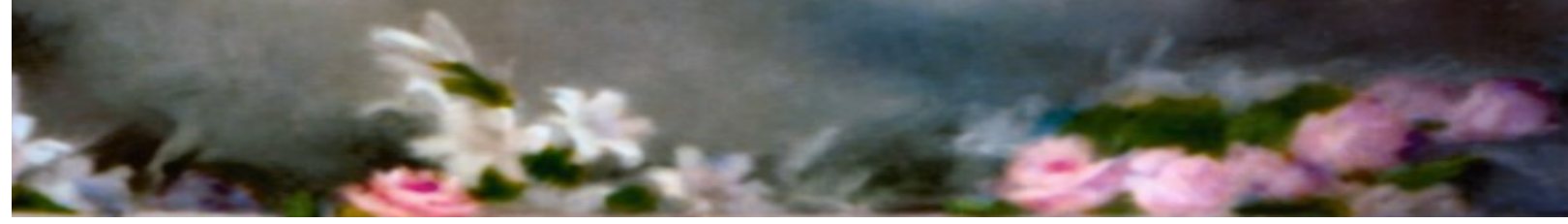

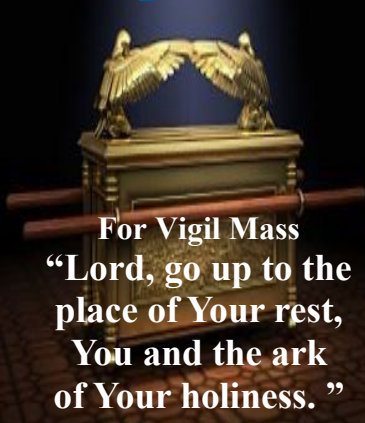

**GROW AS A DISCIPLE** | PRAY, STUDY, ENGAGE, SERVE

There are very few things in this world that are perfectly united, though many attempts have been made, think peanut butter and chocolate, Batman and Robin. But there is one example, and that is the Blessed Virgin Mary is perfectly united with Jesus' life and redemptive work. Though fully human, she is completely without sin - she is, as we pray in echoing God's angel, "full of grace." Thus she shares, as we do, in Christ's heavenly destiny but with an immediacy that we do not have. Upon her death she was instantly assumed into heavenly glory, body and soul, as the first of all the faithful who will eventually join with Christ in eternity upon death and purification. In celebrating this great Solemnity, the Church celebrates what lies ahead for those of us who imitate Mary's total trust in God. She had complete faith in God and his promises, and is a living example of the power and generosity of our God. We can follow her lead, engaging in a life of witness (proclaiming God's greatness) and gratitude (have a rejoicing spirit) for the sake of the world.

**PRAY** A lot of misunderstanding surrounds Catholic devotion to Mary. We do not worship Mary - that is reserved for God alone. Yet we do revere her and honor her unique and important role in God's saving plan. Pray the Magnificat or the Rosary, paying close attention to their scriptural foundation and what was happening in the "stories" within those Scriptures.

**GO EVANGELIZE**

**PRAYER, INVITATION, WITNESS, ACCOMPANIMENT**

Sometimes, when hearing or talking about Mary's *fiat*, I first see it as a "yes" in modern, human terms. "Yes, I'll serve on that committee." "Yes, I'll organize that party." "Yes, I'll stay late to finish that project." It doesn't take long for our little "yesses" to turn into an adamant "Noooooooooo," also known as burnout. Thankfully, Mary's yes was far more than just an acquiescence to a small request - it was the commitment of her entire self to the choice God had placed before her. And she was rewarded with a special seat in heaven near her Son. In today's Gospel, Elizabeth immediately recognizes the true meaning of Mary's *fiat*: "Blessed are you who believed that what was spoken to you by the Lord would be fulfilled." What can we learn from Mary's example? We can learn trust. We don't need to sign up for every volunteer opportunity (though volunteering is a great and worthwhile thing to do), but we can say "yes" to what God is asking of us according to the gifts and graces he has given us. Through daily prayer and seeking the intercession of Mary and Jesus, we can grow closer to the Lord and prepare ourselves for the day we meet Jesus and Mary face to face.

