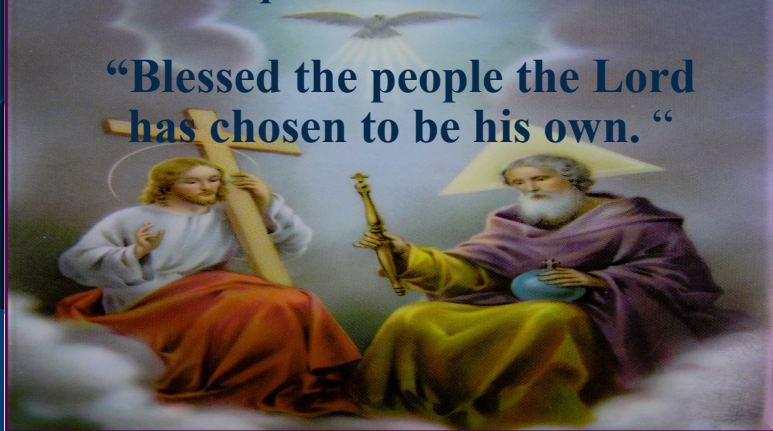

## *Clergy Corner*



My dear St. Ignatius Parish family,

Wish you all a **Blessed Holy Trinity Sunday**. We see in today's Gospel reading that, though the disciples came to the mountain in obedience to the directive of the risen Lord, they were confused. 'They worshiped, but they doubted'. It is quite understandable after what they experienced in those last days of Jesus. They have seen Jesus raising Lazarus from the dead, and many other miracles, including multiplication of bread and other healings. But then they also saw Jesus dying on the cross, and then the resurrected Lord. When they were with Jesus, they might have assumed many things, like Jesus would always do the miracles and they had to just follow Him wherever He went. Or maybe, they might have even thought, He being the Messiah would establish an earthly kingdom where they might be holding important positions. But that was not what was in store for them. Now they were totally clueless about their future. Above all, they might be wondering how long this risen Lord would be with them, and what role they had to do. Jesus totally understood their mental conflict, and assured them of His power and divinity. He gave them the apostolic commission to carry on His work in the world. They were to make disciples, baptize them in the Trinitarian name, and teach the people to observe His commandments. We all are baptized in the name of the Trinity, and we also have to do our part in sharing the Gospel and become better stewards of our time, talent and treasure.

This Monday as we observe **Memorial Day**, we are honoring those who served our country with the sacrificial love of Christ. Let us also not forget those who are still serving, and also the families of both the living and deceased.

As we conclude the month of May dedicated to our Blessed Mother, I invite all, especially those who have done the **33 day Total consecration to Jesus through Mary**, to conclude the month with a good confession and the Act of Consecration on May 31<sup>st</sup>. Whenever we recite a Hail Mary, we are seeking our mother's intercession at the time of our death also. She will surely assist us both now and at our death time. This year being the year of St. Joseph, let us continue to seek his intercession also, as he is the Patron Saint of a happy death, and the role model for fathers. After all, eternal life with Christ is the ultimate goal for all of us. In two days time, we are entering the **month of June, dedicated to the Sacred Heart of Jesus**, let us reflect in a special way of His love, mercy and forgiveness. It is quite sad to see some people on their death bed worrying about whether they are forgiven completely, even about the sins they have committed long ago, and sometimes some even doubt the forgiveness of God even after a good confession, and repeatedly say the same sins even that of their childhood. It is always good to approach the sacrament of confession with a truly repentant heart and go with the confidence that once we have made a good confession with the decision of amendment, God has forgiven us completely. It is we who are not forgiving ourselves. So in this month of Sacred Heart, let us reflect deeper on His merciful love and live as people of hope, peace and happiness.

Next month we celebrate Father's day. We, the priests at St. Ignatius will offer all weekend Masses for all fathers, especially for whom prayers are requested in our Novena Mass envelopes. Let us offer a spiritual bouquet for them as they reflect the love of Jesus Himself, and St. Joseph. We have already begun the **St. Ignatian year** on May 20 which will end on July 31<sup>st</sup>, 2022, his feast day. This is a great occasion of joy as our parish is under his patronage. We are planning various activities to learn more about him and his ways of following Jesus. I hope, by now you all are aware that our Parish has started an **easy, fast, safe, secure and reliable online giving facility**. I express my sincere gratitude for all your contributions. Please continue to support us in all ways possible, to ensure the betterment of our parish. God bless you all .

