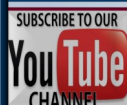

*Clergy Corner*



***My dear Parish family,***

“In a mother’s womb were two babies. One asked the other: “Do you believe in life after delivery?” The other replied, “Why, of course. There has to be something after delivery. Maybe we are here to prepare ourselves for what we will be later.” “Nonsense,” said the first. “There is no life after delivery. What kind of life would that be?” The second said, “ I don’t know, but there will be more light than here. Maybe we will walk with our legs and eat from our mouths. Maybe we will have other senses that we can’t understand now.” The first replied, “ That is absurd. Walking is impossible. And eating with our mouths? Ridiculous! The umbilical cord supplies nutrition and everything we need. But the umbilical cord is so short. Life after delivery is to be logically excluded.” The second insisted, “ Well, I think there is something, and maybe it’s different than it is here. Maybe we won’t need this physical cord anymore.” The first replied, “Nonsense. Moreover, why has no one ever come back from there if there is life? Delivery is the end of life, and in the after-delivery, there is nothing but darkness and silence, and oblivion. It takes us nowhere. ” Well, I don’t know,” said the second, “but certainly, we will meet Mother, and she will take care of us.” The first replied, “Mother? Do you believe in Mother? That’s laughable. If Mother exists, then where is She now?” The second said, “ She is all around us. We are surrounded by her. We are of Her. It is in Her that we live. Without Her, this world would not and could not exist.” Said the first: “Well, I don’t see her, so it is only logical that she doesn’t exit.” The second replied, “Sometimes, when you’re in silence, and you focus and listen, you can hear Her loving voice, calling.” (Dr. Wayne Dyer). Does that sound like the Sadducees’ argument in today’s gospel?

Jesus affirms two realities in this weekend’s Gospel in Luke 20:27-38, that the resurrection of the dead is a reality, for God is a God of the living and not of the dead. Secondly, that life in the resurrection is not like anything that we have experienced here on earth. In November, let us not hesitate to help those who have died and to offer Holy Mass and prayers for them. We have this duty foremost towards our family members, our friends, parishioners, the forgotten souls, and those for whom there is no one to pray.

I am grateful to the “St. Ignatius Ministry of Consolation” group for your compassionate Ministry throughout the year, especially during November, by organizing the All Soul’s Day Mass. The Consolation Ministry is dedicated to the Corporal WorkS of Mercy that commands *Bury the Dead*. The Ministry’s role in that Corporal Work is to support grieving families by assisting with the funeral Mass liturgy. This blessed Ministry is open to those who feel a calling to assist families at a crisis time for them as they mourn a loved one. New members are welcome and can make their interest in serving known to the Ministry through the able leadership of Pam Flannigan.

There is power in praying together. We united as a parish family in October to pray for the intentions of our parish ministries. Thank you, ministry leadership, for your representation and leading the Holy Rosary on assigned days. Thank you, Peggy Gill, for your exceptional leadership in making this “Ministry Rosary” possible with the help of the “Daughters of Mary” Rosary group. To add our joy in the presence of God, we have a beautiful autumn decoration in the Church thanks to the dedication of “Martha’s Guild”.

**GROW AS A DISCIPLE | PRAY, STUDY, ENGAGE, SERVE**

My colleague grew up playing a lot of basketball, and she has pointed out the obvious: Despite the fact that the hoop is much larger than the ball, and there is a very large backboard behind it, it can be very easy to miss a shot. Depending on where you are on the floor, you have to set your sights on, and aim the ball toward, a very specific place in space or on the glass. The king in the first reading and the Sadducees in the Gospel are shooting airballs. Each one of them is, literally, not seeing the right goal. In answering the Sadducees' questions, Jesus challenges their assumptions - not about marriage, but about life after death: "Those who are deemed worthy to attain to the coming age and to the resurrection of the dead ... can no longer die ... they are the children of God ... and he is not God of the dead, but of the living." Something even greater, beyond human understanding, awaits. The seven brothers who experienced horrible deaths rather than violate God's law knew that. We, too, hold onto hope that we will be among the living whom Jesus describes. In the meantime, we can place our trust in Jesus and focus on living according to the example he set for us. We may not know exactly what life after death will look and feel like, but we can trust the psalmist's words: "Lord, when your glory appears, my joy will be full."

