Clergy Corner



My dear St. Ignatius family,

Today is Mother's Day, and in the very onset, I would like to wish all mothers of our Parish family, **A VERY HAPPY MOTHER'S DAY**. May God bless you and give you health in mind and body, throughout your lives. May you be taken care of, for the countless sacrifices you have made for your children, and the family as a whole. May you be rewarded for all that you do for the welfare of society, and in particular for our parish and church as a whole. As I wrote last week, throughout this month, the priests here at St. Ignatius, will offer all the weekend Masses for all those mothers honored or remembered by their family members. The envelopes received from you for your mothers, will be kept near the altar, and their names can be found on pages 13 & 14 of this bulletin. Let us continue to honor them and show them our love by this spiritual bouquet, along with the other surprises and gifts you have planned for them.

In this week, the connection between motherhood and the reception of Holy Communion has struck me very deeply. The moment a woman conceives and comes to know about it, mentally and psychologically motherhood begins in her. She no longer feels alone, and in everything she does, she is automatically concerned about her child in her womb. They give up many things for the sake of the unborn child...the child which they have never seen. Of course, there are exceptions, I do agree. But that small number should not outweigh the majority who prepare for the birth of the child with much enthusiasm, nourish themselves with whatever is good for the growth of the foetus. What happens to us when we receive Jesus who is truly present in the Holy Eucharist? Shouldn't we feel that same oneness with Him? Shouldn't we keep our body and soul clean for the Holy One Who abides in us? As we celebrate this great day, try to reflect on this aspect a little more.

Another thought that came into my mind regarding motherhood, is the spiritual motherhood. For instance, my benefactress, Elizabeth Bachmayer, who sponsored me as a seminarian, consider me as her spiritual son, and we pray for each other every single day, and we keep in touch regularly. I remember her especially in every single Mass I celebrate. Isn't it a beautiful motherhood? As Jesus said, we priests who have left our own families to embrace the bigger family of the church, are privileged to have many such spiritual mothers, who pray for us. What about the anonymous sponsors of those in various orphanages in different parts of the world? Aren't they carrying them in their hearts? Also what about those mothers who adopt children? It's true that they are not their biological mothers, and have not carried them in their wombs, but aren't they giving their children, a motherly love? Haven't they conceived their children in their hearts? Isn't that too a beautiful "conception?" So it is good to pray for all those who play the role of a spiritual mother in our lives. Let us also remember our godmothers in our prayers, especially today.

Our Blessed Mother carried Jesus in her womb, gave birth to Him and nourished Him with her milk. She is indeed the Mother of God. As Jesus gave her as our mother, we are privileged to have the mother of God as our mother. She loves us immensely and is always trying to help us in all our spiritual and corporal needs, just like she helped in the wedding in Cana, even before we ask her. Every single day, she is mothering us. Shouldn't we wish her on Mother's Day and make this day special for her. This Sunday, we are honoring Our heavenly Mother in a special way, and expressing our immense love to her by crowning her. Our pure little ones who received their First Holy Communion on the last two Saturdays, will do that on behalf of all of us, at the 9:30am Mass. May Our Lord and Mother Mary keep them safe from all evil and temptations throughout their lives. A big thank you to all those who made it happen, especially the parents, catechists and St. Anne prayer group who prepared them.

Last but not least, I would like to invite all of you who can come, to join us, at least for one day, and lead the rosary if possible. I have 20/15 vision. I can see things in the distance as well as close up. But that doesn't mean I can see everything perfectly. Because of a difference in how each eye focuses, I can't find those hidden images in "magic eye" posters, and forget trying to watch a 3D movie! Seeing all things perfectly is not something many of us could claim, including Peter. And yet, with God's help, he understands a vision God gave to him: "In truth," Peter says, "I see that God shows no partiality. Rather, in every nation, whoever fears him and acts uprightly is acceptable to him." Through God's mercy and Jesus' redemptive cross, the kingdom of God has been prepared for all peoples. God's saving power has been revealed. With faith, and the help of the Holy Spirit in living out the commandments, we can fix our eyes on Christ - the revelation of God's love who came into the world that we might have life through him.

