## 'Ad Maiorem Dei Gloriam – For the Greater Glory of God'

### Dear Brothers and Sisters in Christ:

May 3, 2021

Imagine this story: A fame-driven soldier is holding his position in battle. He is shot and wounded by a cannonball. During his lengthy recuperation, he is left to read the few books nearby – books that happen to be about the life of Christ and the saints.

After his recovery, he experiences a deep spiritual conversion and decides to lay down his weapons for good. His new life with Christ profoundly transforms the Church and world for over 500 years and counting!

Some might say: "That's impossible!"

Well, that story did happen. That wounded soldier is Saint Ignatius of Loyola (1491-1556).

Upon laying down his sword, doing an about-face and becoming

a Catholic priest, Saint Ignatius founded what is today the largest male religious order in the Catholic Church – the Society of Jesus or "the Jesuits." An order with 16,000-plus priests, brothers, scholastics, and novices worldwide.<sup>1</sup>

An order known for sanctity, scholarship in every field and major scientific discoveries.

An order known for its worldwide mission and special fourth vow of obedience to the Pope, the Successor of Peter. This vow of total availability to the Roman Pontiff disposes the order for its characteristic missionary activity, and in the words of Pope Benedict XVI, calls Jesuits "– in the most genuine Ignatian spirit of 'feeling with the Church and in the Church' – 'to love and serve' the Vicar of Christ on earth."<sup>2</sup>

National Shrine of the North American Martyrs, Assiniboille, New York

An order where more of its priests have been martyred for their faith than in any other order. In fact, in upstate New York, the National Shrine of the North American Martyrs in Auriesville is dedicated to three Jesuits martyred at the Mohawk Indian Village of Ossernenon in 1642 and 1646, including lay brother Saint Rene Goupil (1608-1642), the priest Saint Isaac Jogues (1607-1646) and lay brother Saint John Lalande (died 1646).

An order whose priests have quite possibly influenced you, your children, or grandchildren. Today, in the U.S., in addition to numerous Jesuit high schools, there is a network of 28 Jesuit colleges and universities with over one million living graduates. Local Jesuit colleges include: Fordham University, Canisius College, College of the Holy Cross, Fairfield University, Boston College, Georgetown University, Le Moyne College, Loyola University, Saint Joseph's University, Saint Peter's University, and The University of Scranton.

An order whose priests have contributed so much to theological

study that is faithful to the Magisterium of the Church. Here in the United States, we think of priests such as Cardinal Avery Dulles, SJ, a native of Auburn, New York (1918-2008); another New Yorker, Father John Courtney Murray, SJ (1904-1967), who played a prominent role in the Second Vatican Council's 1965 Declaration on Religious Freedom (*Dignitatis Humane*); and Father Walter Ciszek, SJ (1904-1984) a native of Shenandoah, Pennsylvania who survived 15 years in a Russian prison camp - including five in solitary confinement. Father Ciszek grippingly tells his story and how faith gave him courage to endure the Gulag in *With God in Russia* (1964) and in *He Leadeth Me* (1973).

The Church has designated a special time of celebration in recognition of Saint Ignatius. Called an "Ignatian Year," it will mark significant anniversaries associated with this great Spanish saint.

The Ignatian Year begins on May 20, 2021, the 500-year anniversary of Ignatius' wounding and spiritual conversion in Pamplona, Spain,

and concludes on July 21, 2022, the anniversary of Saint Ignatius passing into eternal life. During the Year, the 400-year anniversary of the canonizations of Saint Ignatius and his Jesuit confrere Saint Francis Xavier (1506-1552) will be celebrated on March 12, 2022.

In our diocese, several of our young priests are working on a series of reflections that begin an exploration of the life and legacy of Saint Ignatius. They will connect the Ignatian legacy with our legacy in 2021. Look for reflections by:



**FATHER MICHAEL BISSEX**, associate pastor of Saint Patrick's Parish, Huntington, who looks at Saint Ignatius' conversion following the Battle of Pamplona.