**GO EVANGELIZE**

**PRAYER, INVITATION, WITNESS, ACCOMPANIMENT**

I like to run races of various distances, and one of my favorite things is seeing the fun posters people hold up ("This is a lot of work for a free banana") and hearing shouts of encouragement. Even more powerful, of course, is the encouragement of friends and family members as we face challenges or difficulties. So it's heartening to hear from St. Paul that we can count on Jesus and the Father as a source of "everlasting encouragement and good hope." Again we are reminded that we cannot - and should not have to - do it alone. Instead, we can join Paul in asking God to "encourage [our] hearts and strengthen them in every good deed and word." In turn, we can encourage others in their faith and daily lives, seeking to reflect God's love to those we encounter.

**ACTION** One positive thing about social media is the way it allows us to lift one another up through a simple "Like" or comment. In the same way that we "connect" with others on social media, our kind, encouraging words and Christian example in our comments can connect others to Jesus and his Church.

## One Minute Meditations

### So many saints

In the early Church, there was a great desire to celebrate the saints and martyrs by assigning each a feast day. However, Christians had been so persecuted that there weren't enough days in the calendar for individual commemorations. Eventually Pope Gregory IV designated November 1 as All Saints Day.



### Happiness

As a loving Father, God wants us to be happy. True happiness is: "Joy and beatitude over receiving the fulfillment of our vocation as creatures: a sharing in the divine nature and the vision of God. God put us into the world to know, love, and serve him, and so come to the happiness of paradise" (*Catechism of the Catholic Church*, # 1720).

### Patience makes sense

Don't be tempted to compare yourself to others. God's plan for each of us is unique. "Be still before the Lord, and wait patiently for him; fret not yourself over him who prospers in his way" (Psalm 37:7).



## Effective prayer is humble, yet bold

Jesus said, "Therefore I tell you, whatever you ask in prayer, believe that you receive it, and you will" (Mark 11:24). The best prayers require the boldness to ask for what we want and the humility to surrender to God's will. Try these tips to pray with humility and boldness:

**Seek reconciliation:** The most common reason for ineffective prayer is unconfessed sin. Start with a thorough examination of conscience to see what needs confessing. Seek forgiveness in the Sacrament of Reconciliation regularly. Ask for the grace to improve.

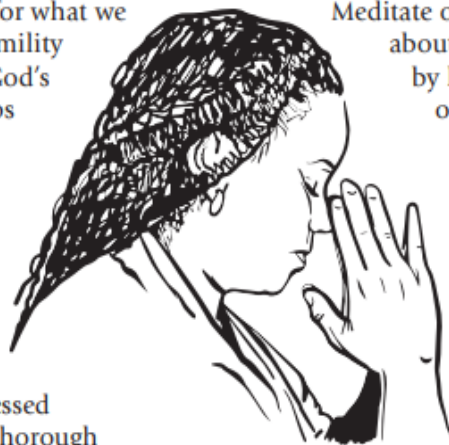
**Step aside:** Sometimes our prayers become lists of demands instead of

conversations with our beloved Father. Put the focus back on Him. Choose a Scripture verse, Biblical image, or a mystery of the Rosary, for example.

Meditate on it and talk with Him about it. We learn humility by lessening the focus on ourselves.

**Give thanks:** Each day, honor God as the source of all that is good in your life. Think of four or five of your favorite blessings and thank Him for them. Doing this daily strengthens our faith in His care.

**Act in faith:** "Cast all your anxieties on him, for he cares for you" (1 Peter 5:7). Asking God for help with all your concerns – which is different from demanding – is a sign of humility and bold faith.



## Why Do Catholics Do That?

## Why do Catholics pray the Liturgy of the Hours?

The Liturgy of the Hours is a cycle of prayers said throughout the day. It's the highest form of prayer in the Church after the Mass. The Hours are a meditation on the psalms, canticles, and Scripture readings, and bring us closer to

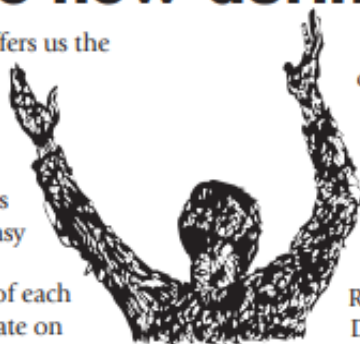


Christ, and to each other. The practice began in the monasteries, but has been extended to priests, deacons, religious orders and the lay faithful. At any given time, someone somewhere, is praying the Liturgy of the Hours.

# Become new during Advent

During the Advent season, the Church offers us the chance to prepare our hearts to celebrate Jesus' birth at Christmas. It's our opportunity to become the people God intended us to be.