GO EVANGELIZE

PRAYER, INVITATION, WITNESS, ACCOMPANIMENT

So much information comes to us every day, in all forms of media, there are now even shortcuts to the shortcuts for grasping the content. My personal favorite is the abbreviation, "TL; DR" which means "too long, didn't read." Some might claim that we are dumbing down our culture with this type of shorthand notation, or we could argue that clear, concise, and straightforward is simply best. And that is what Jesus gives us today in his one commandment: "Love one another as I love you." He offers commentary for the commandment and gives reasons for why he is telling it to us, but the crux of it cannot be missed: *love one another*. It is a commandment both simple, yet complex; easy, yet at times exponentially difficult to live. So Jesus provides the key to fulfilling it by saying, "remain in my love" [emphasis mine]. Faithfulness to a sacramental life and participation in communal living give us the grace to remain in that love - which in turn transforms and enables us to share that love with others.

PRAY To honor the celebration of Mother's Day, pray the Rosary today for the intentions of our mothers, for those who have been motherly influences to us, and for those who long to be mothers.

Dear Nurses of Long Island:

In this last year, no one was left unaffected by the trials and tribulations of the COVID-19 pandemic, but nurses, in a most profound way, were at the frontline from the very beginning, have been there during the darkest hours, and will be there to the very end. I am most grateful for the dedication of every nurse in our Diocese of Rockville Centre who, called to duty in these unprecedented times, demonstrated the grace, strength, and perseverance that epitomizes the Nursing profession and our Christian duty to care for the sick and suffering.

But it is more than just the last year. I thank every one of you in our hospitals, nursing homes and rehabilitation centers, home care environments, hospices, primary care and specialty clinics, schools, and most especially in our Catholic Health system, for giving selflessly, throughout your careers, and bringing Christ's compassion and consolation to so many. I thank you for seeing the beauty and dignity of the human person in every patient you serve.

In the last year, I know how so many of you, painfully aware of the dangers you faced with an unknown infection, bravely donned full body Personal Protective Equipment to minister to the sick and dying in our hospitals, nursing homes and private residences. But I also know of the less-chronicled times you have been away from your own families for extended shifts during a snowstorm or hurricane, when you have brought cheer with a small token of love for a lonesome patient, when you have listened or prayed with a family member, and when you have rejoiced over the news of a cure or recovery. At the same time, you have been there to comfort, console, and accompany many patients and their families through difficult times. You have been at the foot of the Cross.

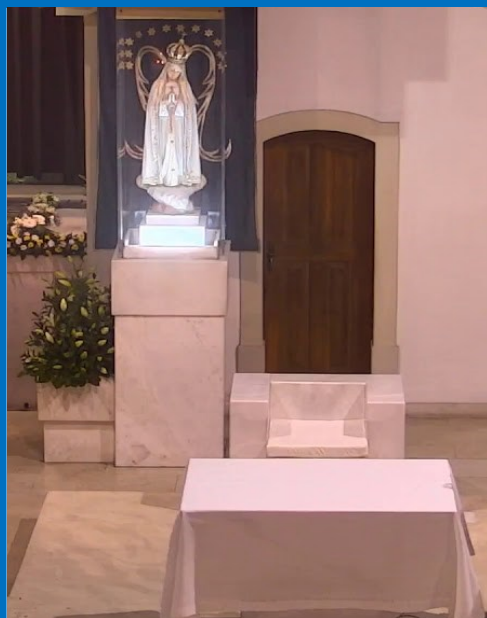
It is for these qualities of character, this deep commitment, and these sacrifices whether small or heroic, that we know those who enter the field of Nursing have a special vocation: to bring Christ to the bedside, to heal the wounds of the body, and more importantly, those of the soul.