**FATHER JOHN WACHOWICZ**, associate pastor of Saint Rosalie's Parish, Hampton Bays, who will explore Ignatian Spirituality in World and Church History.



**FATHER MICHAEL DUFFY**, rector, Saint Agnes Cathedral Parish, Rockville Centre, who will explore the Theological contributions of Cardinal Avery Dulles, SJ.



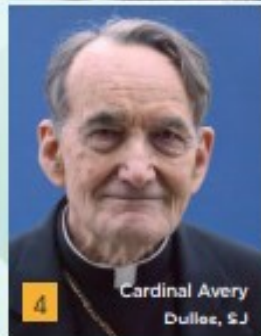

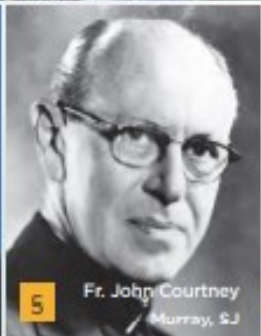

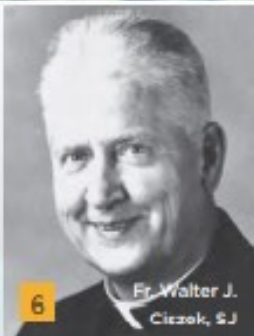

Finally, Monsignor James Vlaun, CEO and president of the Catholic Faith Network, and I will develop a series of my *Encounter* shows with Jesuit theologians and historians that explores the life, mysticism, missionary spirit and centuries-long influence and inspiration of Saint Ignatius of Loyola.


As we will see over the course of this Ignatian Year, Saint Ignatius stands among the great saints in the breadth and depth of his contributions as well as his witness and effects upon the life of the Catholic Church that continue centuries after his death.

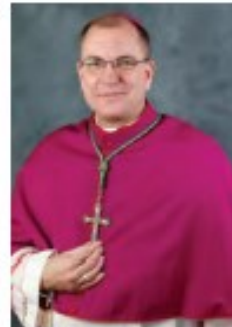
In walking with me and my brother priests on this journey to explore the life and legacy of Saint Ignatius, I invite you to pray with me that the Church recognizes these contributions and names Saint Ignatius of Loyola a "Doctor of the Church." A Doctor of the Church is someone recognized for making an outstanding theological, spiritual, mystical contribution illustrated in their writings and by their holiness in life and creative influence in and on the mission of the Church, an influence that endures centuries after their death.

If this were to happen, Saint Ignatius would join saints like Saint Ambrose (340-397), Saint John Chrysostom (347-407), Saint Jerome (347-420), Saint Augustine (354-430), Saint Gregory the Great (540-604), Saint Bonaventure (1221-1274), Saint Thomas Aquinas (1225-1274), Saint Catherine of Siena (1347-1380), Saint Teresa of Avila (1515-1582), Saint John of the Cross (1542-1591), Saint Robert Bellarmine (1542-1621), Saint Francis de Sales (1567-1622), Saint Alphonsus Liguori (1696-1787), and Saint Therese of Lisieux (1873-1897).

Like Saint Ignatius, we Catholics have been experiencing cannonball-like wounds from the suffering brought about by COVID-19. It is my prayer that through these reflections, like Saint Ignatius, whose life was transformed upon reading those books about Jesus and the saints, the Lord will heal our wounds and lead us all to conversion experiences that focus our lives and the mission of the Church for the greater glory of God.

