





Christmas 2023

To the People of God of the Diocese of Rockville Centre:

Merry Christmas to you and your families!

In recent years at Christmas, I have meditated on the relationship between the Nativity of the Prince of Peace and the Parable of the Good Samaritan.

I have been especially inspired by Pope Francis' analysis of the Parable of the Good Samaritan in the second chapter of his 2020 encyclical *Fratelli Tutti*. It is powerful and provocative, and I would recommend it for your mental prayer.

The short phrase in the Christmas Gospel narrative in the second chapter of the Gospel of Luke reads: "She wrapped him in swaddling clothes and laid him in a manger, because there was no room for them in the inn."

"No room for them in the inn." No Good Samaritan stepped up to help the Holy Family. They were ignored and treated perfunctorily and impatiently. Some passed them by. Some pretended not to notice their plight.

Remember too that in the Parable of the Good Samaritan an "inn" is also mentioned. Luke 10 reads: "But a Good Samaritan while traveling came near him, and when he saw him, he was moved with pity. He went to him and bandaged his wounds, having poured oil and wine on them. Then he put him on his own animal, brought him to an inn and took care of him."

The inn that the Holy Family approaches on the way to Bethlehem is a sign of rejection and indifference.

The inn in the Parable of the Good Samaritan is a sign of the Good Samaritan's compassion and commitment to go the extra mile and to make sure that the wounded man is taken care of until he is completely healed.

Contemporary literary criticism might very well emphasize that the use of "inn" by the Gospel writer in both the Nativity in Luke 2 and the Parable of the Good Samaritan in Luke 10 is not by accident.

In a sense, the phrase "there was no room at the inn" in the Nativity foreshadows and connects with the phrase in the Parable of the Good Samaritan describing the callous indifference of both the priest and the Levite toward the wounded man on the side of the road: "[H]e passed by on the other side."

As Pope Francis says in Fratelli Tutti: "Each day we have to decide whether to be Good Samaritans or indifferent bystanders."

Our Lady, St. Joseph and the unborn Christ Child experienced the reality of people who decided to be indifferent bystanders.

The Christmas Gospel narrative from Luke 2 poses a question which is posed again later in the Parable of the Good Samaritan in Luke 10.

Will we be Good Samaritans?

Or will we be indifferent bystanders?

As the Holy Father reminds us, we make that choice every day.

May our prayer, silent contemplation and creative family catechesis of the Nativity scene help us to be instruments of a Nativity Mystery. May the Good Samaritan Gospel revolution of humility, charity, mercy, tenderness and peace unite us in solidarity with the sick, the poor and the suffering, especially in the Middle East, Ukraine and all war-ravaged areas of the world.

May our commitment to "holiness and mission" bless our contemplative Synodal listening and our Eucharistic Revival and Evangelization.

Merry Christmas and Happy New Year to you and your families!

May the Light and Love of the Christ Child animate and guide our global Catholic Missionary Spirit on this Christmas night and throughout the New Year.

GROW AS A DISCIPLE | PRAY, STUDY, ENGAGE, SERVE

"Hail, full of grace! The Lord is with you." The angel Gabriel announces this in the Gospel today, and it is a phrase with which we are all familiar thanks to our recitation of the Hail Mary prayer. Although some may be comforted by such a message and its angelic messenger, it is troubling to Mary because the angel goes on to tell her she will conceive and bear the Son of God. Thinking practically, Mary is being told the impossible will happen – who wouldn't be troubled? And yet Mary offers herself: "I am the handmaid of the Lord. May it be done to me according to your word." Despite her fear and trepidation, Mary went on to answer God's call and do his will. Our Blessed Mother became a great example of fortitude at that moment, as she exemplified what it means to step outside of our own uncertainty and trust God completely. Although doing God's will can be difficult at times, St. Paul reminds us in his Letter to the Romans that we can ask God for the strength to say "yes" in spite of our fears.

