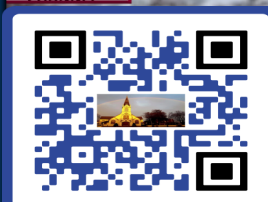

Sister Karen Lademann, OP

I have been called by name to live my life as an Amityville Dominican since 1973. I first met the Dominicans in grammar school at St. Rose of Lima in Massapequa and had them both in Queen of the Rosary Academy and Molloy College. My ministries as a Sister have been varied and have served both in the Diocese of Brooklyn and Rockville Centre. Some of my ministries have been in elementary school and high school as a teacher and principal, Director of Religious Education, Director of a Human Service Center and presently a Wellness Advocate for our senior sisters in our Motherhouse in Amityville.

If I look back over these past 48 years as a sister, I have been greatly enriched by God's people in all my ministries. They have shown me the face of God in many different ways. And I pray that I have also shown them God's face and His love for them. May I continue in the holy preaching as a sign of joy and hope to the people of God as I minister to and with them.

Sister Kathleen P. Murphy O.P.

I have been an Amityville Dominican Sister for 58 years. I have a Bachelor of Arts Degree in History from Molloy College and a Masters in Theology Degree from Immaculate Conception Seminary. I have ministered as an elementary school teacher of grades 4 through 8 in Our Lady of Perpetual Help, Lindenhurst, Our Lady of Hope, Middle Village, Christ the King, Commack and here at St. Ignatius Loyola.

I returned to the parish in 1976 as principal and later served as Human Services Coordinator for 20 years. For four years, I was Pastoral Associate at St. Boniface Martyr in Sea Cliff. Since 1999, I have been a Parish Outreach Coordinator at St. Agnes Cathedral in Rockville Centre. It has been a real blessing for me to minister to those in need for 42 years and to be supported in that ministry by the generosity of parishioners.

I was happy to return to residence here in 2007 and continue to do so today.

Sister Mary O'Donnell, O.P

I have been a member of the Sisters of St. Dominic, for the past sixty-seven years. As women religious, we strive to ground our life in prayer, study, community and mission, the four pillars of Dominican life. My undergraduate studies were completed at St Francis College in Brooklyn and my Masters degrees are from Hunter College and the College of New Rochelle. My elementary school teaching ministry began in Queens in the mid 1950's and ended in the late sixties in Bayamon, Puerto-Rico. While there, I received a grant from the Inter-American University of P.R. to assist me in teaching English to speakers of other languages. When I returned to the States, my community sent me to teach high school students at Maria Regina, D.H.S. in Uniondale.

In 1972, and for what turned out to be the next thirty-seven years, I began a commitment to serving God's people as an elementary and high school principal at: Christ the King, Commack, St Joseph, Garden City, St. Ignatius Loyola, Hicksville and our community's high school, Queen of the Rosary Academy aka: "QRA." The Academy was located on the grounds of our Motherhouse. During the years I served at "QRA", I was blessed to come to know and work with many of the parishioners of St. Ignatius Loyola Parish whose daughters attended QRA—Deacon George Mais and Mickey, his wife, just to name one.

I thank God for His grace and mercy throughout my years in active ministry and for the support and encouragement I have received from my pastors, parents, parishioners and colleagues.

