GROW AS A DISCIPLE | PRAY, STUDY, ENGAGE, SERVE

As a college student, I found myself sitting near the information desk during a layover at a German airport. This was in the days before mobile phones and Google Translate. I remember being so impressed that the two young women behind the desk were able to answer questions in so many languages without missing a beat. Whether it was Spanish, French, German or English, each traveler heard an answer in their own language. I often think that must have been what it was like for the travelers to Jerusalem during Pentecost. They were in an unfamiliar place and yet God spoke to them in a way they could understand. And the beautiful thing about the Pentecost story is that it is not just relating one single moment in time. Instead, it is the start of the Holy Spirit's ministry here on earth, and in our baptism, we, too, receive the same gift of the Holy Spirit. Confirmation completes the grace we receive at baptism, since we receive a "special strength of the Holy Spirit." (CCC 1285) We, too, are given the tools to go forth and speak to others even when we are afraid they may not understand. Let us remember St. Paul's words from the second reading: "To each individual the manifestation of the Spirit is given for some benefit." And then let us go out and use those gifts for the greater glory of God.

GO EVANGELIZE

PRAYER, INVITATION, WITNESS, ACCOMPANIMENT

The idea of evangelizing is uncomfortable for many people. Sure, it was fine for the disciples to go out and start talking to strangers, but us? No way. However, evangelization doesn't have to mean starting conversations on the street (although it can!). Instead, it might be making the sign of the cross before a meal in a restaurant, mentioning Mass when a co-worker asks what you did over the weekend, or displaying a crucifix in your home where visitors will see it. In these small ways, we can encourage others to open the door for God to "shine within these hearts of yours," as today's Gospel Sequence says.

STUDY St. Paul reminds us today that we are all "baptized into one body" and "we were all given to drink of one Spirit." In today's divisive world, it can be difficult to remember that. One Body, One Spirit in Christ

St. Paul reminds us that we are one body and one spirit in Jesus Christ (see this Sunday's Second Reading, 1 Cor. 12, 3-7, 12-13). He compares our Church to a human body with its many parts. Despite many parts, the human body works with all its members harmoniously for the good of the whole--so also in Jesus Christ. He is the head; we are the members of His mystical body. Paul, thus, states in today's reading: "For in one Spirit we were all baptized into one body, whether Jews or Greeks, slaves or free persons, and we were all given to drink of one spirit" (1 Cor. 12:12-13).

Look around our parish. We see the Universal Church in its microcosm—its miniature form. We see men, women and children of every age, background and culture, ethnicity and nationality. As our Holy Father states, throughout the world, the Church embraces all peoples of all places, uniting all the peoples of the Church is its life-giving soul, the Holy Spirit.

On this Pentecost Sunday, we profess one faith with one voice by reciting the creed during the Holy Mass. Putting aside all selfishness and individualism, we must open ourselves to the power of the Spirit who can blow away all our fear and doubt. In the third Eucharistic prayer, therefore, we pray: "Grant that we, who are nourished by His Body and Blood, may be filled with His Holy Spirit and become one body, one spirit in Christ." Whether we are male or female, young or old, white or black, rich or poor, each one of us has been called to be a member of the mystical body of Christ. Like Jesus Christ himself, the head of the body, we dare to raise our eyes to heaven and call God, Our Father.

Before the day of Pentecost, the Apostles and the followers of Jesus felt like orphans, abandoned and confused. Doubts filled their minds and fear tugged at their hearts. Thus, feeling abandoned and confused, each one could think only of himself--for in time of fear our worst inclination toward selfishness becomes manifest and our instinct for self-preservation becomes all consuming.

Then an amazing thing happened. With a great rush of wind, the Holy Spirit came upon them. It is the same Holy Spirit who had sanctified Mary. Doubts and fears were blown away. The apostles and disciples stood up together like one body; they then boldly went forth to proclaim the marvels God had accomplished in Jesus Christ. They had become like Mary in their dedication to Christ.

