GROW AS A DISCIPLE | PRAY, STUDY, ENGAGE, SERVE

Oh, to not be anxious! What would that be like – to not have to worry about how we'll pay the bills or whether our kids are safe or if our health will fail? While anxiety is a very human emotion, we can take comfort in knowing that our God is more powerful than anything that may worry us. It is also important to note that in today's reading from St. Paul's Letter to the Corinthians, what he means by "anxious" is not a modern psychological concept with only a negative connotation. The connotation is more "to be concerned with," or "caring about" something, and can refer to things that are very good – including spouses and families! But when we care for many things, including our relationship with God, it is only natural for us to be anxious at times. But Jesus Christ gives us the assurance that the troubles of this world are temporary, and the peace of God eternal. Paul is encouraging the Corinthians, and us, to understand the importance of an undivided devotion to God, to care for him above all things – no matter if we are married or single – so that our whole life is devoted to holiness.

GO EVANGELIZE

PRAYER, INVITATION, WITNESS, ACCOMPANIMENT

I am always thankful when something good that has been anticipated, or predicted, comes to pass: The sunshine and mild weather holds true for that outdoor event I hosted; or the generous gift that a longtime friend mailed arrives unscathed. There is some anxiety in the waiting for, but relief in the fulfillment of, these beneficent promises. And while these are somewhat superficial examples, they do point us in the same direction of hope and gratitude that the divine gifts of God elicit in us. In today's first reading, Moses promises the people that the Lord will raise up for them, from among their own kin, a prophet who will speak God's own words and to whom the people will listen. And the Lord did provide numerous prophets, and kings, and judges, and eventually his only begotten Son, to call his people back to himself, and to save them from the wages of sin and death. The hope and anticipation God's chosen people had was fulfilled in Jesus' life, death and resurrection. We share in that gift of hope and of gratitude for our salvation.

PRAY Today's psalm (Ps 95:1-2, 6-7, 7-9) is a beautiful prayer of thanksgiving and encouragement. It helps us steer our minds from those things which may make us anxious. Spend time in the morning or evening each day of the coming week, praying and reflecting on the words.

Baby Jesus is Presented in the Temple

On February second we celebrate the feast of the Presentation of Jesus in the Temple. That is the day that Saint Joseph and Our Lady took the baby Jesus to the Temple in Jerusalem to consecrate Him to God. The Jews were supposed to dedicate their first-born sons to God, so Mary and Joseph were obedient to the law even though their Baby was God Himself!

This was a most amazing moment, even though almost nobody noticed it: here was the great Temple where the people came to worship God, and now God had actually come into it- as a little Baby! But only Mary and Joseph and the prophets Simeon and Anna knew what had happened.

Saint Paul tells us that our bodies are temples of the Holy Spirit. Every time you receive Holy Communion, it's like baby Jesus entering the Temple. When you go to Communion, remember that you know that amazing secret- that even though the rest of the world might not know, you have just received Jesus! What a special moment!

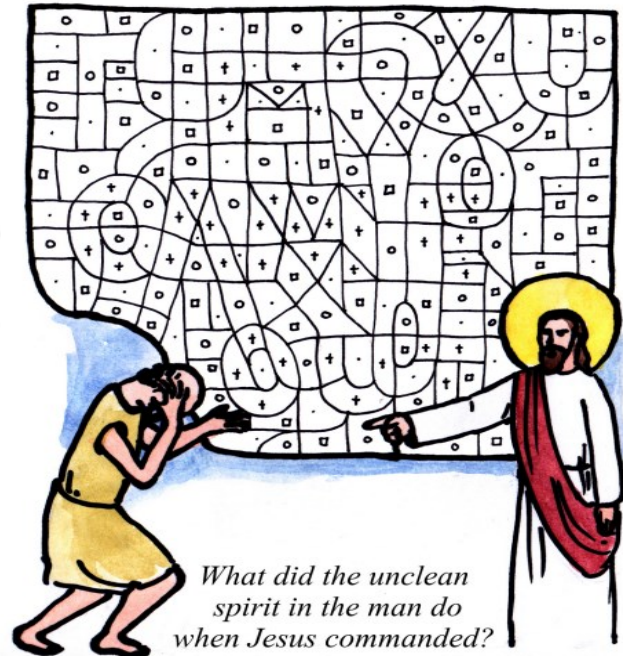

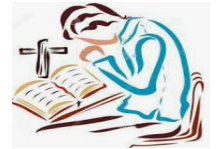

Having compassion in the midst of struggle

If Job's words resonate with you, it may be because he captures the essence of the universal struggle of human existence. Our lives can sometimes seem like they are marked by toil with only fleeting moments of hope. It's a poignant reminder that, at times, we may find ourselves weighed down by the burdens of life, yearning for relief and happiness.

