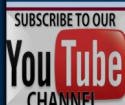

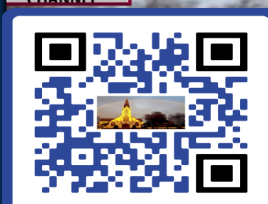

**GROW AS A DISCIPLE | PRAY, STUDY, ENGAGE, SERVE**

I'm struck by phrases in today's first and second readings: The prophet Ezekiel is told that those to whom he will be sent are "hard of face and obstinate of heart"; and Saint Paul aptly describes a "thorn in the flesh" as having been given to him. He even refers to this thorn as "an angel of Satan." These are descriptive images! So, I wondered, What do these images look like in practice? The Gospel gives us a clear example: those who grew up with Jesus refuse to see him as a prophet. At one time in my life, I might have said to myself: "Wow, I can't believe people of his own time would reject Jesus!" However, as I grow older, I'm conscious not only of more physical aches and pains, but the "thorn in the flesh" of patterns I'm not particularly proud of - cynicism, pessimism, even hard-heartedness and a closed mind. The "they" in today's readings hits closer to home and strikes me more as "we" than it used to. And yet, as Saint Paul reminds us, we can bring our imperfections to God and pray for grace to give us strength in our weakness, hearts open to God's love, and ears ready to hear the Gospel and be transformed by Jesus.

**GO EVANGELIZE**

**PRAYER, INVITATION, WITNESS, ACCOMPANIMENT**

When Jesus returned to his hometown, he was not exactly greeted like a "hometown hero." His contemporaries could see him only as a carpenter, and not the Messiah: "So he was not able to perform any mighty deed there, apart from curing a few sick people by laying his hands on them. He was amazed at their lack of faith." We know that Jesus went on to perform the mightiest of deeds - dying and rising from the dead. And yet, even today, he would be "amazed at our lack of faith." Today's Gospel and the other readings encourage us to do a check-up of our spiritual health and pray for the grace to continue to grow in faith. We can also pray for others who may be questioning or have lost their faith, inviting them to consider coming to church with us or simply offering to pray with and for them.

**REFLECT** For a more intentional look at whatever thorns might be in your side, and what weaknesses those contribute to, consider doing a retreat. Attend an in-person retreat at a local retreat house, or look into online options for a guided retreat at home.

# Jesus Son of God, Son of Man

In today's Gospel reading, we see Jesus being rejected in His own home town, because of His familiarity. In the Gospel of this Sunday, from St. Mark, He was just the "son of Mary", and in the parallel Gospel account of Matthew, He was just the "son of the carpenter". Last week, we saw Jesus described as the Son of Man, Peter's profound proclamation of Jesus as the Messiah, and the demons recognizing Him as the Son of God. So let us have a quick glance at the phrases "Son of Man" and "Son of God" which are used for Jesus Christ, to refer to His humanity and deity.

At the time of His Baptism (Matthew 3:17) and again at the time of His Transfiguration (Matthew 17:5), God the Father, Himself introduced Jesus as "This is my beloved Son." So He is indeed the Son of God.

In the book of the Prophet Daniel, we see "As the visions during the night continued, I saw coming with the clouds of heaven, One like a son of man. When he reached the Ancient of Days and was presented before him, He received dominion, splendor, and kingship; all nations, peoples and tongues will serve him. His dominion is an everlasting dominion that shall not pass away, his kingship, one that shall not be destroyed." So a majority of the Jews of that time recognized that the title "Son of Man" was messianic. So in a way, Jesus was basically referring to Daniel's vision and called Himself the Messiah every time He used this title. That's why when Jesus asked His disciples about His identity, and when Peter replied "You are the Messiah, the Son of the living God," Jesus said that it was revealed to Peter by His heavenly Father.

Jesus was fully God and fully man. He was the God-man. He was God who came in human flesh. If He was not a man, He could not have died. If He was not God, He would have been a sinner, and could not have resurrected or ascended into heaven. But as the God-man, He was the sinless man – the perfect sacrifice – a sinless sacrifice for our sins. He took the form of a human, fulfilled His mission to redeem us, and returned to heaven, as He is God.

**SAINT ST. MARIA GORETTI ; FEAST DAY : JULY 6**

**VIRGIN AND MARTYR**

**PATRON SAINT** of Victims of rape, crime victims, teenage girls, modern youth.

Often depicted holding lilies.

Maria Goretti was born on October 16 1890 in Corinaldo, in the Ancona Province in Italy, as the third of the seven children of Luigi Goretti and Assunta Carlini. Her father was a farm worker. Due to poverty, her family had to move to Ferrier di Conca, near Anzio., where his father had to work for other farmers. When her father died of malaria, her mother, brothers, and sisters worked in the fields while Maria cooked, sewed, kept the house clean, and watched her youngest sister Teresa. On July 5, 1902, eleven-year-old Maria was sitting on the outside steps of her home, sewing, when Alessandro tried to rape her and threatened to stab her if she did not submit to him. But she said she would rather die, than submit to him and commit a mortal sin. She warned him that he would go to hell. Alessandro then pulled out a knife and stabbed her fourteen times and fled. On hearing the cry of Teresa, Maria's family returned home and found her bleeding on the floor. They quickly took her to the nearest hospital, where she underwent surgery without anesthesia. The next day, Maria forgave Alessandro and said she wanted to see him in Heaven with her, and died while looking upon an image of the Virgin Mary and holding a cross to her chest. Alessandro Serenelli was soon captured, and sent to prison. He remained unrepentant for his actions until he had a dream in which Maria gave him lilies, which burned immediately in his hands. After his release, he went directly to Maria's mother and begged her forgiveness. He referred to her as "my little saint." and reportedly prayed to her every day. Maria was declared a saint and Alessandro was present in the St. Peter's crowd to celebrate her canonization. Alessandro later became a lay brother of the Order of Friars Minor Capuchin, living in a monastery and working as its receptionist and gardener until his death in 1970 at the age of 87. St. Maria Goretti is called a martyr because she fought against Alessandro's attempts at sexual sin. How she forgave her attacker - her concern for her enemy extending even beyond death - and the miracle her forgiveness produced in his life, are the most important aspects of her story . She is buried in the crypt of the Basilica of Nostra Signora delle Grazie e Santa Maria Goretti in Nettuno.