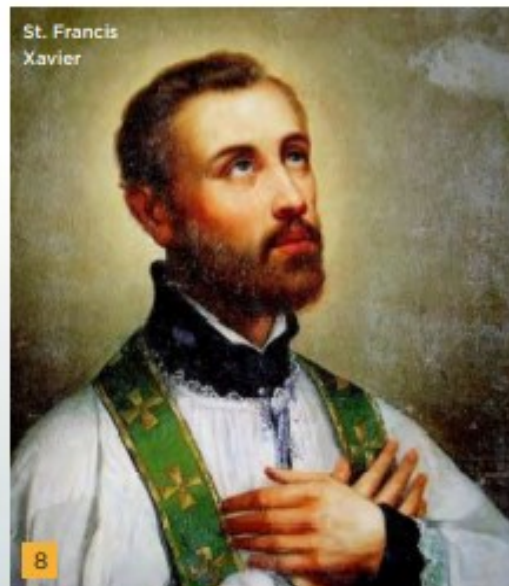

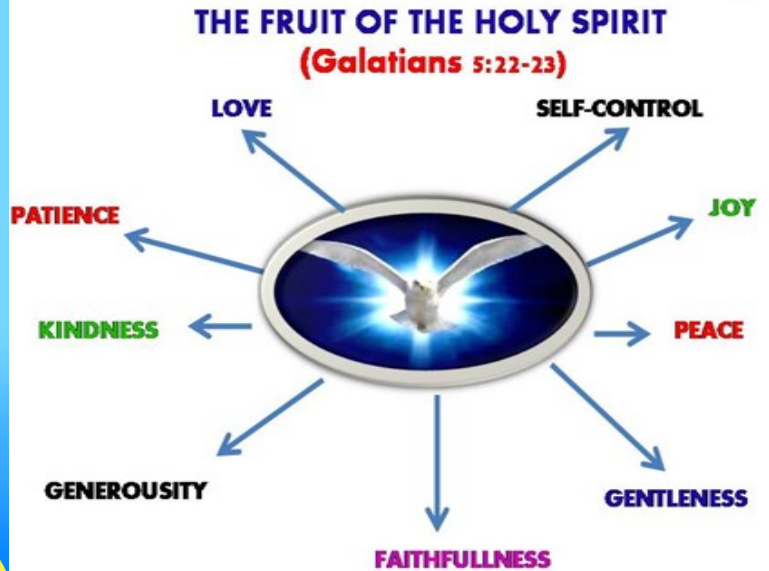
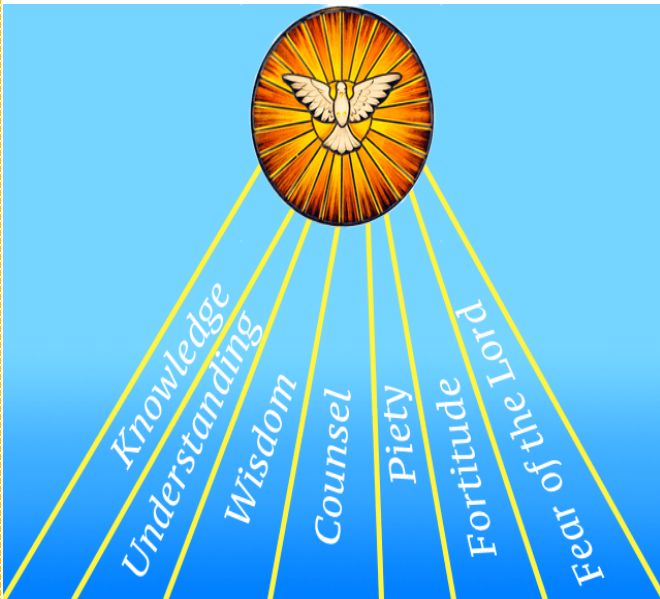

Our efforts, in cooperation with God's graces, and aided by the 7 gifts of the Holy Spirit, will lead us to an eternity with God in eternal happiness. It really needs a constant conscious effort from our side, especially in the beginning, to develop the fruits of the Holy Spirit with the help of the gifts of the Holy Spirit. But it is well worth it, because we will be so richly rewarded and so greatly loved with the God's friends and family. Though we have heard a lot about the gifts and fruits of Holy Spirit, many are unaware of the impacts of these two on us . So let us first have a look at it.