And so, as we mark National Nurses Week, it is with the sincerest gratitude that I thank you for all you do to serve God's people here on Long Island, for bearing witness to His call to love our neighbor: "For the whole law is fulfilled in one statement, 'You shall love your neighbor as yourself.'" (Gal 5:14). Nursing, in its purest form, manifests this truth articulated by Pope Benedict XVI in *Caritas in Veritate*: "everything has its origin in God's love, everything is shaped by it, everything is directed towards it. Love is God's greatest gift to humanity; it is his promise and our hope."

OUR LADY OF FATIMA, PORTUGAL

Just over a week after Pope Benedict XV made a direct appeal to the Blessed Mother to intercede for peace in the world during World War I, Our Lady began to appear at Fatima, Portugal to three shepherd children, Lucia aged 10, and her cousins, Francisco and Jacinta, aged nine and seven. The Angel of Peace prepared them for their meetings with the Queen of Heaven in the spring of the previous year, 1916 and later on in the summer and encouraged them to pray and make sacrifices for peace in their country. In the autumn, he appeared before them holding a chalice in his hands, above which was suspended a host from which drops of blood were falling into the chalice. The Angel left the chalice suspended in the air and prostrated himself before it in prayer, and taught them a prayer of Eucharistic reparation. On May 13, 1917, when the three children were in the small area known as the Cova da Iria (Cove of Peace) with their sheep, after lunch and the Rosary, they suddenly saw what in Lucia's words, "A lady, clothed in white, brighter than the sun, radiating a light more clear and intense than a crystal cup filled with sparkling water lit by burning sunlight." They had 5 more apparitions. At the last apparition, the greatest miracle to occur since the Resurrection, popularly known as "The Miracle of the Sun" occurred and October 13, 1917 has come to be known as "The Day the Sun Danced," and Fatima quickly became a major pilgrimage center.

The 3 secrets of Our Lady of Fatima

1. **VISION OF HELL** - Our Lady explained that devotion to the **Immaculate Heart of Mary** can save souls from going to Hell.
2. **WORLD WAR I & II**—Our Lady said that the path to peace is a **special Marian consecration**, especially that of Russia. Popes Pius XII and John Paul II both had a special relationship with Our Lady of Fátima. Pope Pius XII consecrated Russia and Pope John Paul II consecrated the entire world to the Blessed Virgin Mary.
3. **VISION OF A POPE WHO IS SHOT, AND THE CALL TO PENANCE.** -Pope John Paul II believed that this vision has great connection with his own assassination attempt, and that Our Lady of Fatima saved his life, and so one of the bullets that struck him was encased in her crown .