Sister Joan Klimski, OP

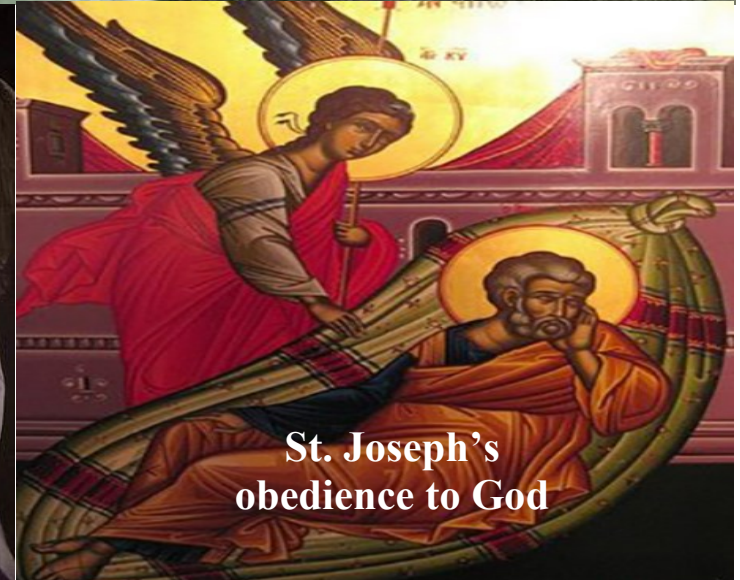
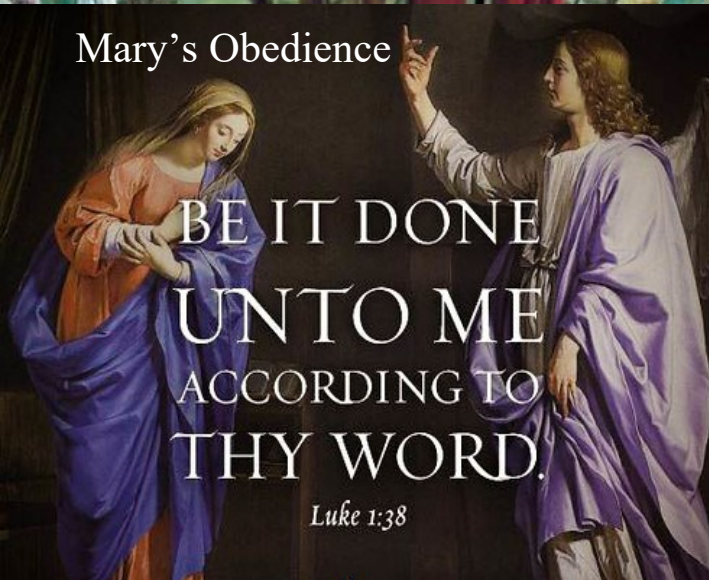
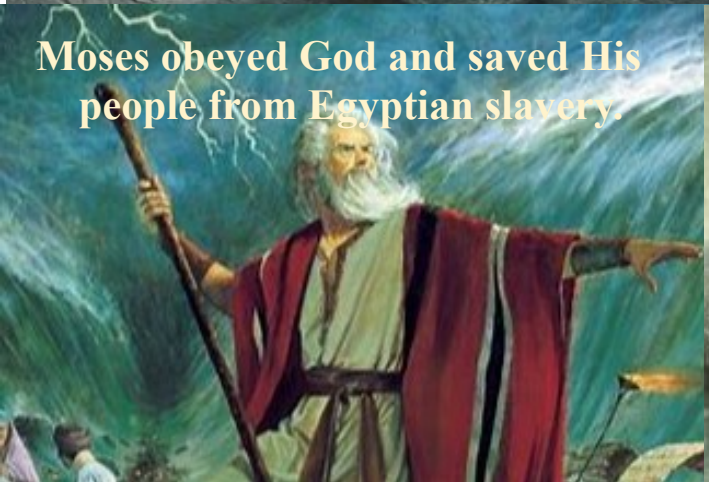
- I have been a member of the Dominican Sisters of Amityville for the past 53 years and over those years have had many experiences in ministry.

GROW AS A DISCIPLE | PRAY, STUDY, ENGAGE, SERVE

We put off all kinds of things for all kinds of reasons. I'll take that trip with my family once my schedule clears up. Someday I'll read that book collecting dust on my shelf. I'll volunteer at church once I get my own act together. Today's readings remind us that God will take us as we are: We need only say "yes." In each of the readings, the protagonists - Isaiah, Paul, and Peter - initially resist God's call, fearing their sinfulness disqualifies them. We may feel that way, too. However, in each case, God forgives their sins and gives them the grace to say, like Isaiah, "Here I am. Send me!" Their assent can be a challenge to those of us who hold back from becoming more involved in our parish or sharing our faith with others, fearing we aren't good enough or aren't an expert in theology. Jesus reminds us that it is ultimately not about us, but him. We don't have to be perfect, just willing to push past our fears and trust him to make disciples of us.