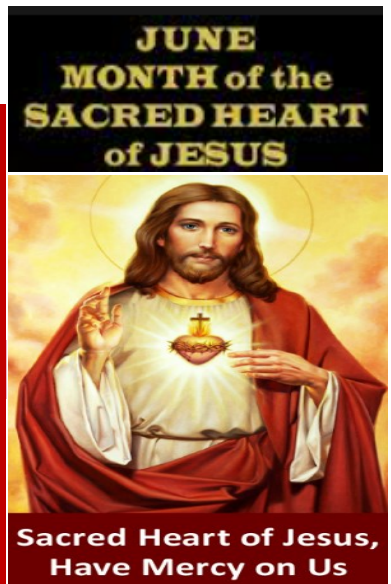
All thoughts of selfishness and disunity had been left behind in the Upper Room. The Church, born from the side of the Savior on the cross, had now been formed by the Holy Spirit into a unity and a community. After Jesus had ascended into heaven and returned to His Father, He sent forth the Spirit from Himself and His Heavenly Father upon the Church to unite all its members in love as one body and of one Spirit.

When Jesus promised the Spirit, He first said to His apostles, "Peace be with you." Peace is the fruit of unity and harmony. When we offer each other the sign of peace during the Holy Mass, we are actually praying that we will be open to the Spirit of love who unites us as one in Jesus Christ. This Pentecost Day can have real meaning in our own lives if, filled with the Holy Spirit, we go forth from our Church determined to be instruments of peace, joy, charity and harmony. Only our own selfishness can inhibit the beautiful movement of the Spirit. Worshipping God as one people during the Holy Mass, we can become who we truly are—a people of one body, one mind, and one spirit in Jesus Christ!

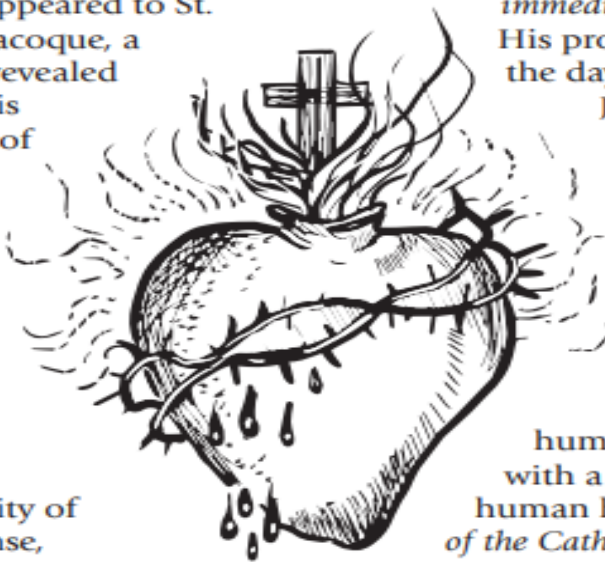

God so loves the world

In 1673, Jesus appeared to St. Margaret Mary Alacoque, a French nun, and revealed the intensity of His love in the image of the Sacred Heart, *"Behold the Heart which has so loved [mankind] that it has spared nothing...in order to testify Its love."*

God's love is intense: The famous image illustrates the reality of a love that is intense, extravagant, passionate, and eternally faithful. Display the Sacred Heart image in your home or workplace to remind you that His extravagant love is for you.

His Heart is our safe place: Jesus advised St. Faustina: *"Do not bargain with temptation but lock yourself*



immediately in my Heart." Seek His protection often throughout the day, *"O Sacred Heart of Jesus, I place all my trust in You."*

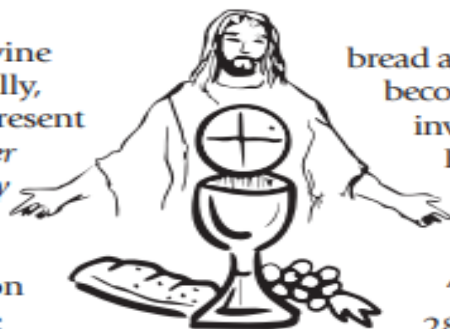
God shares our nature: The Sacred Heart illustrates the mystery of the Incarnation – when the Son of God became (sinless) man. He "worked with human hands; he thought with a human mind ... with a human heart he loved" (*Catechism of the Catholic Church, #470*). He shared and understands our human condition.

