in a cave outside Manresa. Eventually he did chores at a local hospital in exchange for food and lodging, and practiced rigorous asceticism, praying for seven hours a day in the cave, and formulating the fundamentals of his *Spiritual Exercises*.

Ignatian Spirituality: Daily Self Exam

Jesus knows all our sins better than we do. But telling it to Him in confession, encourages us to get to the root of our failures of the past, in the best possible way, correct them now, and avoid them in the future in whichever way possible. In the Confiteor we say, "I have greatly sinned in my thoughts, in my words, in what I have done and in what I have failed to do.." St. Ignatius writes we should do this in our daily self examen "Then you will think over the different hours or the different occupations of the day, examining your thoughts, words, actions, or omissions." Once we go for a good confession, this practice of daily self examen, will help us to be in the right track of life. Through this self examen, we can analyze whether our thoughts, words, and actions have imitated Christ or whether we have gone astray. In fact, we can talk to Him about what we felt, said and did, and even the responses of others to us in all those situations. This self accounting of our lives in God's presence will eventually bring us very close to Him, even without our knowledge. We have to constantly put an effort to visualize living a life right in front of God to improve ourselves.

Juan 6:1-15; Los panes y los peces

Este pasaje evangélico nos recuerda el milagro de la multiplicación de los panes y los peces. La multitud que seguía a Jesús tenía hambre, así que Jesús le preguntó a Felipe dónde podrían conseguir suficiente comida. Felipe calculó que ni siguiera el salario de doscientos días de trabajo bastaría para comprar suficiente comida para todos. Al igual que Felipe, nosotros nos enfrentamos a problemas que pueden parecernos enormes y que nos intimidan.

El apóstol Andrés fue más allá; encontró a un niño con cinco panes de cebada y dos

peces. El niño ofreció a Jesús todo lo poco que había traído. Qué sorpresa cuando Jesús dio de comer a cinco mil, "dándoles todo lo que quisieron". Cuando quedaron satisfechos de pan, ¡aún sobraron doce canastas llenas! Nadie supera a Dios en generosidad. Al enfrentarnos con muchos problemas a la vez podemos sentirnos abrumados. Es fácil reaccionar como Felipe y perder la esperanza. Cuando

estamos solos, quizá no tengamos mucho que ofrecer, pero si ofrecemos lo que tenemos a Dios, él puede hacer algo

asombroso con ello.



¿Qué se espera de los católicos?

16 de julio - Nuestra Señora del Carmen (1251). La tradición carmelita sostiene que Nuestra Señora se le apareció a san Simón en el Monte Carmelo y que le dio un escapulario. Llevar uno puesto se ha convertido en una popular forma de honrar a la Bendita Madre.

22 de julio - Santa María Magdalena (siglo I). María Magdalena era la mujer de la que Jesús expulsó seis demonios en el evangelio de san Lucas (Lucas 8:2). Apoyó la misión de Jesús con su propio dinero y estuvo al lado de la Cruz de Jesús junto con su madre. Conocida como el "Apóstol de los Apóstoles", María quien primero

anunció la Resurrección de Cristo a los apóstoles.

25 de julio - Santiago (siglo I). Cuando Jesús llamó a Santiago y a su hermano Juan a que fueran sus apóstoles, los dos abandonaron a su padre en un barco pesquero en el Mar de Galilea. Santiago fue uno de los tres apóstoles que presenciaron la transfiguración de Jesús, la resurrección de la hija de Jairo

y la agonía en Getsemaní. Santiago fue el primer apóstol martirizado.