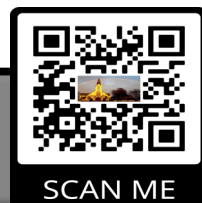
GO EVANGELIZE

In today's readings, we hear descriptions of Isaiah's lips touched by a burning ember, Paul being transformed from persecutor to preacher, and the fishermen dropping their nets to follow Jesus. In each case, that turning point led to a life of witness. We may not have such a dramatic story to share, but most of us can look back and see turning points: That influential teacher, the aunt who saw the best in us, a priest, sister, or retreat leader who spoke to our hearts. Today's readings can encourage us to be that person for others - the one who shows them the love of Christ and what a difference it can make. Buoyed by God's grace, we can share the Good News with others and accompany one another as we seek to follow Jesus in our day-to-day lives.

Want to make better decisions?

The best decisions are those made in harmony with God's will. And, a close relationship with God brings a strong sense of what He wants for us. When we grow distant and distracted, our perception of His will grows dim and the right course of action becomes less obvious. Prayer and Scripture reading help to bring clarity.



The right way to pray

Think of prayer as a focused conversation between two people who love each other. There is no one right way to pray. It is most rewarding when you talk to your loved one as often as possible, giving Him the best of your attention. Pope John Paul II said, "Pray any way you like, so long as you do pray." God is always ready to listen.

Rediscover God's love for you

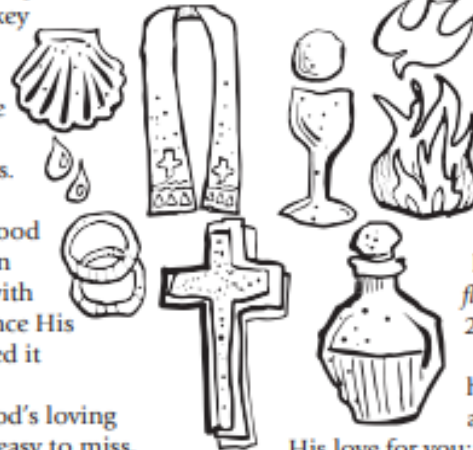
"God is our refuge and strength, a very present help in trouble" (Psalm 46:1). In these challenging times, being grounded in God's personal, powerful love is key to staying strong, positive, at peace, and able to handle whatever happens. A time of uncertainty is a good time to strengthen our connection with God and experience His love when we need it most.

Make room. God's loving presence may be easy to miss, especially if we do more talking than listening. Sometimes prayer means we talk at God instead of to Him. It is best to listen in the silence of our hearts. In prayer, open your heart to hear what He has to say. "Speak, Lord, for your

servant is listening" (1 Sam 3:10).

Embrace the Sacraments. More than just symbols, Sacraments are personal encounters with God's unlimited love and grace. For example, in Confession, we receive Christ's powerful, healing love. In the Eucharist, we encounter Jesus and his love for us, "in the flesh" (Matthew 26:26-28) at every Mass. Find a devotion that helps you focus on God and better understand

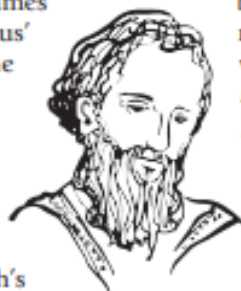
His love for you: the Rosary, Eucharistic Adoration, the Chaplet of Divine Mercy, praying novenas, reciting litanies, attending daily Mass. Devotions highlight some aspect of God's intensely personal love for us and gives us ways to respond.



Why Do Catholics Do That?

Why do Catholics call St. James the "brother of the Lord?"