Our hearts can conform to His: When we put others needs before our own, find the good in others, and show patience, we love like Christ. We do this with His help, *"O Sacred Heart of Jesus, make my heart like Yours!"*

Why Do Catholics Do That?

Why do Catholics believe the Eucharist is more than a symbol?

Catholics have it on divine authority that Jesus is really, truly, and substantially present in the Eucharist, *"Whoever eats my flesh and drinks my blood has eternal life"* (John 6:54). When the priest, acting in the person of Christ, consecrates the

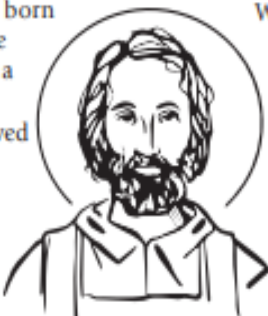


bread and wine, we believe that Jesus becomes truly present. Scientific investigations of the hundreds of Eucharistic miracles support this amazing mystery. In the Eucharist, Christ fulfills His promise to remain with us *"to the end of time"* (Matthew 28:20).

The best father on Earth

Scripture doesn't tell us that St. Joseph was born with special graces, yet he was chosen to raise God's Son. The Bible doesn't say that he had a gift of prophecy, yet Joseph never doubted God's word. He was an ordinary man who lived an extraordinary life.

Ever faithful. It would have been hard for any man to believe his fiancée was pregnant by the Holy Spirit. As a faithful Jew, though, Joseph knew what was written about the birth of the Savior. His devotion to God's



Word helped him recognize God's will.

Steady protector. At a moment's notice, Joseph left everything behind to whisk his family to safety (Matthew 2:13-15). Joseph's hard work and skill helped keep his family safe in a foreign land.

Good man. Scripture calls St. Joseph, a "righteous man," meaning he lived a virtuous life (Matthew 1:19). For example, he was compassionate by his treatment of Mary. Who better to raise the Son of God and care for his Mother than the best father on Earth?

from Scripture

Matthew 10:26-33, "Be not afraid"

In this Gospel passage, Jesus teaches us that the only thing we should fear is God, who has the final say in judgment over us. This is the virtue of reverence (holy fear) – not fearing God as if He were a tyrant, but fearing to offend Him because He is good, holy, wise, and infinitely worthy of our honor and love.

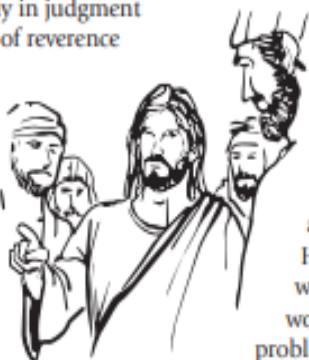
If we faithfully follow Jesus Christ, we will encounter persecution. Even in the United States, we face efforts to undermine Catholic beliefs and values. These attacks don't hurt us physically, but can eat away at our faith,

our self-respect and respect for others, and ultimately, our happiness.

Jesus' advice to His followers 2,000 years ago applies to us today. Instead of being afraid, we can trust

God, who watches over all the details of our lives and who wants us in Heaven even more than we want to be there. He won't make all our

problems disappear but He will give us the strength and grace we need to get through them, especially through daily prayer and the Sacraments.



Feasts & Celebrations

June 1 – St. Justin Martyr (c. 165). Justin was a Christian convert who searched for Truth. After his conversion, he held debates with pagans. When ordered by a pagan judge to renounce his faith or die, St. Justin responded, "Nobody in his senses would give up truth for falsehood." He was martyred for his faith.

June 4 – Solemnity of the Most Holy Trinity. Today, we honor the central mystery of our Faith – that there is one God in three Persons: Father, Son, and Holy Spirit. Jesus revealed this mystery

after the Resurrection (Matthew 28:19).

June 9 – St. Ephrem the Deacon (373). Born at Nisibis in Mesopotamia, he became a deacon and taught catechism classes, opposed heresy, and wrote hymns, prayers, and commentaries on Scripture.