**Differences between the gifts and fruits of the Holy Spirit**

**Gift of the Holy Spirit**

1. Spiritual Capability of a person
2. Gifts of God for the soul.
3. Gifts are means to the goal.
4. Defines how we serve God here on earth

**Fruit of the Holy Spirit**

1. Spiritual character of a person

3. Fruits are the goal

**SAINT BERNADINE OF SIENA; Priest. FEAST DAY: MAY 20**

**Patron Saint** of advertisers, public relations work, gambling addicts, chest problems

Depicted often as small and emaciated, holding in his hand the *IHS* monogram with rays emanating from it representing his devotion to the "Holy Name of Jesus" and with three mitres at his feet representing the three bishoprics which he had rejected.

Born in a noble family, Bernadine had been orphaned at seven and raised by a pious aunt, after whose death, he started to think about where his life should be going. From a young age, he hated indecent talk, and once even slapped a man for that. He joined the Confraternity of Our Lady attached to the hospital of Santa Maria della Scala Church, in Siena, after a course of civil and canon law. He, assisted by ten companions, took upon himself the entire charge of this hospital for four months, when the plague hit Siena. He led a life of prayer and fasting to discover what God wanted him to do. Though he joined the Franciscans, who are missionary preachers and was ordained a priest, he did very little preaching because of a voice that was weak and hoarse, and remained in the background for twelve years praying for his own spiritual conversion and preparation. It was in Milan when he went for a mission, and got up to preach, his voice was strong and commanding, and his words so convincing that the crowd would not let him leave unless he promised to come back. Pope Pius II called him a second Paul because of the missionary life he started there. Unlike many of his contemporaries, who preached only during the liturgy, Bernardine preached directly to the public and chose his themes not from the daily liturgy, but biblical themes that focused on the ordinary lives of the people of Siena. He went on foot across Italy preaching for hours at a time, on punishment for sin, reward for virtue, the mercy of Jesus and the love of Mary, several times a day. Bernardine presented the Virgin Mary as an example for women, and Saint Joseph as an example for men. He had a special devotion to the Holy Name of Jesus, and he devised the symbol, *IHS*, the first three letters of the name of Jesus in Greek, in Gothic letters on a blazing sun. When the devotion spread, and the symbol began to appear in churches, homes and public buildings, his opponents thought it as a dangerous innovation, and he was summoned to Rome to stand trial on charges of this heresy. He was not only found innocent of heresy, but he impressed Pope Martin V sufficiently that upon the Pope's request, he preached in Rome every day for 80 days. Bernardine wrote an entire work systematically devoted to Scholastic economics. In his book, *On Contracts and Usury*, he dealt with the justification of private property, the ethics of trade, the determination of value and price, and the usury question. He did a lot for the establishment of the beneficial loan societies, known as *Monti di Pietà*. In 1438, he was forced to abandon his sermons when he became vicar-general of the Observant branch of the Franciscans in Italy. But in 1442, he persuaded the pope to finally accept his resignation as vicar-general and again resumed his preaching and missionary work. He died in the year 1444, and is buried in the Basilica of San Bernardino, at L'Aquila in the Abruzzi in Naples. According to tradition, his grave continued to leak blood until two factions of the city achieved reconciliation. The first edition of his works, mostly comprised of his elaborate sermons, was printed at Lyon in 1501.

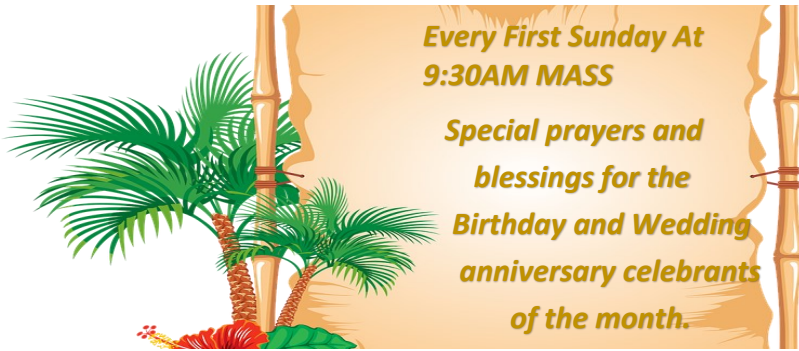