St. Mark's Gospel names St. James as one of Jesus' "brothers" (6:3). In the original languages of the Bible, "brother" included other male relatives. Additionally, tradition holds that Cleopas was St. Joseph's



brother and James was his son, making him Jesus' cousin. Either way, the Church has always taught Mary's perpetual virginity, meaning Jesus (who was miraculously conceived) was her only child. This explains why Jesus entrusted Mary to St. John and not a sibling He didn't have (John 19:26-27).

Find peace in difficult times

If you follow news about national or world events, the reporting can rob you of peace. With stories of financial insecurity, unemployment, disease, depression, and division, how can we find peace?

Talk it out. Bringing worries into the light and confiding them to someone we trust can cut them down to size. Even better – talk about worries with God. Prayer has the added advantage of surrendering your problems into powerful hands. "Jesus, I trust in You!"

Focus on what you can do, not what you can't.



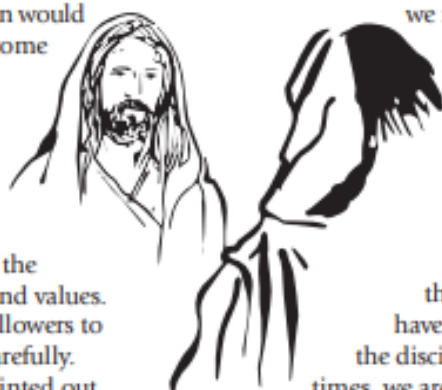
Stress results from feeling powerless. Focusing on what we can't do can "paralyze" our problem-solving abilities. Start making a list of steps you can take toward solving your problem. Whatever is beyond your control, leave to God.

Immerse yourself in God's all-powerful love. Whether we feel it or not, whether we believe it or not, we are God's precious children. He watches over us very closely. He knows what we can handle and is more than ready to help us with all the rest.

Luke 6:39-45, Fraternal correction begins with "me"

There is a danger to following someone who doesn't know the way to God. In Jesus' time, a young man would apply to a rabbi to become one of his students. The student would live with the rabbi, study with him, and assist him with his work. As a result, the student might take on the teacher's philosophy and values. Jesus cautioned His followers to choose their leaders carefully.



he himself is blind to the plank of wood in his own. Therefore, Jesus said we must first deal with our own faults before correcting others.

We are called to be disciples of Jesus Christ – God Himself – through whom we have eternal life. Like the disciples in Biblical times, we are called to stay close to Christ, let His grace transform us, and to live according to His values. Finally, we are called to bring Him to others.

Q & A How can we celebrate the Presentation?

The Presentation is when Jesus' parents brought Him to the Temple to consecrate Him to God, in accord with ancient Jewish Law. Celebrating the feast of the Presentation of Our Lord began as early as the fourth century AD.



The candle connection. We recall Simeon's prayer, in which he honored Jesus as "a light to reveal [God] to the nations" (Luke 2:32).

Priests bless hundreds of candles and give them to the faithful for home use, lending this feast its other name: Candlemas.

Pancakes and crêpes are the traditional food for this day because of their light color. Treat yourself to anything that reminds you of the light and joy of this last "Christmas" feast day, like white chocolate, ice-cream, popcorn, mashed potatoes, etc.

Give back. God gave everything He had to save us because we mean everything to Him. Mary and Joseph made a ritual sacrifice in gratitude for their Son. In gratitude for His sacrifice, put something extra in the poor box at church in His honor.

Feasts & Celebrations

Feb. 2 – Presentation of the Lord. In accordance with Moses' Law, Mary and Joseph brought Jesus to the Temple forty days after his birth. Simeon praised God for revealing the long-awaited Savior, saying, "Lord, now you let your servant depart in peace, according to thy word" (Luke 2:29).

Feb. 5 - St. Agatha (251). St. Agatha dedicated herself to God and kept this vow despite torture and imprisonment. God sent her a vision of St. Peter to comfort her, heal her, and fill her dungeon with heavenly light.

Feb. 22 – St. Margaret of Cortona (1297). St. Margaret's conversion came after the sudden death of the man she was having an affair with. Shaken, she repented and became a Franciscan tertiary. She founded a hospital and an order of Tertiary sisters to operate it.