This all-powerful God chose us to be his own; he created us in love and desires for us to be with him forever. He loves us enough to have become one of us - to live and breathe and suffer as one of us! While on earth as Jesus Christ, he showed us, in healing and forgiving, the depth of his merciful and unconditional love. Through the Son we are made adopted children of God, co-heirs with Christ to the promises of the Kingdom. The Holy Spirit is sent to remain with us - always - demonstrating the steadfastness and faithfulness of God to his people and drawing others to the Father's love. And we, members of the Body of Christ, are commissioned to go "and make disciples of all nations," that all may be given the pathway to the Kingdom. With all this Good News, how can we keep from singing?

**GO EVANGELIZE**

**PRAYER, INVITATION, WITNESS, ACCOMPANIMENT**

"When they all saw him, they worshiped, but they doubted." These words jumped out at me from today's Gospel. After all the Apostles had witnessed, even after their encounters with Jesus following his resurrection, they doubted. That is, until Jesus reassured them that "All power in heaven and on earth has been given to me." Then, look out! Once empowered by the Spirit, the disciples no longer doubt. In readings from the Acts of the Apostles throughout the Easter season, we have heard how the Apostles are transformed into bold and relentless preachers and leaders, healers and miracle workers, by their belief in the power of the Holy Spirit. And they can't suppress the joy they know in believing the Good News. We were made for this joy, and for sharing it as the earliest disciples did. Given all that God has done for us, how can we not?

**STUDY** Read Scripture verses or hymns that rejoice in God's love and bring you joy (Phil 4:4-9 is a good start).

Pray the Act of Faith to reaffirm your belief in the Trinity. Be a joyful Christian!

# SOLEMNITY OF THE MOST HOLY TRINITY



**ALL GLORY TO THE TRIUNE GOD**

The first Sunday after Pentecost is liturgically celebrated as Trinity Sunday, in which we honor the Christian doctrine of the Trinity, one God in three Persons: the Father, the Son, and the Holy Spirit. It is officially known as the *Solemnity of the Most Holy Trinity*. All the Western liturgical churches celebrate Trinity Sunday. On this Sunday, it is good to spend time meditating on what the Father, Son and Holy Spirit have done to redeem us from our sins and ensure our salvation. The word trinity comes from the Latin words “*trinus* “ (“tri”) meaning three and “*unus* “ (“unity”) meaning one. Though the word “trinity” does not appear in Scripture, we see in Matthew 28:18-20, *Then Jesus approached and said to them, “All power in heaven and on earth has been given to me. Go, therefore, and make disciples of all nations, baptizing them in the name of the Father, and of the Son, and of the Holy Spirit, teaching them to observe all that I have commanded you. And behold, I am with you always, until the end of the age.”*. In Mathew 3:16-17, we see, *After Jesus was baptized, he came up from the water and behold, the heavens were opened [for him], and he saw the Spirit of God descending like a dove [and] coming upon him. And a voice came from the heavens, saying, “This is my beloved Son, with whom I am well pleased.”*. It is impossible to completely understand the concept of the Holy Trinity. This is a mystery, and the Scripture tells that we can understand this only through the work of the Holy Spirit; and so it is very apt to celebrate this dogma on the first Sunday after Pentecost, soon after we commemorated the first time the outpouring of the Holy Spirit.

St. Augustine of Hippo, the great Doctor of the Church, spent over 30 years to understand the mystery of the Trinity. There is also a story about this. One day, St. Augustine was walking by the seashore contemplating about this mystery of the Holy Trinity. He then saw a little child carrying water in a shell from the large ocean and pouring it into a small pit that he had made in the sand. Augustine asked him what he was doing, and the boy replied, “I’m going to pour the entire ocean into this hole”. Augustine then said, “That is impossible, my dear child, the sea is so great and the shell and the hole are so little. “That is true,” the boy said. “It would be easier and quicker to draw all the water out of the sea and fit it into this hole than for you to fit the mystery of the Trinity and His Divinity into your little intellect; for the Mystery of the Trinity is greater and larger in comparison with your intelligence than is this vast ocean in comparison with this little hole.” It is believed that it was Child Jesus Himself who came to make St. Augustine understand the limitations of human understanding with regard to the great mysteries of our Faith.

Saint Patrick used the shamrock to teach about the Holy Trinity the people of Ireland, and hence a shamrock is a Catholic symbol for Trinity.

**Prayer to Holy Trinity:** Glory be to the Father, Who by His almighty power and love created me, making me in the image and likeness of God. Glory be to the Son, Who by His Precious Blood delivered me from hell, and opened for me the gates of heaven.

