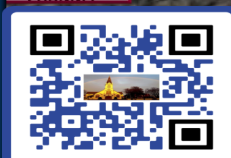

*Clergy Corner*



The readings for the twenty-fourth Sunday in Ordinary Time bring to our attention the topics of anger and forgiveness. Our approach to anger and forgiveness influences our relationship with God and neighbor.

The first reading from the book of Sirach, tells us that anger and wrath affect our relationship with other people. Sirach reminds us that anger and wrath are emotions that become part of our personality, who we are. Anger and wrath harbor vengeance. They “possess” us, they become an integral part of our behavior, affecting our relationships with God and neighbor. “The vengeful will suffer the LORD’s vengeance, for he remembers their sins in detail.”

What is anger? Anger is a passionate and active response of the entire person to a real or perceived wrong. Countless resources have been spent studying the physical and mental effects of anger on human beings. The long-term physical effects of uncontrolled anger include increased anxiety, high blood pressure, chronic depression, and headaches. Indeed, in the book of Deuteronomy anger is likened to a consuming fire. (Deut. 32:22)

Anger itself is not a sin. It is a natural emotion, a built-in adaptive response to threats; which allow us to prepare for fight or flight when we are attacked or threatened. A certain amount of anger, therefore, is necessary to our survival. Anger becomes sinful when it leads us to revenge, and we allow it to take control of our words, actions, reactions and our thoughts. Jesus acknowledges that there are times that we will be angry, He says: “But I say to you, whoever is angry with his brother will be liable to judgment, and whoever says to his brother, ‘Raca,’ will be answerable to the Sanhedrin, and whoever says, ‘You fool,’ will be liable to fiery Gehenna.” (Mat 5:22-25) He warns us that holding on to that anger will make us “liable to judgement.” Therefore, we must be reconciled to one another, even before we offer worship to God.

This leads us to the second point of our readings, the issue of forgiveness. Sirach gives us a preamble to the sixth petition in the Lord’s Prayer: “Forgive our sins, as we forgive those who sin against us.” Sirach asks: “Could anyone nourish anger against another and expect healing from the LORD? Could anyone refuse mercy to another like himself, can he seek pardon for his own sins?”

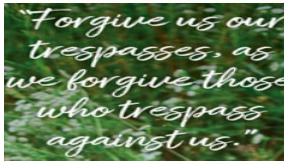
The parable of the Unforgiving Servant in Mathew’s Gospel tells the story of a king who forgives a large unpayable debt of one of his servants, when he begs for mercy. But this same servant is unwilling to forgive a modest debt that another servant owes him. This parable addresses Peter’s question on the ethics of forgiveness. Jesus teaches us the importance of unlimited forgiveness. He says that we should be forgiving, because forgiving others leads to our own forgiveness.

With this parable, Jesus sums up the principle of mercy that is outlined in the Sermon on the Mount: “Blessed are the merciful, for they shall receive mercy” (Mat. 5:7); “For if you forgive others for their transgressions, your heavenly Father will also forgive you. But if you do not forgive others, then your Father will not forgive your transgressions.” (Mat 6:14-15)

This is a repetitive theme in the Gospels. Our mercy must be unlimited so we can receive unlimited mercy. If our mercy has limits, likewise, God will limit the mercy that He extends to us. In this parable the unforgiving servant was called “wicked,” and was handed over to be tortured, the same faith awaits all who are unforgiving. (Matthew 18:34-35).

Psalmist invites us to seek the path of holiness, by following God’s example, “The Lord is kind and merciful, slow to anger, and rich in compassion.”(PS 103) We are invited to follow His lead: “As far as the east is from the west, so far has he put our transgressions from us.” Notice that the psalmist says that the Lord is slow to anger and that He distances our transgressions from our person. The lesson for us is that in the midst of our anger, we need to take time to release the anger, the hurt, and pain we believe others have caused us; and look at the offender with mercy, kindness and compassion. The offense does not define the offender. Practicing mercy and forgiveness. This will bring peace, health, healing, reconciliation and God’s mercy upon us.

**GROW AS A DISCIPLE | PRAY, STUDY, ENGAGE, SERVE**

Forgiveness. It seems like a relatively simple *concept*, doesn't it? We ask our merciful Father for it every day when we pray the Our Father: "... forgive us our trespasses..." Then reality hits, as we remember the second part of that phrase: "...as we forgive those who trespass against us ..." *As we forgive others.* Oh, that long, hard road of forgiveness! Easier said than done. Sometimes those old sayings have some merit, don't they? And when we look at today's readings, there is nothing cryptic about them: forgive *not seven times but seventy-seven times*, let go of wrath and anger, forgive your brother and sister *from your heart*. Yes, forgiveness is a simple concept, but it's not easy. Perhaps the answer is to re-read today's Scriptures and ask the Holy Spirit to give us the strength to put in the hard work if there is someone in our lives to whom we need to offer our heartfelt forgiveness.