**SAINT BERNARD OF CLAIRVAUX; Abbot & Doctor of the Church;**

**FEAST DAY : AUGUST 20**

**PATRON SAINT** of beekeepers, candlemakers, Burgundy.

Often depicted with a Cistercian habit, book and crozier.

Bernard was the third of seven children of noble and pious parents in Burgundy. At the age of nine, he was sent to a school at Chatillon run by the secular canons of Saint-Vorles, where he later studied theology and Holy Scripture. He had a special devotion to the Virgin Mary, and considered her as the model of his personal faith. Later he wrote several works about the Queen of Heaven, and explained the virginity of Mary, *the "Star of the Sea"*, and her role as Mediatrix.

After the death of his mother at the age of nineteen, he thought of living a life of solitude and prayer and avoid the snares and temptations of the world. Bernard set such a convincing example that many followed his monastic life. He, with thirty young noblemen joined the Cîteaux Abbey, near Dijon, which was founded by Robert of Molesme with the purpose of living literally according to the Rule of St Benedict. St. Stephen was the Abbot at that time . After three years, seeing the great progress he had made in the spiritual life, he was sent with twelve monks to start a new monastery in the Diocese of Langres, which afterward came to be known as the celebrated Abbey of Clairvaux. Even his father and all his six brothers joined the Abbey. Later his only sister, with the consent of her husband, took the veil in the Benedictine nunnery of Jully-les-Nonnains. He founded numerous other monasteries, composed a number of works and undertook many journeys for the honor of God. He refused all the Bishoprics offered to him. Even the Popes took his advice. Bernard was also instrumental in re-emphasizing the importance of *lectio divina* and contemplation for monks. He also wrote some hymns on Jesus. On 20 August 1153, after forty years of monastic life, Bernard died at the age of sixty-three. He was buried at Clairvaux Abbey, and after its dissolution by the French revolutionary government in 1792, his remains were transferred to Troyes Cathedral. At his 800th death anniversary, Pope Pius XII issued an encyclical about him, titled *Doctor Mellifluus*, in which he labeled him "The Last of the Fathers."

Though the Memorare has been traditionally attributed to St. Bernard, as it was championed by a French priest who is also a Bernard (Claude Bernard), the actual author is unknown. However, St. Bernard has composed many beautiful prayers of which, the Nativity prayer given here is very famous.

### **Nativity Prayer of St. Bernard of Clairvaux**

“Let your goodness Lord appear to us, that we, made in your image, may conform ourselves to it. In our own strength we cannot imitate your majesty, power, and wonder nor is it fitting for us to try. But your mercy reaches from the heavens through the clouds to the earth below. You have come to us as a small child, but you have brought us the greatest of all gifts, the gift of eternal love. Caress us with your tiny hands, embrace us with your tiny arms and pierce our hearts with your soft, sweet cries.”



**INTERESTING FACTS ON THE TYPES OF MASSES & FEASTS IN THE CATHOLIC CHURCH**

As we celebrate the Solemnity of the Assumption of the Blessed Virgin Mary, let us have a look at the types of Masses celebrated by the Catholic Church.