Glory be to the Holy Spirit, Who has sanctified me in the sacrament of Baptism, and continues to sanctify me by the graces I receive daily from His bounty. Glory be to the Three adorable Persons of the Holy Trinity, now and forever. Amen

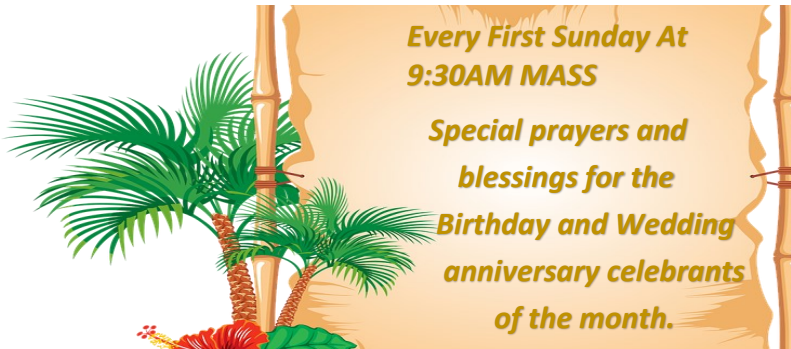

**Early Childhood—Some quick facts**

Date of Birth—23 October 1491; Place of birth—Azpeitia, in the Basque county of Spain

Baptismal name— Iñigo after St. Enecus (*Iñigo* in Spanish);

Later adopted the last name, ‘de Loyola’ and hence got the name *Inigo Lopez de Loyola*

Parents—Don Beltrán and Doña Marina. ; Siblings –12.

He was the youngest of 13 children. As his mother died soon after his birth, he was put in the care of the local blacksmith's wife, María de Garín.

## One Minute Meditations

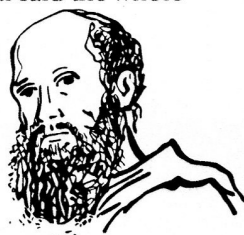
### God is our strength

Life can be exhausting and we can become overwhelmed by what it takes to be good. It is important to remember that we don't struggle alone. *"If God is for us, who is against us? He who did not spare his own Son but gave him up for us all, will he not also give us all things with him?"* (Romans 8:31-32).

### A new approach

St. Paul said the whole law is summed up in love. While he was talking about Mosaic law, laws are given to preserve order. Jesus presented a new fresh approach. Out of love, He came not to abolish the Law, but to bring it to perfection. The relationship between heaven and earth is love.

*"Whatever you ask in my name, I will do it, that the Father may be glorified in the Son; if you ask anything in my name, I will do it"* (John 14:13-14).



## Who do you say that Jesus is?

Jesus said to his Apostles, *"But who do you say that I am?"* (Matthew 16:15). In *Mere Christianity*, C.S. Lewis wrote that there are three ways to answer this question. Perhaps Jesus was a liar, deliberately misleading others by claiming to be God. Or, was He insane, deluded into thinking He was God? Finally, perhaps He was what He said He was – God.

**Liar:** If Jesus deliberately misled others, He would have been evil. Yet, his friends wrote that He did incredible acts of good, was honest, kind, and compassionate. No one experienced Jesus as a bad man.

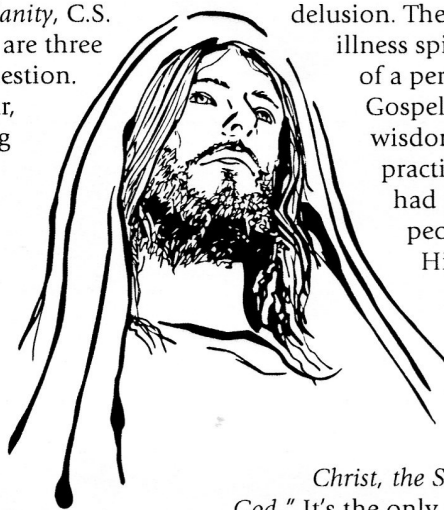
**Lunatic:** What if Jesus were insane and deluded when believing He was

God? Being out of touch with reality wouldn't have been confined to one delusion. The effects of mental illness spill into many areas of a person's life. Yet, the Gospels describe Jesus' wisdom, intelligence, and practical good sense. He had an ability to attract people who respected His authority.

**Lord:** When Jesus asked, *"But who do YOU say that I am?"*, Peter responded, *"You are the*

*Christ, the Son of the living God."* It's the only answer that makes sense.

Ultimately, we all have to answer the question of who Jesus is for ourselves. We can pray for the faith of Peter to declare Jesus our Lord and our God.



## Why Do Catholics Do That?

## Why do Catholics pray the Rosary?

Popes, saints, and Catholics over the centuries have turned to the Rosary for miraculous help in seemingly impossible situations. The mysteries of the Rosary describe the events of Jesus' life, death and

Resurrection. As we pray the Rosary, we revisit these events.

The Rosary is deeply ingrained in our Catholic identity. The rhythm of the Rosary is meant to still our minds and direct our hearts to communion with God, placing our focus on God and not on the world.