June 29 – SS. Peter and Paul (1st Century). Peter was the apostle chosen by Jesus to lead the Church – an ordinary fisherman, made extraordinary by God's grace. A persecutor of the Church, Paul became the Great Apostle, also transformed by grace.



Q & A What can I do to promote respect for life?

All Catholics are called to protect the dignity of life from conception to natural death. While casting votes for candidates who pledge to protect life is important, there are many options outside the voting booth.

Assist pregnancy support centers. Many centers offer counseling, material assistance, and even provide daycare. Find one in your area and volunteer your time, talents, or treasure in support.

Speak up. When you hear or read about a story in the news in which the value of life is demeaned, write a letter to the editor and to government leaders supporting life-affirming and non-violent solutions.

Consider becoming a foster parent. Many local social service agencies are overwhelmed by the number of children whose families cannot care for them. Contact your local social services department to inquire about the necessary training and certifications you'll need to take in a child who needs a temporary shelter.

Visit local nursing homes and offer residents the gift of companionship. Many older people feel lost and forgotten and would welcome the attention.

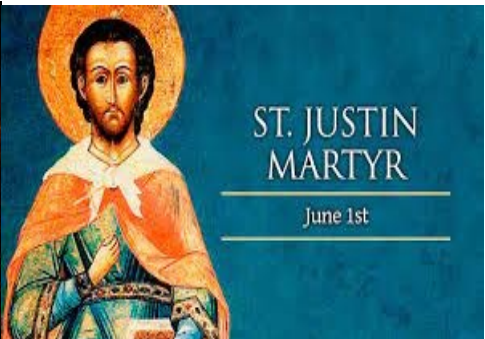

Un Cuerpo, Un Espíritu en Cristo



San Pablo nos recuerda que somos un solo cuerpo y un solo espíritu en Jesucristo (ver la segunda lectura de este domingo, 1 Cor. 12, 3-7, 12-13). Compara nuestra Iglesia a un cuerpo humano con sus muchas partes. A pesar de muchas partes, el cuerpo humano trabaja con todos sus miembros en armonía para el bien del todo, así también en Jesucristo. Él es la cabeza; somos los miembros de Su cuerpo místico. Pablo, por lo tanto, afirma en la lectura de hoy: “Porque en un solo Espíritu fuimos todos bautizados en un cuerpo, ya sean judíos o griegos, esclavos o libres, ya todos se nos dio a beber de un mismo espíritu” (1 Cor. 12:12-13).

Mire alrededor de nuestra parroquia. Vemos a la Iglesia universal en su microcosmos, su forma en miniatura. Vemos hombres, mujeres y niños de todas las edades, orígenes y culturas, etnias y nacionalidades. Como dice nuestro Santo Padre, en todo el mundo, la Iglesia abraza a todos los pueblos de todos los lugares, uniendo a todos los pueblos de la Iglesia es su alma vivificante, el Espíritu Santo.

En este domingo de Pentecostés, profesamos una sola fe con una sola voz recitando el credo durante la Santa Misa. Dejando de lado todo egoísmo e individualismo, debemos abrirnos al poder del Espíritu que puede disipar todos nuestros miedos y dudas. En la tercera Plegaria Eucarística, por lo tanto, rezamos: "Concédenos que nosotros, que nos alimentamos de su cuerpo y sangre, seamos llenos de su Espíritu Santo y lleguemos a ser un solo cuerpo, un solo espíritu en Cristo". Ya seamos hombres o mujeres, jóvenes o viejos, blancos o negros, ricos o pobres, cada uno de nosotros ha sido llamado a ser miembro del cuerpo místico de Cristo. Como Jesucristo mismo, cabeza del cuerpo, nos atrevemos levantar los ojos al cielo y llamar a Dios, Padre Nuestro.

Antes del día de Pentecostés, los Apóstoles y los seguidores de Jesús se sentían huérfanos, abandonados y confundidos. Las dudas llenaron sus mentes y el miedo tiró de sus corazones. Así, sintiéndose abandonados y confundidos, cada uno sólo podía pensar en sí mismo, pues en tiempos de temor se manifiesta nuestra peor inclinación hacia el egoísmo y nuestro instinto de conservación se vuelve devorador.