### **Official Prayer to St. Maria Goretti**

Oh Saint Maria Goretti who, strengthened by God's grace, did not hesitate, even at such a young age, to shed your blood and sacrifice life itself to defend your virginal purity, look graciously on the unhappy human race which has strayed far from the path of eternal salvation. Teach us all, and especially youth, with what courage and promptitude we should flee for the love of Jesus anything that could offend Him or stain our souls with sin. Obtain for us from our Lord victory in temptation, comfort in the sorrows of life, and the grace which we earnestly beg of thee (here mention your intention), and may we one day enjoy with thee the imperishable glory of Heaven. Amen.

**ST.IGNATIAN YEAR CORNER**

**Life immediately after recovery**

After recovery, by the spring of 1522, Ignatius entered the Benedictine monastery, Santa Maria de Montserrat. He spent three days in thoroughly examining the sins of his whole life, and confessed all his past sins. Before an image of the Black Madonna, he laid down his military garments, his sword and dagger, during an overnight vigil at the shrine. He gave his clothes to a poor man, wore sack cloth and spent the night of March 24 in prayer .

**Ignatian Spirituality**

St. Ignatius says Confession involves healing, and there are three steps for a Sacramental Confession.

1. **Confession of my faith** which is actually an acknowledgement that there is something greater than myself and that life has a deeper meaning that we want to tap into. It means admitting that I am a *part* of an entire world of people striving together for this *greater something*.
2. **Confession of my humanity** which means accepting my humanness, and the strengths and weaknesses that come with it.
3. **Actual confession of sins**, which is more about restoration than about guilt. When we become so vulnerable to admit our faults and failings, healing comes in two ways— self healing which helps to forgive ourselves, and the healing of broken relationships with others, by forgiving them with the forgiveness we ourselves have experienced.

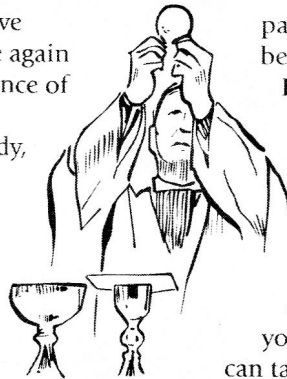


## Welcome back to Mass!

participating in Mass – the more we enjoy the benefits.

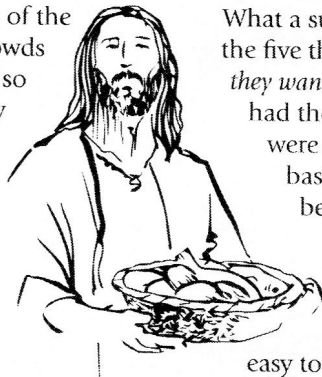

### Q & A

### What is expected of Catholics?

Every household has basic ground rules: "Be respectful," "Clean up your messes," etc. This way, everybody benefits. Like every family, the Catholic Church has "house rules" as well:



**Come home every weekend:** "You shall attend Mass on Sundays and on holy days of obligation and rest from servile labor." God wants to see us back in person – often!

**Take responsibility:** "You shall confess your sins at least once a year." Since we are prone to sin, we're obligated to reconcile with God at least once a year.

**Reconnect:** "You shall receive the sacrament of the Eucharist at least during the Easter season." In the Eucharist, Jesus nourishes us with his Body and Blood at every Mass!

**Practice detachment:** "You shall observe the days of fasting and abstinence established by the Church." Fasting helps us free our hearts for God's love.

**Help around the house:** "You shall help to provide for the needs of the Church." Whether we donate money, time or resources, every little bit helps. (CCC, #2042-2043)

### Feasts & Celebrations

**July 16 – Our Lady of Mount Carmel (1251).** Carmelite tradition holds that Our Lady appeared to St. Simon on Mount Carmel and gave him a scapular. Wearing one has become a popular way to honor the Blessed Mother.

**July 22 – St. Mary Magdalene (1st century).** Mary Magdalene was the woman from whom Jesus expelled seven demons in St. Luke's gospel (Luke 8:2). She helped to support Jesus' ministry out of her own money and stood by the Cross of Jesus with his mother. Known as the "Apostle to the

Apostles," Mary was the one who first informed the Apostles of Jesus' Resurrection.

**July 25 – St. James (1st Century).** When Jesus called St. James and his brother, John, to become apostles, they left their father in a fishing boat on the Sea of Galilee. St. James was one of three apostles to witness Jesus' transfiguration, the raising of Jairus' daughter, and the agony in Gethsemane. St. James was the first of the apostles to be martyred.