December 31, 2023; Feast of the Holy Family of Jesus, Mary, and Joseph

Trust Jesus despite not understanding

"Joy mixed with drama marks the fifth [joyful] mystery, the finding of the twelve-year-old Jesus in the Temple." Saint John Paul the Great wrote this In *Rosarium Virginis Mariae*, his interesting encyclical about the Rosary.

He continued: "Here he appears in his divine wisdom as he listens and raises questions, already in effect one who 'teaches'. The revelation of his mystery as the Son wholly dedicated to his Father's affairs proclaims the radical nature of the Gospel, in which even the closest of human relationships are challenged by the absolute demands of the Kingdom. Mary and Joseph, fearful and anxious, 'did not understand' his words."

We, too, often fail to understand the words of Jesus. His teachings challenge us to accept a more difficult life, a life of doing good to our enemies, turning the cheek and going the extra mile, a life of courageously standing up for the truth and adhering to high moral standards that are countercultural.

Our preference, when living this way is inconvenient or unpleasant, is to rationalize and make excuses for our worldly behavior. But once we truly understand the demands of the Kingdom of God, we see their benefits and we obey gladly.

Without this understanding, we have to simply trust that the words of Jesus are right and true. Like Mary and Joseph, we need to ponder in our hearts what we don't understand, while moving forward and doing what Jesus wants us to do.

As challenging as this is, that's when we discover how amazing God can be.

Questions for Personal Reflection:

What teaching of the Church have you rationalized away so that you don't have to obey it? Or what teaching of Christ in the Sermon on the Mount (see Matt. 5,6,7) or elsewhere in the Gospels do you excuse yourself from? How much is your disobedience due to not understanding what is really being taught? What will you do to seek and gain a better understanding?





Navidad 2023

Al Pueblo de Dios de la Diócesis de Rockville Centre:

Feliz Navidad para usted y su familia!

En estos últimos años, en la Navidad, he meditado sobre la relación entre la Natividad del Príncipe de Paz y la parábola del Buen Samaritano.

Me ha inspirado especialmente el análisis que el Papa Francisco hace de la parábola del Buen Samaritano en el segundo capítulo de su encíclica *Fratelli Tutti* [Hermanos Todos] del 2020. Esto es poderoso y provocador y se los recomendaría para su oración mental.

Una corta frase en el relato del Evangelio de Navidad en el segundo capítulo del Evangelio de Lucas dice: "Ella lo envolvió en pañales y lo acostó en un pesebre, porque no había sitio para ellos en la posada".

"No hay sitio para ellos en la posada". Ningún buen samaritano se acercó a ayudar a la Sagrada Familia. Fueron ignorados y tratados con ligereza e impaciencia. Algunos pasaron de largo. Algunos fingieron no darse cuenta de su situación.

Recuerda también que en la parábola del Buen Samaritano se menciona también una "posada". Lucas 10 dice: "Pero un buen samaritano que viajaba se acercó a él y, al verlo, se compadeció. Se acercó a él y le vendó las heridas, echándoles aceite y vino. Luego lo montó en su propio animal, lo llevó a una posada y cuidó de él".

La posada a la que se acerca la Sagrada Familia camino de Belén es un signo de rechazo e indiferencia.

La posada de la parábola del Buen Samaritano es un signo de la compasión y el compromiso del Buen Samaritano de hacer un esfuerzo extra y asegurarse que el hombre herido sea atendido hasta que esté completamente curado.

La crítica literaria contemporánea podría muy bien enfatizar que el uso del termino "posada" por el escritor del Evangelio tanto en la Natividad de Lucas 2 como en la parábola del Buen Samaritano de Lucas 10 no es casual.

En cierto sentido, la frase "no había sitio en la posada" de la Natividad predice y se conecta con la frase de la parábola del Buen Samaritano que describe la dura indiferencia tanto del sacerdote como del levita hacia el hombre herido al borde del camino: "Pasó por otro lado".

Como dice el Papa Francisco en Fratelli Tutti: "Cada día tenemos que decidir si ser buenos samaritanos o espectadores indiferentes." (70)

Nuestra Señora, San José y el Niño Jesús por nacer, padecieron la experiencia de sentir la indiferencia de las personas que decidieron ser espectadores.