**GO EVANGELIZE**

**PRAYER, INVITATION, WITNESS, ACCOMPANIMENT**

Bishop Robert Barron, in his *Word on Fire Bible* on the Gospels, has four suggestions related to this Gospel on how to become "a better forgiver." The one that stood out to me immediately is "forgive offenses quickly." Don't let them fester and "settle deeply into your psyche." This seems like very sage advice because we can all have a tendency to "stew" about things that are bothering us, which rarely makes them better. Bishop Barron's other suggestions are: Pay attention to your own sins, go to confessions regularly, and offer forgiveness through a concrete act or sign. Which brings us back to the simplicity of it all: God will always forgive us, so we must always forgive others. Doesn't it make sense that to live in the house of our merciful Father, we must emulate him and have loving hearts rather than vengeful hearts?

**PRAY** Examine your heart and take a hard look at whether you are holding on to a wrong that was committed against you. Take it to God in prayer. The more we open our hearts to forgive others, the more at peace we can be. Ponder the last words of today's reading from Sirach: *Think of the commandments, hate not your neighbor; remember the Most High's covenant, and overlook faults.*

**Celebrating Constitution Week, September 13-19, in All Schools**

"The U.S. Constitution stands as a testament to the tenacity of Americans throughout history to maintain their liberties, freedoms and inalienable rights." <sup>(1)</sup> In 1956, the Daughters of the American Revolution started the celebration of the Constitution adopted by Congress. Then, in 2004, Sen. Robert Byrd, correctly believing that American school children lacked significant knowledge regarding the Constitution, proposed an amendment, passed by Congress, requiring that all educational institutions receiving federal funds implement educational programs relating to the U.S. Constitution on Sept. 17 every year, celebrating the signing of the Constitution on Sept. 17, 1787.

This Constitution is the world's longest surviving written charter of government with its first 3 words, "We the People", affirming that the government of these United States exists to serve its citizens. "...its framers wisely separated and balanced governmental powers to safeguard the interests of majority rule and minority rights, of liberty and equality, and of the state and federal governments." <sup>(2)</sup>

"To prevent the abuses of power they felt under the British monarchy, the Founding Fathers framed the Constitution carefully, distributing power over three branches of government, outlining its powers, limitations on those powers, and the rights of citizens." <sup>(3)</sup> The three branches were to have equal powers, called "checks and balances." "Powers not assigned to one of the three branches are left to the individual states." <sup>(4)</sup>

Some of the original delegates from the states were troubled that the original Constitution lacked a description of individual rights. In 1791, Americans added the first 10 Amendments known as the Bill of Rights. The first and foundational right is: **"Congress shall make no law respecting an establishment of religion, or prohibiting the free exercise thereof; ..."** <sup>(5)</sup>

### ***Remembering September 11, 2001***

We pray, for those killed in the attack on our city, country and liberties. We pray for comfort for their loved ones as a nation still grieving the loss of each one of them. Let our lives reflect respect and appreciation for the liberties they had no chance to defend that day.

If the liberties they lived are to prevail, each generation must be taught the bedrock of our liberties is inalienable rights from our Creator. The natural rights of life, liberty and the pursuit of happiness guided our founders to construct a Constitution written for "ages and millions yet unborn" ...a Constitution not bounded by culture or by technology but by the immutable nature of man and his reliance on God.

Those Americans who died on Sept. 11, 2001, lived in the freedom to follow their faith or to choose no faith. They were not forced to behave or worship according to the dictates of any government. They were not subject to an all-powerful culture or government selecting winners and losers, rich and poor, respected and vilified. We honor them by living those freedoms and insuring them for their loved ones

As we remember the joy of their lives and the anguish of their loss, we pray for the repose of their souls in the comforting arms of the Savior of us all. May they rest in peace and may we protect and preserve the liberties for which they were so grievously attacked.