**Be mindful.** Fulfilling our responsibilities well is how we glorify God. Yet, it can be easy to get lost in the routine of daily life. St. Josemaria said, "Carry out the little duties of each moment: do what you ought and concentrate on what you are doing."



**Resolve to do better.** "I want to be more considerate," is a great start. Specifics will make it happen. "I'll give others my full attention when they're speaking to me," or "I will be on time to respect others' schedules."

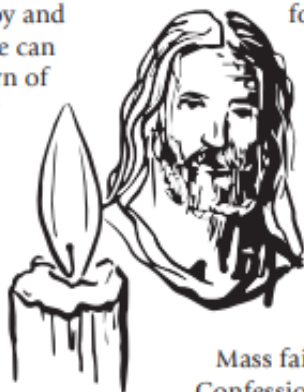
**Be flexible.** If you struggle to find 20 minutes to pray each day, try two 10-minute sessions morning and evening. If you lack time for an entire Rosary, pray one decade at a time throughout the day. Don't miss this chance to prepare well for the birth of Jesus at Christmas.

## from Scripture

### Matthew 24:37-44, Don't be afraid, do be prepared

The Church calendar is a gift to help us mark the seasons of joy and sorrow, work and rest. We can withdraw from the pattern of the world and remember that we wait in joyful hope for Jesus to come.

Beginning at the end of this month, the season of Advent is a time of warning and a time of preparation. Next month we celebrate Jesus' coming at Christmas. But he will come twice more: at our own death, and at the end of time. This Gospel reading reminds us that we will never know ahead of



time just when he will come for us. Advent is the time to ask, "What do I need to do to be ready to greet the Lord?"

Start by examining your conscience and pick one or two sinful practices you want to eliminate.

Then try to spend more time in prayer, attend

Mass faithfully, and go to Confession.

Finally, spend a few extra minutes each day in prayer. Then when Christmas comes, you will know you are ready to greet the Lord with joy.

## Q & A How does the Church decide who is a saint?

There are many people in Heaven who are saints but whose names we may never know. They are uncanonized saints. Canonization is the formal process by which the Church identifies and



determines whether someone has become a saint.

In its simplest form, official Church procedures detail three steps to recognizing a saint. First, the bishop of the diocese where the person died begins an extensive investigation. The results are passed to the Congregation for the Causes of Saints. If the Congregation approves, the prefect presents the cause to the pope. With the pope's approval, the petitioner becomes "venerable" and is called "Servant of God."

Next, "beatification," may come after further investigation and a miracle has proven to be attributed to the Servant of God's intercession after his or her death. Then the person can be called "Blessed."

Finally, canonization may follow additional investigation and a second miracle also proven to have occurred after the beatification and as a result of the candidate's intercession. After canonization, the "Blessed" is called "Saint."

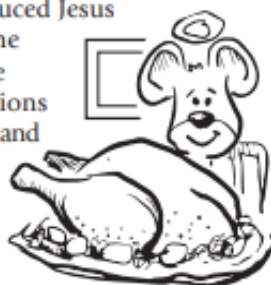
## Feasts & Celebrations

**November 2 – All Souls Day.** On this day we pray for the dead, especially our loved ones and the souls in Purgatory. Our prayers and sacrifices can help them get to Heaven.

**November 16 – St. Gertrude the Great (1301).** Born in 1256 in Germany, St. Gertrude was raised by and later joined the Benedictine nuns. When she was about twenty-six, she began having visions of Christ. She was known for her personal holiness, her kindness to the rich and poor, and her prayers for the souls in Purgatory.

**November 27 – First Sunday in Advent.** We anticipate Christ's birth and his coming on the last day. Catholics around the world light candles in an Advent wreath to signal the coming of the light of Christ.

**November 30 – St. Andrew (1st Century).** The son of a Galilean fisherman and brother of Simon Peter, he introduced Jesus to Peter. After the Resurrection, he conducted missions in Turkey, Greece and Macedonia. He was martyred on a X-shaped cross.