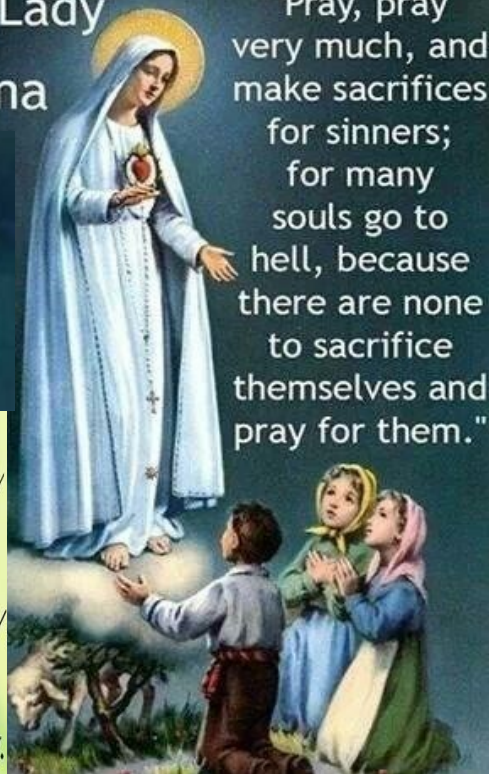

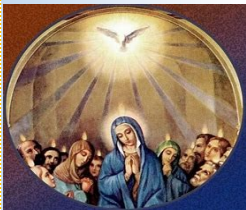

HAPPY MOTHER'S DAY TO OUR BLESSED MOTHER MARY FROM ALL HER CHILDREN



The **Chapel of Milk Grotto**, also known as the **Grotto of Our Lady** or simply the **Milk Grotto**, is in Bethlehem, behind the Church of the Nativity. According to tradition, while Mary and Joseph were fleeing to Egypt, during the Massacre of the Innocent Infants by King Herod, Holy Family stopped in this cave while Mary nursed the baby Jesus. A "drop of milk" of the Virgin Mary fell on the floor of the cave and changed its color to white. The **Franciscans** erected a church around the Milk Grotto in 1872, and the local people of Bethlehem decorated the shrine with mother-of-pearl carvings, to express their love. This tiny 5x10-meter grotto has been a favorite pilgrim destination for women of various religions, particularly childless women who have problems in conceiving, or the new mothers looking to increase their milk supply. Many believe that a visit here will increase the quantity of their milk or enable them to become pregnant, especially if the powdery white chalk from the cave is mixed into food, and pray to Our Lady of the Milk. The inner walls of the chapel covered with letters and baby pictures sent from around the world to the Milk Grotto, testify the effectiveness of the "milk powder" and prayer. Mixing the powder in water and drinking it gives a special feeling of Our Blessed Mother's maternal love and protection. In 2007, a modern chapel dedicated to the Mother of God which is connected to the Milk Grotto church by a tunnel, was opened. A monastery of the Sisters of Perpetual Adoration of the Blessed Sacrament is attached to the chapel, where the nuns practice perpetual Eucharistic adoration, and are also uninterruptedly praying for peace after the installation of 'Queen of Peace' tabernacle" in their Eucharistic Adoration Chapel in 2016. When you visit the Holy Land, it is good to make sure that your guide will take you here, so that you will not miss the opportunity to visit this beautiful place.

WHY THE MONTH OF MAY TRADITIONALLY DEDICATED TO MARY?



Though the majority of Catholics may be aware that May is consecrated to Mary, for many, it may be unclear why it is so. Usually the month of May is a part of the Easter season, which is the period of fifty days from Easter to Pentecost. It is good to recall how she strengthened and guided the Apostles during this difficult period, and waited for the Holy Spirit. Her presence in the beginnings of the Church is very significant, and so this is the first and foremost reason.

Another reason is the connection between May and motherhood, in classic western culture. May was connected with the beginning of new life, which led to May being associated with motherhood in general. So Mother's Day is celebrated in May in many countries. As Mary gave birth to Jesus and nurtured Him, and is truly the Mother of God and our heavenly Mother, the connection between May and motherhood led Christians to adopt May as the month of our Lady.

Although it's a tradition in the Church, although there are special graces connected to it, honor her and love her, not because of these reasons, but because she is our Mother and because she cares for all of us all the time, without fail, interceding for us in even the smallest matters.

Queridas enfermeras de Long Island:

En este último año, nadie quedó sin ser afectado por las pruebas y tribulaciones de la pandemia del COVID-19, pero las enfermeras, de la manera más profunda, estuvieron en la primera línea desde el principio, han estado allí durante las horas más oscuras, y estarán allí hasta el final. Estoy muy agradecido por la dedicación de todas las enfermeras de nuestra Diócesis de Rockville Centre que, llamadas al servicio en estos tiempos sin precedentes, demostraron la gracia, la fuerza y la perseverancia que personifican la profesión de enfermería y nuestro deber cristiano de cuidar a los enfermos y a los que sufren.

Pero es algo más que solo el año pasado. Les doy las gracias a cada una de ustedes en nuestros hospitales, residencias de ancianos y centros de rehabilitación, ambientes de atención domiciliaria, hospicios, clínicas de atención primaria y especializada, escuelas y, muy especialmente, en nuestro sistema católico de salud, por darse desinteresadamente, a lo largo de sus carreras, y llevar la compasión y el consuelo de Cristo a tantos.