Feb. 28 – Sts. Romanus and Lupicinus (460). Saint Romanus became a hermit when he was 35. Later, his brother St. Lupicinus joined him in religious life. Together they founded two monasteries and a convent.

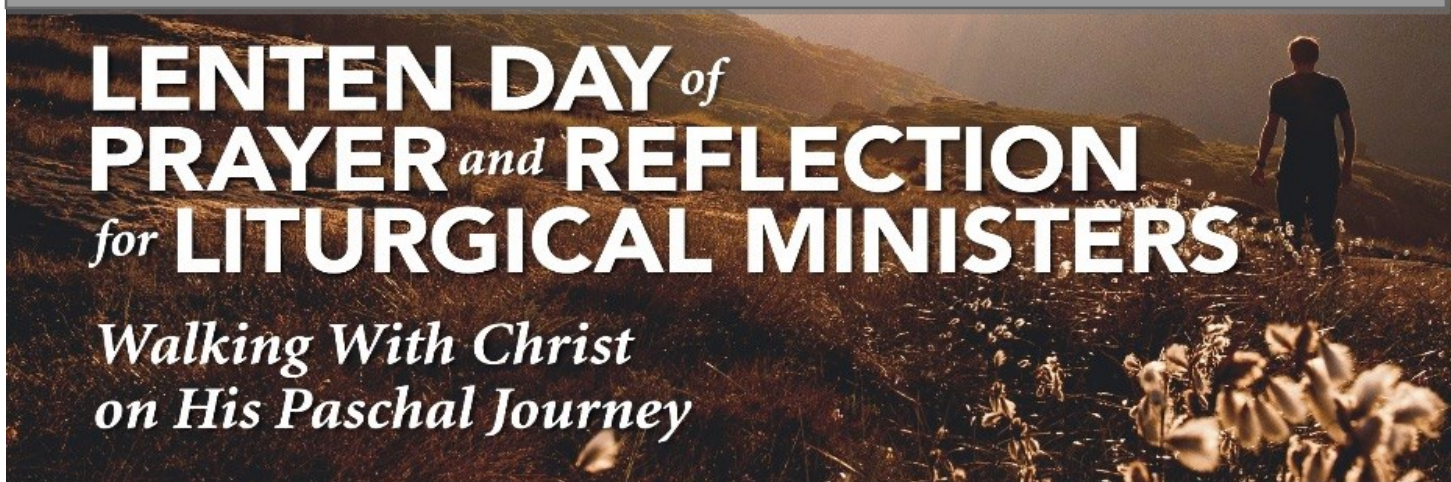

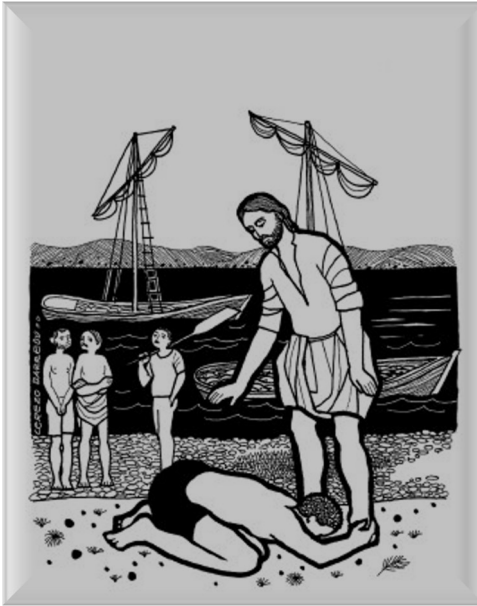

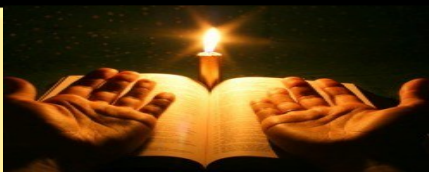