1. **Low Mass:** -A Mass that is entirely read or spoken by the celebrant, but hymns may be sung by the celebrant, congregation and/or by the choir. Usually the daily Mass, which is not obligatory, but attended by most people because of personal spiritual reasons, falls in this type of Mass.
2. **High Mass:-** - A Mass that has some of its parts chanted or sung responsorial between the celebrant and the congregation and/or the choir. If there is more than one Mass celebrated in a day, the High Mass should be prominent and celebrated when the most people are expected to attend.
3. **Solemn Mass:-** A High Mass at which there are assistants to the celebrant. Traditionally during a Solemn Mass, the altar may be incensed during the Entrance Rite, the Gospel prior to its proclamation, and the gifts of bread and wine as well as the altar during the Offertory. A Solemn Mass is usually offered to celebrate Christmas, Easter, Pentecost and very special occasions.
4. **Vigil Mass:-** A Mass that is offered during the evening or the night before the Sabbath or a major holy day. For the Christian, Sunday is the Sabbath, the first day of the week when Christ resurrected, and so the Christian Sabbath begins on Saturday evening. Therefore, a Vigil Mass is scheduled at 4 p.m. or later.
5. **Pontifical Mass:-** A Mass that is celebrated by a bishop.
6. **Concelebrated Mass:-** The Holy Mass celebrated by more than one bishop, or by more than one priest, or by bishops and priests together. The one who presides is usually the highest ranking bishop or priest present at the Mass.
7. **Votive Mass or Mass of Special Intention:-** A Mass that is offered at the request of an individual or a group for a special purpose. The **four common types** of Votive Masses are: **Mass of Supplication, Thanksgiving Mass, Mass for the dead**— funerals and Memorial Mass when prayers are offered in the hope that their souls will pass from this life to eternal life in God's heavenly kingdom through Christ in the context of the Holy Mass, and the **Wedding/ Nuptial Mass** when a man and a woman are united in the Sacrament of Matrimony in the context of the Holy Mass.

Now let us have a look at Solemnities, Feast Days and Memorials in the Catholic Church.

1. **Solemnities** celebrate the most important mysteries of the Catholic faith, and hence hold the highest degree of Catholic celebrations. Sundays and Holy Days of obligation are treated as Solemnities.

Some commonly known Solemnities include Easter, Christmas, Pentecost, and Christ the King. Some Solemnities, like the Assumption, the Immaculate Conception, and the Annunciation honor Mary. Saints that played an important role in salvation history like Saint Joseph, Saint John the Baptist, and Saints Peter and Paul also are celebrated with a Solemnity. Some Solemnities like Christmas (celebrated every year on December 25), are always celebrated on the same calendar date. Others like the Pentecost (celebrated fifty days after Easter), will change from year to year. The Solemnities are mostly obligatory days, and the Mass on a Solemnity, is very much like that of a Sunday Mass. The Gloria is sung/said, three specific readings will be read, the Creed will be said, petitions will be offered, and in most cases, a specific preface will be prayed. Solemnities that fall on Sundays are celebrated during Ordinary Time and Christmastide, but are usually moved to the following Monday, during the rest of the year.

2. **Feast Days** are special days set apart on the liturgical calendar to celebrate the lives of the saints and other events in the life of Christ, and second in line of importance in the liturgical calendar. Some of the most well known feast days are the Presentation, and the Baptism of the Lord, the Visitation, the feasts of all the apostles, except that of Saints Peter and Paul which is a Solemnity, the feast of the Holy Angels etc. Specific readings are used. The Gloria is said, but the Creed won't be said, and in most cases, a specific preface will be prayed. Since Sundays are Solemnities, Feast Days that fall on a Sunday are not celebrated.
3. **Memorials** are a celebration of the lives of saints, and is of third importance in the liturgical calendar and can be either obligatory or optional. The Church only observes obligatory memorials for saints who are of "universal significance." For instance, the memorial of Saint Thomas Aquinas, celebrated on January 28, is an obligatory memorial. The Gloria does not have to be sung during Mass. The priest chooses whether to celebrate the optional memorial. Memorials during Lent and December 17-24 are celebrated as commemorations, which means only the opening prayer is specific, and everything else is regular so as not to interrupt the Lenten and Advent last week preparation. In the case of the memorial of the Patron Saint of a Parish, special dispensation from the local bishop permits to celebrate the Memorial, like that of St. Patrick which is on March 17, and usually falls during Lent.

