

GROW AS A DISCIPLE | PRAY, STUDY, ENGAGE, SERVE

I once saw Tony Melendez, a musician born without arms, play his guitar for the pope – with his feet – and I knew I had witnessed something exceptional, something extraordinary. We may be feeling the same way about some of the Olympic performances taking place right now. But however amazed Tony Melendez or an Olympic medal performance might make us feel, it is hard to imagine what it must have been like to experience Jesus taking a few barley loaves and fish, blessing them, and somehow feeding more than 5,000 people. How Great Thou Art, indeed! Participating in this miracle was lifechanging for those who realized what Jesus had done. They were convinced, on the spot, that Jesus was a prophet, and were ready to carry him away as a king. But Jesus did not come to be an earthly king, he came to give his life for us, that we might have life with him in abundance.

GO EVANGELIZE

PRAYER, INVITATION, WITNESS, ACCOMPANIMENT

One boy gives up his lunch and Jesus feeds thousands – and there were twelve wicker baskets with fragments left over! Think of how God can multiply our gifts. Perhaps there are times we fail to share what we have, thinking it is too small to make a difference; thinking that what we bring to feed others can't possibly be worth anything. Sure, what usually happens with us isn't on a scale like today's Gospel passage, and our offering may not be "Olympic" in nature. But in sharing our gifts as Jesus calls us to – to love our neighbor and to do "small things with great love" as St. Teresa of Calcutta is purported to have said – there is no such thing as a gift or talent too small. Ask the Holy Spirit for fortitude as you strive to share your gifts.

Perhaps it's time to contact someone who has been on your mind lately. A seemingly small gesture of concern may be just the support they need right now. With the help of the Holy Spirit, perhaps you may be a source of affirmation for them, providing a catalyst that helps them discern their path more clearly.

Pilgrimage to Jerusalem

In March 1523, Ignatius left Barcelona and traveling by way of Rome, Venice, and Cyprus, reached Jerusalem on September 4. Though he wanted to settle there permanently, the Franciscan custodians of the shrines of the Latin church would not listen to this plan. Ignatius left Palestine on October 3, after visiting Bethany, the Mount of Olives, Bethlehem, the Jordan River, and Mount of Temptation. In March 1524, he came back to Barcelona, via Cyprus and Venice.

Ignatian Spirituality: Ignatian way of Catholic Pilgrimage

Traditionally, Catholics make pilgrimages to holy places. To be in the spirit of St. Ignatius' pilgrimage means an encounter with God. This means, Pilgrimage should be a daily undertaking, as it is a desire to encounter the living God in every person we meet, and in every place. When we love our forgotten co-worker, the person in the street, or even our enemy, we are encountering God. God has designed history, geography, prayer, tradition, and our own gifts to be in places where there is a sacred meeting. When we are in a place, we are participating in what happened there in a mystical way. In fact the holiness of a place depends on what happened there. To be a true pilgrim, we have to control our wandering mind, and be in the place with full concentration. Pilgrimage reveals not only knowledge and wisdom about the site itself, but also knowledge and wisdom about the pilgrim who lingers at the site. True pilgrimage is made when we linger with our mind, memory, emotions, gifts, and sensuality to wherever we are and connect with the graces God has hidden there.