We are then shown a different view of life's duties. The Apostle Paul talks about his responsibility to share the Gospel. He willingly becomes like a servant to everyone, adapting to connect with different people to share the message of salvation. This calls to mind our own responsibilities — are they forced on us like Job's troubles, or do we take them on willingly, like Paul?

In the Gospel, Jesus emerges as the epitome of compassionate service. His healing touch and selfless acts of curing the sick and driving out demons depict a profound commitment to alleviating the suffering of others. The passage of Simon's mother-in-law being restored to health and immediately attending to the needs of those around her echoes the transformative power of compassion.

There is another important message that we should take to heart. Jesus takes time for solitude and prayer, even when things are busy. This emphasizes how important it is to connect with God for strength and nourishment, especially when life gets tough. In the midst of life's chaos, it's all too easy to lose sight of the need to turn to God, even when (or possibly especially when) His guidance is most crucial.

Take some time to reflect on the different experiences portrayed in these readings and the lessons God is trying to teach you through them. As you navigate your life's complexities, do you make an effort to fulfill your responsibilities with purpose and to show compassion to those around you?

Questions for Personal Reflection:

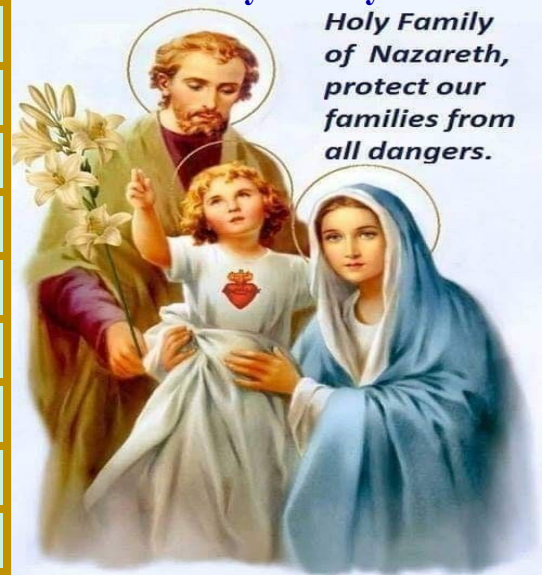
How do you handle tough times and moments of hope? What responsibilities do you have, and do you take them on willingly?

MESSAGE FROM THE SOCIETY OF ST. VINCENT DE PAUL By John Toner Sr., member & treasurer

Hello, my fellow parishioners, I'm presently the Treasurer of our St Vincent de Paul Conference for both the St. Ignatius Loyola and Holy Family parishes. I have published articles previously, and now would like to summarize some of our latest accomplishments.

As mentioned above, for those who have not as yet heard, our ministry now is responsible for supporting two parishes, St Ignatius and for the past several months, the Holy Family parish. This partnership has worked extremely well, and the needs of both parishes are addressed on a timely basis with respect and compassion. Our Fiscal Year ended on September 30th, and during the completed year our ministry completed **128** home visits. The definition of a home visit is two of our members (Vincentians) visit a neighbor in need and attempt to provide solutions to many problems, while always maintaining the confidentiality and dignity of those who are served. The problems are then discussed at bi-weekly meetings and solutions agreed upon at our conference meetings. During the Fiscal Year these home visits resulted in **33 rent payments**, the payment of **14 Utility Bills** and the purchase of over **\$9,000** in much needed furniture. Additionally, over \$2,000 in Gift Cards were distributed.

In addition to the above, food deliveries are made on a weekly basis, to 17-20 households, this includes canned products as well as vegetable and dairy selections. Other major activities included the delivery of 70 meals to 25 needy families on Thanksgiving morning as well as the delivery of Christmas toys to 32 families with 65 children. So, you see we were quite active!

As I mentioned in previous articles, financial support for our activities is a continuous challenge. Our September Friends of Poor fundraising is our major source of funding but in the past Fiscal year this covered only 22% of our Expenses. To mitigate this somewhat we are blessed by periodic financial donations from our loyal parishioners and by the proceeds from deposits made in the 'Poor Boxes' located in the churches. While we appreciate these donations, we continuously must reduce outlays and offer other creative solutions because of a shortage of funds.