## Mary brings us to the heart of her Son

Jesus so loved his mother that his last thoughts on the Cross were of her. He gave her to us as our own mother, and wants us to honor her. "Since Mary is rightly to be regarded as the way by which we are led to Christ, the person who encounters Mary cannot help but encounter Christ likewise" (*Mense Maio*, Blessed Pope Paul VI).

For her "yes." Without fully understanding what God intended, she unhesitatingly agreed to become his mother. Her "yes" made it possible for God to become



human and be crucified for our salvation.

Following her example means saying "yes" to whatever God asks.

For her sacrifice. Wouldn't you be forever grateful to someone who gave up her child so that you and your loved ones might live? Mary loved her amazing child and she experienced unspeakable heartache as he was sacrificed for us. Praying the Rosary regularly reminds us of the life of Jesus and the desire of his Mother to bring us close to his heart.

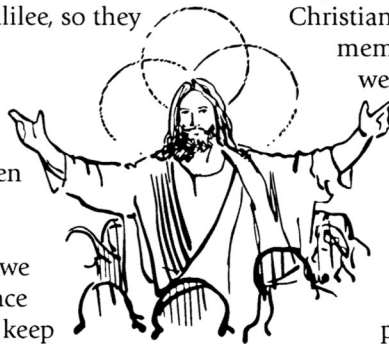
### from Scripture

### Matthew 28:16-20, The Holy Trinity

Jesus appeared to the Apostles on the mountain top in Galilee, so they could receive their final instructions. They were to go forth, baptize, make disciples, and to teach what they had been taught.

These are our instructions, too. Once we meet Jesus and experience his love for us, we can't keep him to ourselves. We must share him.

Jesus also revealed to the Apostles, and to the crowd gathered with them, that God is a Trinity — Father, Son, and Holy Spirit — three Divine Persons united in love. The belief that God is



three, yet one, is distinct to Christianity. When we became members of the Church, we were baptized in the name of the Trinity.

The Trinity is a mystery we may not fully understand, but we can still live in its love and power. We proclaim our faith in it

whenever we make the Sign of the Cross: "In the name of the Father, and of the Son, and of the Holy Spirit." Our ultimate goal is to follow Christ into the eternal life of the Trinity.

### Q & A Why are Catholics urged to pray?

St. Therese of Lisieux said, "For me, prayer is a surge of the heart; it is a simple look turned toward heaven, it is a cry of recognition and of love, embracing both trial and joy."



Practically speaking, prayer is how we connect with God.

Prayer helps us to hear God's voice. By praying, we learn about Him, come to understand what He wants for us, and how we reap the blessings He wants to give us. The more we pray, the closer to Him we become. "Christian prayer is a covenant relationship between God and man in Christ" (Catechism of the Catholic Church, #2564).

Through our Baptism, we are united with Jesus. When we pray often and regularly, we create the habit of being in His presence and in communion with Him. And, we tap into our Baptismal connection. Through a healthy prayer life, we enjoy a personal and living relationship with God.

God seeks to draw us each to Himself. Prayer is our answer to Him.

### Feasts & Celebrations

May 1 – St. Joseph the Worker. Entrusted with the care of the Blessed Mother and Jesus, Joseph was a carpenter dedicated to his family and obedient to God.

May 13 – Solemnity of the Ascension of the Lord (1st Century). This solemnity marks the completion of Jesus' mission of salvation and his triumphant entry into Heaven. *Note: In many dioceses, observance of Ascension has been moved to the following Sunday.*

May 18 – St. Felix of Cantalice (1587). Born to poor, pious parents in

Italy, St. Felix was called "Brother Deogratias" because he was always thanking God. As a young man, he joined the Capuchins, who sent him to Rome to be the friary's official beggar. He was also friends with Saints Philip Neri and Charles Borromeo.

May 23 – Pentecost (1st century). After the Resurrection and Ascension of Jesus, the Holy Spirit was given to the Church at the first Pentecost. When the apostles received the Holy Spirit, the "new age" of the Church was born.

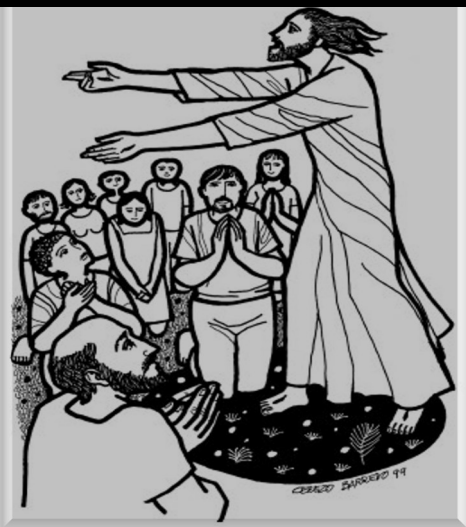