Quizás caminemos con nuestras piernas y comamos de nuestra boca. Tal vez tengamos otros sentidos que ahora no podemos entender”. El primero respondió: “Eso es absurdo. Caminar es imposible. ¿Y comer con la boca? ¡Ridículo! El cordón umbilical nos proporciona nutrición y todo lo que necesitamos. Pero el cordón umbilical es tan corto. La vida después del parto debe ser lógicamente excluida”. El segundo insistió, “Bueno, creo que hay algo, y tal vez es diferente de lo que es aquí. Tal vez ya no necesitamos este cable físico”. El primero respondió: “Tonterías. Además, ¿por qué nadie ha vuelto nunca de allí si hay vida? El parto es el final de la vida, y en el posparto no hay más que oscuridad y silencio y olvido. No nos lleva a ninguna parte. “Bueno, no lo sé”, dijo el segundo, “pero seguro que nos encontraremos con la Madre y ella cuidará de nosotros”. El primero respondió: “¿Madre? ¿Crees en la Madre? Eso es ridículo. Si la Madre existe, entonces, ¿dónde está Ella ahora? El Segundo dijo. Ella está a nuestro alrededor. Estamos rodeados por ella. Somos de Ella. Es en Ella que vivimos. Sin Ella, este mundo no existiría ni podría existir”. Dijo el primero: “Pues yo no la veo, así que es lógico que no salga”. El segundo respondió: “A veces, cuando estás en silencio, te enfocas y escuchas, puedes escuchar Su voz amorosa, llamándote”. (Dr. Wayne Dyer). ¿Suena eso como el argumento de los saduceos en el evangelio de hoy?

Jesús afirma dos realidades en el Evangelio de este fin de semana en Lucas 20:27-38, que la resurrección de los muertos es una realidad, porque Dios es un Dios de vivos y no de muertos. En segundo lugar, que la vida en la resurrección no se parece a nada de lo que hemos experimentado aquí en la tierra. En noviembre, no dudemos en ayudar a los que han muerto y ofrecer la Santa Misa y oraciones por ellos. Tenemos este deber ante todo para con los miembros de nuestra familia, nuestros amigos, los feligreses, las almas olvidadas y aquellos por quienes no hay nadie por quien rezar.

## Evangelio según San Lucas (Lc. 20, 27-38)



En aquel tiempo, se acercaron algunos saduceos, los que dicen que no hay resurrección, y preguntaron a Jesús:

«Maestro, Moisés nos dejó escrito: “Si a uno se le muere su hermano, dejando mujer pero sin hijos, que tome la mujer como

esposa y de descendencia a su hermano. Pues bien, había siete hermanos; el primero se casó y murió sin hijos. El segundo y el tercero se casaron con ella, y así los siete, y murieron todos sin dejar hijos. Por último, también murió la mujer. Cuando llegue la resurrección, ¿de cuál de ellos será la mujer? Porque los siete la tuvieron como mujer». Jesús les dijo:

«En este mundo los hombres se casan y las mujeres toman esposo, pero los que sean juzgados dignos de tomar parte en el mundo futuro y en la resurrección de entre los muertos no se casarán ni ellas serán dadas en matrimonio. Pues ya no pueden morir, ya que son como ángeles; y son hijos de Dios, porque son hijos de la resurrección. Y que los muertos resucitan, lo indicó el mismo Moisés en el episodio de la zarza, cuando llama al Señor: “Dios de Abrahán, Dios de Isaac, Dios de Jacob”. No es Dios de muertos, sino de vivos: porque para él todos están vivos».

**Palabra del Señor/ Gloria a ti Señor Jesús.**

*El evangelio de este domingo nos presenta a Jesús enfrentando a los saduceos, quienes negaban la resurrección. Para ponerlo en dificultad y ridiculizar la fe en la resurrección de los muertos, parten de un caso imaginario: “Una mujer tuvo siete maridos, que murieron uno tras otro”, y preguntan a Jesús: “¿De cuál de ellos será esposa esa mujer después de su muerte?”. Jesús, siempre apacible y paciente, en primer lugar responde que la vida después de la muerte, la vida eterna es otra vida, en otra dimensión donde ya no existirá el matrimonio, que está vinculado a nuestra existencia en este mundo. Los resucitados -dice Jesús- serán como los ángeles, y vivirán en un estado diverso, que ahora no podemos experimentar y ni siquiera imaginar. Si miramos sólo con ojo humano, estamos predispuestos a decir que el camino del hombre va de la vida hacia la muerte. Jesús le da un giro a esta perspectiva y afirma que nuestra peregrinación va de la muerte a la vida: la vida plena. Nosotros estamos en camino, en peregrinación hacia la vida plena, y es vida plena es la que ilumina nuestro camino.*

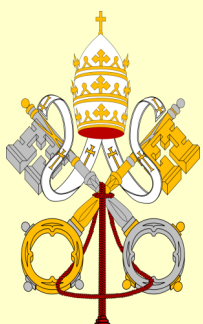