During the past month of December, we received over \$1,300 in donations in the St Ignatius Poor Boxes. This was a major donation for us and shortly we will be receiving donations from the Holy Family parish. Poor Box donations can be a major source of funding!! As alternatives, contributions can be made by deposited envelopes in the Collection baskets marked for 'St Vincent de Paul' or mailed to the Rectories.

As St. Vincent de Paul taught us, "May our presence and care to those in need reflect the gentleness, esteem and dignity we see reflected in the life and work of JESUS. We want to thank you for your assistance in enabling us to follow his words and continue our mission. We know that the work of our ministry would not be possible without the support of people like you. Your contributions allow us to continue the work we do and make a meaningful impact on the lives of our neighbors.

Our ministry wishes you and your families a joyful New Year!!

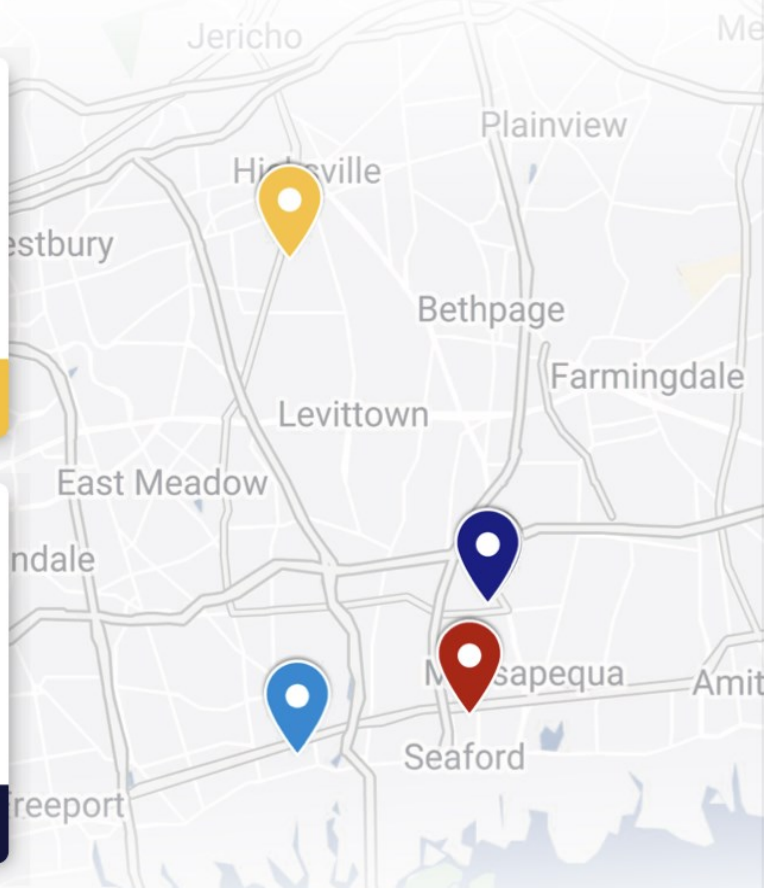

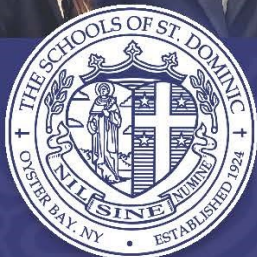

REFLEXION PAPA FRANCISCO

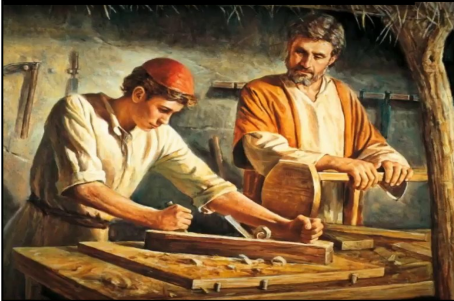
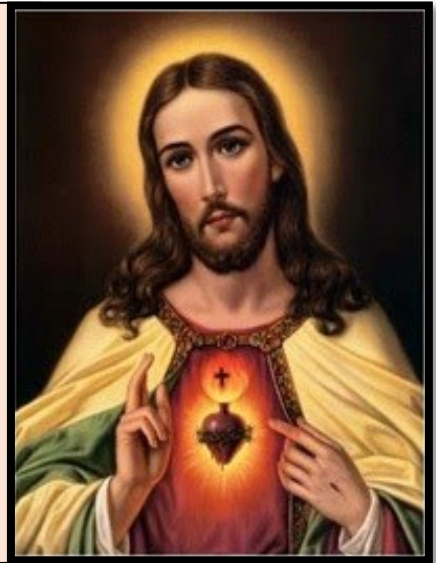