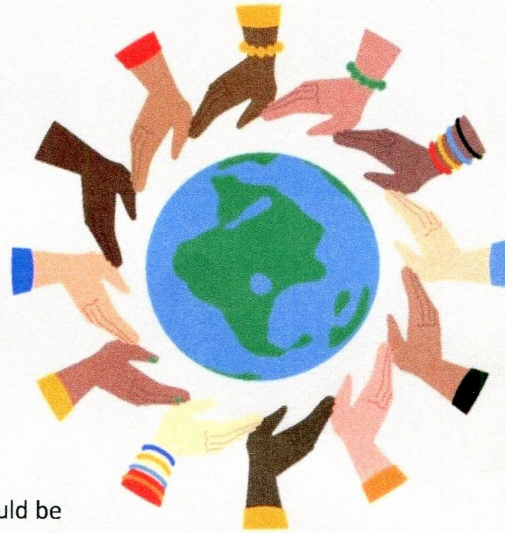

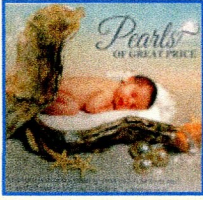

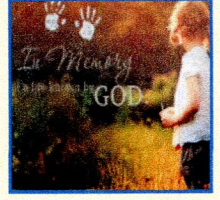

Las lecturas del vigésimo cuarto domingo del Tiempo Ordinario llaman nuestra atención a los temas del rencor, cólera, y el perdón. Nuestra respuesta ante el rencor, la cólera y el perdón influye en nuestra relación con Dios y el prójimo.

La primera lectura del libro de Eclesiástico nos dice que el rencor y la cólera destruyen nuestra relación con otras personas. Su autor Jesús Ben Sira nos recuerda que la rencor y la cólera son emociones que se vuelven parte de nuestra personalidad, de quiénes somos como personas. El rencor y la cólera albergan venganza. Nos poseen, el pecador se aferra a ellas, se vuelven parte integral de nuestro comportamiento, afectando nuestras relaciones con Dios y el prójimo. “El Señor se vengará del vengativo y llevará rigurosa cuenta de sus pecados.”

¿Qué son el rencor y la cólera? El rencor y la cólera son una respuesta apasionada y activa de toda la persona ante un mal real o percibido. Se han invertido innumerables recursos en estudiar los efectos físicos y mentales que el rencor y la cólera tiene en los seres humanos. Los efectos físicos a largo plazo del el rencor y la cólera incontrolada incluyen aumento de la ansiedad, enfermedades como la presión arterial alta, depresión crónica y dolores de cabeza.

El rencor y la cólera en sí misma no son pecados. Son emociones naturales, son una respuesta adaptativa ante las amenazas reales o percibidas. Nos permiten prepararnos para luchar o huir cuando nos sentimos atacados o amenazados. Por lo tanto, una cierta cantidad de rencor y cólera es necesaria para nuestra supervivencia. El rencor y la cólera se vuelve pecaminosa cuando nos lleva a la venganza y permitimos a esos sentimientos tomen control de nuestras palabras, acciones, reacciones y pensamientos. Jesús reconoce que hay momentos en los que estaremos enojados, dice: “Pero yo os digo que el que se enoja con su hermano será reo de juicio, y el que dice a su hermano: ‘Raga’ tendrá que responder ante el Sanedrín, y cualquiera que diga: ‘Necio’, será castigado con la Gehena de fuego”. (Mateo 5:22-25.) Nos advierte que aferrarnos al rencor y la cólera nos hará “sujetos a juicio”. Por lo tanto, debemos reconciliarnos unos con otros, incluso antes de ofrecer adoración a Dios.

Esto nos lleva al segundo punto de nuestras lecturas, la cuestión del perdón. Eclesiástico nos da un preámbulo a la sexta petición del Padrenuestro: “Perdona nuestros pecados, como nosotros perdonamos a los que pecan contra nosotros”. Sirá pregunta: “¿Cómo pide perdón de sus pecados? Cuando el hombre que guarda rencor pide a Dios el perdón de sus pecados, ¿hallará quien interceda por él?

La parábola del siervo implacable en el evangelio de Mateo cuenta la historia de un rey que perdona una gran deuda impagable de uno de sus siervos, cuando este pide misericordia. Pero este mismo siervo no está dispuesto a perdonar una deuda modesta que otro siervo le debe. Esta parábola aborda la pregunta de Pedro sobre la ética del perdón. Jesús nos enseña la importancia del perdón ilimitado. Dice que debemos perdonar, porque perdonar a los demás conduce a nuestro propio perdón.