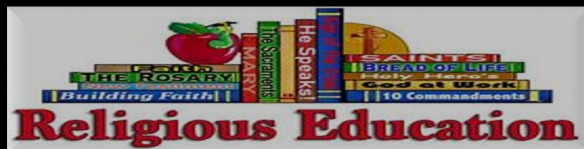

**Continued Assaults on Religious Liberty:  
A Christian Flag and a Chapel and Prayer Trail**

*"Alas, our freedom is wounded. ... While the United States remains by and large a believing society, a growing number of people are settling for a style of life that marginalizes God, a way of living in which God and the things of God don't count." - Archbishop William Lori*



The city of Boston denied Camp Constitution a permit to fly their flag on a "public forum" flagpole in front of city hall, saying the application form referred to the flag as a "**Christian flag.**" Liberty Council has filed a petition with the U.S. Supreme Court arguing Boston violated the First Amendment.

Over 12 years, the city had approved 284 flags from private organizations including the Turkish flag with an Islamic symbol, Ethiopia, Brazil, Italy, Mexico as well as Communist China and Cuba flags, pride & transgender flags.

Catholic Healthcare International (GHI) is suing a Michigan township for violating its 1st and 14th Amendment rights, after it denied permission to build a **chapel and prayer trail** dedicated to St. Padre Pio on 5-acres of a 40-acre property it already owned.

"The Township's rejection of our clients right to religious worship on CHI's private property is not in keeping with our proud tradition of accommodating people of faith, and, in fact, it violates our clients' fundamental rights protected by the United States and Michigan Constitutions and federal statutory law," said American Freedom Law Center.<sup>(3)</sup> "The Townships denial of the Final Submission was not based on any measurable, objective criteria, (but instead) based upon amorphous, subjective considerations that were contrary to the facts and which permit an anti-Catholic animus to drive the Township's decision."<sup>(4)</sup>

## ST.IGNATIAN YEAR CORNER

### Study in Alcala

When Ignatius completed his two years of studies in Barcelona, he was advised by his master to go to Alcala to study philosophy, which he himself also wanted. But before setting out, however, he sought the opinion of a certain theologian. As he also gave him the same advice, Ignatius started for Alcala in the year 1526. After ten or twelve days, of a life of alms and begging, the superior of a new hospital, seeing him rudely treated, took him home, placed him in a room, and liberally provided for his needs. Here he studied the works of Scotus, Albertus, Alcuin, and the Master of the Sentences. He wanted to glorify God in all possible ways, and gathered students and adults to explain the Gospels to them and teach them how to pray. But as he was not ordained, he was imprisoned and tried, because his intentions were suspected. Upon found innocent, he was released with the instruction to not teach. He could not live without helping souls and so he left Alcalá and joined the University of Salamanca.

### Ignatian Spirituality: Concept of knowledge

Ignatius strongly believed that true knowledge came through three infallible sources: God's intervention, the Bible and the Church. According to Ignatius, knowledge and belief cannot be separated. According to him, knowledge is something that helps us to better understand God, which will eventually help in becoming closer to Him, and live a life for Christ. For him, learning is merely increasing the knowledge.

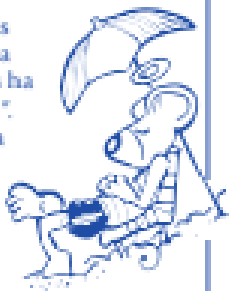
### El don del trabajo

## ¿En qué lugar está Dios?

Dos viajeros, disgustados por el asesinato de una persona querida, saltan de la ciudad. Mientras caminaban se esforzaban por entender lo que había sucedido y por qué Dios los había abandonado. Se sentían abrumados y solos. Un amable desconocido se les unió en el viaje, les explicó acontecimientos recientes y les recordó el amor fiable de Dios. El desconocido era el mismísimo ser querido por el que lloraban. Aunque no se habían dado cuenta, Dios había estado todo el tiempo con ellos (Lucas 24).  
¿Por qué no podemos encontrarlo? Los acontecimientos o las experiencias de nuestras vidas pueden disminuir nuestra

percepción de Dios y hacer que nos parezca distante. A veces estamos demasiado preocupados, demasiado tristes o demasiado enojados para encontrarlo.



Por ejemplo, como estaban abrumados por su dolor, los dos viajeros no reconocieron a Dios que caminaba con ellos.