Entonces sucedió algo asombroso. Con una gran ráfaga de viento, el Espíritu Santo descendió sobre ellos. Es el mismo Espíritu Santo que había santificado a María. Las dudas y los miedos se disiparon. Los apóstoles y discípulos se pusieron de pie juntos como un solo cuerpo; luego salieron valientemente a proclamar las maravillas que Dios había realizado en Jesucristo. Se habían vuelto como María en su entrega a Cristo.

Todos los pensamientos de egoísmo y desunión habían quedado atrás en el Aposento Alto. La Iglesia, nacida del costado del Salvador en la cruz, ahora había sido formada por el Espíritu Santo en una unidad y una comunidad. Después de que Jesús ascendió al cielo y regresó a su Padre, envió el Espíritu de sí mismo y de Su Padre Celestial sobre la Iglesia para unir a todos sus miembros en amor como un solo cuerpo y un solo Espíritu.

Cuando Jesús prometió el Espíritu, primero dijo a sus apóstoles: "La paz esté con ustedes". La paz es el fruto de la unidad y la armonía. Cuando nos ofrecemos unos a otros el signo de la paz durante la Santa Misa, en realidad estamos orando para estar abiertos al Espíritu de amor que nos une como uno en Jesucristo. Este día de Pentecostés puede tener un significado real en nuestra propia vida si, llenos del Espíritu Santo, salimos de nuestra Iglesia decididos a ser instrumentos

de paz, alegría, caridad y armonía. Sólo nuestro propio egoísmo puede inhibir el hermoso movimiento del Espíritu. Adorando a Dios como un solo pueblo durante la Santa Misa, podemos convertirnos en lo que realmente somos: ¡un pueblo de un cuerpo, una mente y un espíritu en Jesucristo!

En efecto, el Espíritu es Aquel que no nos deja solos, es el Consolador; nos alienta con su presencia discreta y benéfica, nos acompaña con amor, nos sostiene en las luchas y en las dificultades, anima nuestros sueños más hermosos y nuestros deseos más grandes, abriéndonos al asombro y a la belleza de la vida.*

El Espíritu Santo es fuente de unidad. *Los que lo acogen reciben el amor del Padre y se convierten en sus hijos (cf. Rm 8,15-16); y, si son hijos de Dios, son también hermanos y hermanas. No puede haber lugar para las obras de la carne, es decir, del egoísmo; como las divisiones, las peleas, las calumnias, las murmuraciones... Cuando el Espíritu del Resucitado desciende sobre los discípulos, se convierte en fuente de unidad y de fraternidad contra todo egoísmo; inaugura el único lenguaje del amor, para que los diversos lenguajes humanos no permanezcan lejanos e incomprensibles; rompe las barreras de la desconfianza y del odio, para crear espacios de acogida y de diálogo; libera del miedo e infunde la valentía de salir al encuentro de los demás con la fuerza desarmada y desarmante de la misericordia.*

El Espíritu es fuente de profecía. *La historia de la salvación, como sabemos, está repleta de numerosos profetas que Dios llama, consagra y envía en medio del pueblo para que hablen en su nombre. Con frecuencia las palabras de los profetas son penetrantes; llaman por su nombre a los proyectos de mal que se anidan en el corazón de la gente, ponen en crisis las falsas seguridades humanas y religiosas, e invitan a la conversión. También nosotros tenemos esta vocación profética; todos los bautizados han recibido el Espíritu y todos son profetas. Y como tales no podemos fingir que no vemos las obras del mal, quedarnos en una «vida tranquila» para no ensuciarnos las manos. Un cristiano tarde o temprano debe ensuciarse las manos para vivir bien su vida cristiana y dar buen testimonio. Y ahora invoquemos la intercesión maternal de la Virgen María... Que Ella nos ayude a dejarnos guiar siempre por el Espíritu Santo y nos mantenga alegres, unidos en el afecto y en la oración.*

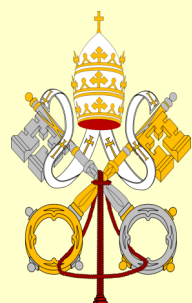