Con esta parábola, Jesús resume el principio de misericordia que se describe en el Sermón de la Montaña: “Bienaventurados los misericordiosos, porque ellos recibirán misericordia” (Mateo 5:7); “Porque si perdonáis a otros sus transgresiones, vuestro Padre celestial también os perdonará a vosotros. Pero si no perdonáis a los demás, vuestro Padre no perdonará vuestras transgresiones”. (Mateo 6:14-15)

Este es un tema repetitivo en los evangelios. Nuestra misericordia debe ser ilimitada para que podamos recibir misericordia ilimitada. Si nuestra misericordia tiene límites, de la misma manera, Dios limitará la misericordia que nos extiende. En esta parábola, el siervo que no perdonó fue llamado “malvado” y fue entregado para ser torturado; la misma fe espera a todos los que no perdonan. (Mateo 18:34-35).

El salmista nos invita a buscar el camino de la santidad, siguiendo el ejemplo de Dios: “El Señor no nos condena para siempre, ni nos guarda rencor perpetuo. No nos trata como merecen nuestras culpas, ni nos paga según nuestros pecados.” (PS 103) El salmista nos dice: “El Señor no nos condena para siempre, ni nos guarda rencor perpetuo. No nos trata como merecen nuestras culpas, ni nos paga según nuestros pecados.” La lección para nosotros es que en medio de nuestro rencor y cólera, debemos perdonar el dolor que otros nos han causado; debemos estar preparados para brindar al ofensor misericordia, bondad y compasión. Practicando la misericordia y el perdón, encontraremos paz, salud, sanación, reconciliación y la misericordia de Dios Padre.

## Evangelio según San Mateo (Mt. 18, 21-35)

Pero, apenas había salido aquel servidor, se encontró con

uno de sus compañeros, que le debía poco dinero. Entonces lo agarró por el cuello y casi lo estrangulaba, mientras le decía: 'Págame lo que me debes'. El compañero se le arrodilló y le rogaba: 'Ten paciencia conmigo y te lo pagaré todo'. Pero el otro no quiso escucharlo, sino que fue y lo metió en la cárcel hasta que le pagara la deuda. Al ver lo ocurrido, sus compañeros se llenaron de indignación y fueron a contar al rey lo sucedido. Entonces el señor lo llamó y le dijo: 'Siervo malvado. Te perdoné toda aquella deuda porque me lo suplicaste. ¿No debías tú también haber tenido compasión de tu compañero, como yo tuve compasión de ti?' Y el señor, encolerizado, lo entregó a los verdugos para que no lo soltaran hasta que pagara lo que debía. Pues lo mismo hará mi Padre celestial con ustedes, si cada cual no perdona de corazón a su hermano".

### Meditación del Papa Francisco

*¿Por qué nos deberíamos convertir? La conversión concierne a quien de ateo se vuelve creyente, de pecador se hace justo, pero nosotros no tenemos necesidad, ¡ya somos cristianos! Pensando así, no nos damos cuenta de que es precisamente de esta presunción que debemos convertirnos —que somos cristianos, todos buenos, que estamos bien—: de la suposición de que, en general, va bien así y no necesitamos ningún tipo de conversión. Pero preguntémosnos: ¿es realmente cierto que en diversas situaciones y circunstancias de la vida tenemos en nosotros los mismos sentimientos de Jesús? ¿Es verdad que sentimos como Él lo hace? Por ejemplo, cuando sufrimos algún mal o alguna afrenta, ¿logramos reaccionar sin animosidad y perdonar de corazón a los que piden disculpas? ¿Qué difícil es perdonar! ¿Cómo es difícil! "Me las pagarás": esta frase viene de dentro. Cuando estamos llamados a compartir alegrías y tristezas, ¿lloramos sinceramente con los que lloran y nos regocijamos con quienes se alegran? Cuando expresamos nuestra fe, ¿lo hacemos con valentía y sencillez, sin avergonzarnos del Evangelio? Y así podemos hacernos muchas preguntas. No estamos bien, siempre tenemos que convertirnos, tener los sentimientos que Jesús tenía.*

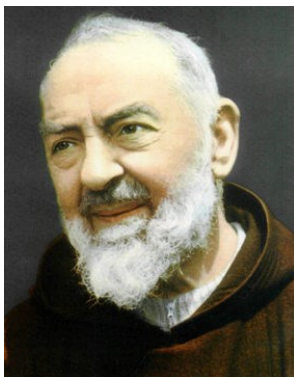

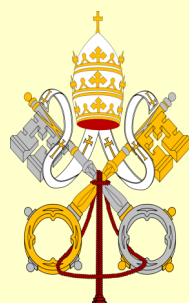