Recuerden su promesa. Confiar en

Dios a veces es más difícil cuando es más

necesario hacerlo. Recuerden que prometió que no nos abandonaría nunca. Lo percibamos o no es irrelevante. Dios nunca rompe su promesa.

Hablen con él. Cuando los viajeros le abrieron el corazón a Jesús, él los ayudó a entender su situación, les aseguró que Dios los cuidaba intensamente y les dio paz y consuelo. Cuando abrimos nuestros corazones a Jesús y le contamos todo, él también nos da paz y consuelo.

¿Por qué hacen eso los católicos?

¿Cómo contemplan los católicos el nombre de Jesús?

“Para que al nombre de Jesús, se doble toda rodilla en el cielo, en la tierra y en los abismos” (Filipenses 2:10). El uso de su nombre tiene tanto poder que Jesús prometió que escucharía todas las oraciones que se

Sean portadores de amor. Jesús nos pidió que fuéramos sus manos y sus pies en la Tierra. Como discípulos suyos, debemos llevar su amor al mundo.



### de las **E**scrituras

**Marcos 7:1-8, 14-15, 21-23, Corazones limpios frente a manos limpias**

Los líderes religiosos enviaron investigadores para que comprobaran lo que decía Jesús y lo que vieron no les gustó. No sólo hacían caso omiso de algunos ritos tradicionales Jesús y sus seguidores, sino que además Jesús reprendió a los líderes por ser unos hipócritas cuando los observaban. Eran obedientes en el exterior para parecer santos en lugar de dar los pasos necesarios para ser santos de verdad.

Por ejemplo, los judíos devotos realizaban un rito de limpieza antes de cada comida. Los fariseos creían que esta ceremonia evitaba que fueran considerados impuros. Eran muy críticos porque los seguidores de Jesús no realizaban esta



ceremonia. Jesús les dijo que se equivocaban pensando que ser limpio en el exterior los hacía aceptables a los ojos de Dios. A Dios le interesa más el estado de nuestros corazones que el de nuestras manos.

La hipocresía es que finjamos ser algo que no somos y que no tenemos intención de ser. Jesús llamó hipócritas a los fariseos porque alababan a Dios por inercia para aparentar santidad a los ojos de los judíos. Nos convertimos en hipócritas cuando seguimos cuidadosamente las prácticas religiosas, pero permitimos que nuestros corazones sigan lejos de Dios.

### **P & R** ¿Cómo puedo resistir la tentación?

Hay sólo una forma eficaz de resistir la tentación y es decir "no". Pero es más fácil decirlo que hacerlo. Ponga a prueba estas ideas:

Haga una lista de cosas que suelen

llevarles a pecar. ¿Tiene amigos a los que les gusta murmurar? ¿Bebe demasiado con sus compañeros de trabajo? ¿Gasta demasiado dinero en el centro comercial? Escriba su lista y procure que sea

completa. Luego decídase a rechazar cada cosa de la lista.

Practique decir "no" cuando esté a solas. Dígalo en voz alta si le ayuda. No dé explicaciones. Simplemente diga "no". "No hago eso". "Eso no va conmigo".

Aléjese de la tentación. En la historia de José del Antiguo Testamento, la mujer de su jefe "puso sus ojos en él" y lo seguía por todas partes, pero "José se negó a acostarse a su lado y a estar con ella" (Génesis 39:10). Evite a los amigos murmuradores, vuelva a casa directamente después de trabajo, no vaya al centro comercial.

No hay nada más importante que evitar el pecado.

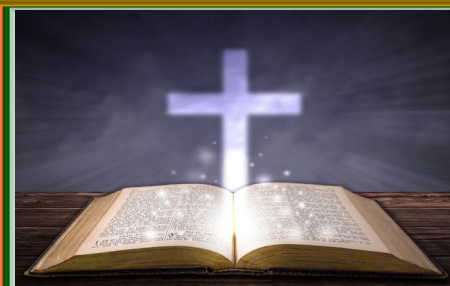
